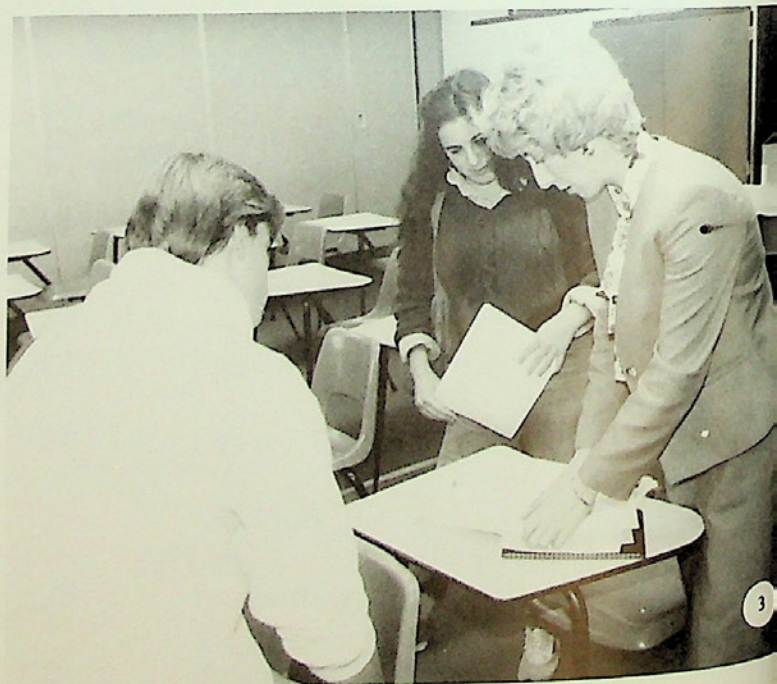
The NHS sponsored a tutoring program offered to all students who needed help in any subject. The

The Student Government was advised by Mr. Constantine "Gus" Loupos, whose support and hard work was a most valued asset to the organization.

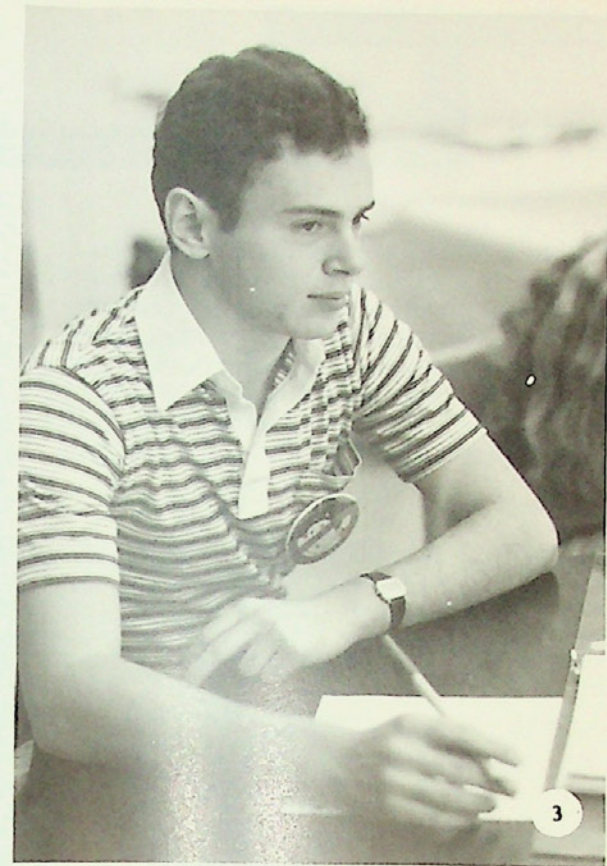

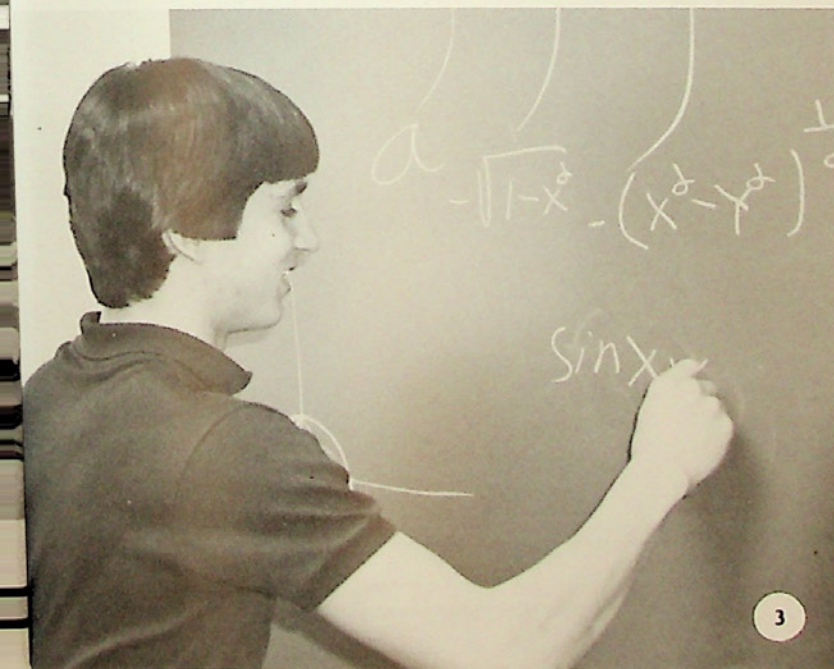




# Math Team: Summing It Up

# Homecoming: Keeping The Spirit Alive

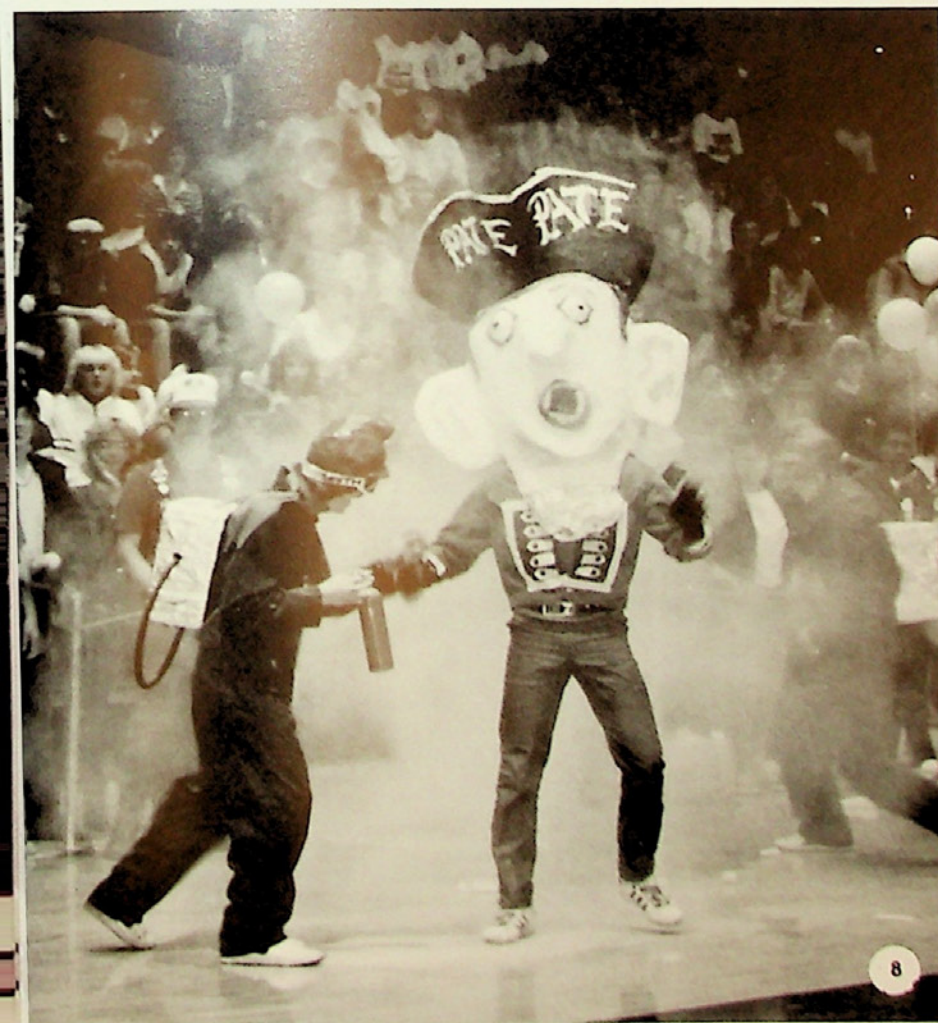

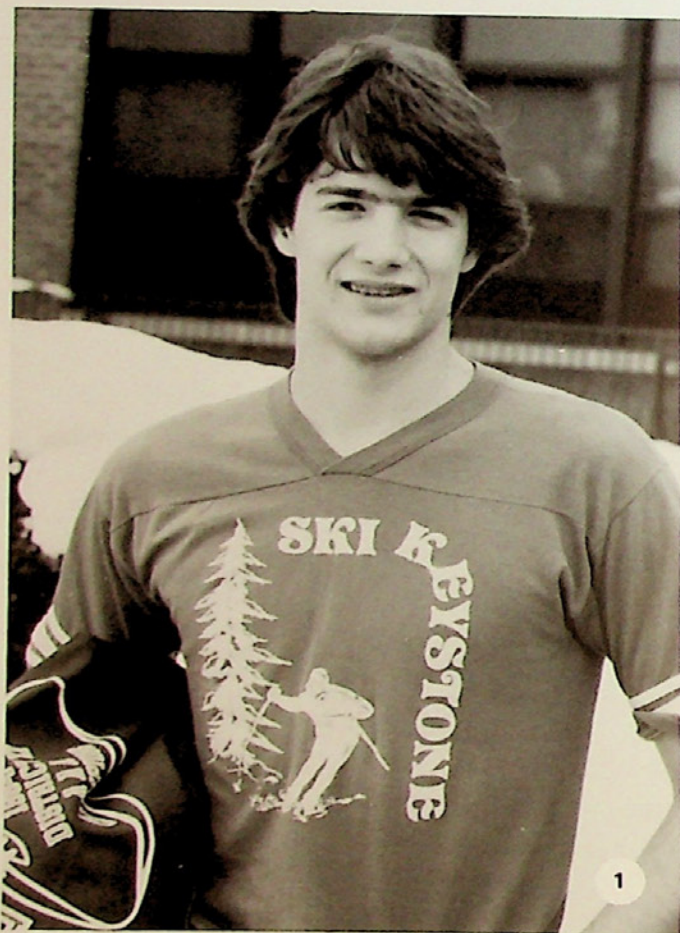


# Ski Club:

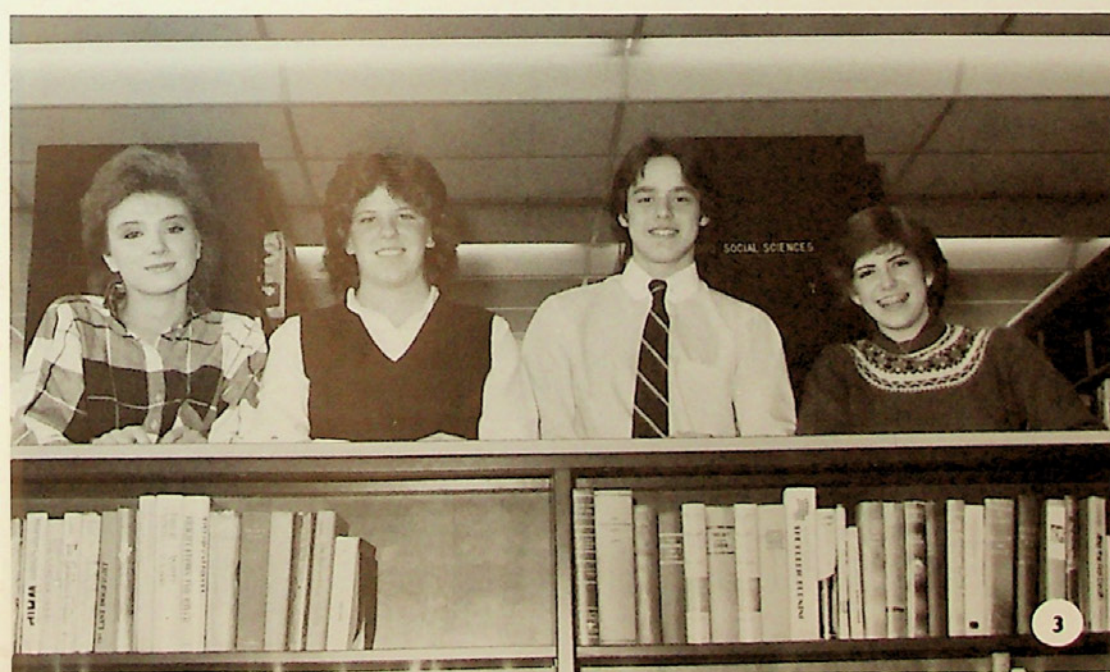


# Young Republicans: Voicing Political Opinions

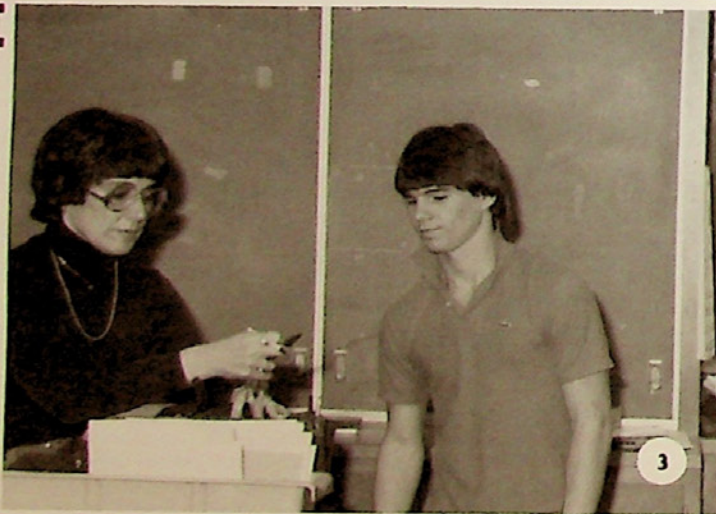


## Art Club:

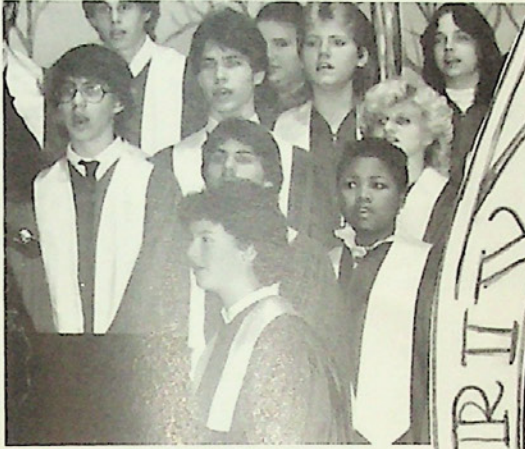

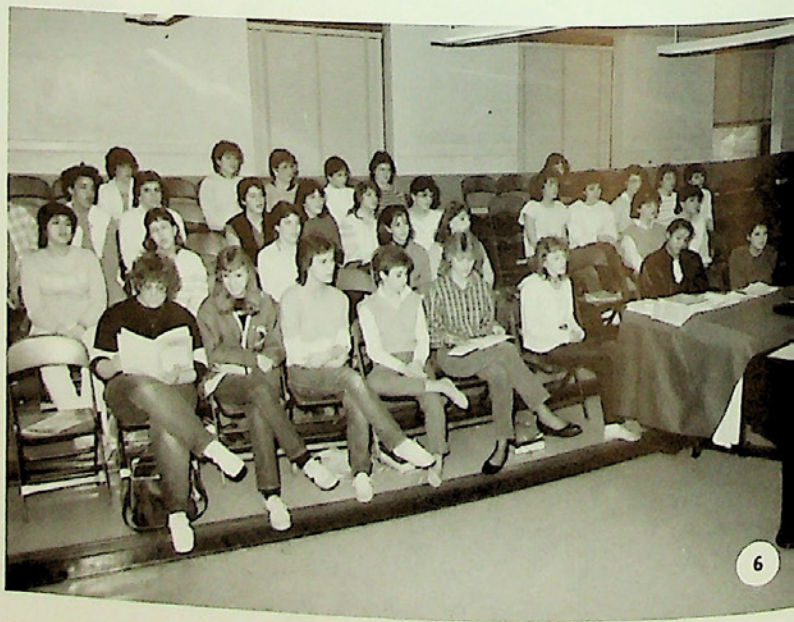


## Carrying A Tune

*Crown Imperial* and *Nobody Does It Better*.

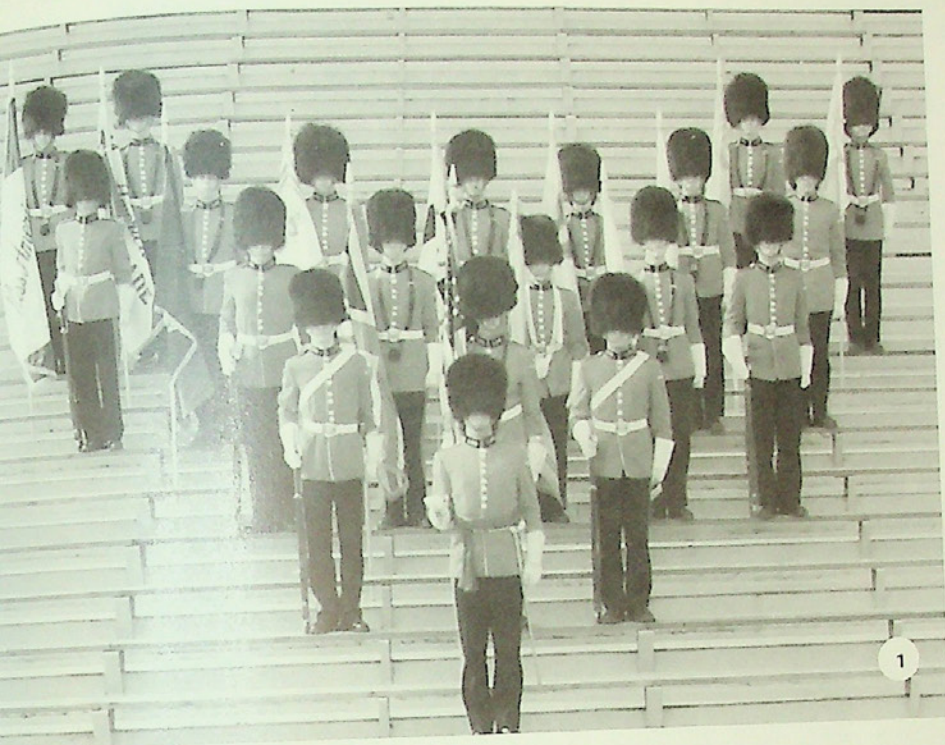

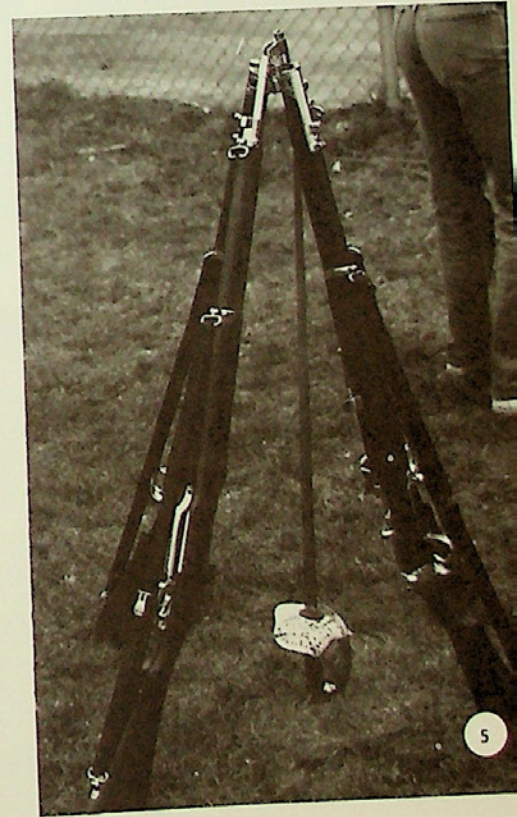

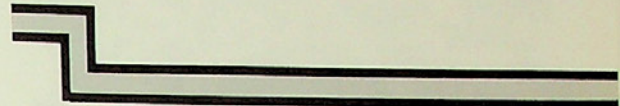
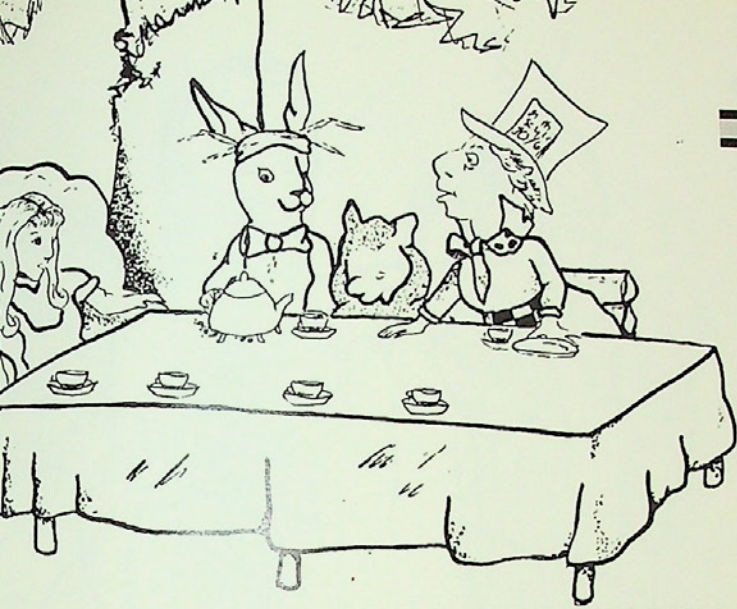

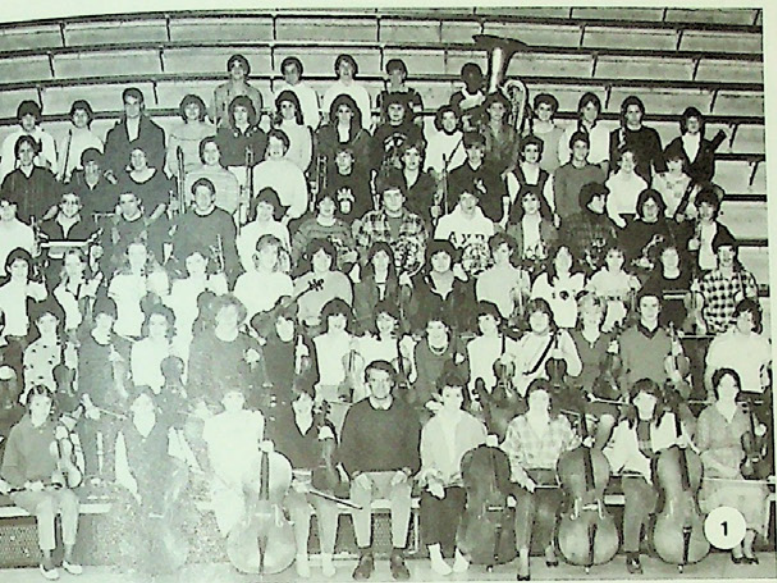
The orchestra's faithful practice led to perfection and the close of another fine year.

This was the second year Liberty Theatre produced a successful rock concert due to the leadership of Len Perrett, advisor.

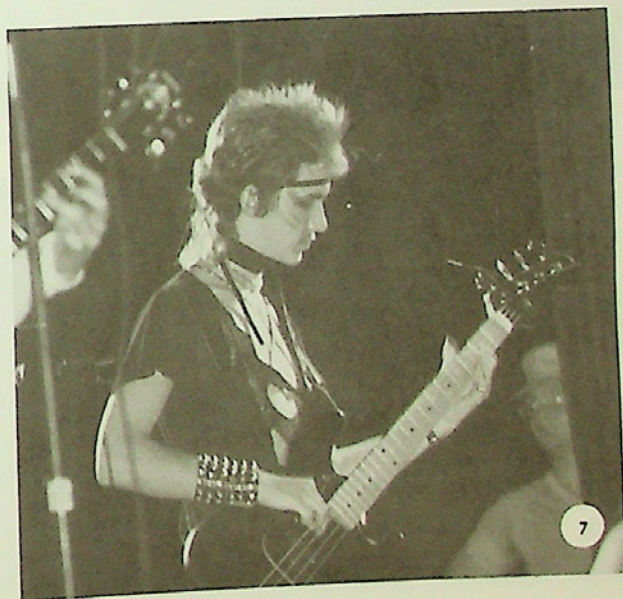
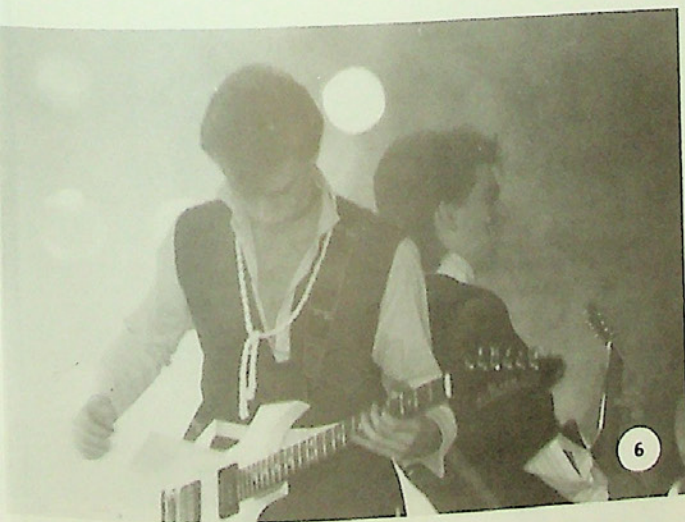
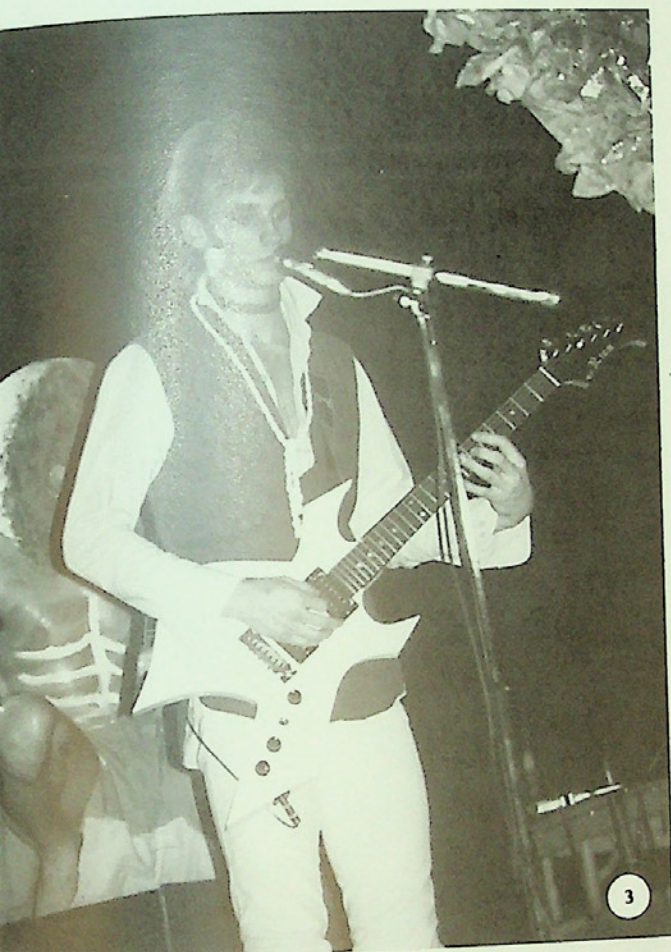

# Liberty Theatre: Expanding In New Directions

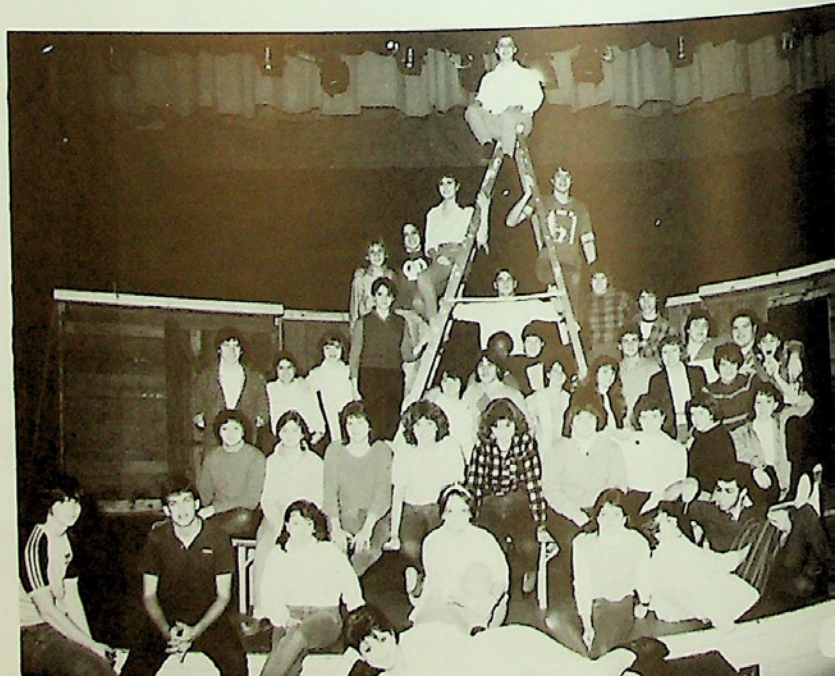

duction of a Shakespearean play did not occur due to timing difficulties.

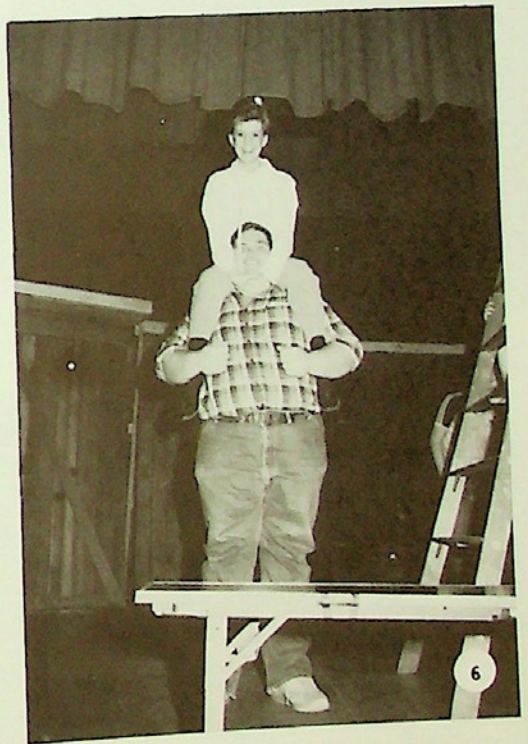
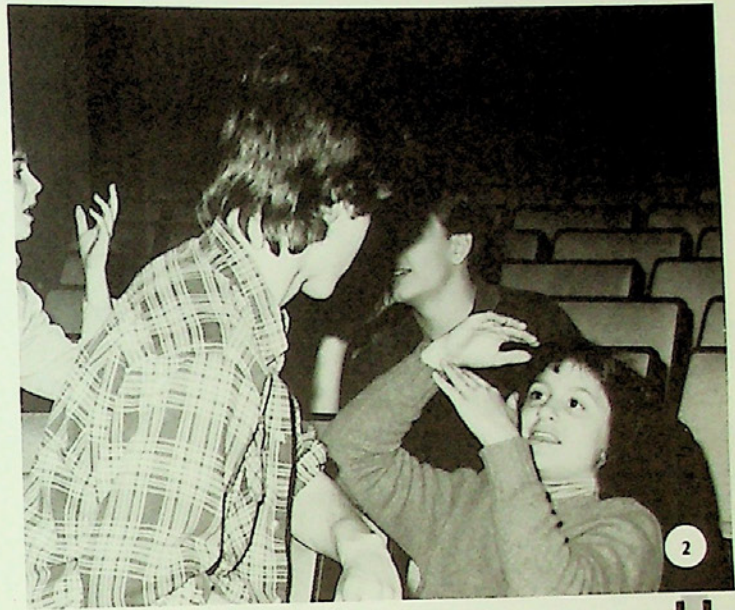

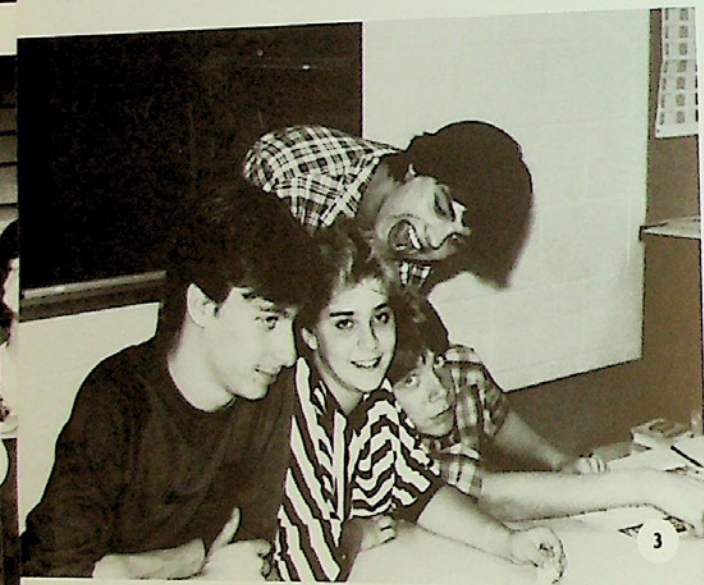




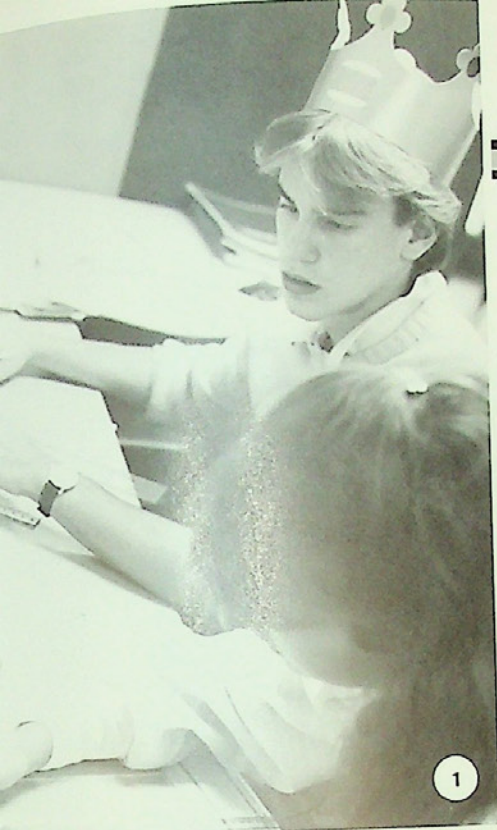
# Cauldron: Creating Memories

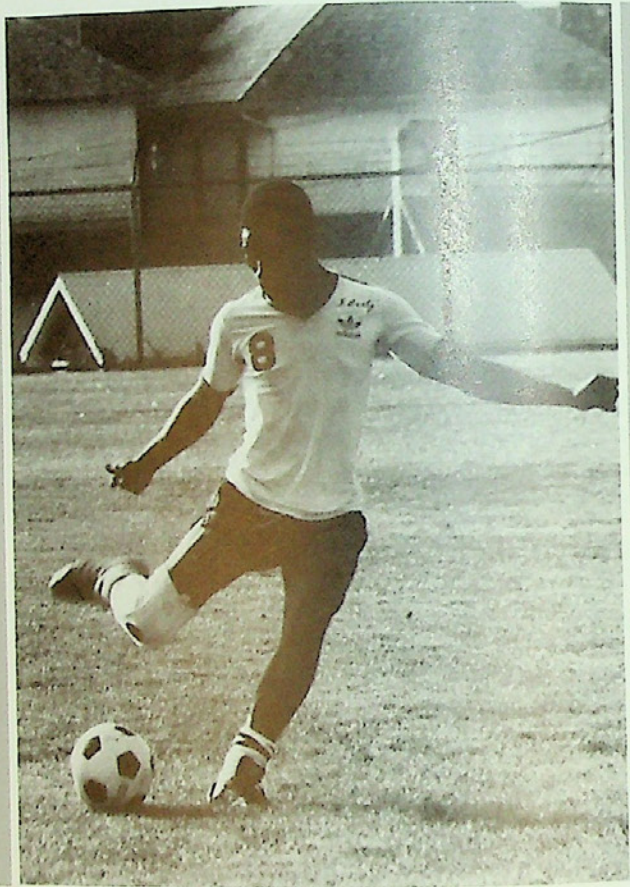
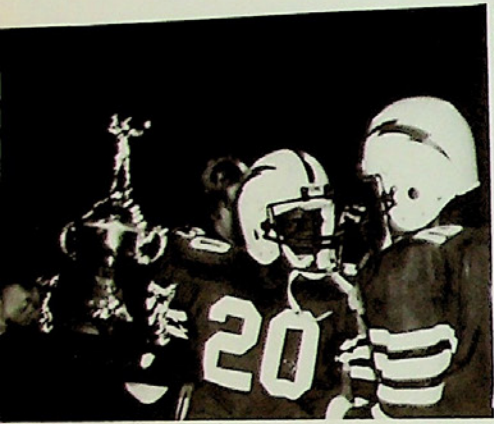

The many talented underclassmen, who made vital contributions to the teams, should provide a strong foundation for a good season next year.

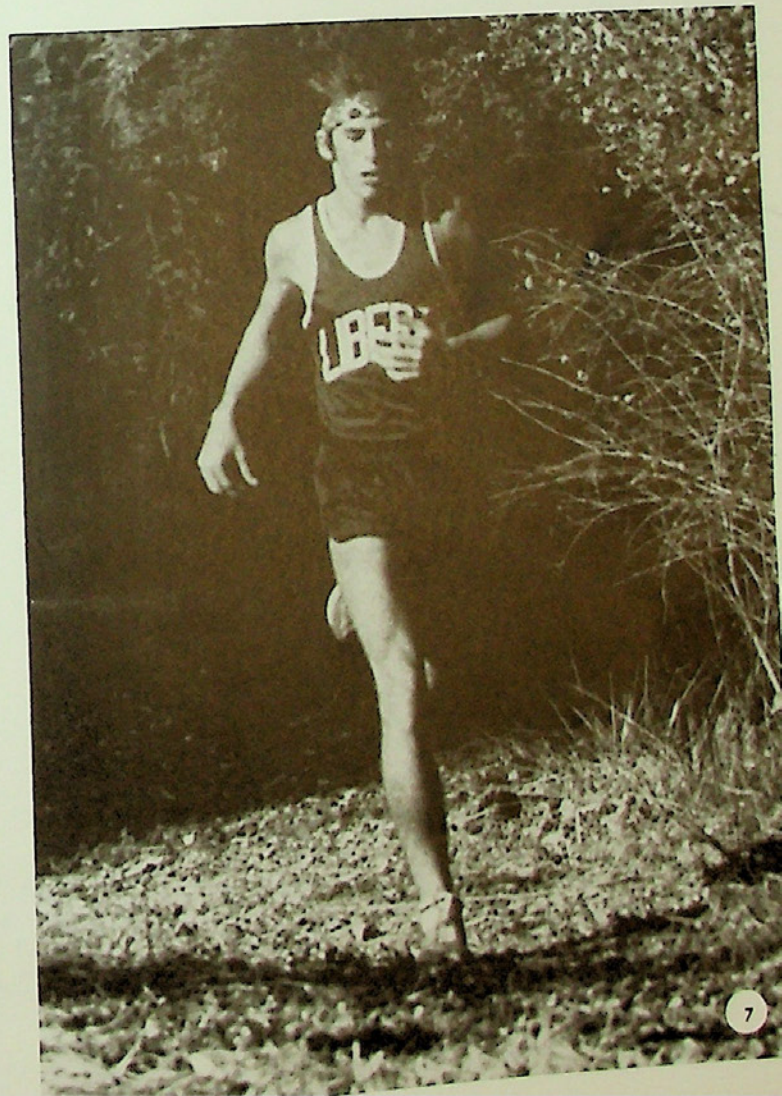

# Girls' Tennis: Gaining Experience

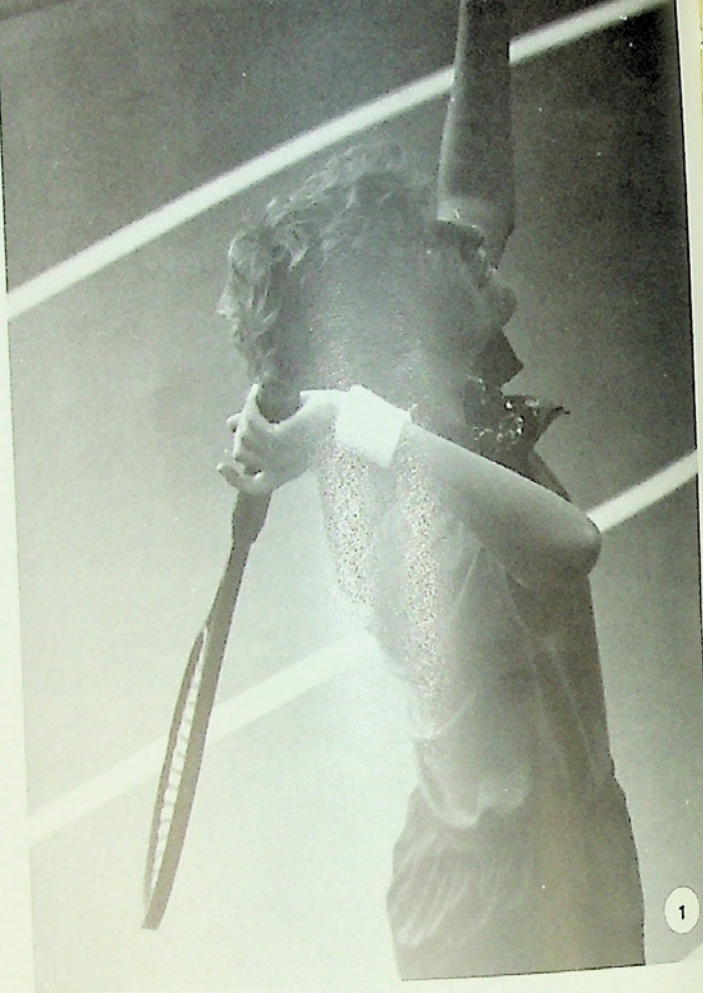

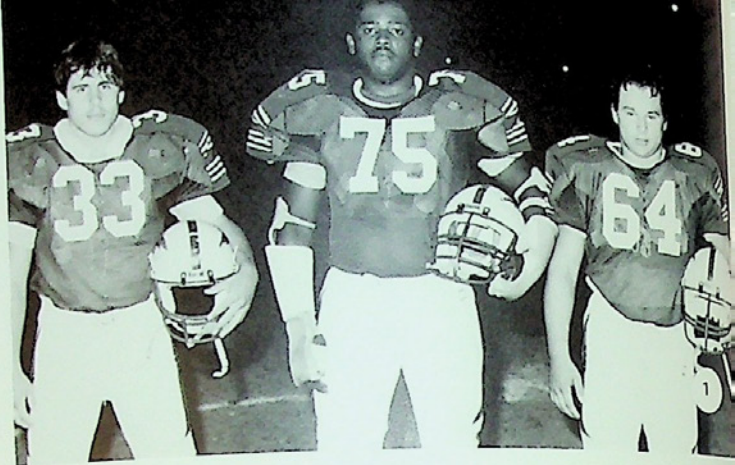

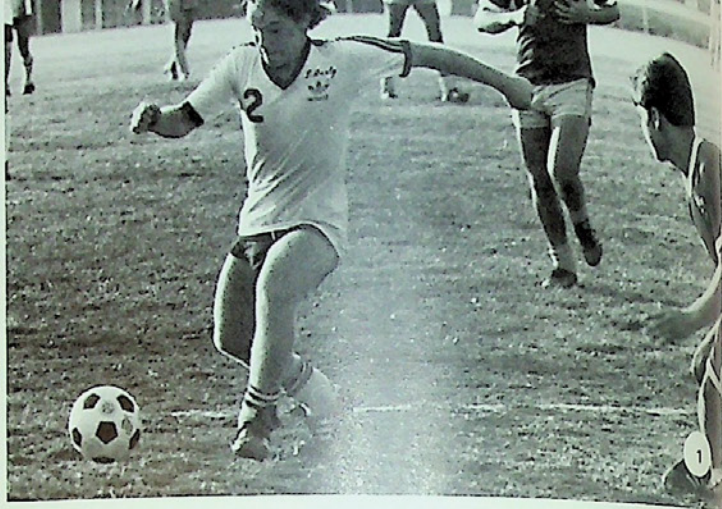

# Cheerleaders: Keeping Spirit Up

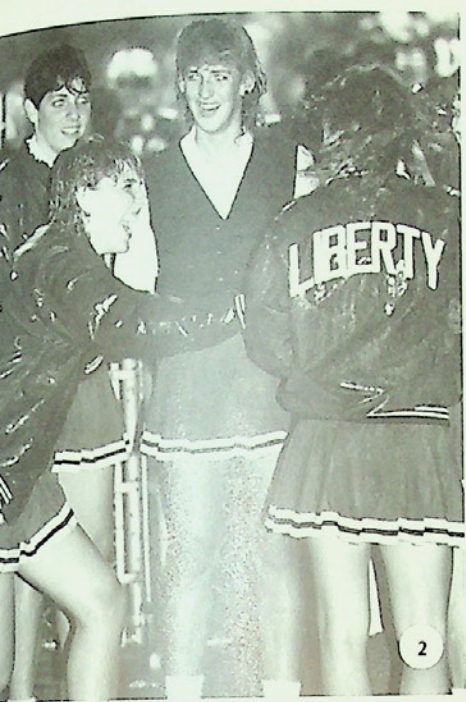

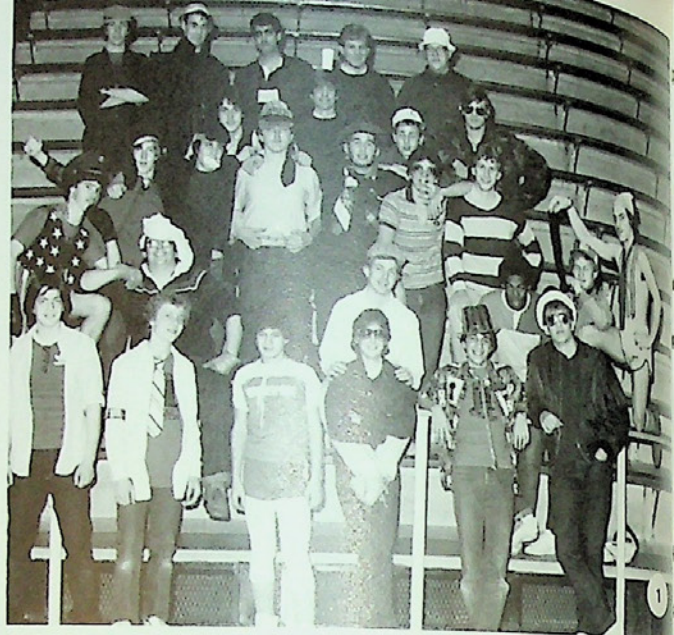


# Mad Hatters: Clowning Around

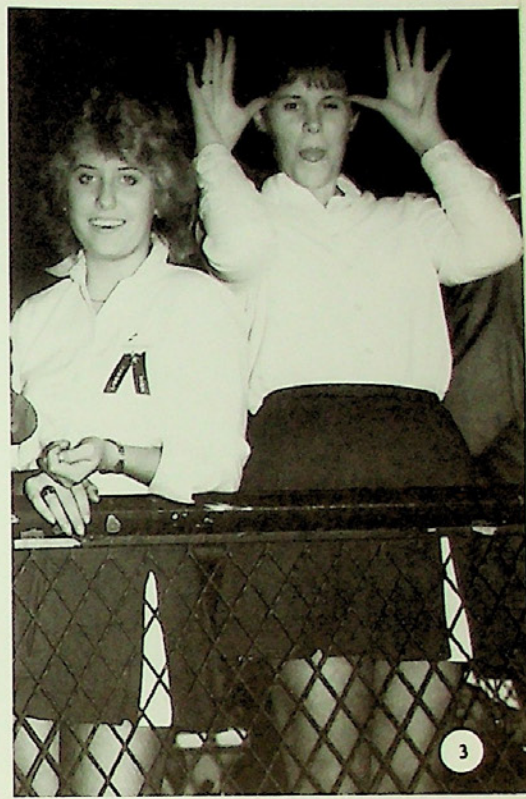

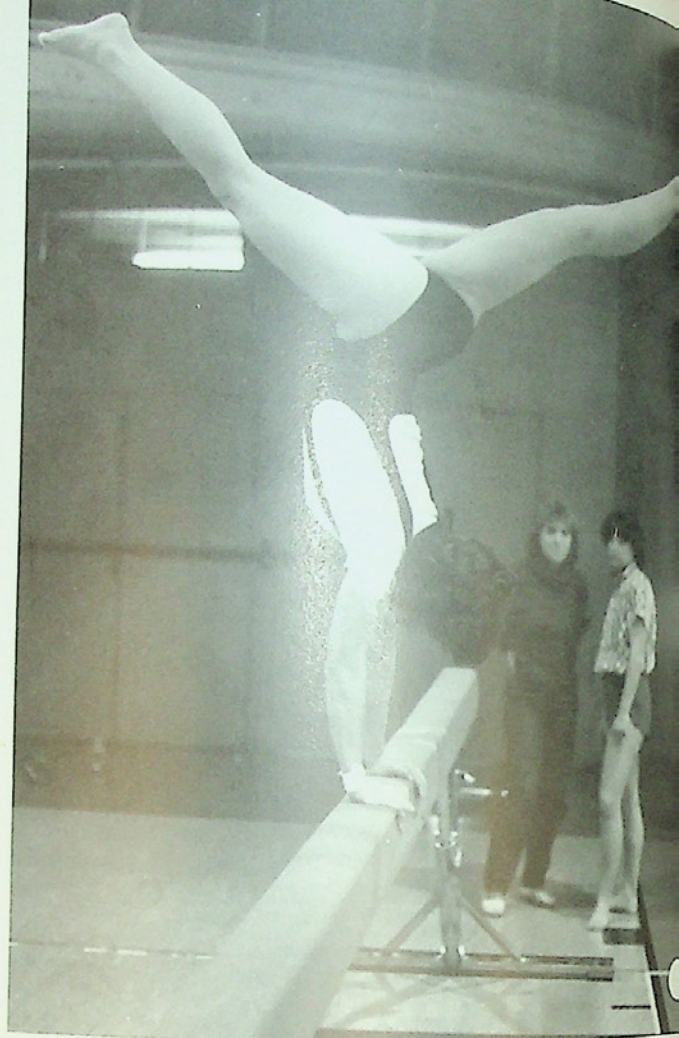
# Gymnastics: Tumbling Forward

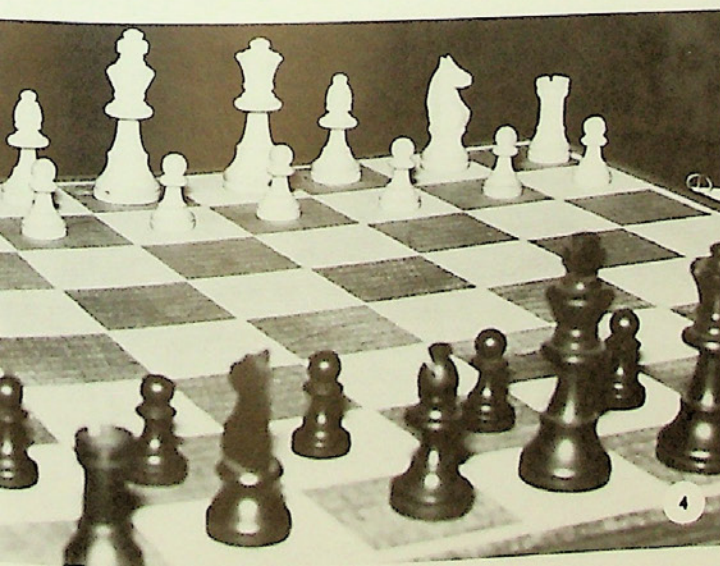
## Chess: Checking Opponents

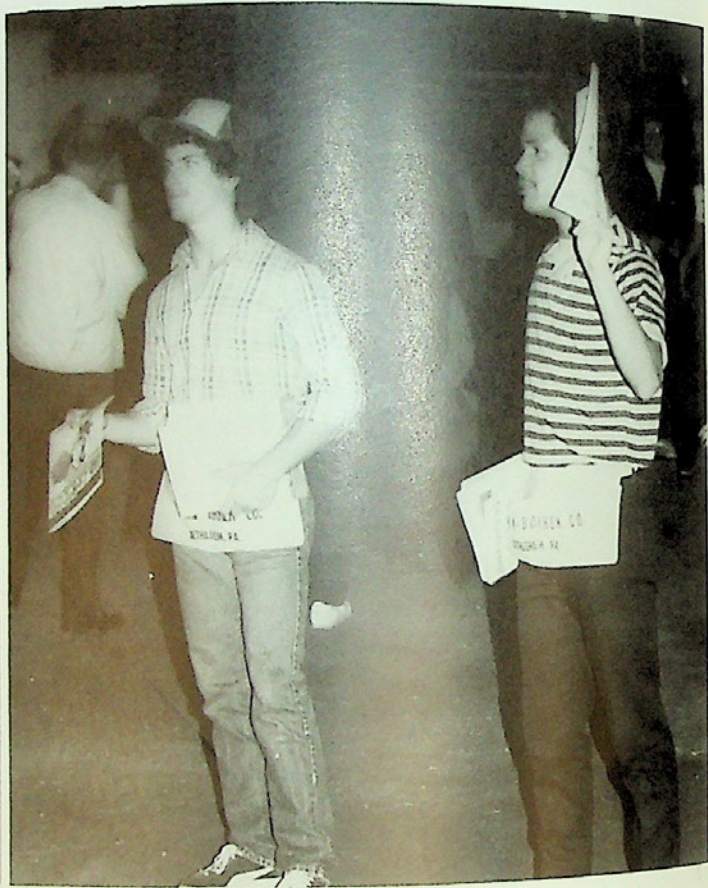

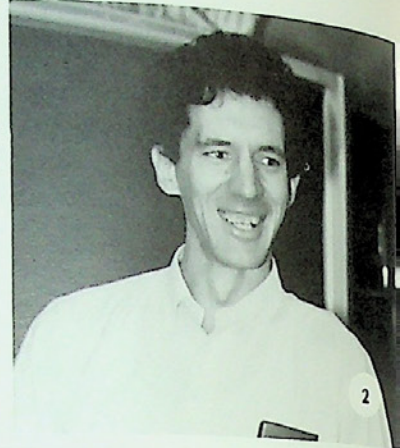


## Mathematics Department

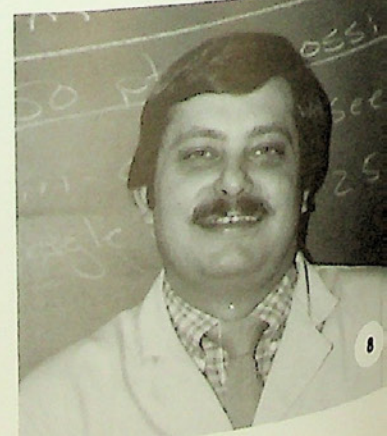

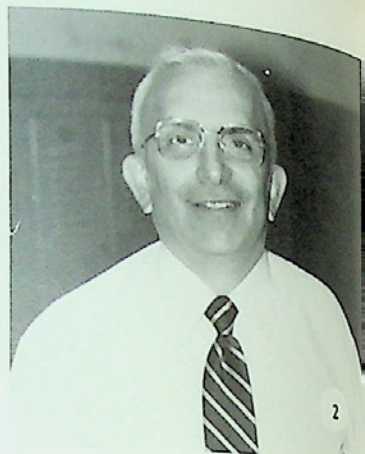
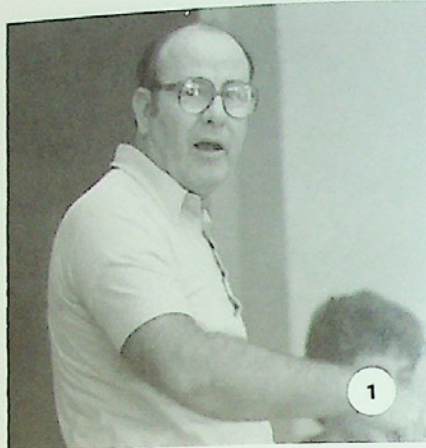
## Science Department

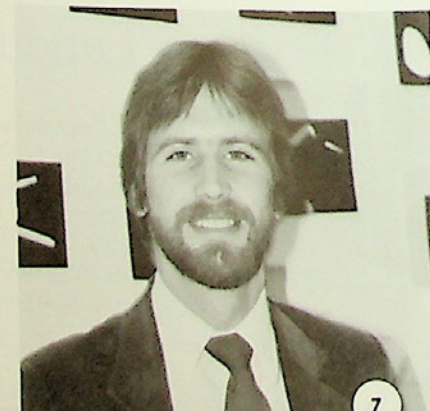
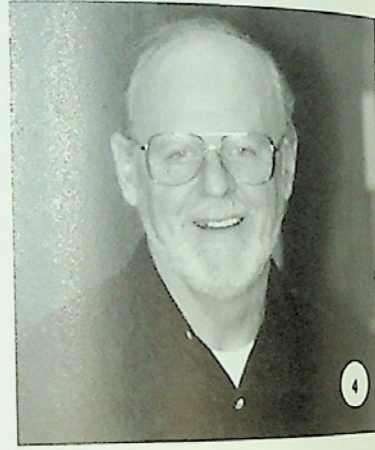
## Foreign Language Department

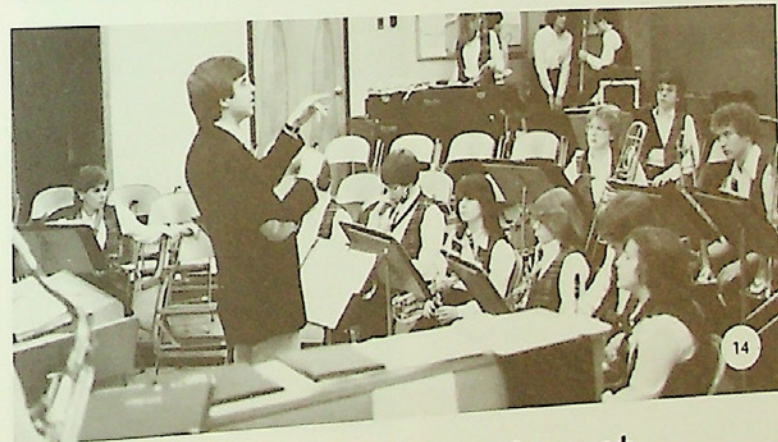
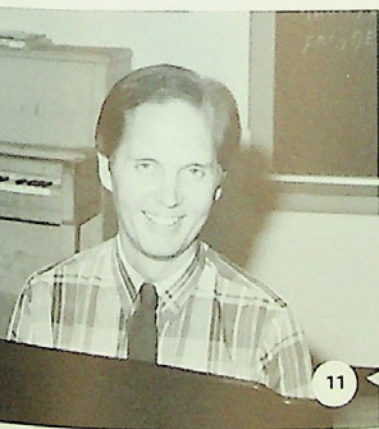
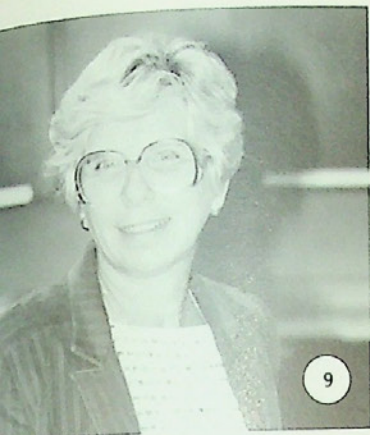

## Fine Arts Department

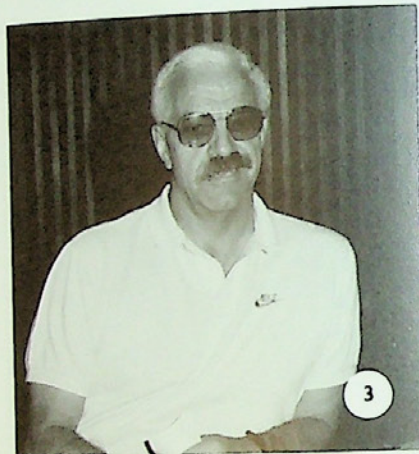
The Fine Arts Department at Liberty High School, headed by Dr. Gilmarin, offers a variety of courses ranging from music to photography.

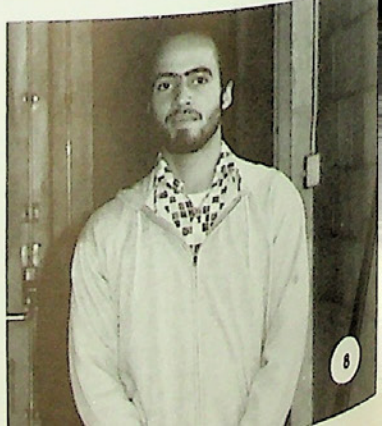
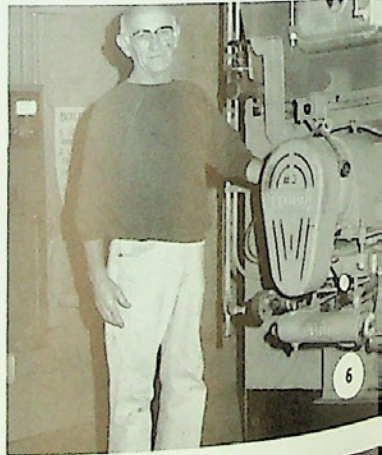
## Special Services Dept.

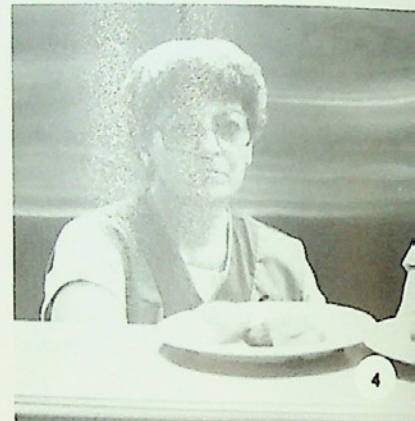


## Office Staff

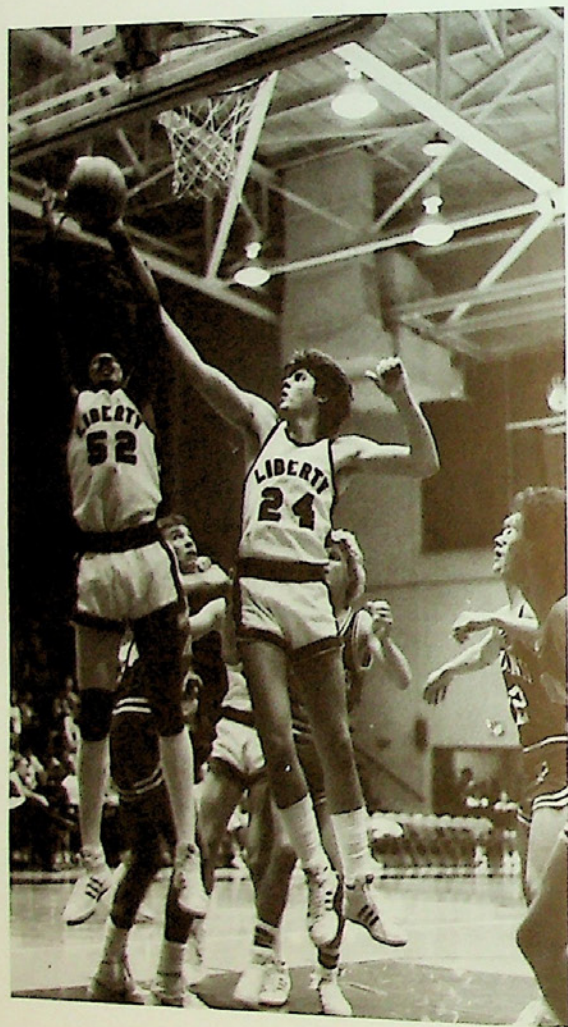
## Cafeteria Staff

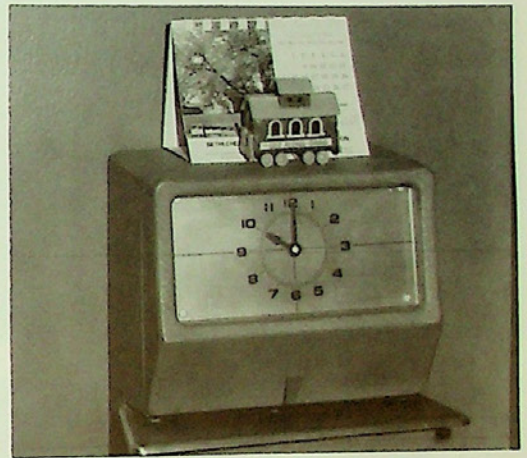

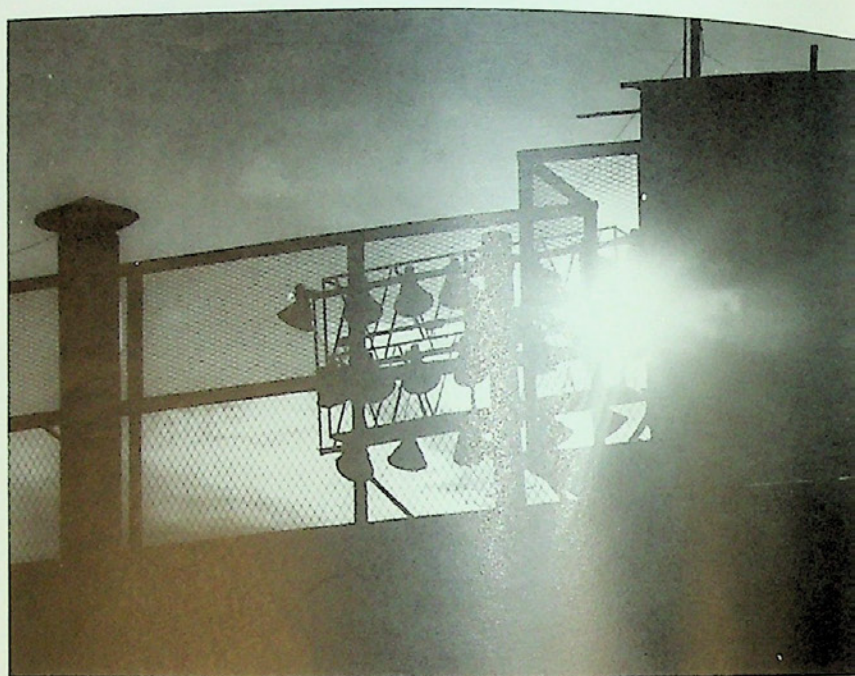

## Band Trip: Winning As Usual

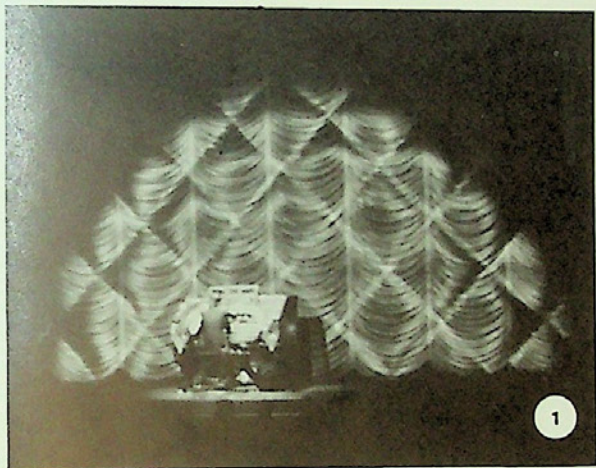

# Boys' Track: Hurdling To Victory

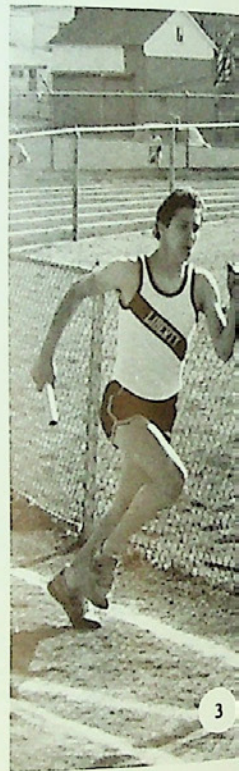
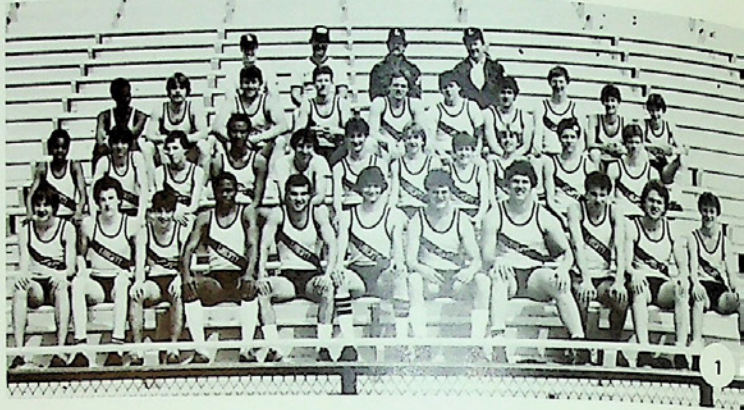

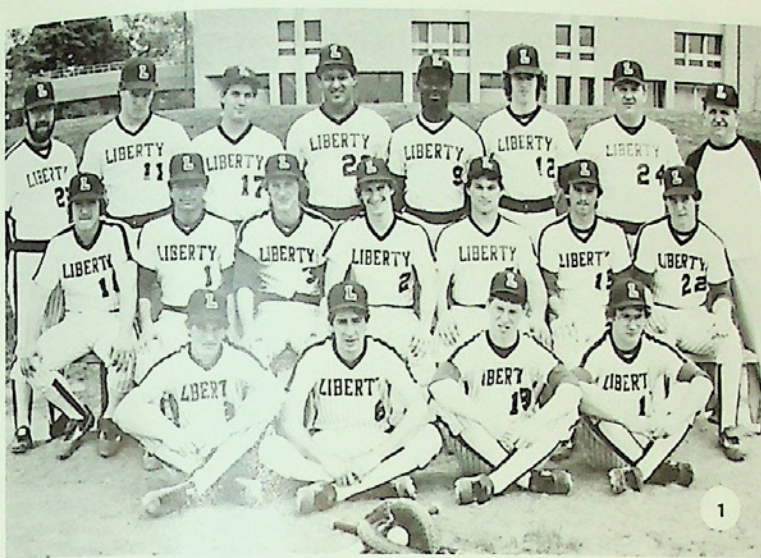

# Boys' Baseball: Sliding To Victory

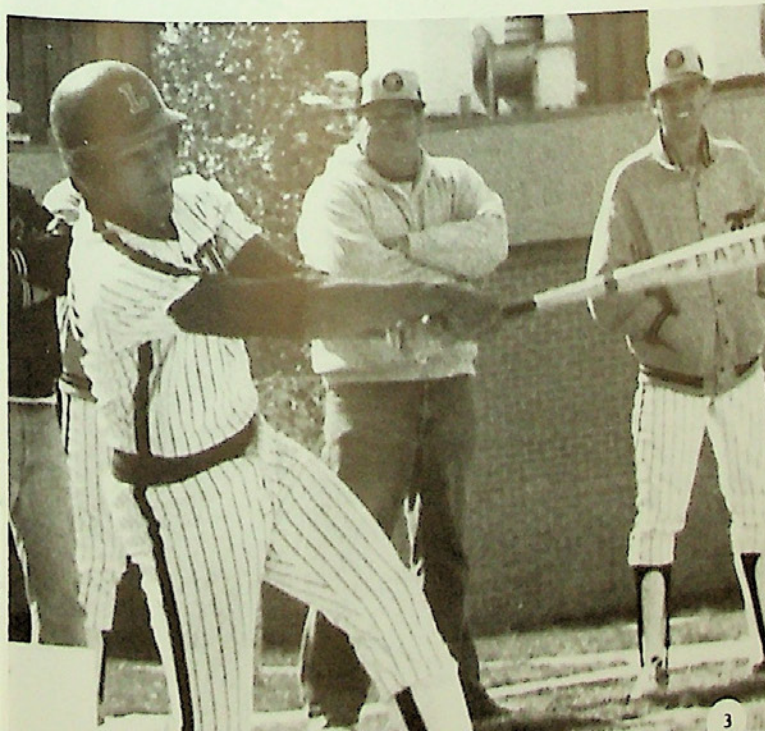

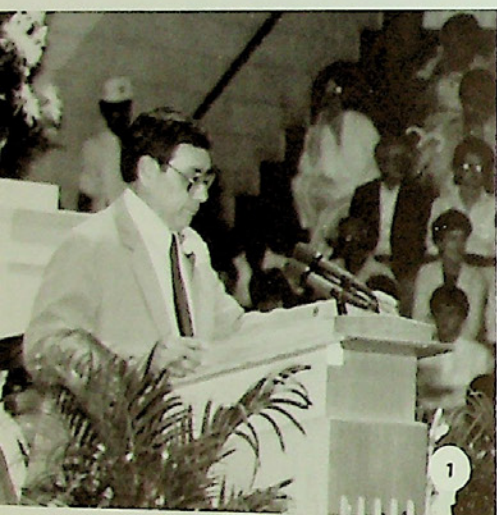
# Graduation: Stepping Through The Looking Glass
