A memorial scroll, the presenta-tion of the Slovak Lutheran Church, was given to the mother, while the flag presentation to the mother was made by William Potts, of the Edwin H. Ackerman Post. Taps were sounded by the Post bugler.

A gold star was placed on the church service flag by Lieutenant Joseph Tomanchek, U. S. Air Corps, a brother, who is stationed at a North Carolina camp. This is the second gold star on the flag, the first in memory of Pfc. Martin Fainor, who met an accidental death in the Panama Canal Zone.

The late Sergeant Tomanchek has another brother in the combat forces, Sergeant Martin Tomanchek, assigned to a tank destroyer unit, at a Texas camp.

Sergeant Carl Tomanchek, had been in the service of the United States since June, 1942, and had spent nine months in the South Pacific theater of war. The last letter written by him was dated January 2, and was received by Rev. John Daniel.
