Commissioned An Ensign in 5 **Vital Service**

Charles Vehafric, 25, 1131 Sioux Street, Fountain Hill, a former me-chanic in the employ of the Hauser Chevrolet Company, has been com-missioned an ensign in the United States Merchant Marine. His enter-ing the Marine service came about in a peculiar manner Thursday a week ago.

Being in the draft age, Vehafrio had filled out a questionnaire for re-classification in the service. When he called the attention of his boss, R. R. Hauser, to the matter, Mr. Hauser suggested getting in touch with Captain E. C. Venetiener, of Eleventh Avenue, West Side, and select his service, the Merchant Ma-

vehafric agreed to this and Captain Venetiener, a close friend of Mr. Hauser, called on him. When body man, Captain Venafric is an expert body man, Captain Venetiener re-marked: "Just the man the Mer-chant Marine needs," and asked him to apply for the job.

Given letters of introduction, Ve-hafric went to New York City May 6 and called on the Captain of the Port, who directed him to the Bu-reau of Navigation, where he was promptly signed up and commis-sioned an ensign, with permission to one or third officer on any U.S. to go as third officer on any U.S. Merchant Marine ship.

At the age of 19 Ensign Vehafric entered the training ship Annapolis from which he was graduated two years later as a third mate. He re-ceived some experience in the Marine service by taking two trips on an oil tanker. His vessel reached Greenport, N. Y., about the time that the New England coast was visited by the devastating hurricane more than four years ago. His ship, however, was in the harbor and no damage was done to it. Ensign Vehafric did not return home from New York City May 6 but left the same night for Los An-

geles to take the job given him by the Bureau of Navigation on a new Merchant Marine ship built at Los Angeles, and on which he expects to sail shortly.

He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. John Vehafric, 519 Ontario Street. He was graduated from Liberty High School at the age of 17. Some time later he became employed by the Bethlehem Steel Company as assist-ant foreman of the bricklayers in the Saucen plant For the next year the Saucon plant. For the past year or so he has been employed by the Hauser Company as a body mechanic.

In 1940 Ensign Vehafric was married to Miss Anna Rick, of Fountain Hill. She has taken a position with the Lehigh Valley Silk Company, Fountain Hill.
