

First of Five Brothers Gets Army Discharge

Cpl. Jack Wright is the first of five brothers who have served overseas to return to the United States with an honorable discharge. Holder of the Purple Heart and the various service ribbons with six battle stars, he has seen action with several branches of the army, the most recent being the 185th Engineers of the Fifth Army.

Cpl. Jack and his brother Sgt. Elwood Wright, left with the 213th Coast Artillery in September, 1940. Jack served thirty-two months overseas.

Alfred Wright, Chief Petty Officer 2-c, is also home after serving fourteen months in the European Theater. He is spending a 30-day leave with his wife, the former Mary Bracken of Easton. He will report to the Philadelphia Navy Yard upon completing his leave.

Sgt. Elwood Wright and another brother, Cpl. Harry Wright, who served overseas with a chemical warfare unit, are expected to return to the States soon, both with enough points to be discharged.

Cpl. James Wright is serving in France with a Troop Carrier Squadron. According to latest word received from him, he expects to be home at the end of the year with an honorable point discharge.

The youngest brother Robert, enlisted in the Navy a short time ago and is now in training at Sampson, N. Y. They are all the sons of Mrs. Margaret Wright, now residing at 1206 Butler Street, Easton, and the late Alfred E. Wright of this city.
