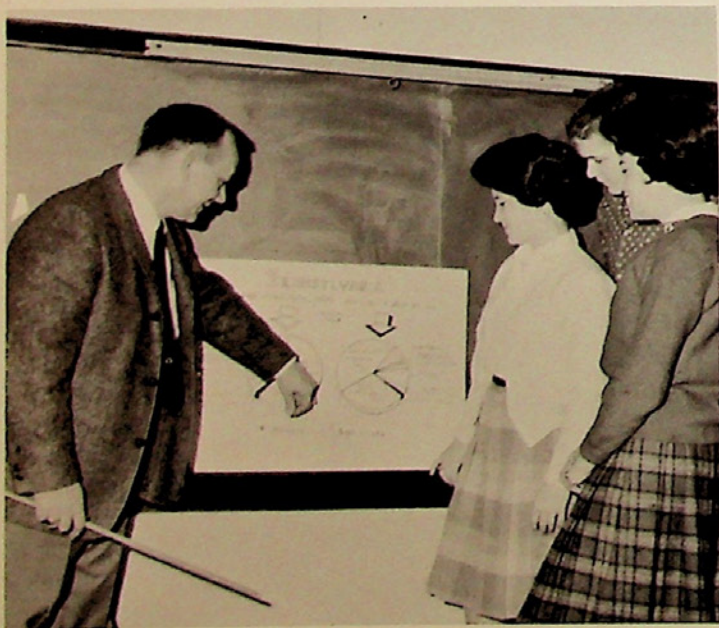

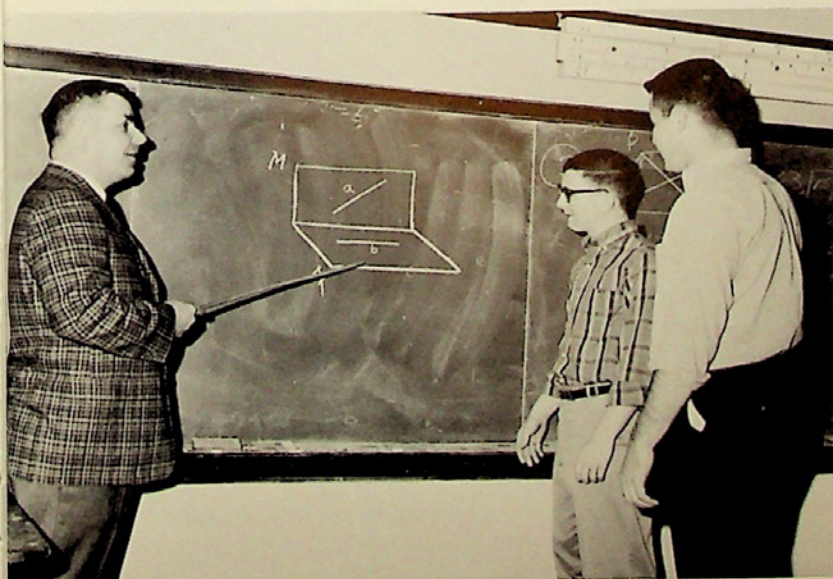

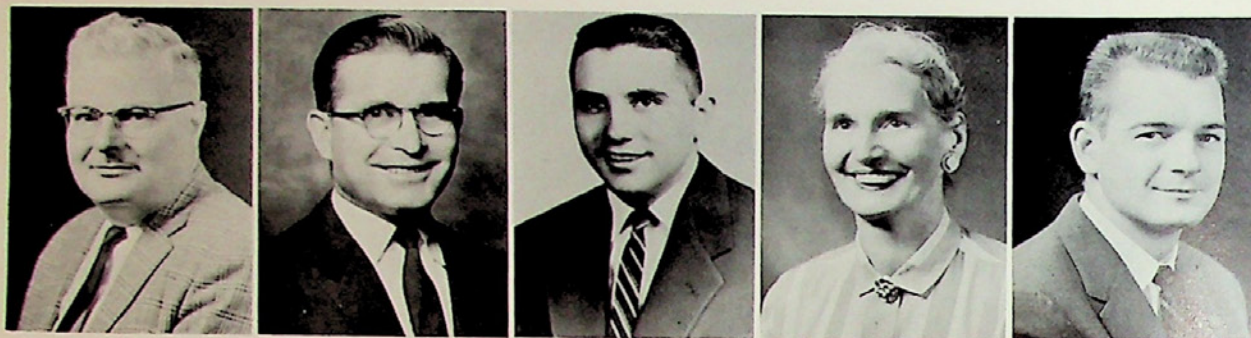


All levels of mathematics are available and are planned according to the students' abilities and future plans. Students entering fields which do not require a knowledge of higher mathematics can select high school math, plane geometry, or algebra.

Courses offered to college preparatory students are plane and solid geometry, trigonometry, algebra 1, 2, 3, and advanced academic math, which consists of calculus and analytic geometry. Logic, the set theory, Venn diagrams, and the Truth Tables are gradually being introduced into all abstract math courses.

An accelerated summer course in trigonometry and solid geometry is offered to selected honor students.

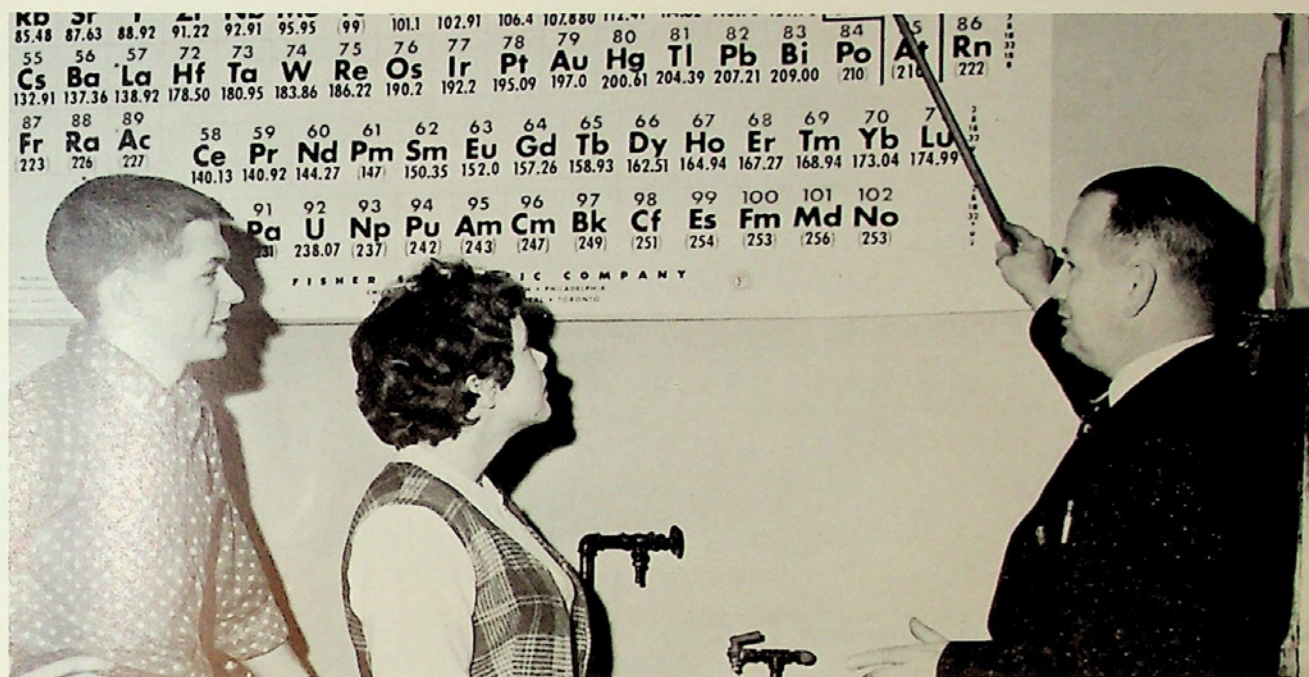

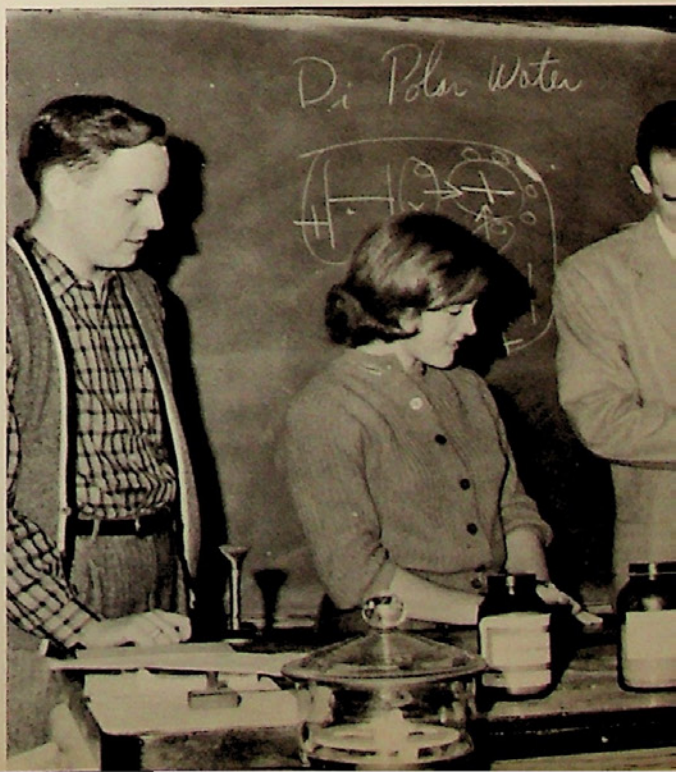

From the atoms to the stars is the scope of the science courses at Liberty. Conscious of the fact that science is of ever-increasing importance in today's world, this department offers a variety of courses geared to the individual student's abilities. In many of the college prep sections, instruction is accelerated.

Students in the academic physics and chemistry courses receive seven periods of instruction per week composed of three periods of theory and four of laboratory. Nursing chemistry is offered to interested pupils.

Senior science and physical science deal with the principles of physics and chemistry without a mathematical approach. General biology and advanced biology, which includes extensive bacteriological work, are also available.

Russian, German, Latin, French, and Spanish constitute the language curriculum at Liberty. The latter four can be studied for four years; Russian, however, is available for only three.

Language laboratory equipment enables students to hear the correct accent of natives of different countries. Pupils can also record and listen to their own voices, thus realizing and correcting their mistakes.

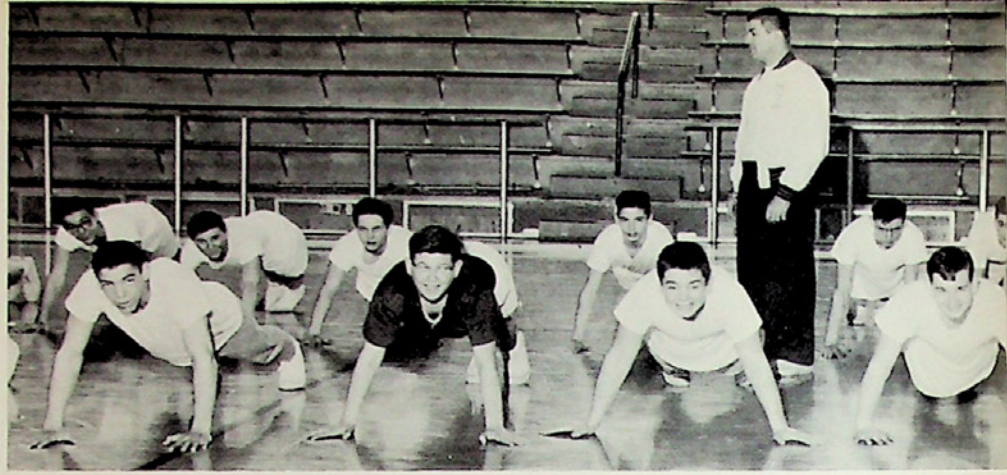

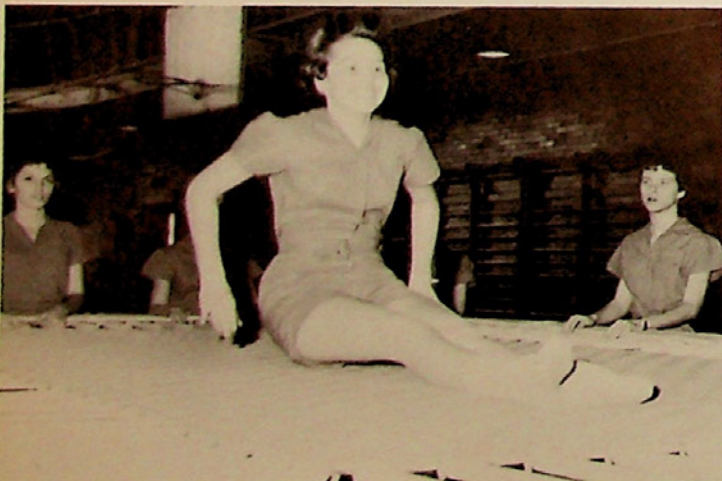

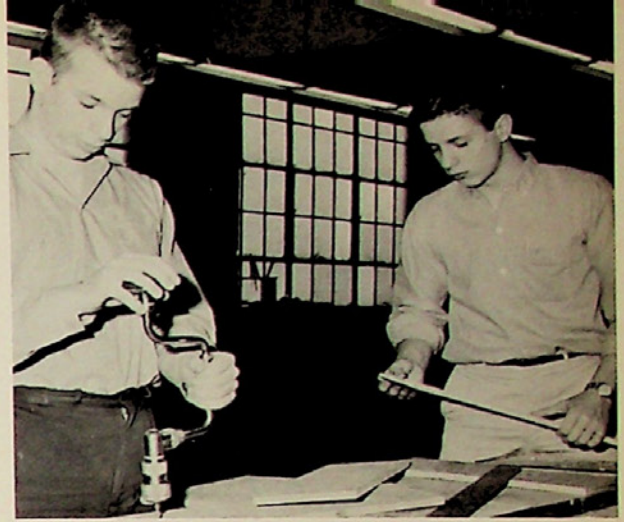
HIGHWAY SAFETY EDUCATION

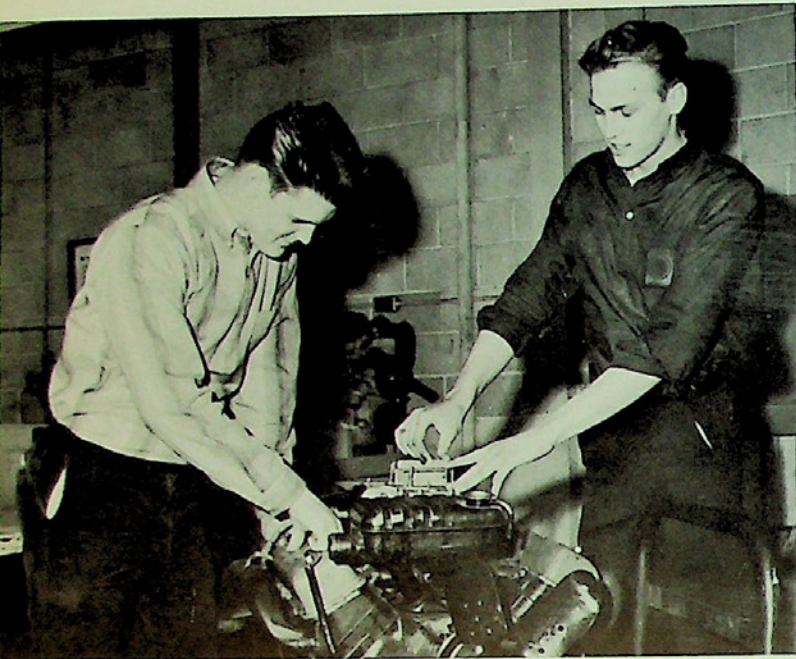

AUTOMOTIVE

Auto mechanics, directed by Mr. Leidig, supplies students with the knowledge necessary for servicing the complex machinery of the automotive world.

Detailed study of the operation of an automobile is taught in the sophomore and junior years. Seniors gain invaluable practical experience by actually working on automobiles.

Students completing the auto body course, taught by Mr. Vallone, are prepared to enter the field of automobile body repair.

Sophomores learn fundamental operations such as sanding, aligning panels, and repairing dents. Juniors are instructed about methods of welding, brazing, soldering, and shrinking. Seniors are capable of spraying automobiles and repairing any part of a car body.

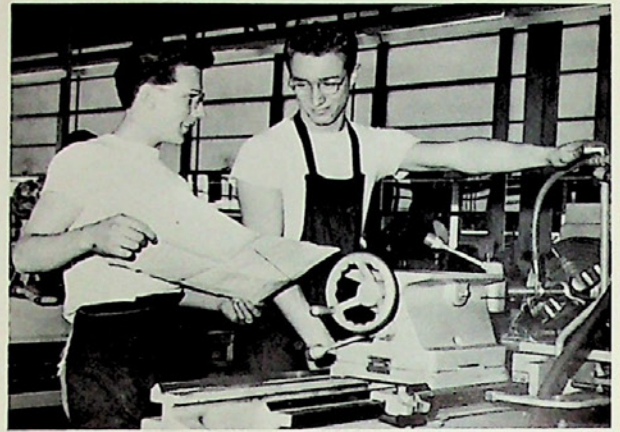

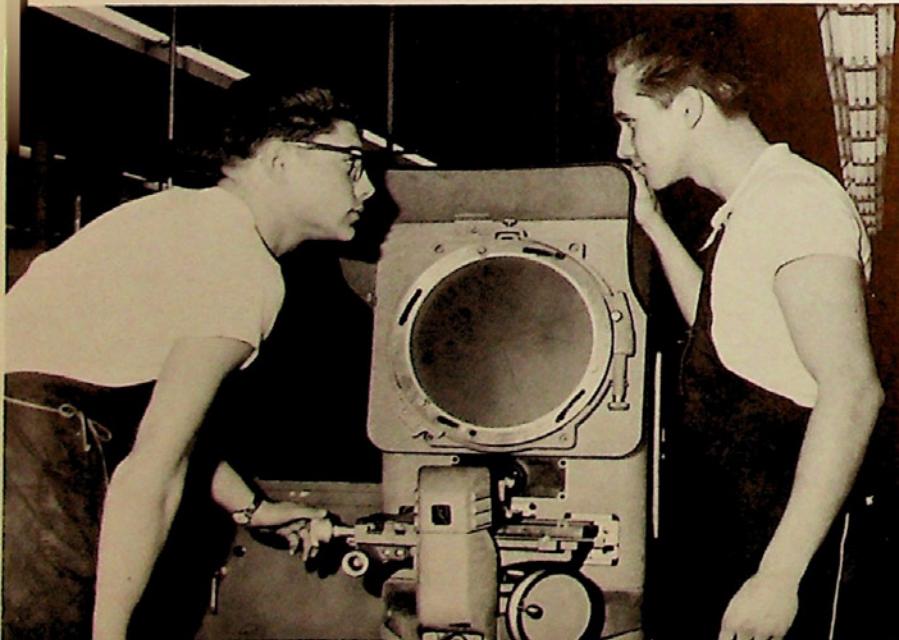

MACHINE SHOP

Metallurgy, initiated to provide students with the basic knowledge and experience necessary for advanced studies, is taught by Mr. Ross. The selected boys, having learned fundamentals during the sophomore year, apply theories and techniques in actual laboratory practice during their junior and senior years.

Mr. Cacciatore and Mr. Rhoads, instructors in machine shop, teach the uses of the drill press, surface grinder, boring mill, and lathe. By working on increasingly complex projects, the students master acetylene operations and gain well-rounded backgrounds for working as machinists.

Drafting, a fundamental in engineering and architectural work, is under the direction of Mr. Dubbeling and Mr. Kach. Structural drafting is the study of drawing beams and columns; while mechanical drafting includes the drawing of machine, tool, and gear parts.

Related drawing, a sophomore and senior course, concentrates on the field of blueprints and is taught by Mr. Messinger.

In Liberty's civil technology course, the only one of its type in Pennsylvania, Mr. Andrucci teaches the basic fundamentals of surveying.

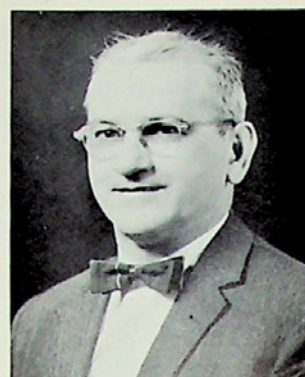

ELECTRICAL- ELECTRONICS

Vital and varied applications of electronics in the modern world make this study interesting as well as important.

Because of its complexity, various phases of the course are studied on each of the grade levels. Mr. Neamand instructs sophomores in fundamentals, in theory, and in the reading of the instruments they will use later. During the junior year, Mr. Risbon presents the theories and practical applications of motors, generators, and transformers.

To complete the course, seniors familiarize themselves with components used in basic electronic circuits and testing equipment used to check them, under the guidance of Mr. Michaels.

BUILDING TRADES

As the sole teacher of general metal working, Mr. Dietrich instructs sophomores in soldering and in the operation of crimping, bar fold, and rolling machines. Acetylene welding and burning, beam detail, and blueprint reading are areas covered during junior and senior years.

Mr. Snyder presents the fundamental concepts of construction. These include carpentry, heating, welding, plastering, template making, and roofing. Students gain practical experience by working at jobs both in and out of school.

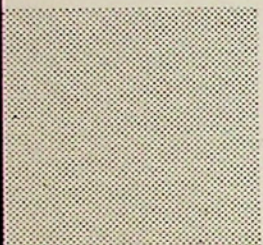
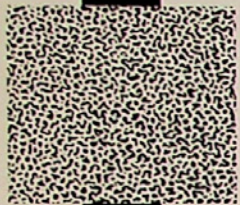

Liberty Life, the school newspaper, is published monthly by a student staff under the supervision of Mrs. Viola Leh. The paper again reaped first place honors in the Columbia Scholastic Press Association annual contest; it also received the Pennsylvania School Press Association's Keystone Award, the highest rating in the state. Individual merit of *Liberty Life's* representatives at the Temple University Press Tournament was rewarded with a first place rank in that competition.

In April *Liberty Life* sponsored a sample fair to aid the financing of the paper. 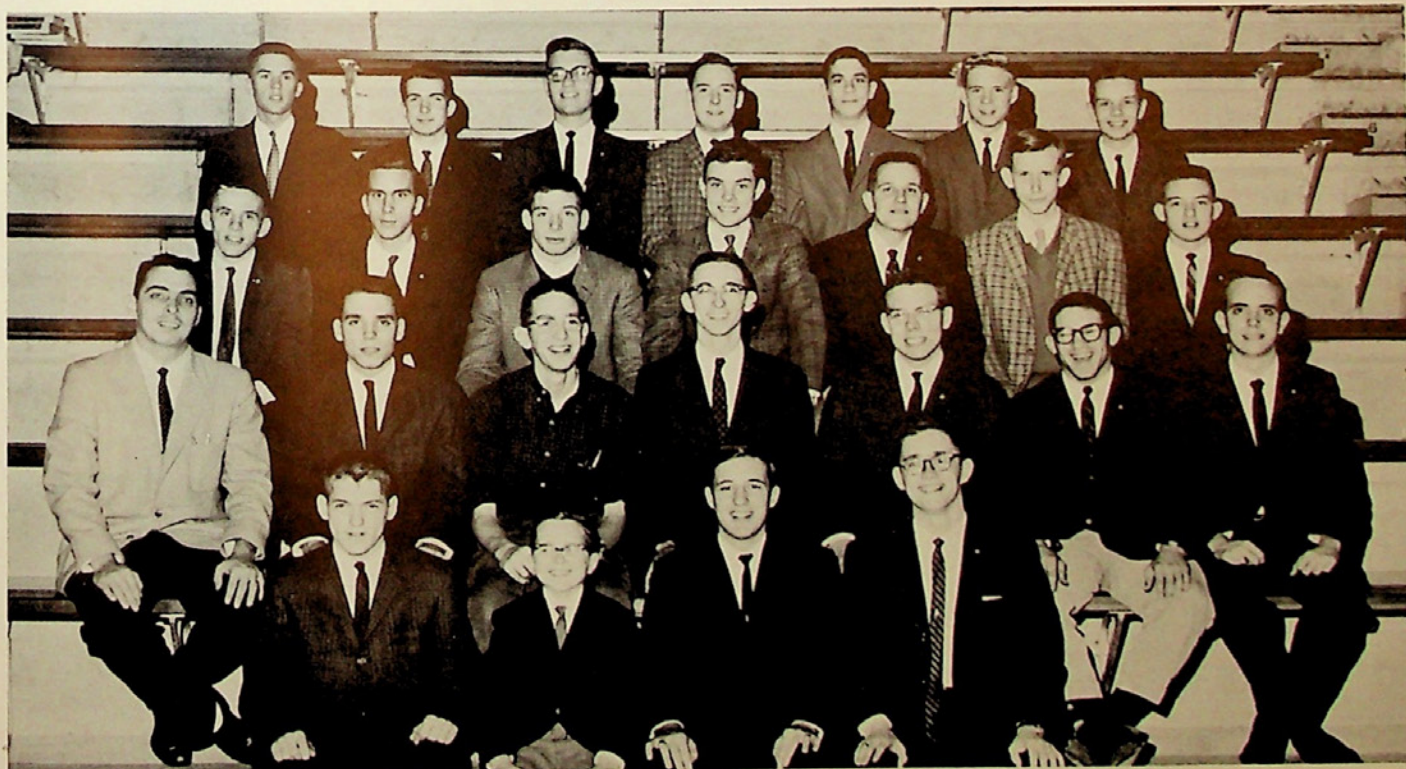

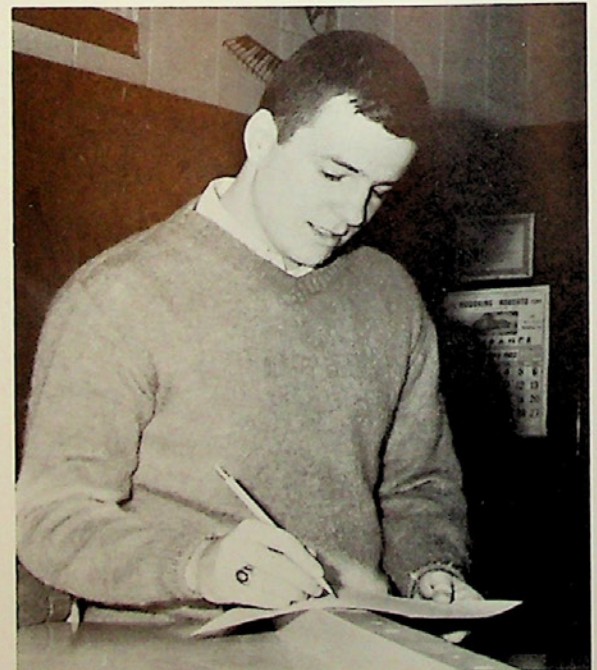

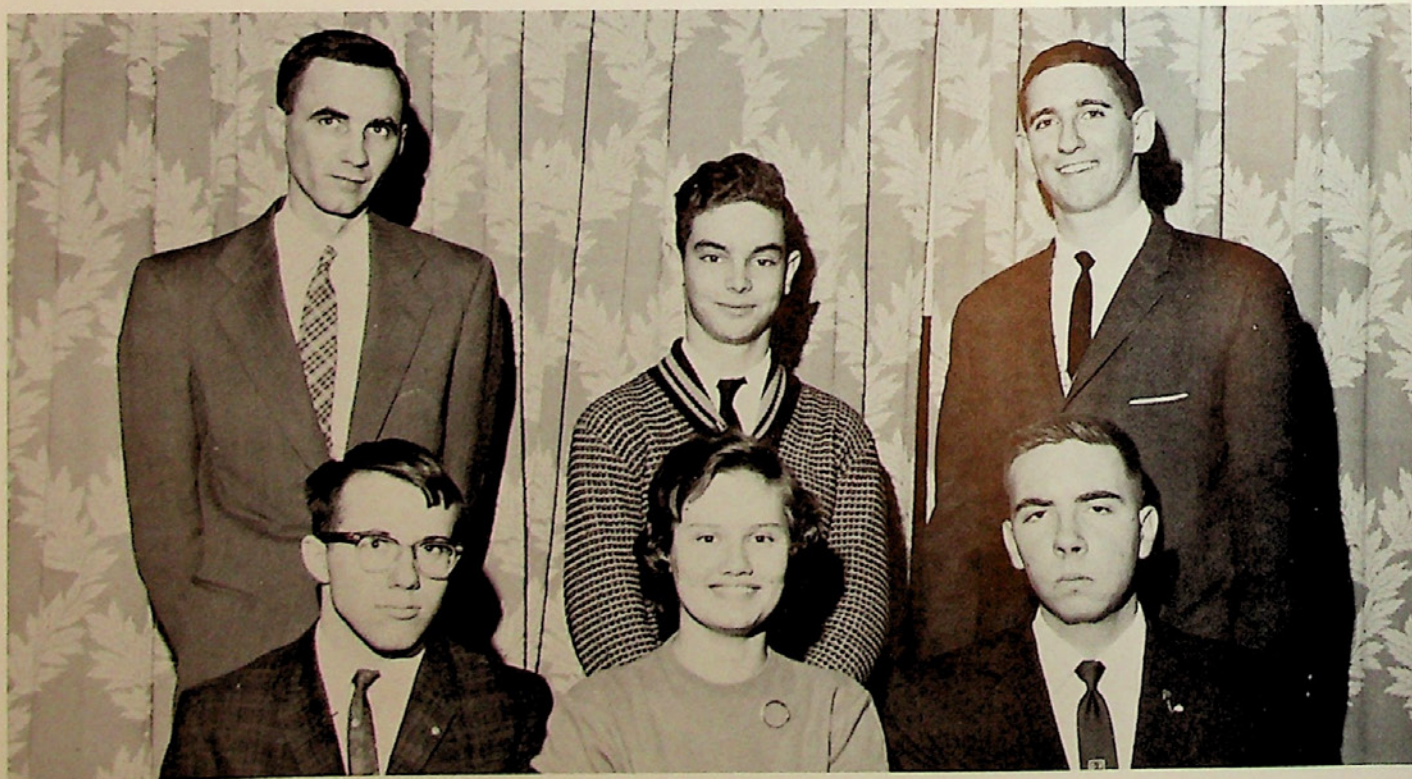
Originally one of the oldest organizations in the school, the Debating Club was reorganized last year after a long period of dormancy.

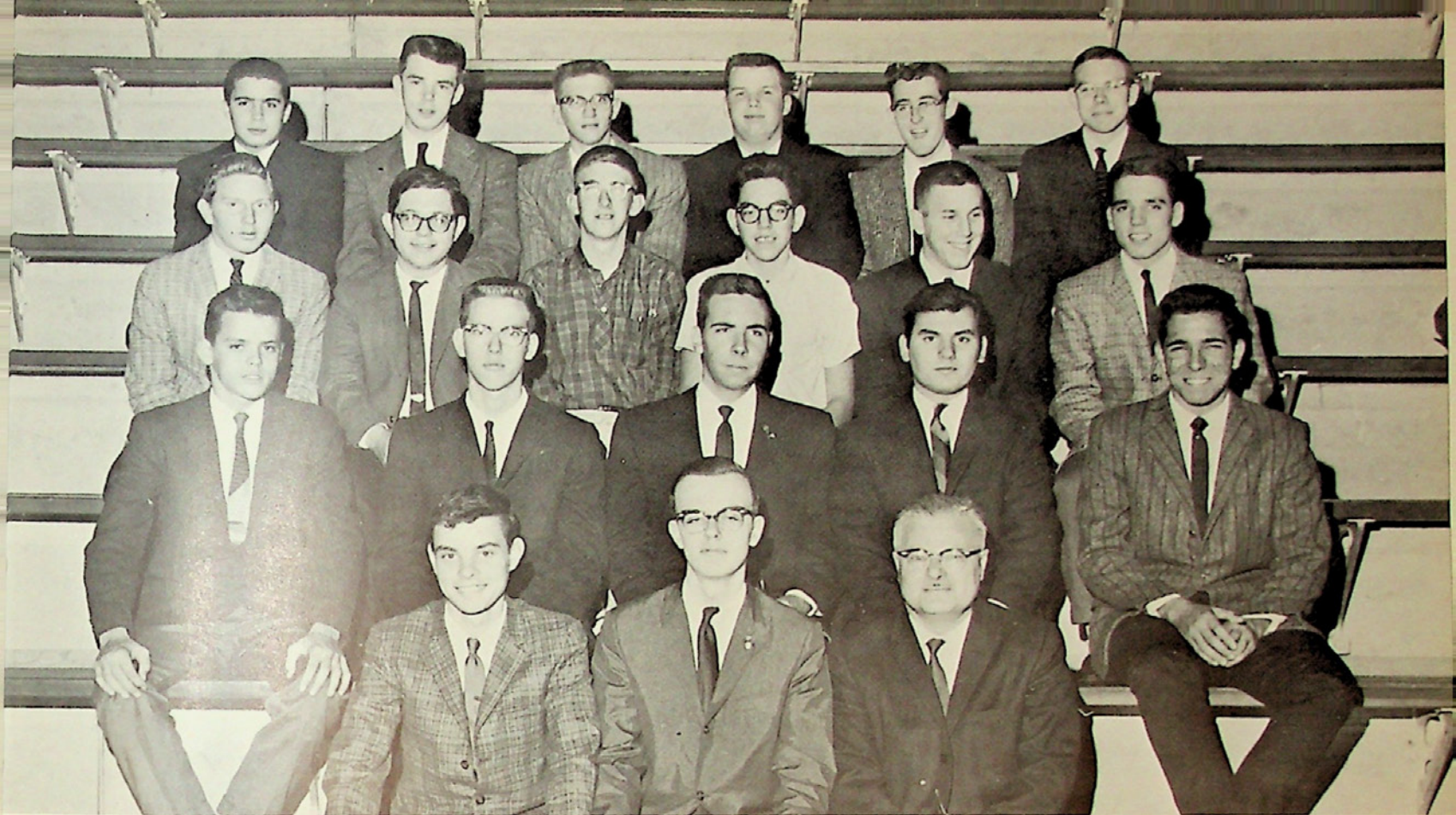

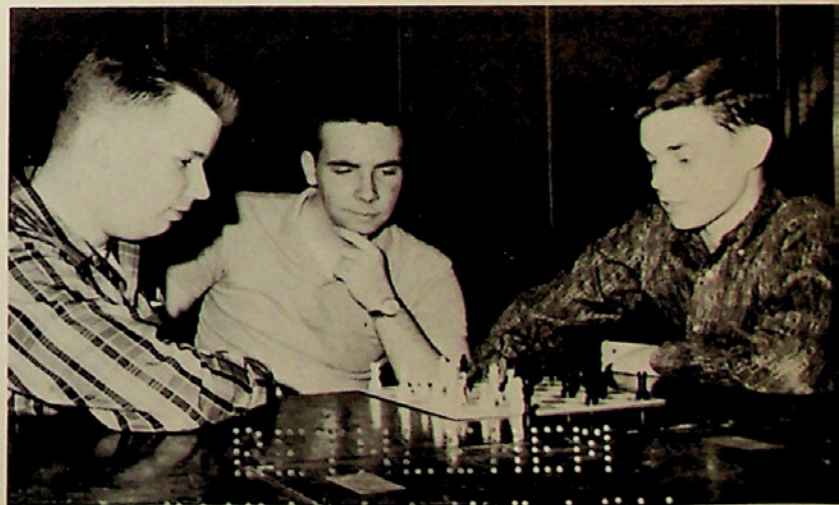

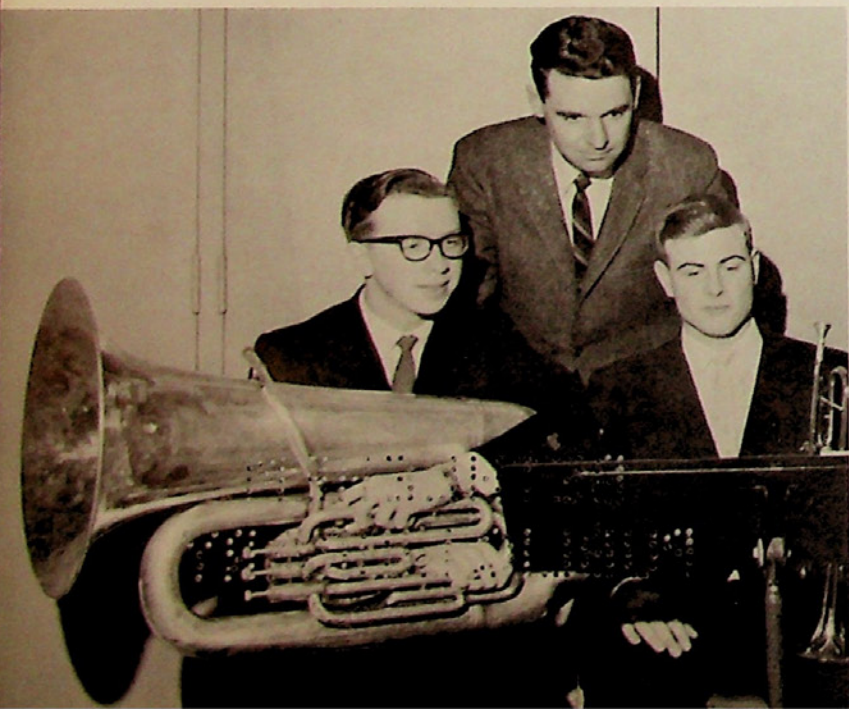

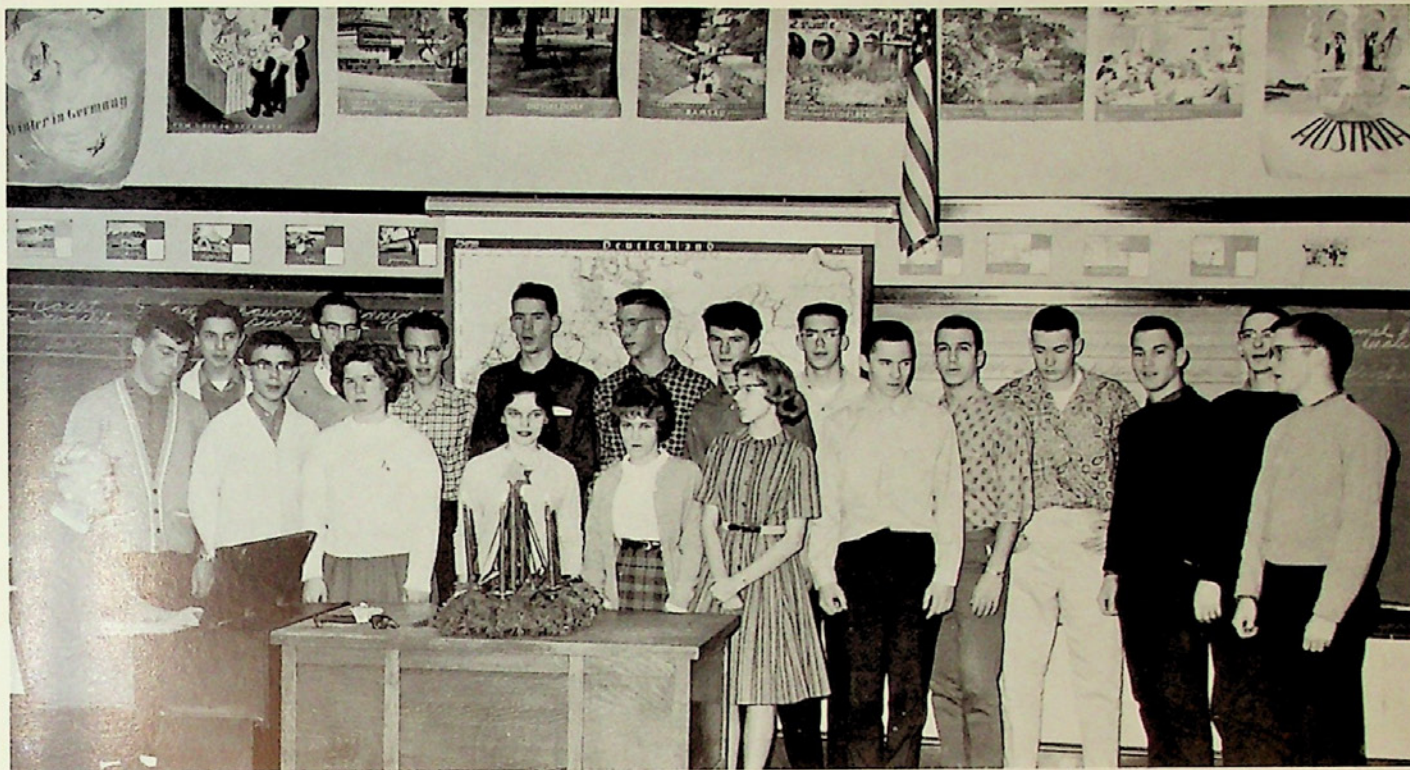

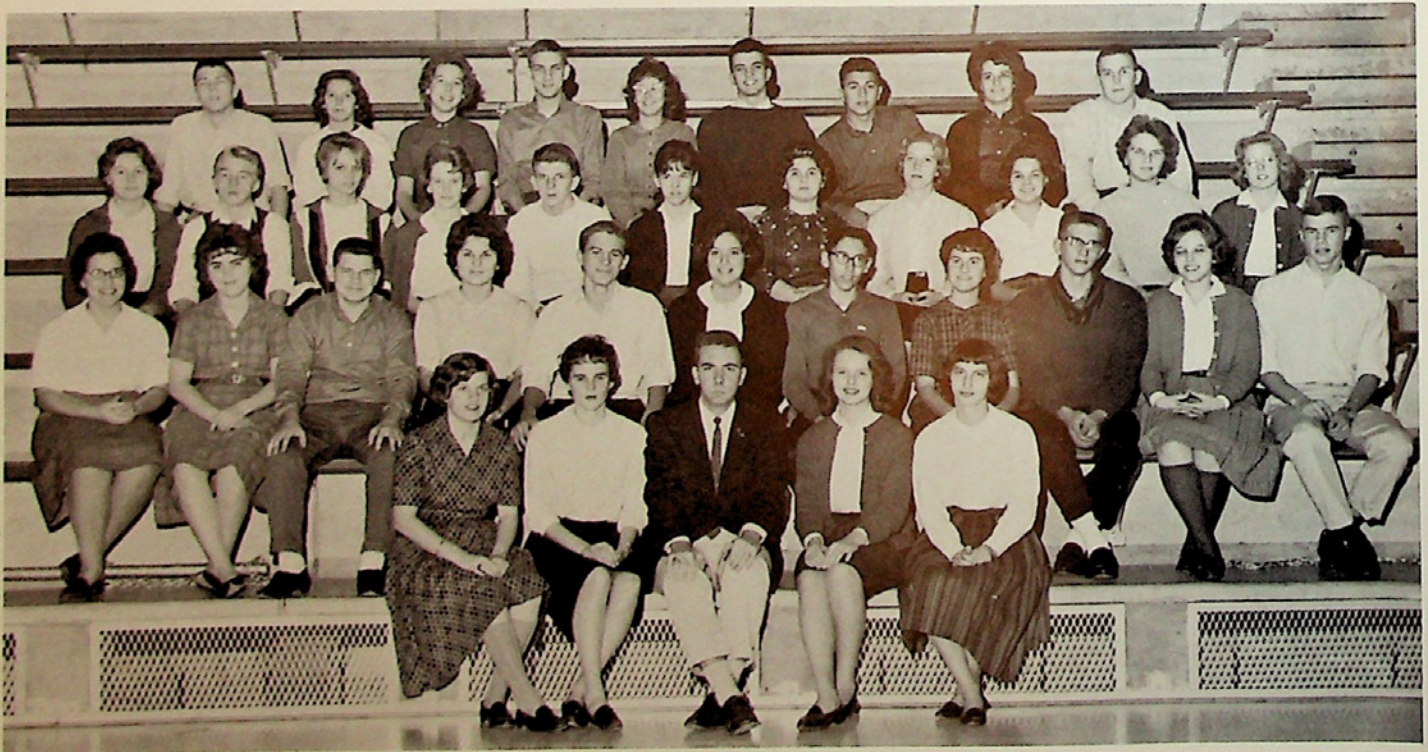

Not only did band members exercise their musical talents at school affairs, but they also enjoyed themselves at their annual Halloween and Christmas parties and on their New York trip.

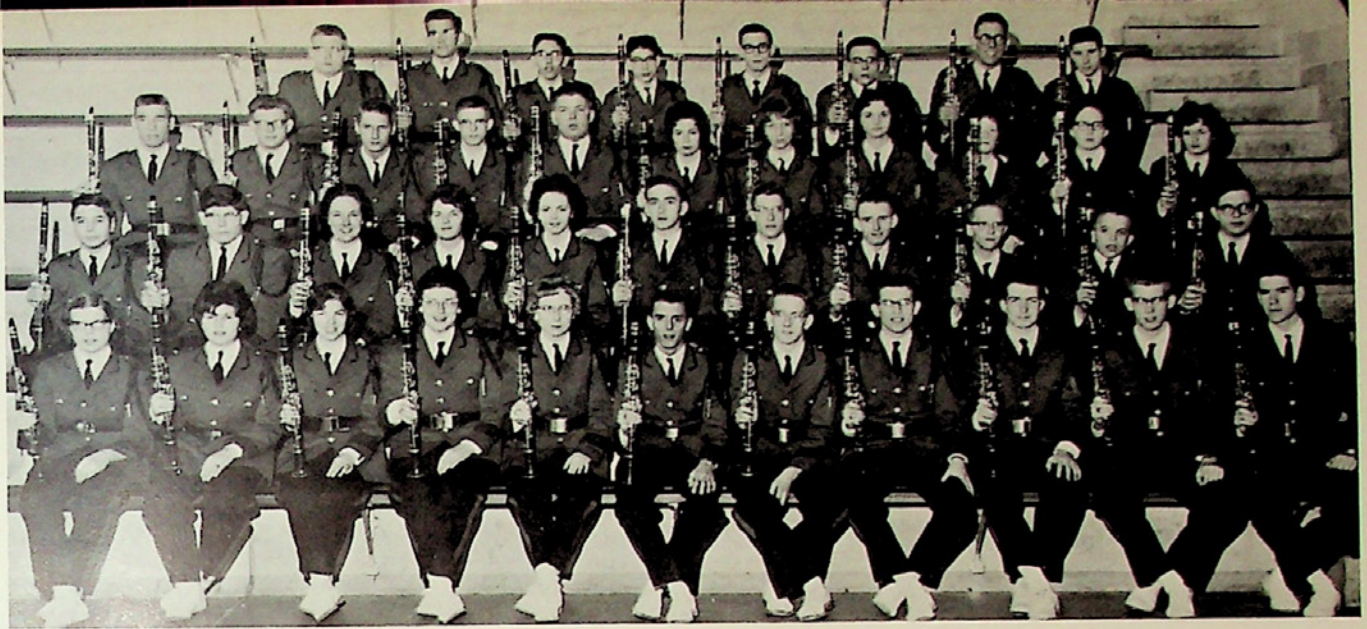

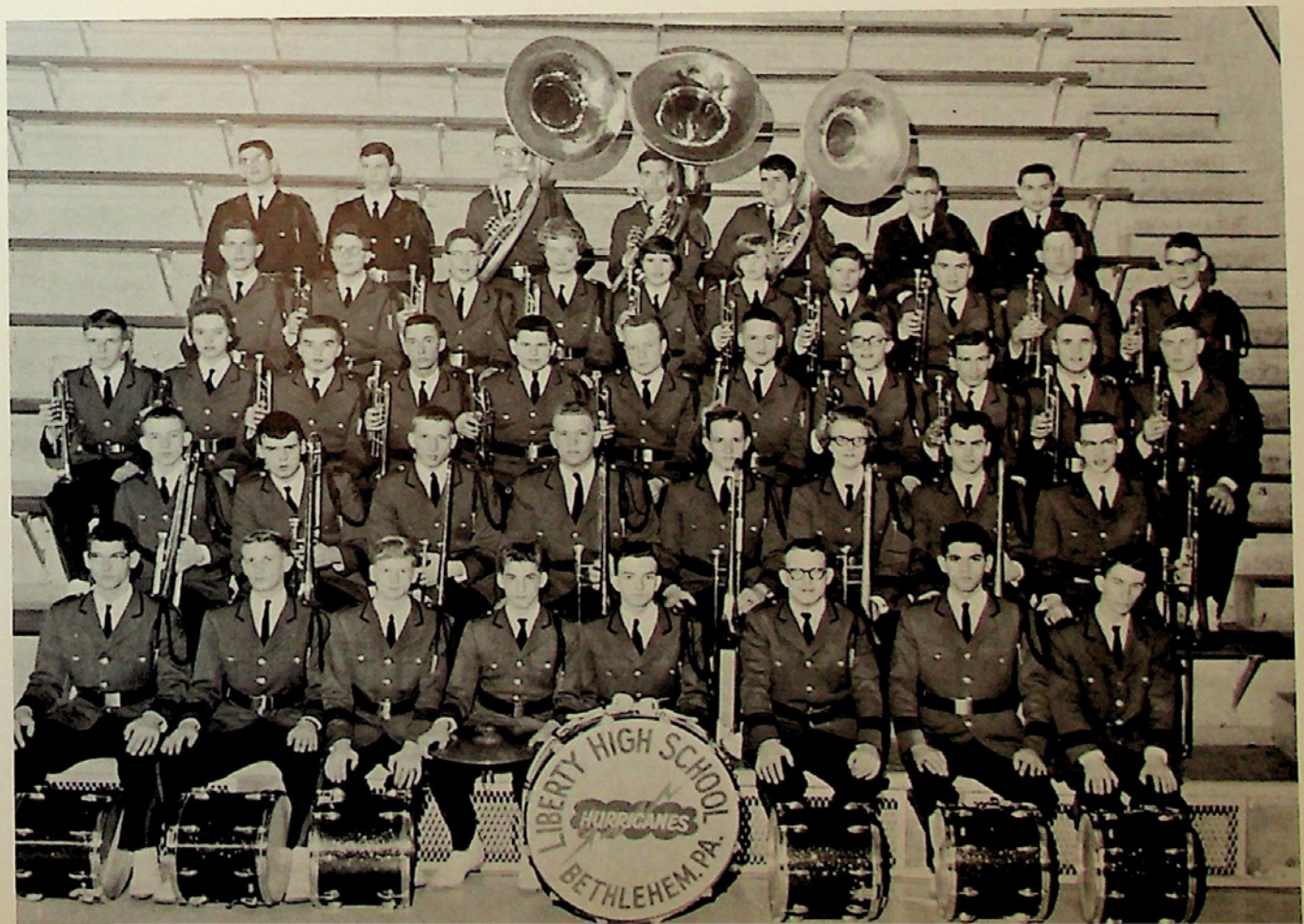

Cuckoos on the Hearth is a mystery-comedy in three acts. It is a snowy December evening in Maine, 1940, and Don Carlton must leave his wife Charlotte and cousin Lulu Pung alone at Harmony Hearth as he goes to Washington to report on some gas experiments that may revolutionize warfare.

Sheriff Preble arrives with the news that a lunatic-killer, who recites poetry while strangling his victims, has escaped in the area. Zadoc Grimes, an eccentric author, arrives at Harmony Hearth seeking a quiet place to write his next book. After Don leaves, three men seek refuge in the Carlton house from the storm.

The second act relates Zadoc Grimes's book which he wrote after meeting the characters in the first act. In Zadoc's book, Dr. Gordon, from the near-by Pine View Sanitarium, is the lunatic killer who strangles Charlotte.

In the third act, which is the actual ending of the story, Sheriff Preble saves Don and Charlotte from the three Nazi spies disguised as the Professor, the Reverend, and the Doc. When they are safely locked in Don's laboratory, a telephone call informs Charlotte that Sheriff Preble and his wife were murdered earlier that evening. The "Sheriff" reveals his true identity and tries to strangle Charlotte. Don hears Charlotte's screams but cannot get through the locked door. Zadoc enters the room and immediately faints at the violence displayed. After the insane killer (the "Sheriff") admits Don and tells him that Zadoc tried to kill Charlotte, he is taken into custody by a suspicious state trooper. All ends happily as Zadoc settles down to a cozy chat about his new book, *Horror at Harmony Hearth*.

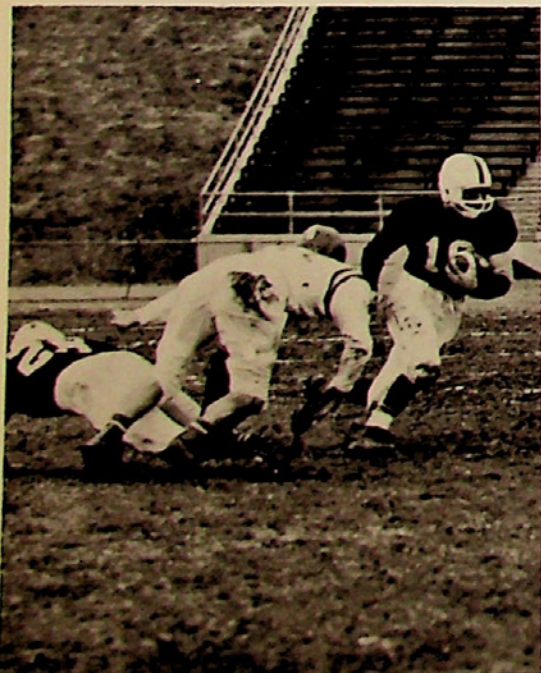

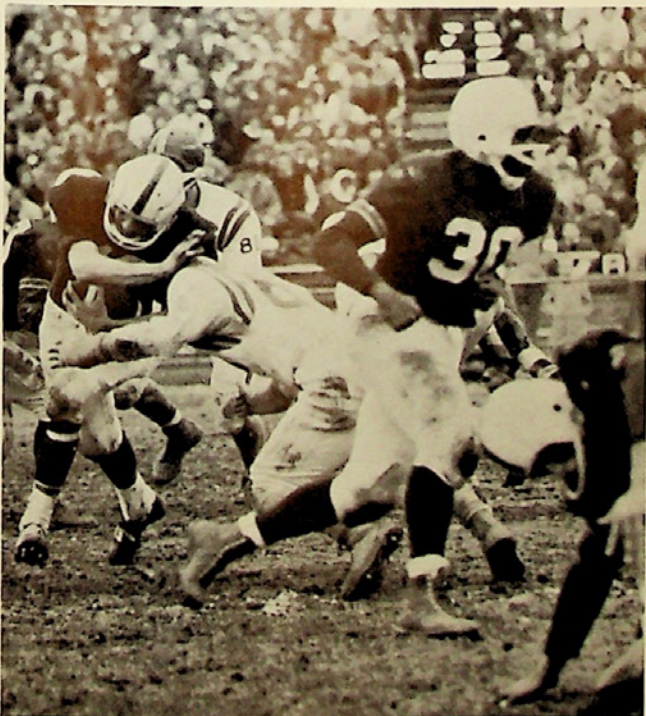

BASKETBALL TEAM HAS OUTSTANDING SEASON

Liberty's 1962 cagers compiled an excellent record of 21 wins and 3 losses. LHS won the first and second-half East Penn League championships but lost to Catsauqua in the District XI play-off.

Although the junior varsity's season was not as successful as the varsity's, they attained a 14-7 record.

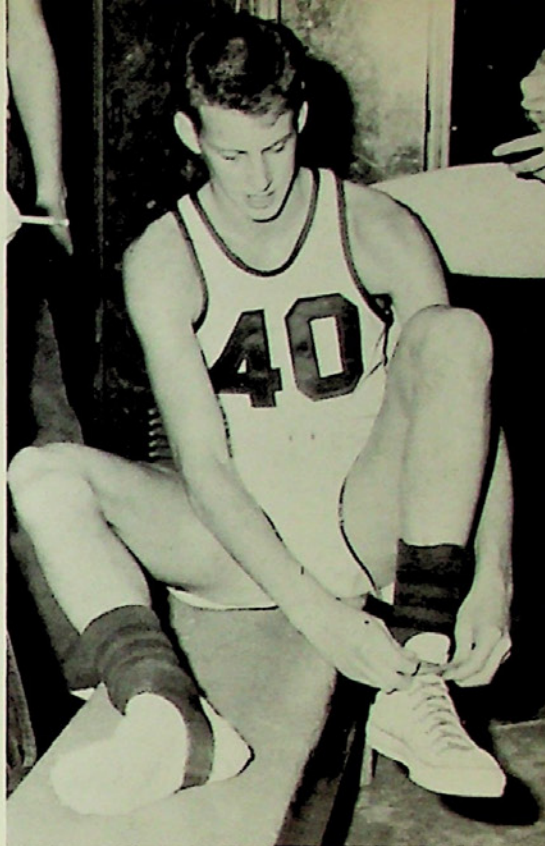

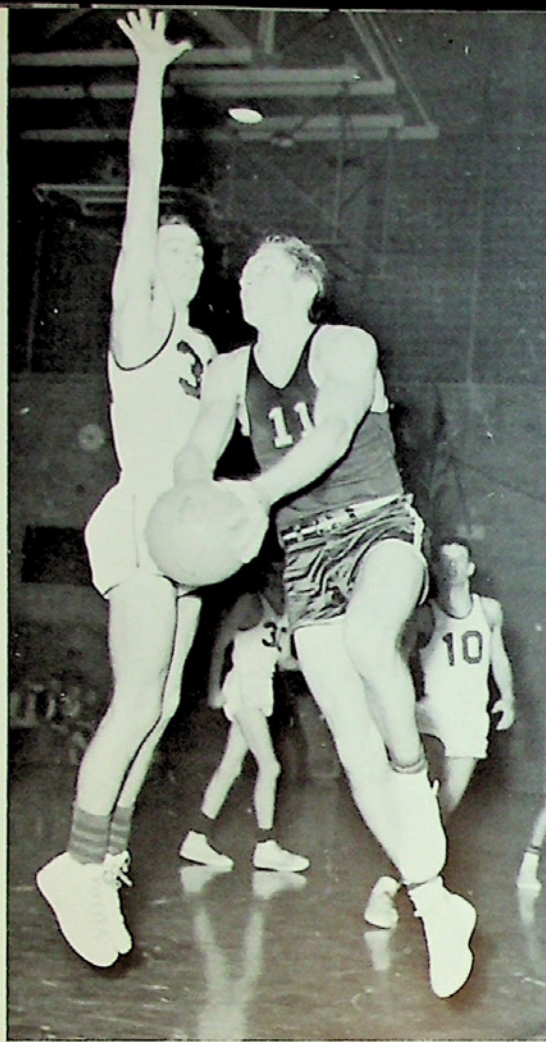

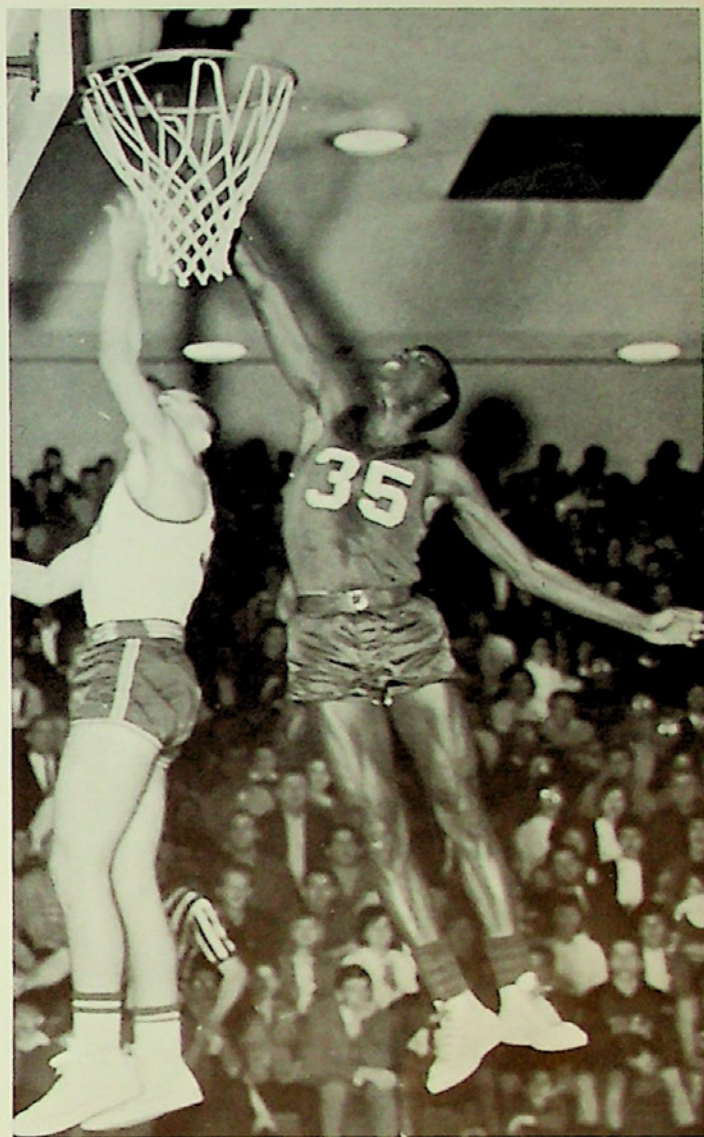

MATMEN CONCLUDE WINNING SEASON

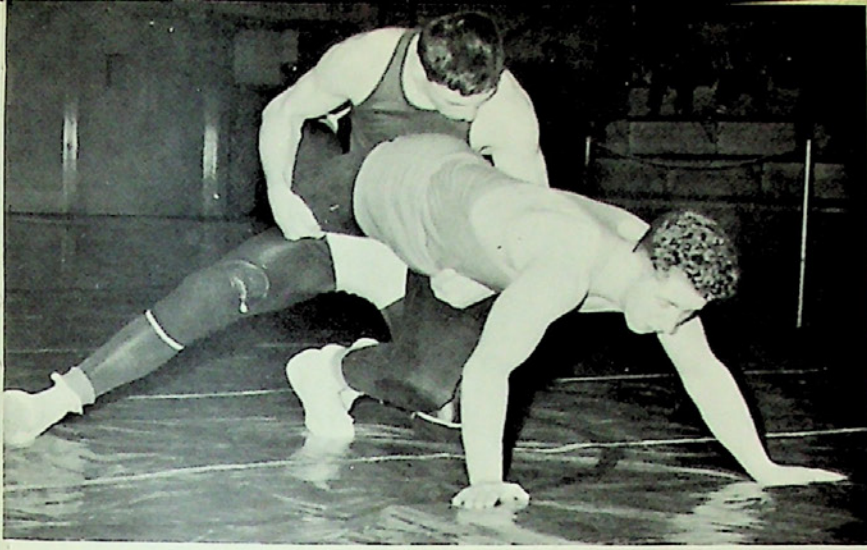

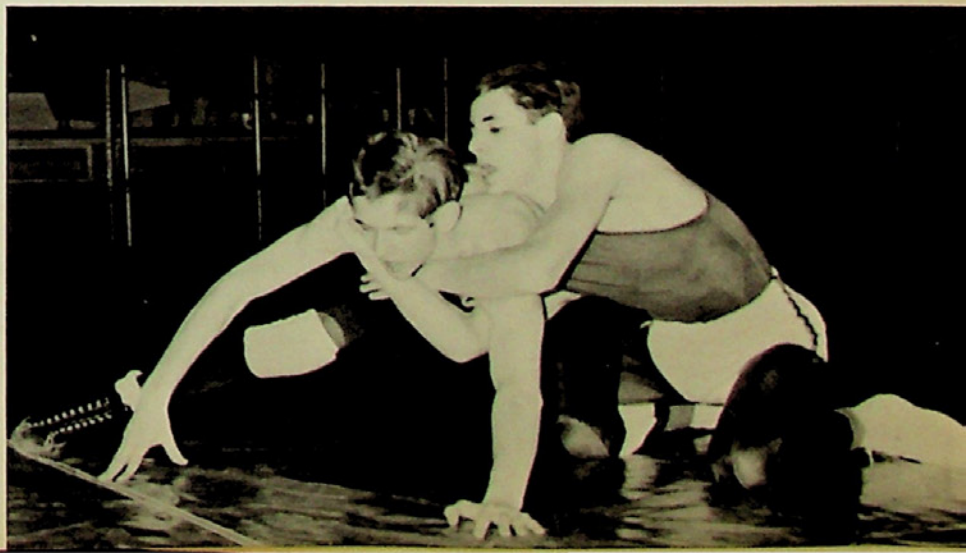


Dave Clery tries to avoid being pinned.

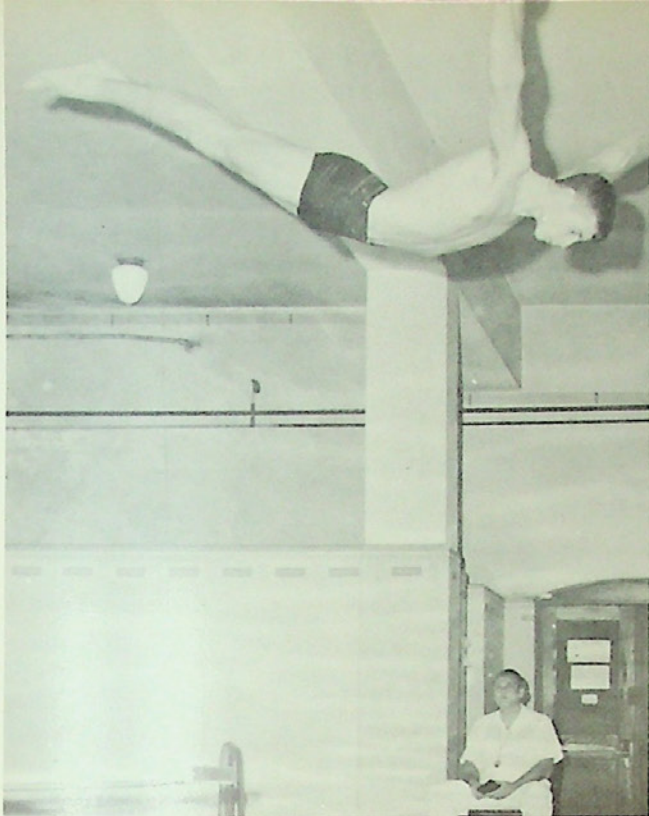
Even though there were no individual district winners, many new school records were set. Gary Young now holds the records for the 100-yard freestyle, the

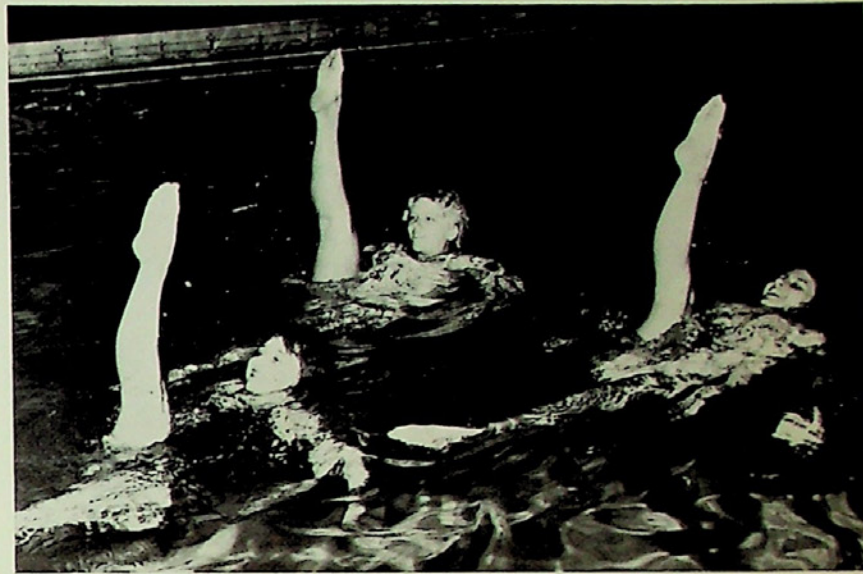

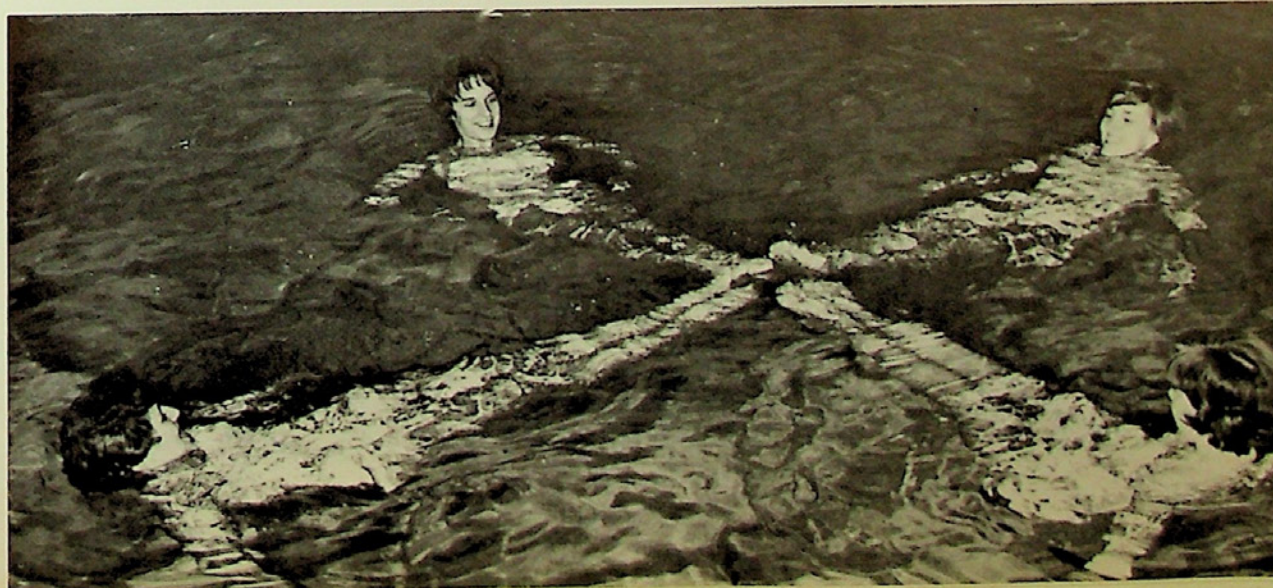
