
Science Club: _____ Experimenting For Fun

The Student Government was advised by Mr. Constantine "Gus" Loupos, whose support and hard work was a most valued asset to the organiza-









■ Math Team: ■ Summing It Up

Homecoming: Keeping The Spirit Alive

























Presenting The Facts


Interact: Serving The Community

German Club:


Exploring German Customs




Voicing Political Opinions






DECA:









This was the second year Liberty Theatre produced a successful rock concert due to the leadership of Len Perrett, advisor.
















J.V. And Freshmen Football: Planning For '85





















Varsity Soccer: Kicking Grass


















Field Hockey: Looking Ahead






Cheerleaders: Keeping Spirit Up

able to attend.



The J.V. Team, coached by John Tone, had a successful season despite their youth and inexperience. Other returning J.V. players will help to create a


















JV & Frosh B-Ball: Looking Ahead
















J-V Frosh Wrestling: Holding Ground




















Gymnastics: Tumbling Forward



















Girls' Swimming: Winning Recognition


Checking Opponents



























Mathematics Department


















Science Department














Special Services Dept.

Band Trip: Winning As Usual





The rest of the concert included performances by the Highland Dancers, the colour guard, the pipes and drums, and the majorettes.



Boys' Tennis: Building Confidence


















Boys' Baseball: Sliding To Victory


Stepping Through The Looking Glass

Following the recognition of scholastic achievement and awarding of diplomas, the wave began its move onward, but the water of which it is composed remains.


