at Columbus Air Field, Miss. He was subsequently transferred to Hendricks Field, Fla., for advanced tactical training and in October, 1944, he went overseas. He was advanced in rank while on foreign soil. His first mission was on November 19 when his Fortress squadron attacked the railroad bridge at Fer-

rara, Italy.

He was awarded the Air Medal for "meritorious achievement in aerial flight against the enemy."
