## Local G-I Back From War With Dutch Girl As Bride

The romance of a comely Dutch lassie from the land of tulips and an American soldier which culminanted in a simple but impressive wedding ceremony in Maastricht, Holland, April 14, 1945, brought joy to the household of Mr. and Mrs. Michael Rice, 1435 Orchard St., Bethlehem.

Mrs. Rice's brother, John Capowitz, met his bride, the former Maria VanNunspeet, in New York City, July 8, when the SS. Brazil docked in New York harbor with 481 GI. brides on deck. Eight brides were from Holland, several from Russia and Italy and the majority from France. Only 12 children were aboard.

The Rice's are very much inpressed with their new sister-inlaw who speaks a bit of English. She is the daughter of a wood carver and one of a family of five girls and five boys. She delights in telling how she met her American husband through one of her brothers in the Netherlands Army who invited Corporal Papowitz to their home. The couple rode to the St. Lambertus Catholic Church, Maastricht; in a horse and buggy on the eventful day of April 14, 1945, and the bridegroom has the honor of being the first American soldier to take the marriage vows in that church. Friends of the family of the VanNunspeet's pooled their ration points that day so that there might be meat on the table for the wedding dinner.

In speaking of the English language, the bride said she learned most of her English from her husband and in return taught him the Netherlands language. Some of her

would meet at one or the others homes to improve their English. She said, "These were friendly gatherings and we had much fun."

It was hard to leave her devoted family in Holland, she said. However, she wants to leave the horrors of the war in the past and start life anew in a great country with her American husband and his hospit-
