CITY Council hears calls for revision **Residents** question

amended ordinance

In a 5-1 vote Bethlehem City Council in the "first reading" approved the amended Zoning Ordi-nance July 18 in spite of a general feeling that a key part of the ordinance is flawed. The new ordinance, technically an amendment to the old ordinance, sets the course of future development in the city.

Councilman David DiGiacinto cast the nay vote; Council President Eric Evans was absent.

Several citizens objected to Section 1304.04 of the ordinance, which, according to the objectors, gives developers and others a "window of opportunity" to "leap through" allowing almost any kind of businesses short of adult entertainment and drug treatment centers into any corner lot in the city's residential

VALLEY Meeting veterans' medical needs Health care

A unique meeting July 19 brought the chief executive officers and other key leaders of Lehigh Val-ley's health care companies together in an unprecedented meeting with area veteran's health organizations to create a unified, standardized way to make sure that the Valley's 50,000 veterans get the quality healthcare that they deserve.

The executives, in a meeting organized by the Lehigh Valley Military Affairs Council (LVMAC), took a major step in improving cooperation among local health care professions with veteran specific issues.

They will begin now to develop procedures that will help them more easily treat the veterans

Christine Stevens, a resident of Market Street, and board member of the Bethlehem Historic District Association and her husband, Tim Stevens, opposed the section and urged council members to table the amended ordinance until the administration revises the seccontrolling tion development of corner lots.

Early public hearings on the ordinance conducted by the administration were misleading, according to Christine Stevens who said that PowerPoint slides presented by city planner Darlene Heller at the hearings showed corner stores - not standalone buildings on corner lots.

"This ordinance is seriously flawed," Tim Stevens said.

Resident Beale Fowler, who spoke against the corner lot provision in a previous meeting, again urged the council to strike

As I turned the corner around my house on my way to work that Thursday, something in my yard caught my eye. I stopped my car half way past my house and I thought to myself, "I don't have a statue on my property, do I?"

I backed up and looked again. What I thought was an owl sitting next to my rhododendron was really a hawk.

I thought its just sitting there didn't seem right. He moved his head from side to side and also looked down a few times. Mmmmmmmm? 'What do I do?' I wondered.

arrived at work and decided to call my veterinarian's office to see if the doctor knew anyone I could call. I spoke with David Peck, the office manager at Cummings Veterinary Hospital, who has been a falconer for 16 years. David gave me the number for the Pa. Game Commission, but I was told there was nothing they could do at this point because we couldn't tell if the hawk was just resting or if it landed to eat prey. I couldn't tell if the hawk was

holding onto something under his talons.

In the meantime, I made about six other calls. One was to the Carbon **County Environmental Education** Center. I spoke with chief naturalist

Susan Gallagher, who oversees rescue, emergency care, housing and release operations. She put me in touch with Barbara Miller, a volunteer licensed wildlife rescuer from Allentown.

Barbara Miller was wonderful. She took the time to communicate with me about what I should do about capturing the hawk until she was able to get the hawk and transport it to Pocono Wildlife and Rehabilitation Center.

I couldn't leave work, so I called my sister to check on the hawk.

When she did, she reported that the hawk had moved to the other side of the rhododendron and was lying down part way underneath the bush. I called Barbara Miller again to inform her of this new development. While waiting for Barbara to return my phone call, I also called David Peck back and asked if he could come out and capture the hawk.

He said he would.

I was told that to capture a hawk, you must place a cardboard box over it to calm it down. Cardboard is used instead of a plastic because air can still get into the box. The hawk will then feel safe and less vulnerable; My sister had informed me that four crows were flying around where the hawk was lying.

Hope of redemption Penn State alumni, friends react to the Freeh report

Weeks after the release of Louis Freeh's investigative report into the conduct, knowledge and complicity of the Penn State administration, sports staff and board of trustees in covering up Jerry Sandusky's longtime sexual abuse of young men, only one thing is certain: Nothing is certain.

"There's more here than what we know," said Rob Hays, PSU '74, a journalism professor at Northampton Community College and former editor at the Express-Times. 

BETHLEHEM TWP. Board drops NIZ challenge

Bethlehem and Hanover townships have been the vanguard of a legal challenge to Allentown's controversial Neighborhood Improve-ment Zone (NIZ). Aside from constitutional concerns about a state law that could only ever apply to Allentown, what really rankled township and borough officials was the diversion of Earned Income Taxes (EIT) that would otherwise go to them. Sixteen townships and boroughs, along with a school district, eventually joined this litigation. The lawsuit, filed March 29, effectively prevented Allentown from floating a \$220 million bond for a hockey arena and other improvements inside the NIZ. State legislators finally addressed these concerns June 30, when they adopt-

ed a budget. In addition to removing language that allowed for what was in effect a tax grab of local EIT, state lawmakers expanded the definition of a Neighborhood Improvement Zone so that it could conceivably apply to other municipalities.

Stopping West Nile Virus

West Nile Virus is a disease spread by infected mosquitoes, so the best defense against the West Nile Virus is not giving them a place to breed. Here are some things you can do around your home:

Dispose of tin cans, plastic containers, ceramic pots or similar water-holding containers that have collected on your property.

Pay special attention to discarded tires. Stagnant water in tires is where most mosquitoes breed.

Drill holes in the bottom of recycling containers left outdoors.

Have clogged roof gutters cleaned every year, particularly if the leaves from surrounding trees have a tendency to plug up the drains.

Turn over plastic wading pools when not in use.

Turn over wheelbarrows and don't let water stagnate in birdbaths.

Aerate ornamental pools or stock them with fish. Water gardens can become major mosquito producers if they are allowed to stagnate.

Clean and chlorinate swimming pools not in use. Mosquitoes may even breed in the water that collects on pool covers.

The Pocono Wildlife **Rehabilitation Center is** a facility where injured and orphaned wild animals receive treatment until they can be released back to the wild. Human health and safety are preserved while caring humanely for the animals in need. The Center holds permits from U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the Pa. Game Commission and U.S.D.A. The director, Kathy Uhler, lives on the property and has been working with wildlife for more than 25 years. The center is in need of donations to buy the property they are now renting because their lease is running out. They need to raise \$150,000 to stay where they are; otherwise they will have to move. LVHN introduces Children's Hospital

Lehigh Valley Health Network (LVHN) has introduced the Children's Hospital at Lehigh Valley Hospital. LVHN locations throughout the community will have new identifying signage.

LVHN is a six year member of the National Association of Children's Hospitals and Related Institutions (NACHRI), now the Children's Hospital Association (CHA). The area's first Children's Emergency Room (ER) was opened in 2011. The hospital also established a pediatric residency program.

Board-certified physicians provide children's care in 28 specialties including critical care, burn care, cancer, pulmonology, neurology, endocrinology including diabetes and gastroenterology via a staff of 71 general pediatricians and 81 pediatric specialists. Other services included are a pediatric ambulatory surgery center and the outpatient infusion area at Lehigh Valley Hospital-Muhlenberg, Bethlehem.



That evening I spoke p.m., the hawk was holdtoms of a raptor having fever which can cause encephalitis, an inflammation of the brain. Most birds that do get sick die within 24 to 48 hours of becoming lethargic, unbalanced and unable to maintain normal body posture.

Infected raptors display certain symptoms. Initially the birds are depressed and anorexic with consequent rapid weight loss. This is followed by head tremors, green waste products (indicating liver damage), blindness, ataxia and weakness in legs and general lack of awareness of surroundings. In the final phase preceding death, the bird suffers severe tremors and seizures.

Many of these symp-toms reflect virus infection of and inflammation in the brain and spinal cord, but many other tissues are also damaged, including heart, lungs, kidneys, spleen and liver, explaining the virtual



but did nave seizures every 7 minutes. He was put on anti-inflammatory medication, given IV fluids, though he wasn't extremely dehydrated, and fed. He also was not underweight.

I called the Pocono Wildlife and Rehabilitation Center Friday. Saturday and Sunday to see if the hawk had made any progress. He was still struggling, but alive. They were giving him plenty of antiinflammatory medication to keep the swelling in his brain down as well as pain medication in case he did have West Nile Virus. Some raptors do survive, but most don't. Still, there was hope!

I called the Pocono Wildlife Rehab Center Monday to check on my hawk. Despite the extreme medical intervention and the compassion to help these helpless raptors and all the other animals that come but in this case every-

Despite heroic efforts to save the hawk, the seizures overtook him. My heart sank for a moment and I thought to myself that at least he had comfort care in his last days.

A throat swab was sent out to the Pa. Department of Environmental Protection but Pocono Wildlife Rehab wouldn't know the results of a specific animal because the DEP doesn't give out that type of information. DEP updates its website every day with positive results from different counties regarding mosquitoes and avian species as well as from a vet's office. Human results are also posted for each county and municipality.



The income limit is \$35,000 a year for homeowners and \$15,000 annually for renters.



Freeman, Gracedale's administrator recently hired by management company Premier Healthcare Services, told a July 19 meeting of Northampton County Council's Human Services Committee that the reconfiguration of the Wound Care Team would not only serve to improve upon the alreadyexcellent care Gracedale residents receive but would also incorporate proven best practices in the care and treatment of wounds. The changes would also bring annual savings to Gracedale of about \$254,000.

At council's regular meeting July 5, a resolution had passed which directed Premier Healthcare Resources to make no changes to Gracedale's Wound Care Team. Councilman Lamont McClure, who had introduced the resolution, said he supported this action because he believed changing Gracedale's current system of treating patient wounds would compromise the high level of care received by Gracedale residents and would tarnish Gracedale's reputation for excellence in this area. At that meeting, a detailed plan and course of action was not available for

council's review.

Director of Human Services Ross Marcus told committee members that since the July 5 meeting Gracedale's new Advisory Board had reviewed and unanimously approved the changes to the wound treatment plan.

Freeman said the retirements of three nurses on the Wound Care Team necessitated treatment changes that would be more in compliance with current industry practices that involve two components to wound care treatment and would allow better tracking of wound care for Medicare reimbursement. Currently, Gracedale receives reimbursement for about 75 percent of wounds treated.

Freeman explained that since wound care is an assignment and not a job description and that continuity of care is important, wound care and supplies will be available 24 hours a day and 7 days a week, which is currently not the case. Wound care will be delivered by the nursing team on the floor. In return for all nurses caring for patient wounds, Freeman said nurses would be freed up from some time-consuming paperwork, which often takes hours to complete. Given the current case load, Freeman anticipates each nurse will be performing about two treatments per shift. Each dressing change averages 15 minutes.

nia, southern New Jersey and Kevin Geklinsky, a Forks Township resident, who related his experiences with the transplant process. Nathan said that in his region there have been more than 1,200 transplant recipients and that 6,500 are waiting

for one, with 16 regional hospitals performing transplant operations. Since Jan. 1, 2011, there have been 14 donors from St. Luke's benefiting 35 recipients and 105 tissue donors benefiting more than 1,000 recipients.

Wilson's career comes together as senior

It's one thing to be a senior on a varsity team. It's another to be a captain for said team, and quite another to be a starting pitcher for a softball team that's vying for a division, conference, and district championship.

Liberty's Erin Wilson was all three. Her athleticism, tenacity, and maturity culminated into 50 career wins, an East Division championship, and a District 11 championship during the 2012 season.

Wilson actually began her high school career on Liberty's varsity softball team as a freshman. Coach Rich Giering was also new to the Hurricane program, having just accepted the head coaching position for the 2009 season. After spending four years together, it was Wilson's maturity level that really stood out for Giering this year.

"It's always tough to be on a varsity team, but I noticed, especially this year, Erin's maturity level. She was growing up and taking on a leadership role. That's tough as a

pitcher. You have a lot on your shoulders," said Giering.

"As a coach, I always want my seniors, when things are getting tight and a little crazy, you want them to calm things down. In that circle, to take that on, that's really big."

The Hurricanes had their fair share of tight games this season, namely against Bethlehem Catholic, Northampton, and Pocono Mountain East.

When it comes to pressure, the former Hurricane quarterback and baseball star only feels what he puts on himself.

So after taking the reigns of a football program that was headlined by the likes of former Division-1 quarterbacks Dan Persa and Anthony Gonzalez, McCarthy hopes he left his own legacy and mark on Liberty's athletic fields.

The 5-foot-10, 165-pound multitalented athlete may not have been the biggest player to play head football coach Dave Brown's option quarterback role, but he certainly was the toughest.

"Jimmy was the type of player that you always knew was going to give you the best," said Brown, who took over the program just as McCarthy became a junior. "If there's one word I could use to describe Jimmy it's -- consistency. He was always consistent in what he would do for us. From playing hard, to being a great leader, we always knew what we were going to get from him."







THIS WEEK IN **BETHLEHEM HISTORY** A14. THE PRESS

Excelsior School

n a Tuesday evening on June 28, 1881, the first class of the new Bethlehem public high school, the Excelsior School, graduated with fanfare. Arnon P. Miller was salutatorian, and Elsie E. Werner was valedictorian of the two-year program. The Excelsior School was the first school built with the intended purpose of housing a public high school in Bethlehem.

In 1890, there were only 180 public high schools in the entire state of Pennsylvania. Up until the late 1800s, secondary education was provided for, for the most part, by private academies. It was Dr. Henry Coppée, Lehigh University's first president, who saw a great need for the public schools of South Bethlehem to prepare young men for admission to his university.

Dr. Coppée made this suggestion to the South Bethlehem School Board. The school board followed through by voting in July 1874 to establish a high school. It was located in one room, on the third floor, of the Penrose Grammar School (built 1867), located on Vine Street. Next, they selected Harvey S. Houskeeper as the first principal of the new high school. On Saturday, Aug. 29, 1874, Houskeeper gave an exam to 33 applicants resulting in only 13 students scoring high enough for admission to the high school.

The brick, three-storied Penrose School with its six large rooms, three smaller ante-rooms, and wooden belfry, soon became too crowded. The school was eventually razed. Plans were set for the Excelsior School on the north side of Fourth Street, between Adams and Webster streets, to be erected in 1879. Excelsior is a Latin word meaning "higher."

The South Bethlehem school board endured much criticism from some of the residents for this plan. On the eve of the school board election in 1878, a flyer was distributed to the residents complaining of the board's extravagant spending using "the Monumental Excelsior" as an example. However the residents voted for the incumbent board, thus supporting progress in education.

The total building costs of the Excelsior School was \$5,270 and the monthly salaries paid teachers then were: high school principal, \$75; grammar school principals, \$49; and primary school teachers, \$23-33. Male educators were valued more than females and received higher salaries.

At the dedication of this school, Oct. 1, 1879, Dr. Coppée delivered the address.

When the Central School was completed in 1892, on the site of the old Penrose School, the high school program was moved to that building. Next, the South Bethlehem HS opened in 1916 at Packer Avenue between Vine and Brodhead streets. This building eventually became Broughal MS.

A.W. Leh had designed the four-story, 114,000-square-foot building in the Italian Renaissance design. The floors were laid with Terrazzo tiles. It had a pit-type gymnasium with a capacity for 500 spectators. The first floor, center-of-building auditorium had a seating capacity of 1,300. The auditorium with balcony was

orado, the story of a man gone mad and a defenseless crowd of theater-goers forced to play witness to their own horror film, was saddening, depressing. But it wasn't surpris-

ing. Gun violence, like capitalism in many respects, has become synonymous with America. It's embarrassing, really, that we're one of the last modern nations that somehow feels guns in the hands of Average Joe is still a good idea, that the words "gun control" to some people are still words of blasphemy, an affront on all things American.

As an expat in China, gun violence isn't a problem I have to worry about. It's one of the limited, perhaps only, perks of living in the world's largest police state. Freedoms here are few, but so are guns. And this is the country that invented gunpowder.

Under Chinese law, Average Zhou is strictly prohibited from owning firearms. Possession leads to a three-year prison sentence, while using a gun to commit a crime often yields a death sentence. Modern gun laws in China date back to 1966, when the government passed sweeping legislation outlawing the manufacture and ownership of guns by private citizens. The act came after children playing with a rifle shot out a window in the Great Hall of the People, according to historians. That's like kids walking up to the U.S. Capitol and taking target practice.

you'll see that gun control in China isn't meant just for public protection - it also keeps the government safe. These laws in China prevent exactly what the U.S. Constitution tries to defend: the people's right to bear arms to guard against an authoritarian government abusing its powers to impose tyrannical rule. China's great helmsman, Mao Zedong, even famously said that "political power grows out of the barrel of a gun," a credo he and the Communists used to supplant the Nationalist Party in 1949 and establish the People's Republic.

No one seems to complain. The Chinese I spoke to all said they feel safer knowing there aren't guns on the streets, at least not in quantities comparable with the United States. More importantly, the Chinese have bigger problems social and political - taking precedence over the desire to buy a gun.

"Chinese people have lost so many human rights in all aspects, and losing the right to own a gun is nothing compared to birth control (China maintains a one-child policy to control its population) and restrictions on relocation (social mobility is limited and people are not always able to move from rural to urban areas or even between cities). That's not to mention restrictions on buying a car and purchasing a house in tier one

out of China's textbook on gun control? No. We shouldn't even be reading the same book.

Banning gun ownership won't stop gun interest. It may even pique people's fascination with the tabooed items, as is happening in China where the rich and powerful look to add rifles and handguns to their collection of expensive toys. Hunting is also becoming popular on the itineraries of the country's wealthy.

What the United States needs is limitation and regulation, not a complete ban. Do you have the right to buy a rifle to go hunting during deer season? Absolutely. Does that rifle have to be an AK-47 or other automatic weapon? Probably not.

At the very least, gun enthusiasts who point to the Constitution and cry "freedom" need a history lesson. When America's defining document was signed in 1789, establishing the right to keep and bear arms, it took a lengthy process to fire and reload a single-shot musket. America's forefathers could never have anticipated the firepower of assault rifles, or that one day one man could walk into a movie theater and cause as much death as a decent sized formation of Revolutionary War-era soldiers.

The Excelsior School served as a grammar and trade school until 1939. The Bethlehem Steel Corporation bought the building for \$14,000 and donated it to the Boys' Club of Bethlehem, in 1940. The Boys' Club used the building until 1984 when it was demolished and a new club was built on the site.

The students of the old Penrose School did well in the new high school program. The class of 1876 had mechanical and freehand drawings exhibited at the Centennial Exposition held in Philadelphia that year. The program continued to succeed.

The "Semi-Centennial of South Bethlehem," a publication issued for South Bethlehem's October 1915 semi-centennial celebration, states that graduates of the South Bethlehem HS program "are admitted without examination to all the higher institutions of learning of this and neighboring States, and its students to classes of equal grade in the High and Manual Training Schools of Philadelphia.'

In the 1800s, only a small percentage of students were encouraged to pursue a high school education. Today, every student is expected to earn a high school diploma.

Wouldn't it be great if Bethlehem city government would do the same thing? Talk about being responsive and proactive: this would be a major move in the right direction for the city, garner all kinds

of great PR and most of all be of great benefit to the city's residents.

Have you ever been driving somewhere in the city when all of a sudden unknown to you there are detours because of roadwork or possibly an accident? Or, how about when your tap water is brown because hydrants are being flushed or there is a leak. Wouldn't it be great if you could be informed before or immediately as it is happening? What if a snow emergency is being declared? What if certain city facilities are closed due to extenuating circumstances, or parks closed due to flooding? Wouldn't it be a wonderful city service to inform citizens before they come upon such detours and inconveniences?

According to an informal survey I took this past week, many city residents think a system like this would be a great idea.

City council and the mayor have received a number of requests to implement the 'opt in' process on the city's website. Alerts and breaking information would then be made available in real time.

There are many situations in Bethlehem where notification like this would be a great advantage. Instead, the use of this technology is ignored. Why can't it be done? All it takes is for the mayor to say, "Do it!" Why can't residents who want them receive alerts and email updates when there are emergencies, changes in schedules, cancellations or threatening weather conditions? Why do Hanover Township and other municipalities do this and the City of Bethlehem doesn't?

The time has come. The technology is everywhere. The City of Bethlehem needs and the residents are owed a centralized interactive process whereby any interested resident, business owner, or even visitor to the city, can receive the information that is pertinent to their daily comings and goings in our city.

The Wales Revival

In 1904 a young ministerial student named Evan Roberts, felt that God was going to pour out a mighty revival on Wales. Roberts began attending various revival meetings, and during one he was deeply moved by the Spirit. As he prayed at the altar he cried out to God, "Bend me O Lord!" This was a complete and total surrender of his will to God's will. He soon returned to his home church where his pastor announced that Roberts would be speaking following the regular prayer meeting. Only 17 teenagers and young adults stayed to hear him. He spoke for nearly two hours with a simple four point message that he was convinced could help bring revival. 1. Confess all known sin to God. 2. Get rid of any "doubtful" area in your life. 3. Obey the Holy Spirit instantly. 4. Confess Christ publicly. When Roberts finished speaking, all 17 young people were on their knees at the altar crying out to God! They prayed until 2 a.m. It was the beginning of one of the greatest movements of God in all history. By the end of the week over 60 people were won to Christ. Over the course of the next year and a half revival swept through the nation of Wales. Over 1,000,000 people were led to saving faith in Jesus Christ! The national culture was dramatically changed. All of the taverns and liquor stores went out of business! Due to a complete lack of crime, the entire police force was dismissed for almost 18 months! One of the few court cases brought before a judge was unusual. The defendant came into the court and admitted his guilt. The judge led the man to Christ, and the case was closed by the jury singing a hymn! O God, send us a revival like this in America! I invite you to attend our remaining revival services continuing through July 27 at 7:30 p.m. with Evangelist Jimmy Millikin.

Upcoming programming for "At the Edge: Art of the Fantastic," includes: "Superhero Saturday


with Scott Hanna," 1-3 p.m. Aug. 4



Dove tale memories of youth

One of my favorite places to visit while I was growing up was my Uncle Jack and Aunt Ginny's house located along the BUD'S VIEW Delaware River in New By Bud Cole Jersey. The house was perched high on the river bank between Belvidere and Columbia, N.J., in an area called Manunka-was disappointed to find out that her bird neighchunk.

The river location improved my swimming skills to the point that I would swim from the New Jersey shoreline to Pennsylvania and back again. There were plenty of

exploits available to my cousin Jackie and me in the river and on land, although many of our adventures were not very smart. We were young.

Of course, when you are young and impulsive you don't think much about the dangers that could result from swimming across the river, swinging out into the river on a rope doing Tarzan calls, while dropping into the water doing flips and other gymnastic moves.

Hiking through a onequarter mile active railroad tunnel that had very little space between the walls and the tracks was a white-knuckle adventure and did not take much brain power, but it was exhilarating once we reached the other end.

Probably the best example of our dumb and dumber moves was when shot a clam shell off Jackie's head with my BB gun. I know I made him hold a metal beer tray in front of his face, but he remembers the incident differently. Needless to say, we both survived our foolish youthful adventures.

I remember a river house visit while I was attending East Stroudsburg State College (ESSC). My Aunt Ginny casually mentioned the owl sounds emanating from the nearby white pines. She was referring to the repeated Ooah-ooo-oo coming from the evergreens.

I knew immediately that the sounds were being produced by a mourning dove and I had to decide whether to tell my aunt the disappointing truth that it was not an owl producing the sounds. I majored in elementary education at ESSC, so I took advantage of what many educators refer to as a teachable moment. My aunt did not want to believe that during all those years living along the river that she was listening to a mourning dove and not an owl. So, we identified the doves' call in my bird book and later from the white pines to pick at the gravel on the

dirt driveway.

I believe Aunt Ginny bors were not as "wise" as she thought.

The mourning dove, not morning dove, as I once thought, is a common native bird of the suburbs and farmlands. Sitting side by side on telephone and power lines, they are easily recognized by their erect bodies and pointed tails.

The ground feeder is most often seen foraging through scattered seeds dropped by other birds using hanging feeders. In our yard, the doves, generally in pairs, bob their heads walking about, resembling their cousins, the rock dove (the pigeon common to parks and city buildings).

Mourning doves, Zenaidura macroura, are about 12-inches long, including their trim bodies and long, tapered tails. The species name macroura is Greek, meaning "long-tailed."

They exhibit a very quick and direct flight pattern. The whistling of the wings when taking flight is noteworthy for identification.

The mourning dove, referred to as "a winged meteor" by some hunters, is classified as a migratory game bird in Pennsylvania. Some states protect it as a songbird.

in size and color, although the male has a bit more iridescence to its neck and back feathers.

They raise two to three and sometimes four broods each year. The female is not a skilled nest builder. She lays one to two white eggs in a rather flat, frail arrangement of loose sticks and twigs. It's remarkable that the eggs do not roll out of the flat structure during the two weeks of incubation.

The inadequate nest construction may be because of the doves' anatomy. Their bills and feet are poorly adapted for nest building. The nests are easy to locate because of the birds' large size and their frequent trips to the nests once the eggs have hatched.

Unfortunately, the wandering neighborhood cats have taken their share of our backyard dove fledglings as well as many other young birds.

You can attract mourning doves to your feeders by offering grains such as millet and cracked corn. Grass seed and stale breadcrumbs will also bring in the doves. Weed seeds, grass seeds and wild pokeberries are favorite naturally growing treats.

Be sure to provide water. The mourning doves tend to respond to water offered at ground level. Place a large pan or basin on the ground near your feeders. An old brownie pan will provide a good water source. Water is especially important during dry spells.

That's the way I see it!



Positional Vertigo can be managed

Q. My grandmother told me she has HEALTHY BPPV and that it GEEZER makes her head spin. By Fred What exactly is this **BPPV?**

Benign Paroxysmal Positional Vertigo (BPPV) usually strikes when you change the position of your head.

First, we have to define terms

Vertigo is the feeling that either you or your surroundings are spinning. It is more than being just lightheaded or dizzy because you are subjected to the illusion of movement.

If you feel your body is moving, you have subjective vertigo.

When you sense that back later. your surroundings are moving, you have objective vertigo.

BPPV occurs most makes you fall.



The odds of falling each year after age 65 in the United States are about one in three. Falls are the leading cause of injury and injury-related death among older adults.

Other symptoms besides spinning include: dizziness, loss of balance, blurred vision, nausea and vomiting.

The symptoms of BPPV can be irregular. They usually last less than a minute. Episodes can disappear and then come

I know I was drawn to that father and daughter in the kayak because I don't see that much of it anymore


