## **West Bangor** Soldier Dies In England

Pvt. Trebio Carbone, of the U.S. Army, 23-year-old son of Mrs. Mary Carbone and the late John Carbone, of West Bangor, has deid in England where he was stationed, according to information received by his mother. Circumstances contributing to his death are not known.

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Official notification of the death of Pvt. Carbone was received in a telegram from Adjutant General Ulio, as follows: "The Secretary of War asks that I assure you of his deep sympathy in the loss of your son, Pvt. Trebio Carbone. Report received states that he died March 21 in Warminster, England. A letter will follow."

Mrs. Carbone received a letter written by her son dated March 12, in which he was able to be out again after being hospitalized by illness. However, the letter stated that he had recovered from this illness.

Since moving overseas with the U. S. Army last November, he and a brother, Pvt. Angelo Carbone, also staticted in England, had met on several occasions, being stationed about 60 miles from each other.

One of the three sons of Mrs. Carbone in the U. S. Army, he was inducted September 1, 1942. He went to the Fort Meade Reception Center; then to Camp Carson, Colo.; Camp Claymar. La.; Camp Bowie, Texas; Camp Huckinshaw, Ark., and Santa Anita, Calif. In November, 1943, he moved overseas in an ordinance group.

He is a graduate of the Pen Argyl High School, a member of the class of 1940. While in high school much time was spent in baseball practice, being an infielder on the varsity team. After graduating from school he carried on his ball-playing interest by playing with several baseball teams of the Slate Belt District, including Pen Argyl and Bangor. He was a faithful worker in the St. Roch's Catholic Church at West Bangor. He also was a member of the Hillside Rod and Gun Club.

In addition to his mother, he is survived by a brother, Pvt. Angelo Carbone, in England; Frank Carbone of Philadelphia, and the following brother and sisters at home: Donald, Antonella, Victoria, Helen, Innaicand Phyllis

Jennie and Phyllis.

he was employed at the Wel-Bit
Trouser Company mill, Pen Argyl.
