being twice wounded by shell fire in carrying out his duties the chaplain was in no way deterred from his attempts to relieve both physical and spiritual suffering of friend or foe regardless of his position on the battlefield.

"This chaplain is held in such esteem by the personnel of this battalion that the divisional commander promised never to transfer him while the battalion was assigned to that division, even though his seniority entitled him to a better position."

Captain Yost has had an opportunity for missionary work in connection with his duties that few chaplains have had. This opportunity he has used to the fullest expectation.

Because of the many extra services that the captain has performed and as long ago as 18 months when the 100th Battalion first went into action in Italy, Chaplain Yost's superior services to the battalion were recognized by Lieut. Col. Farrant L. Turner, then the commanding officer of the 100th, who wrote:

During the period from October 15, 1943, to Stptember 8, 1944, Chaplain Yost has given spiritual guidance, made personal contacts and shared the common duties of carrying food, water and medical supplies to the men fighting in the lines dispersed over a wide area.

He is the holder of the Purple Heart and Cluster and the Distinguished Unit Badge, which all of the 100th Infantry Battalion won for their Belvidere-Sasseta action in Italy
