

Four Bangor Soldiers Are War Casualties

Three Bangor families and one former Bangor family, now residents of Pen Argyl, were informed recently that members of their families who are serving in the armed forces were victims in campaigns on foreign soil.

One of the four listed casualties paid the supreme sacrifice. Mrs. Ellen Strunk, of Pen Argyl, was notified by the War Department that her son, T. Sgt. William Strunk of the United States Army, was killed in action in Italy. Sgt. Strunk, who was the son of the late John Strunk and Mrs. Strunk, had served many years in the Army and was a former resident of Bangor and East Bangor. He also has two brothers serving with the armed forces.

Three Bangor men have been injured in action. Yesterday Mrs. Elmira May Counterman, of Broadway, Bangor, was informed by the Navy Department that her husband, S. 1-c. Alfred Counterman, of the United States Navy, was injured in action in the European theater of operations. He last was heard from in England, and at that time was a cook aboard an LST boat.

Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Singer, Sr., of North Main Street, Bangor, have also been informed that their son, Pvt. Raymond Singer, of the United States Army, was injured in action in Italy, but is recovering.

Word was also received here by Mr. and Mrs. John D. Pritchard, of South High Street, that their son, Pvt. Glenwood R. Pritchard, of the United States Army, was also slightly injured in action in Italy on May 27. Further information will be forthcoming on all these men.
