Mother Just Given Citizenship Has Four Sons in Armed Forces; Good Work Wins Promotions

Mr. and Mrs. Louis Hanner, 196 Heckman Avenue, Nazareth, are the proud parents of four sons who are serving Uncle Sam. Mrs. Hanner is also very happy and proud of the fact that she became in American citizen last week, having received her naturalization papers in Northampton County Court, Easton.

Technical Sgt. Paul J. Hanner is in England at a hospital, recovering from wounds received in France on June 19th. He has been awarded the Order of the Purple Heart which he sent home for safekeeping.

He was inducted into the U. S. Army on July 29, 1940, and received training at Camp Gordon, Georgia, Arlington, Va., and Fort Dix, N. J. He was sent to England in January of this year. He receives The Globe-Times overseas and writes that "it's like receiving a letter from home."

Before entering the service, Tech. Sgt. Hanner was employed by the City of Miami Beach, Fla., as a park attendant.

Pvt. Stephen Hanner, who is stationed at Fort Benning, Ga., has recently won the right to wear the Wings and Boots of the U. S. A. Paratroops. He was inducted on February 7, 1944, and was home on his first furlough recently. Before entering the service, he was employed at the Lehigh Foundry, Easton.

Staff Sgt. Peter Hanner entered the service October 6, 1942, and is stationed at Camp Rucher, Ala. He recently returned to camp after spending a 15-day furlough at home at the same time that his brother, Pvt. Stephen Hanner, was home on furlough. Before entering the service, he was employed by the Pan-coast Hotel, Miami, Fla.

S. Navy, enlisted in 1941 and is stationed at Fort Pierce, Fla. He was employed by the Wagner Brewery Co., Miami Beach, Fla., before entering the Navy.

The Hanners have a fifth son, Calvin, of Yonkers, N. Y., who has been employed at the Newark Art Port for the past three years by the government.
