Memorial Service Planned Sunday for Pen Argyl Soldier

Special memorial services for Pfc. Abram Haffling, son of Mrs. Abey Brewen of 709 George Street, Pen Argyl, who was killed in action in the U. S. Army, in France on August 28, will be conducted tomorrow evening at the regular worship service in the St. John's Lutheran Church, Pen Argyl, in charge of the pastor, the Rev. Charles J. Shimer, who will give a special address.

Pfc. Haffling entered the U. S. Army service in February, 1943, and received his training at Fort Benning, Ga., Fort Jackson, S. C., and Fort Meade, Md., from where he went overseas on February 6 of this year. While overseas he was in the invasion of Southern France and was in a hospital following action at Anzio where he had trench foot. He was also with the American troops which went through Rome.

He attended the Pen Argyl Public Schools and prior to leaving for service was employed at the Argyle Silk Underwear Company in Pen Argyl. He was a member of the St. John's Lutheran church of Pen Argyl.

Surviving are his mother and the following brothers and sisters: Mrs. Elizabeth Smith of Wind Gap; Mrs. Miriam Flyte of Wind Gap; William Haffling, Wind Gap R. D. 1; Milford Haffling of Pen Argyl; Jerry Haffling, Easton; Isabelle and Clayton Brewen at home.
