Too many

Council proclaims proposed ethics ordinance unwieldy

n a two-hour meeting June 26, during which the same arguments were repeated several times and exasperated residents grumbled in their seats, city council members agreed the much-discussed ethics ordinance proposal, weighing in at 34 pages, is simply too unwieldy to handle as one item.

First proposed by members Olga Negron and Michael Colon in January, the work has been applauded by groups such as the League of Women Voters as a measure for transparency and curb corruptive influences in government.

And while council members said they like parts, they said there are simply too many parts for them all to BY JOANNA IRELAND agree with.

Much of the discussion revolved around just how to tackle an ordinance of such size and whether items already a week-long camp for in the works, such as Bryan Callahan's proposal to disallow gifts to administrators and Shawn Martel's ethics training, should be the many free services pulled under this larger umbrella.

They were not entirely convinced of creating an independent ethics board, either.

Continued from page A1 organization suggested we team up with the Coco (Camelot for Children) Foundation to do something together.

"We decided to start this camp, because no one else does. While the Coco Foundation isn't a part of the camp any longer, we've continued the program," Zenie said.

The counselors, many of whom are returning campers, work with the kids who are grouped into Lions (ages 4-6), Tigers (ages 7-9), and Bears (ages 10-12) or, as Kirsten Almeida, owner and founder of the Emmaus-based "Star of the Day" theater troop calls them, "littles, middles,

Her middles were rehearsing their big musical number for the Friday showcase, to which parents and families were invited, on the Tompkins College Center's Samuels Theater stage.

"I chose 'Waving Through a Window,' from this year's Tony Award-winning 'Dear Evan Hansen' for them to perform," Almeida said. "It's all about overcoming obstacles, and being pushed to the edge - on the outside looking in, which is absolutely something these kids can relate to.

Almeida's "littles" have been practicing "How Far I'll Go," from the film "Moana," another inspirational song about finding strength in yourself. Her "bigs" will perform "Freak Flag," from the musical "Shrek," because the song encourages everyone to embrace who they

"I lost my best friend of 28 years to cancer - she learned about her diagnosis and passed away in a week, and so I'm always looking for ways to give back [to this community].

"I just want to help these kids feel normal for a few hours," Almeida said. "So I choose age-appropriate popular pieces or pieces that I know will be fun to perform, and then I teach the kids to tell a story through music and movement.'

It's obvious from the giggles, hugs and laughter that after three and a half days, everyone's bonded.

"Our goal really is for everyone to be together and have fun and connect with peers that have similar experiences," said Tracy Stauffer, marketing and community relations coordinator.

"We invite the cancer warriors, their siblings, and siblings of kids who've passed," Stauffer said. "And many of our campers have returned year after year and eventually become counselors-in-training and then, when they're 18, become

counselors.' "It really is all about community and family," said Assistant Executive Director Lisa Kappes. "We want to make people smile, and so we spend a few months planning for the week-long camp,

sending out requests for volunteers and application forms for the camp-

ers.
"We had so many former campers wanting to return as counselors that we had to turn a few away. Our ratio this year is practically 1:1," she

said. "It's a family that no one wants to be in, but we welcome everyone with open arms," Stauffer said. "Sometimes the kids who are new to the camp might be a bit nervous on day one, but by day tw, you'd never know. It real-

ly is an instant bond." Parents also appreciate the respite. It's a challenge, Stauffer said. for parents to find and trust someone who's accustomed to dealing with their kids' diagnoses and treatments. "We get it," said Stauffer, mother of one of the 11-year-old campers who's been a cancer warrior for two years, "and they trust us.'

The Pediatric Cancer Foundation of the Lehigh Valley (PCFLV) doesn't just plan and run this weeklong camp. The organization assists families throughout the Lehigh Valley whose children have been recently diagnosed, are mid-treatment, or in remission or maintenance, says Stauffer.

"We offer a one-time free home 'health' cleaning in partnership with a local cleaning company so that when immune-compromised kids come home from the hospital for the first time," said Stauffer, "they're coming into a home that's as clean as possible."

The organization also plans and coordinates events for kids, like a recent field trip to a local Escape Room, a "chemo circus" - where volunteers visit kids in the hospital, accompanied by clowns, princesses, or other characters, and home visits to cheer up seriously ill children.

"We have an art therapy program called 'Art Soup,' which partners local artists with the kids to work on different projects, and on those days, we give parents a gift card to go out to eat and have a bit of a date night," said Stauffer.

Everyone in the organization understands that a cancer diagnosis turns everything upside down. A parent may need to severely restrict working hours or quit a job to handle the myriad doctors' appointments and treatments. The organization provides gift cards for gas, grocery stores, and hospital cafeterias.

Stauffer said that about 50 percent of the children involved with PCFLV are treated at Lehigh Valley Hospital and the other half travel to CHOP or St. Christopher's.

Much of the organization's capital comes from two annual fundraisers: Run to Live, a 5K/8K walk/run event, and Hearts of Gold, which won Lehigh Valley Style Magazine's 2017 award for "Best Annual Charity or Social Event."


Monsignor Schlert named bishop

The Vatican announced last week that Pope Francis has appointed a priest of the Diocese of Allentown, Reverend Monsignor Alfred A. Schlert, as the Fifth Bishop of Allentown.

Bishop-elect Schlert is the first priest of the Diocese to be appointed to serve as its Bishop. He has been serving as the Diocesan Administrator since his election by the Diocesan College of Consultors on Feb. 1, 2017 following the Jan. 31 installation of his predecessor Most Reverend John Barres as the Bishop of Rockville Centre, New York.

Bishop-elect Schlert was born to Alfred and Marylou (DeRose) Schlert in Easton on July 24, 1961, just six months after the Diocese of Allentown was formed. He was educated at St. Jane Frances de Chantal Elementary School and Notre Dame High School, both in Easton. He prepared for the Priesthood at St. Charles Borromeo Seminary near Philadelphia and the Pontifical Roman Seminary and St. John Lateran University in Rome. Most Reverend Thomas J. Welsh ordained him a priest at the Cathedral of Saint

Lehigh University golf coach



Frank "Kelly" Bachman Gutshall, 92, of Springtown, died June 22, 2017, at the inpatient hospice unit at Lehigh Valley Hospital, Allentown. Born in Hellertown, he was a son of the late Foster L. and Clara E. (Bachman) Gutshall. He was the husband of Marguerite (Dimmig) Gutshall for 69 years.

He was a 1942 graduate of Springfield High

He was a tech sergeant in the U.S. Marine Corps during World War II.

He attended Muhlenberg College. He transferred to and graduated from Lehigh University, where he had earned a bachelor of science degree in Business Administration.

He was a car under coater and then was a salesman for his father, F.L. Gutshall, Springtown. He and his two brothers later opened Gutshall's Chevrolet, Hellertown, from which he retired in 1990 after 40 years. He was on the Chevrolet dealers planning committee and was a president of the A.B.E. Chevrolet Dealers Association.

He was on the Christ Lutheran Church, Springtown, council. He was a past president of the Hellertown Lions Club, Springtown Fire Company and Springtown Sportsman's Association. He was a member of the board of directors for Indian Valley Country Club, Merchant's Bank and First National Bank. He was, from 1990 to 2006, the Lehigh University golf coach, where he twice won the Patriot League Coach of the Year award. He had 13 holes in one, won the Indian Valley Country Club championship 12 times in four decades, and played in 13 different countries and on 276 different courses in during his career. He was inducted into the GALV Hall of Fame and received the distinguished service award from Philadelphia Golf Association.



Steam engine tour set for July 16

After a rash of complaints about the noise and dust caused by all-terrain vehicles, Bethlehem Township Commissioners are on the brink of strictly regulating their use. A proposed ordinance, debated at JUne 19 meeting, would ban their use between dusk and dawn. They would

also be required to stay at least 100 feet away from the property line of any adjacent owner. Commissioner

Nolan said that the ordinance under consideration is similar to one already in place in Lower Saucon Township. He said "it's time to place some regulations. The township is filling out. We don't have much land." President Mike Hudak agreed but made clear that "we're not outlawing anything.

Under the proposed ordinance, ATVs would include snowmobiles, motor driven vehicles having two or more wheels (commonly known as trail bikes), dirt

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

Celebrating community diversity

A mural currently being produced on the north facing wall of 414 Hayes Street is one part of the neighborhood improvement project currently underway under the auspices of the Community Action Committee of the Lehigh Valley (CACLV) and Lehigh Valley Community Land Trust, with financial support from Wells Fargo Bank, according to CACLV associate executive director of community development Ellen Larmer.

Holly Fields-Scott of Bella Pintura Inc. is working on the mural, which she says "celebrates diversity of the community" and which should be finished by the end of July. After the brick exterior wall received repairs, Fields-Scott was spotted outlining and painting the mural with her daughter, Nevada's, assistance on June 23. Their work will continue to the end of July she estimates.

Larmer explained that 414 and 418 Hayes Street, both owned by the Land Trust, will be complete-

ly rehabbed and sold as "workforce housing, and be income restricted for 99 years through the land trust model." She said that the Southside Vision development committee is identifying properties to improve neighborhoods, and that the middle property at 416 Hayes Street, which is private investor owned, will participate as well.

Larmer also mentioned that new street trees will be planted on Hayes Street in spring 2018 to replace dead or dying trees in the neighborhood.

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
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

In the path of totality, about 70 miles wide, the sun will be completely obliterated from sight. This is referred to as a total solar eclipse and will be visible in parts of 14 states. 



Ozone pollution danger to seniors, children

Q. I don't get it. Is ozone a good thing or

a bad thing? Ozone, a gas, is a form of oxygen. It is created when an electric spark or ultraviolet light passes through air, or when pollutants react chemically with sunlight.

Beneficial ozone is in the upper atmosphere, 10 to 30 miles above the surface of the Earth. It protects us from the sun's ultraviolet rays. Too much of these rays may increase the risk of skin cancer, cataracts and problems with our immune systems. Part of the good ozone layer has been destroyed by man-made

chemicals. Detrimental ozone is at ground level and is the main component of smog. This bad ozone is horrible for your respiratory system. Ozone may aggravate chronic lung diseases such as emphysema and bronchitis and reduce the immune system's ability to fight off bacterial infections in the

respiratory system. Seniors and children are especially vulnerable to ozone pollution. Those





with asthma and nasal inflammations seem to be more sensitive to pollut-

Active children are at highest risk from ozone exposure because they spend a lot of time playing outdoors. Obviously, adults who work and play outdoors are at higher risk than indoor types.

Ozone can make you cough, suffer from throat irritation and experience an uncomfortable sensation in your chest. This gas can also make it more difficult to breathe deep-

People who experience high ozone levels may discover that their initial symptoms disappear after a while. However, ozone continues to cause lung damage even when there are no symptoms.
