Too many parts

Council proclaims proposed ethics ordinance unwieldy

In a two-hour meeting June 26, during which the same arguments were repeated several times and exasperated residents grumbled in their seats, city council members agreed the much-discussed ethics ordinance proposal, weighing in at 34 pages, is simply too unwieldy to handle as one item.

First proposed by members Olga Negrón and Michael Colon in January, the work has been applauded by groups such as the League of Women Voters as a measure for transparency and curb corruptive influences in government.

And while council members said they like parts, they said there are simply too many parts for them all to agree with.

Much of the discussion revolved around just how to tackle an ordinance of such size and whether items already in the works, such as Bryan Callahan's proposal to disallow gifts to administrators and Shawn Martel's ethics training, should be pulled under this larger umbrella.

They were not entirely convinced of creating an independent ethics board, either.

Continued from page A1 organization suggested we team up with the Coco (Camelot for Children) Foundation to do something together.

"We decided to start this camp, because no one else does. While the Coco Foundation isn't a part of the camp any longer, we've continued the program," Zenie said.

The counselors, many of whom are returning campers, work with the kids who are grouped into Lions (ages 4-6), Tigers (ages 7-9), and Bears (ages 10-12) or, as Kirsten Almeida, owner and founder of the Emmaus-based "Star of the Day" theater troop calls them, "littles, middles, and bigs."

Her middles were rehearsing their big musical number for the Friday showcase, to which parents and families were invited, on the Tompkins College Center's Samuels Theater stage.

"I chose 'Waving Through a Window,' from this year's Tony Award-winning 'Dear Evan Hansen' for them to perform," Almeida said. "It's all about overcoming obstacles, and being pushed to the edge - on the outside looking in, which is absolutely something these kids can relate to."

Almeida's "littles" have been practicing "How Far I'll Go," from the film "Moana," another inspirational song about finding strength in yourself. Her "biggs" will perform "Freak Flag," from the musical "Shrek," because the song encourages everyone to embrace who they are.

"I lost my best friend of 28 years to cancer - she learned about her diagnosis and passed away in a week, and so I'm always looking for ways to give back [to this community]."

"I just want to help these kids feel normal for a few hours," Almeida said. "So I choose age-appropriate popular pieces or pieces that I know will be fun to perform, and then I teach the kids to tell a story through music and movement."

It's obvious from the giggles, hugs and laughter that after three and a half days, everyone's bonded.

"Our goal really is for everyone to be together and have fun and connect with peers that have similar experiences," said Tracy Stauffer, marketing and community relations coordinator.

"We invite the cancer warriors, their siblings, and siblings of kids who've passed," Stauffer said. "And many of our campers have returned year after year and eventually become counselors-in-training and then, when they're 18, become counselors."

"It really is all about community and family," said Assistant Executive Director Lisa Kappes. "We want to make people smile, and so we spend a few months planning for the week-long camp,

sending out requests for volunteers and application forms for the campers.

"We had so many former campers wanting to return as counselors that we had to turn a few away. Our ratio this year is practically 1:1," she said.

"It's a family that no one wants to be in, but we welcome everyone with open arms," Stauffer said. "Sometimes the kids who are new to the camp might be a bit nervous on day one, but by day two, you'd never know. It really is an instant bond."

Parents also appreciate the respite. It's a challenge, Stauffer said, for parents to find and trust someone who's accustomed to dealing with their kids' diagnoses and

treatments.

"We get it," said Stauffer, mother of one of the 11-year-old campers who's been a cancer warrior for two years, "and they trust us."

"I love coming to this camp," Hudson says, "because it's for children who had or have cancer or their siblings to come together for fun, regardless of what we can or can't do. This year, I really liked the gym activities and karaoke." Hudson will be the guest speaker at PCFLV's next Hearts of Gold annual fundraiser, sharing his story of his journey with a brain tumor and hemianopsia.

The Pediatric Cancer Foundation of the Lehigh Valley (PCFLV) doesn't just plan and run this weeklong camp. The organization assists families throughout the Lehigh Valley whose children have been recently diagnosed, are mid-treatment, or in remission or maintenance, says Stauffer.

"We offer a one-time free home 'health' cleaning in partnership with a local cleaning company so that when immune-compromised kids come home from the hospital for the first time," said Stauffer, "they're coming into a home that's as clean as possible."

The organization also plans and coordinates events for kids, like a recent field trip to a local Escape Room, a "chemo circus" - where volunteers visit kids in the hospital, accompanied by clowns, princesses, or other characters, and home visits to cheer up seriously ill children.

"We have an art therapy program called 'Art Soup,' which partners local artists with the kids to work on different projects, and on those days, we give parents a gift card to go out to eat and have a bit of a date night," said Stauffer.

Everyone in the organization understands that a cancer diagnosis turns everything upside down. A parent may need to severely restrict working hours or quit a job to handle the myriad doctors' appointments and treatments. The organization provides gift cards for gas, grocery stores, and hospital cafeterias.

Stauffer said that about 50 percent of the children involved with PCFLV are treated at Lehigh Valley Hospital and the other half travel to CHOP or St. Christopher's.

Much of the organization's capital comes from two annual fundraisers: Run to Live, a 5K/8K walk/run event, and Hearts of Gold, which won Lehigh Valley Style Magazine's 2017 award for "Best Annual Charity or Social Event."

Good People in Hell?
This may shock you, but the Bible teaches that many good people will end up in hell while many bad people will end up in heaven! Let me explain.

When a sinner repents of his sin and accepts Jesus Christ as his Savior, he becomes a child of God as the Bible explains in John 1:12, "As many as received Him, to them gave He power to become the sons of God." 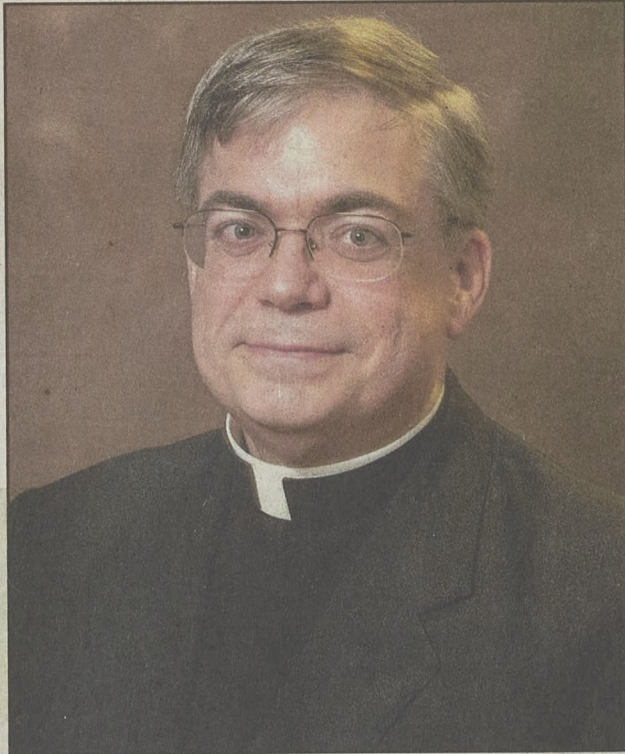
Monsignor Schlert named bishop

The Vatican announced last week that Pope Francis has appointed a priest of the Diocese of Allentown, Reverend Monsignor Alfred A. Schlert, as the Fifth Bishop of Allentown.

Bishop-elect Schlert is the first priest of the Diocese to be appointed to serve as its Bishop. He has been serving as the Diocesan Administrator since his election by the Diocesan College of Consultors on Feb. 1, 2017 following the Jan. 31 installation of his predecessor Most Reverend John Barres as the Bishop of Rockville Centre, New York.

Bishop-elect Schlert was born to Alfred and Marylou (DeRose) Schlert in Easton on July 24, 1961, just six months after the Diocese of Allentown was formed. He was educated at St. Jane Frances de Chantal Elementary School and Notre Dame High School, both in Easton. He prepared for the Priesthood at St. Charles Borromeo Seminary near Philadelphia and the Pontifical Roman Seminary and St. John Lateran University in Rome. Most Reverend Thomas J. Welsh ordained him a priest at the Cathedral of Saint

he has overseen coordination of all administrative offices of the Diocese and assisted Bishop Cullen and Most Reverend John O. Barres in the governance of the Diocese. From 1998 to 2008 he was in residence at the Cathedral of Saint Catharine of Siena in Allentown.

Pope St. John Paul II named him a Chaplain to His Holiness with the title of Monsignor in 1999. Pope Benedict XVI named him a Prelate of Honor, the second highest rank of Monsignor in 2005.

While still serving as Vicar General he was pastor of St. Theresa of the Child Jesus Church, Hellertown from July 2008 until February 2010 when he resumed full time service as Vicar General and residence at St. Theresa's.

Bishop-elect Schlert's Ordination and Installation will be held on Thursday, Aug. 31 at the Cathedral of Saint Catharine of Siena in Allentown.

Bishop-elect Schlert will hold a news conference at the Cathedral of Saint Catharine of Siena at 11 o'clock THIS morning. The news conference will be streamed live on the Diocesan Facebook page: www.Facebook.com/Dio-ceseofAllentown.

Catherine of Siena in Allentown on September 19, 1987.

He served as an assistant pastor of St. Francis of Assisi Church in Allentown, as a professor at his alma mater Notre Dame High School and as the Catholic chaplain at Lehigh University. During his years at Notre Dame he resided at St. Anthony of Padua Church and St. Bernard Church in Easton and at Sacred Heart Church

in Bath. He completed graduate work at Pontifical North American College and Pontifical Lateran University in Rome and received a Licentiate in Canon Law from the Pontifical Lateran University in 1992.

He was named Vice Chancellor and Secretary to Bishop Welsh in 1997 before being named Vicar General of the Diocese by Most Reverend Edward P. Cullen in 1998. As Vicar General

Northampton County District Attorney John Morganelli visited council the previous week and said that part of the proposal was redundant and unnecessarily expensive, possibly costing as much as \$100,000. But Negrón and resident Breena Holland, a

Lehigh University political science professor, argued the county ethics board Morganelli spoke of is concerned only with criminal activity.

Holland said, "The state law is flawed," in that it ignores intent, and she and Negrón stressed a city board would exist to stop behaviors before they escalate into such activity.

A similar board in Reading is budgeted at \$10,000 a year and last year only used \$6,000, they said.

Callahan argued an ethics board is corruptible itself and capable of being used as a political weapon to smear opponents, but was assured by Negrón and council attorney John Spirk Jr. the language in the pro-

posal includes confidentiality enough to avoid exemplified abuses.

At the end, Callahan was adamant, and others agreed, to pull the proposal into its smaller parts for individual consideration.

Even then, Negrón said installing a comprehensive ethics policy in the city may easily take a year or more.

technical assistance and multi-agency cooperation. Detectives will offer educational training to the public on issues of sexting, cypher crimes, and other internet-related issues.

The unit will be part of the existing Criminal

Investigation Division and will work in cooperation with the Special Victims Unit. It will engage in both proactive and reactive investigations of persons involved in internet child abuse. There will be four city detectives trained in internet undercover operations and computer forensic examination whose jobs are to re-

spond to and combat online internet enticement of children by sexual predators, the proliferation of child exploitation, child obscenity and child pornography. They will target individuals who traffic or engage in the business of child victimization, exploitation and pornography.

The Pennsylvania ICAC Task Force is commanded out of the Delaware County District Attorney's Office. Detectives assigned to the BPD ICAC Unit are Det. Sgt. Robert Toronzi, Special Victims Detective Thomas Galloway, Det. Sam DelRosario and Det. Michael DiLuzio.

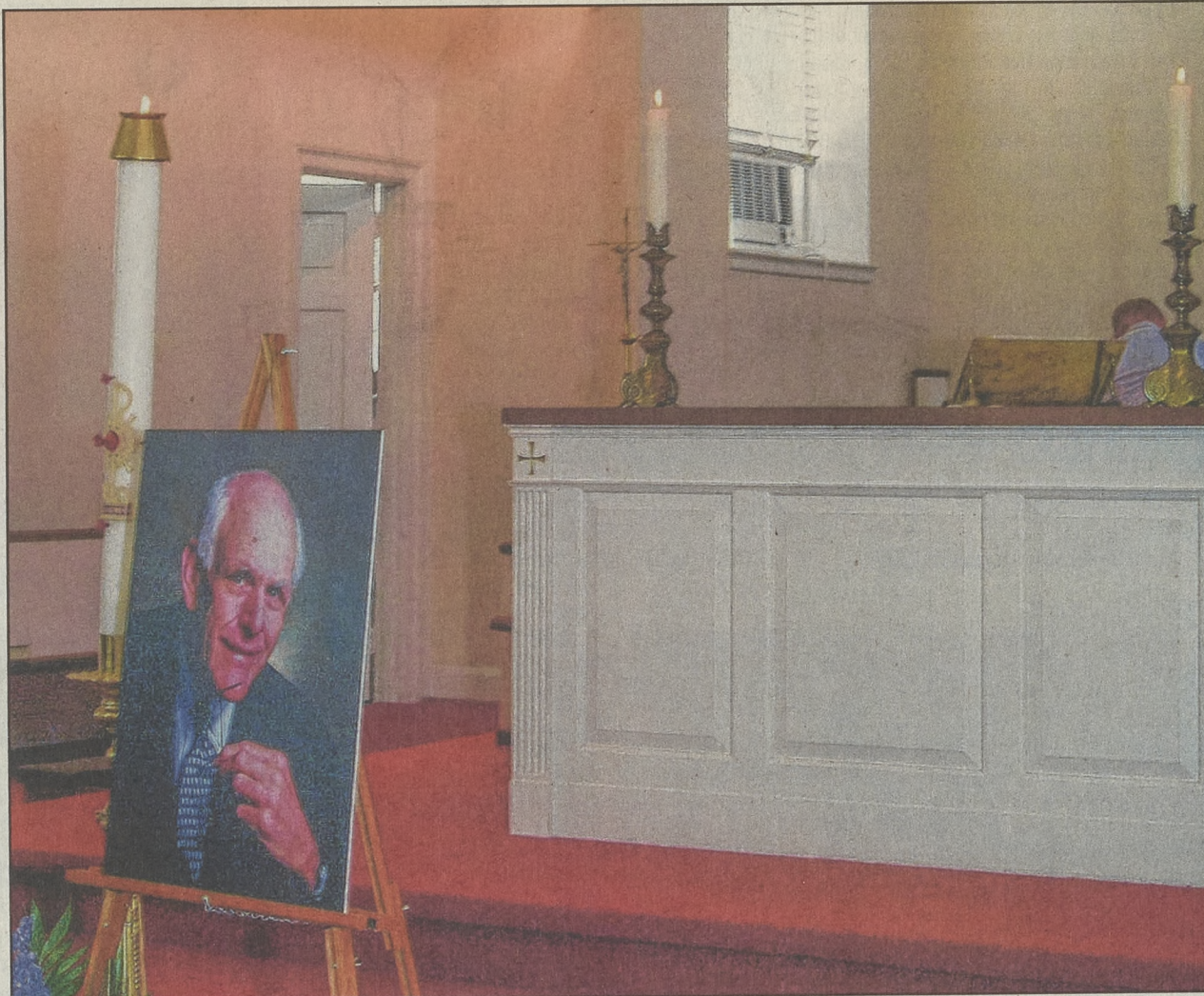

Officer receives Nathan Ogden award

In 1771, Northampton County Deputy Sheriff Nathan Ogden was killed while attempting to execute an arrest warrant. He is the first known law enforcement officer to make the ultimate sacrifice for his community in America. Unfortunately, many others have followed. Last year alone, 134 police officers died in the line of duty. In memory of Nathan Ogden and his fallen comrades, the Northampton County Chiefs of Police Association established an annual award in 2002 for a police officer who distinguishes himself and his profession. This year's recipient is Detective Chris Leidy of the Lower Saucon police department.

Larry Palmer, Police Chief in Palmer Township and president of the Northampton County Police Chiefs' association, presented the award. The costs associated with this statue are paid by Bill Hillanbrand of Northampton County Emergency Management Services.

Lower Saucon Police Chief Guy Lesser explained why Leidy, who was first hired in 1999 as a part-time police officer, deserved this award.

Leidy first began to stand out when he broke up a criminal mischief ring involving 13 juveniles. Chief Lesser noticed there were no citizen complaints following matters he investigated. Leidy is also responsible

Steam engine tour set for July 16

Commissioners take aim at ATV use

BETHLEHEM TOWNSHIP

After a rash of complaints about the noise and dust caused by all-terrain vehicles, Bethlehem Township Commissioners are on the brink of strictly regulating their use. A proposed ordinance, debated at June 19 meeting, would ban their use between dusk and dawn. They would also be required to stay at least 100 feet away from the property line of any adjacent owner.

Commissioner Tom Nolan said that the ordinance under consideration is similar to one already in place in Lower Saucon Township. He said "it's time to place some regulations. The township is filling out. We don't have much land." President Mike Hudak agreed but made clear that "we're not outlawing anything."

Under the proposed ordinance, ATVs would include snowmobiles, motor driven vehicles having two or more wheels (commonly known as trail bikes), dirt

bikes, mini bikes, and all other vehicles (licensed and unlicensed) commonly used for off-road purposes. ATVs used for residential gardening, property maintenance, or agricultural purposes would be excluded.

Nolan thought there was enough information about these exceptions to add them to the ordinance last night, but the rest of the Board opted to give Manager Melissa Shafer and Solicitor Jim Broughal more time to work on the language before advertising.

According to HG, a legal information site, 135,000 people are injured every year in ATV accidents. Over 700 are killed every year, and a third of them are under 16.

OTHER BUSINESS
Commissioners voted 4-1 to appoint The Pidcock Company to administer the \$2.3 million Brodhead Road reconstruction project. Pidcock, which will be paid \$130,000, has been heavily

involved in this project from the onset. Pidcock is also the Township's engineer.

Hudak, the sole dissenter, explained after the meeting that He has high regard for Pidcock, but is troubled by spending \$2.3 million in borrowed money to pay for a road that was destroyed by the tractor trailers from the businesses inside the industrial park.

Commissioners also voted unanimously to ease the workload of township staff. A part-time clerk, who will be paid \$18,000 per year with no benefits, was approved. Manager Shafer conceded that the position is unbudgeted, but the township has been operating with reduced manpower for years.

"I want to be able to provide top notch service," she explained, adding that the clerk would work at one of three counters inside the lobby. She said this added manpower was also recommended by the bargaining agent for township employees.

Assistant Manager Doug Bruce told Commissioners that clerical staff was at 12.5 in 2010, and was down to 8.5. There are currently 9.5 clerical staffers. He said that, at an average salary of \$60,000, this has saved the township \$1 million. "We'd like some of that back," he said.

No member of the public spoke against this proposed hire.

Finally, Commissioners voted unanimously to give a break to employees and active volunteer firefighter who join the community center. Full-time employees will be permitted to join the Community Center for \$10 a month or receive a 25 percent discount off the resident rate for a family membership. Active volunteer firefighters will also be able to join the community center for \$10 a month. Firefighters will get no family discount because the Township provides no insurance for volunteer families.

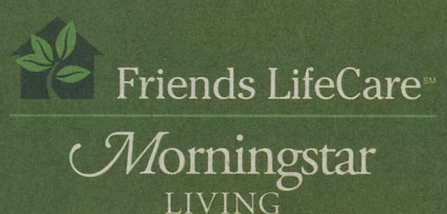

The UCA camp focused on new cheers for game day, cheers and pyramids for extreme routine, and crowd leading.

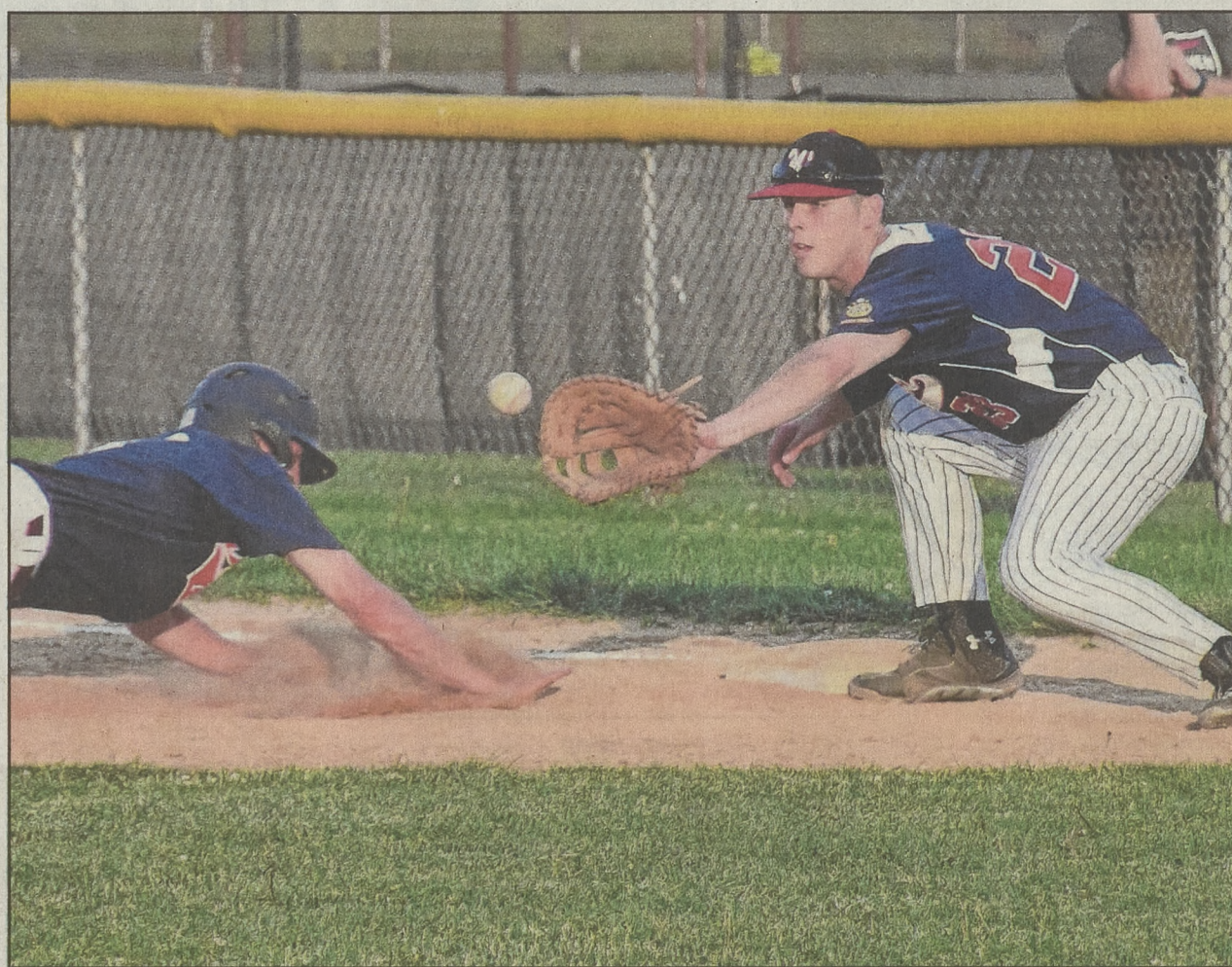
"We went there again because it's so well run. Jerry Preschutti, the owner, he's a great guy, and he does everything he can for these girls,"

"She loves it there. She had nothing negative to say. She loves the curriculum, the classes, the atmosphere, and the softball program," said Kaleycik.

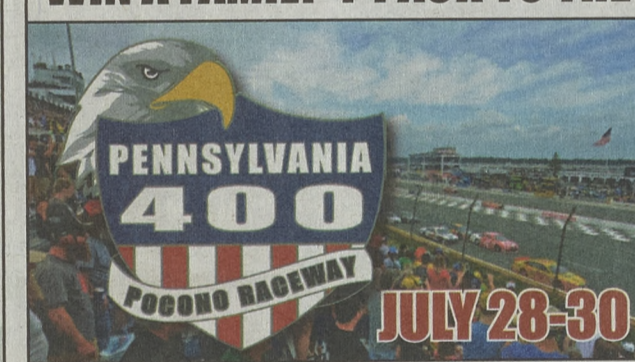
A week before her overnight, Kaleycik met with Coach Judy Lawes, and then had the opportunity to work out with the team, which was 31-17 overall this season, the following week.

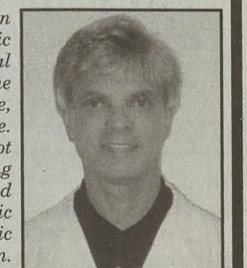

Celebrating community diversity

A mural currently being produced on the north facing wall of 414 Hayes Street is one part of the neighborhood improvement project currently underway under the auspices of the Community Action Committee of the Lehigh Valley (CACLV) and Lehigh Valley Community Land Trust, with financial support from Wells Fargo Bank, according to CACLV associate executive director of community development Ellen Larmer.

Holly Fields-Scott of Bella Pintura Inc. is working on the mural, which she says "celebrates diversity of the community" and which should be finished by the end of July. After the brick exterior wall received repairs, Fields-Scott was spotted outlining and painting the mural with her daughter, Nevada's, assistance on June 23. Their work will continue to the end of July she estimates.

Larmer explained that 414 and 418 Hayes Street, both owned by the Land Trust, will be complete-

ly rehabbed and sold as "workforce housing, and be income restricted for 99 years through the land trust model." She said that the Southside Vision development committee is identifying properties to improve neighborhoods, and that the middle property at 416 Hayes Street, which is private investor owned, will participate as well.

Larmer also mentioned that new street trees will be planted on Hayes Street in spring 2018 to replace dead or dying trees in the neighborhood.





'An important part of who we are'

More than 50 members of the Liberty HS Hurricanes varsity football team devoted a warm and sunny Saturday to cleaning up the Steelworkers Memorial at the foot of the Fahy Bridge on June 10.

The student athletes pulled weeds by hand and then used screwdrivers to painstakingly remove roots and debris from between each commemorative brick. The football players finished the job by sweeping the area with leaf blowers so that the inscriptions on the memorial bricks

could be read clearly. "We've got about 52 kids here," said John Truby, Hurricanes head football coach. "They're all of various ages, freshmen up to those who will be seniors, so it's a good mix for this crew. They also cleaned up leaves on the side (of the memorial). It was pretty bad. This is probably the worst we've seen it, with the growth in between each stone. It was over-run."

While awaiting refreshments in the shady area by the gazebo, the Hurricanes fielded questions about their knowledge of Bethlehem Steel from Truby, who

also serves as a history teacher at Liberty.

"They built the Golden Gate Bridge," said one student. "They made arms for world War I and World War II," said another. "Hitler wanted to bomb it!" chimed in another, alluding to the importance of Bethlehem Steel in the war effort.

The players will get credit for community service as required by the school district, said Joe Mayer, a member of the Steelworkers Archives who spearheaded the annual cleanup effort.

"Joe Mayer has been really influential in do-

ing this," Truby said. "I have family that worked in a steel mill out in Pittsburgh so, for me it's a nice way for giving back a little bit, and also for the city. The kids do a really good job with it, I'm happy with them. For the most part it's the heart and soul of the team who show up to do this. They're a great group of kids."

Explaining the genesis of the annual event, Mayer said, "About five years ago, the Steelworkers Archives checked out the memorial, looked at the condition of the memorial. We approached the city and our concerns seemed to fall on deaf ears. So then it was brought up at our meetings, where I said why don't we get the football team, who needs community service, to do it every year? They've been doing it ever since and it's been working out really well.

This is the sixth year. It's been a really good thing for the kids and a good thing for the Steelworkers Memorial."

The Bethlehem Department of Public Works is responsible for maintaining the memorial area.

Chris Sule, superintendent of grounds maintenance, said his crew cuts the grass weekly and does landscape work every seven to 10 days at the site.

"We sprayed that entire area Monday (June 12)" Sule said. "We sprayed the entire plaza and the sidewalks, so it was definitely taken care of. We usually spray it with pesticide a couple times a year."

Sule said the memorial site is one of 114 properties his crew helps maintain throughout the city.

"Liberty does their cleanup there every year," Sule said. "Then we do our work usually the day after or a couple of days after, and then we spray again later in the summer."

The Steelworkers Archives provides sustenance for the hearty (and ever hungry) football players when they finish their yearly cleanup work.

Archives President Frank Behum, who logged more than 30 years as a steelworker in the Bethlehem Plant, brought a truckload of pizzas and soda to reward the players for a job well done.

Sitting on the wall that surrounds the memorial, Behum said, "Every time I come down here I'm amazed. I can't walk three feet without seeing the name of someone I know."

"This is a memorial for those who worked at the Steel," Behum continued. "I'm a history guy, so this is an important part of who we are."

2017-18 season

Miller Symphony Hall leader sees renewed opportunity in Allentown renaissance

Miller Symphony Hall, Allentown, home to the Allentown Symphony Orchestra, had a "great season" for 2016-17, and Allentown Symphony Association Executive Director Sheila K. Evans has an even better season in store for 2017-18.

"It was a great season. We had an amazing season last year," Evans says.

Maestra Diane Wittry is in her 22nd season as Allentown Symphony Orchestra Music Director-Conductor, bringing world-class artists to Miller Symphony Hall, enhancing the cultural community in the Lehigh Valley.

Highlights of the 2017-18 season include "The Music of James Bond & More" in the Allentown Symphony Pops Series, Sept. 23; the "Ladies of Laughter" Comedy Series, starting Oct. 13; Tango Buenos Aires in the Live Onstage Series, Oct. 27; the Eroica Trio in the Allentown Symphony Orchestra Classical Series, Nov. 4 and 5; "Cinderella's Christmas" in the Family Series, Nov. 25, plus the continuing Jazz Upstairs Series and the Met Opera Series telecast.

The 2016-17 season success is exemplified financially, in programming and attendance.

"Last year, we came in at 101 percent of our earned revenue target, which is great," says Evans. "We had a surplus of over \$90,000, which pays off debt from previous years."

For contributed revenue, "We were actually at 103 percent of our targeted budget," Evans says.

Attendance at Miller Symphony Hall was approximately 100,000, with 46,000 for the Allentown Symphony Orchestra, jazz series and non-symphonic performances. The bulk of the rest of the attendance is composed of hall rentals, including religion services by Life Church, Repertory Dance Theatre "Nutcracker" ballet performances, Salisbury High School graduation and dance recitals. "It was a really banner year for utilization of the hall," says Evans.

Pops sell out

Last year's Disney-themed Allentown Symphony Pops concert sold out. The July 15 Allentown Symphony Pops Disney In Concert: "Tale As Old As Time," featuring Deidre Donovan, Nathan Riley, Stephanie Gerson and Anthony Apicella is also sold-out.

Ron Demkee, Allentown Symphony Orchestra Associate Conductor since 1983, is the Allentown Symphony Pops Conductor.

"We had exceptional attendance for the Pops concerts. It started with Disney [last] June and ended with 'Rock On' in May," Evans says.

The nonprofit Allentown Symphony Association with a budget of \$3 million, owns and operates Miller Symphony, home concert venue for the Allentown Symphony Orchestra. The ASO has 60 tenured musicians, plus an additional 20 musicians, depending on the concert. The Allentown

Symphony Association has 14 full-time employees, 10 part-time employees, and additional employees for the El Sistema program, hall administration, and food and beverage service.

Miller Symphony Hall seats 1,103 to 1,150, depending on seating configuration. The Rodale Community Room, setting for the Jazz Upstairs Series, seats about 190.

"The expenses were a lot more this year. We had a lot of maintenance issues. It's all part of running a 120-year-old building," Evans says.

"We are a much more complex business because of owning the hall," says Evans, Allentown Symphony Association Executive Director for about eight and one-half years since January 2009.

ASO outreach

"We were all over the Valley," Evans says of the Allentown Symphony Orchestra "run-outs," or outreach performances, including "Symphony On Ice" concert at PPL Center, Allentown; Levitt Pavilion at SteelStacks, Bethlehem; the Organ Festival at various Lehigh Valley venues, and orchestra member concerts in the Arts at St. Johns series at St. John's Lutheran Evangelical Church in center city Allentown.

"One of the things I like to emphasize is that we work in partnership with as many organizations as we can. Each of us is more successful together than we are individually," says Evans.

"For the Beethoven concert [Beethoven: Symphony No. 8 and Triple Concerto, featuring the Eroica Trio], we are doing a premiere of a piece for Bertoia sculptures in partnership with the Allentown Art Museum," Evans says.

The Allentown Symphony Orchestra will perform the world premiere of "Bertoia Sound Sculptures for Orchestra" by composer and percussionist Doug Owens.

"He's listening to the Bertoia sculptures at the Art Museum and Ursinus

College by Harry Bertoia. We will be performing the concert with sculptures by Bertoia November 4 and 5. People who know Bertoia are really excited about this. We're working with the Art Museum on the transportation, security and insurance," says Evans.

"Another partnership we are doing is 'Pictures At An Exhibition' with the Art Museum," Evans says. The March 10 and 11, 2018, concerts feature the world premiere of "Pictures At An Exhibition 2018" of new compositions based on paintings in the Allentown Art Museum. The concert includes Mussorgsky's "Pictures At An Exhibition" accompanied by an animation film produced by the University of Southern California School of Cinematic Arts.

New audiences

The "Ladies of Laughter" comedy series, to be held in the Rodale Room, is "targeted to the new people of the downtown," as are several of the Live Onstage series performances, including "The Queen's Cartoonists," Sept. 29, performing soundtracks from cartoons from the 1920s through today; The Rodney Marsalis Philadelphia Big Brass, a Dec. 17 Christmas season-themed concert, and, back by popular demand, Mummenschanz, "You & Me," March 28, 2018. "Symphony on Ice" returns Dec. 14 at the PPL Center, with a combined high school choir of 150 and 75 skaters from the Penguin Skate Club.

"One of the challenges is keeping it interesting to the people who are new to the neighborhood, as well as our traditional audience who we cherish," Evans says of Miller Symphony Hall programming.

"One of the things that makes the Allentown Symphony unique is the education that surrounds each concert. The Friday 'Meet the Artist' talk is free. And it's also part of what Diane [Wittry] communicates during the concert. That makes the music more en-

tertaining for people who may have not had the training or interest but became interested as they became older," says Evans.

Season subscriptions are still available. Single tickets went on sale June 1. Season ticket subscribers are offered \$5 per concert parking at the Community Deck, Sixth and Walnut streets.

Amidst the new apartment and retail building construction just outside its doorstep, one small change turned out to be a big change for venerable Miller Symphony Hall.

"The marquee is so much more important than we thought it would be, with all the action around us. It makes us visible as people are driving down Sixth Street or walking down the Arts Walk. It's been exceptionally successful. It far exceeded what my expectations were," Evans says.

Inspector 'Hound'

The howls you hear during "The Hound of the Baskervilles" stage play at the Pennsylvania Shakespeare Festival aren't those of the titular hound, although there is that.

No, the howls are nearly nonstop from the audience at "The Hound of the Baskervilles," a regular laugh-riot through

July 16, Schubert Theatre, Labuda Center for the Arts, DeSales University, Center Valley. The opening night June 23 performance was seen for this review.

"The Hound of the Baskervilles," adapted for the stage by Steven Canny and John Nicholson from Sir Arthur Conan Doyle's novel, was first performed in 2007 by Peepolykus

(pronounced "People Like Us") and played a 10-week run at the Duchess Theatre in London's West End.

"The Hound of the Baskervilles" was Conan Doyle's third crime novel featuring detective Sherlock Holmes, and was originally published in 1901-02 as a magazine serial.

The play, as with the novel, is set in London and Dartmoor, the latter in the western part of England. The plot centers on Holmes' investigation of the death of Sir Charles Baskerville,

apparently at the jaws of that titular Hound. At that juncture, in the play, and perhaps in the novel, you may as well give the plot, ahem, the boot (the plot tracks a mystery boot).

The Canny and Nicholson comedy provides a tour-de-force platform for actors and the PSF production has de force, albeit with three actors, who have delighted audiences in previous PSF seasons and don't disappoint in "The Hound of the Baskervilles."

Greg Wood plays Sherlock Holmes with

the proper combination of somber reflection, unctuous revelatory pronouncements and a reticence in countenance owing to his mind being several steps ahead of his words. Wood's is a well-considered performance as quick to light up as Holmes' Calabash Pipe.

Carl N. Wallnau plays Dr. Watson, Holmes' browbeaten assistant, with a touch of whimsy, aggrieved vanity over any perceived slight, and a ram-rod stance that gives him the hilarious appearance of a statue in the park.

Jacob Dresch plays Sir Henry Baskerville, the heir to the Baskervilles, with a puppy dog eagerness, an endearing distractedness and an attentiveness that's winsome.

The three actors assay multiple roles, some 16 among them, including Wood as Cecile Stapleton and Mr. Barrymore and Mrs. Barrymore.

That the play must be exhausting for the actors is a rank understatement, owing to the accumulation of dialogue that fires like battalion rounds, timing of lighting-strike repartee, and quick-change costumes and entrance and exits achieved like Olympians running the hurdles.

Director Jim Helsing is well-familiar with theatrical shenanigans, having directed "The 39 Steps," "The

Mystery Of Irma Vep," "The Complete Works Of William Shakespeare (Abridged)," among other stage delights at PSF. The Helsing touch, light, deft and fast, is in evidence in the brisk pace, as well as attention to detail and staging in the three-quarter round.

The actors step out of their roles several times, notably at the start of play in direct-address to audience and each other, incorporating actual biographical material. Another neat thing that the play does is have the actors refer to intentionally-missed lighting and sound cues.

Scenic and Lighting Designer Steve TenEyck gives us an efficient, minimalist and gestural setting. Sound Designer Don Tindall had his cues full and pulls it off. Costume Designer Lisa Zinni gets out the tweeds and Britishisms to convincingly delineate the play's populace.

The play should be of interest to Sir Arthur Conan Doyle aficionados, especially members of The Baker Street Irregulars, a United States literary society, who would derive great pleasure from comparing the comedy's plot twists and turns to those of the source material.

"Well done, Watson," and PSF's "The Hound Of The Baskervilles."

Living a meaningful life helping others

I was blessed to be able to experience a moment of grace that came unexpectedly.

I was at a resale store to interview the woman who has helped hundreds of struggling people.

Bobbi Sue knows some people find themselves in circumstances where they have nothing. Some don't have something as simple as a bed to call their own.

Many of those she helps are not the chronically poor. They are people who work hard all their lives but are barely getting by. If they are suddenly hit with a blow such as an accident, major illness or loss of job, the little bit they had can be lost.

"So many of us are only a paycheck away from a disaster like that," says Bobbi Sue Burton. She started the Project Phoenix resale store in Florida to help those starting over with nothing.

How she managed to do that with a just a few helpers is a story in and of itself. Even after she collected six storage bins filled with donated household goods and clothing, and even after she found a reasonable place to rent, it took her three months of hard work to turn an empty space into a resale store.

She worked at it every single day then left each night to work the third shift as a nurses' aide. When there was no money for electricity, she worked by candlelight.

Why she did it is as interesting as how she did it.

"There was a time in my life when I had five kids, no money and no place to go. We all slept in an old car until a kindly woman offered to give us a home to live in," she said.

But even then she had no beds, no furniture, none of the basics most of us take for granted.

"We had absolutely nothing, not even a towel or blanket of our own," she recalled.

When her new neighbors learned of her plight, they brought over donated furniture, bedding and basic kitchen things.

That was 20 years ago, and life got better for Bobbi Jo and her family when she married and moved to southwest Florida where she had her own home.

"But I never forgot the emotional pain of having nothing, and I was all too aware of those who are still suffering.

"I wanted to help by opening a resale place where the needy could come to get the help they needed without being asked to pay for it," she said.

That's the remarkable story behind an even more remarkable woman.

But wasn't why I was headed to the resale store to do a story on Bobbi Jo. I had received an email telling me that the woman who did so much for so many struggling people

now is the one who needs help.

Because she has an inherited disorder that dramatically increases the risk of many types of cancer, she's been hit with one cancer after another, including colon cancer last year. Just as she is mired in medical debts, she lost her health insurance.

She is also in dire need of a car because the engine of her old car blew up and can't be fixed.

When I went to interview Bobbi I thought we would be talking about her plight. But when I asked what kind of help she most needed, she didn't respond with her own needs. She wanted me to write about the need for more volunteers to keep the resale store running because she is afraid it will fail if she's too sick to be there. It was 91 degrees outside and it felt even warmer inside the resale store. The air conditioner had failed and the landlord said he couldn't get it fixed for a while.

He told her to close up and go home.

"I can't allow someone in need to come here for help only to find the place closed," she said. So she stayed, working in insufferable heat.

Here's where the surprising moment of grace came.

A guy who just started his own air conditioning company heard about her plight and came to help. He did more than fix the air conditioning problem. He also pitched in to help with the heavy lifting in the stockroom.

He also said he just purchased the contents of a storage unit and promised to bring it all there to help the nonprofit.

When he later learned Bobbi Jo had all her teeth pulled because of side effects of radiation, he was saddened to hear she was in pain and couldn't eat solid food.

Later, he and his fiancée showed up with a cold milkshake for Bobbi Jo. It was just their small gesture to show they cared.

It was a case of one good soul responding to another good soul.

They say when you witness a moment of grace, what you're seeing is Christ in action.

I know it touched me to my core.

I don't know what the future has in store for Bobbi Jo. She's a fighter and will keep fighting cancer so she can continue to help others.

But I do know when she is ready to leave this earth she will have the comfort of knowing her life counted for something meaningful.

And ultimately, isn't that what really matters?

'Transformers' tabled

"Transformers: The Last Knight." Or is it?

"Transformers Universe: Bumblebee" is set for a June 2018 release. A sixth "Transformers" is set for a June 2019 release.

"Transformers: The Last Knight" evokes the legend of King Arthur (Liam Garrigan) and the Knights of the Round Table. In the Transformers revision of the legend, Merlin the Wizard (Stanley Tucci) forges an alliance with the Knights of Iacon, 12 Transformers who hid on Earth. Merlin's magic staff, given to him by the Knights, helps Arthur, aided by a dragon, to triumph over the Saxons.

In one of the lengthiest time-leap title cards in motion picture history, 1,600 years later, the international Transformer Reaction Force is tasked to eliminate Transformers from Earth. The destroyed Chicago sports stadium (from "Transformers: Age of Extinction," 2014) brings together Izabella (Isabela Moner) and Sqweeks (resembling the robot from "Short Circuit," 1986), Bumblebee and Cade Yeager (Mark

Wahlberg), who's given a talisman that Megatron, leader of the evil Decepticons, wants. Meanwhile, Optimus Prime is on Cybertron, controlled by Quintessa, and headed for Earth in search of Merlin's staff.

British Lord Sir Edmund Burton (Sir Anthony Hopkins), keeper of Transformers' lore, is assisted by Cogman (a robot that looks so much like C-3PO from "Star Wars" that the screenplay includes a joke about it). Viviane Wembly (Laura Haddock) is an Oxford professor and descendant of Merlin.

When on-screen, Wahlberg, Hopkins, Haddock and Moner are fine. The trouble is, they're not on-screen enough. Instead, we get mind-numbing mayhem.

There's too much story and too little character development in the screenplay by Art Marcum (screenplay, "Iron Man," 2008); Matt Holloway (screenplay,

"Iron Man") and Ken Nolan (screenplay, "Black Hawk Down," 2001) from a story by Akiva Goldsman (screenplays, "I Am Legend," 2007; "The Da Vinci Code," 2006; "I, Robot," 2004; Oscar recipient, screenplay, "A Beautiful Mind," 2001; "Batman Forever," 1995), Marcum, Holloway and Nolan.

Director Michael Bay (director, "13 Hours," 2016; and the four previous "Transformers"; "Pearl Harbor," 2001; "Armageddon," 1998; "Bad Boys," 1995) keeps all the parts moving. Dialogue quips help relieve the tedium. The computer-generated imagery and action is spectacular. The settings at Alnwick Castle in Northumberland, England, are magnificent.

If the Transformers Universe is to be expanded ala the Marvel Cinematic Universe and the DC Extended Universe, better stories and more character development is needed.

Ozone pollution danger to seniors, children

Q. I don't get it. Is ozone a good thing or a bad thing?

Ozone, a gas, is a form of oxygen. It is created when an electric spark or ultraviolet light passes through air, or when pollutants react chemically with sunlight.

Beneficial ozone is in the upper atmosphere, 10 to 30 miles above the surface of the Earth. It protects us from the sun's ultraviolet rays. Too much of these rays may increase the risk of skin cancer, cataracts and problems with our immune systems. Part of the good ozone layer has been destroyed by man-made chemicals.

Detrimental ozone is at ground level and is the main component of smog. This bad ozone is horrible for your respiratory system. Ozone may aggravate chronic lung diseases such as emphysema and bronchitis and reduce the immune system's ability to fight off bacterial infections in the respiratory system.

Seniors and children are especially vulnerable to ozone pollution. Those

with asthma and nasal inflammations seem to be more sensitive to pollutants.

Active children are at highest risk from ozone exposure because they spend a lot of time playing outdoors. Obviously, adults who work and play outdoors are at higher risk than indoor types.

Ozone can make you cough, suffer from throat irritation and experience an uncomfortable sensation in your chest. This gas can also make it more difficult to breathe deeply.

People who experience high ozone levels may discover that their initial symptoms disappear after a while. However, ozone continues to cause lung damage even when there are no symptoms.

Studies done in the United States reported that ozone with concentrated ambient fine par-

ticles cause a significant increase in blood pressure. The studies also found that increased levels of ambient sulfate and ozone may increase the risk of heart arrhythmia in older people.

Seniors with respiratory problems should check the news and highway signs for reports of high ozone levels.

The Air Quality Index (AQI) reports levels of ozone and other common pollutants in the air. The higher the AQI value, the greater the health concern.

The following guide about AQI ratings is from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency:

Good. The AQI value for your community is between 0 and 50. Air quality is satisfactory and poses little or no health risk.

Moderate. The AQI is between 51 and 100. Air quality is acceptable. However, pollution in this range may pose a moderate health concern for a very small number of individuals. People who are unusually sensitive to ozone or particle pollution may experience

respiratory symptoms.

Unhealthy for Sensitive Groups. When AQI values are between 101 and 150, members of sensitive groups may experience health effects, but the general public is unlikely to be affected.

Unhealthy. Everyone may begin to experience health effects when AQI values are between 151 and 200. Members of sensitive groups may experience more serious health effects.

Very Unhealthy. AQI values between 201 and 300 trigger a health alert, meaning everyone may experience more serious health effects.

Hazardous. AQI values over 300 trigger health warnings of emergency conditions. The entire population is even more likely to be affected by serious health effects.

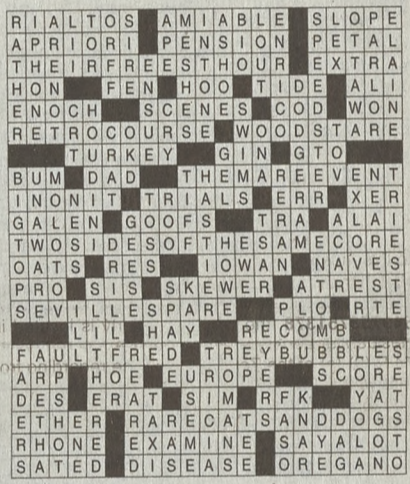
