Easter demand, avian flu drive up price

egg prices before the holiday. The average price of large eggs is 44 percent higher than it was at this time last year, according to the United States Department of Agricul-

Officials explained that the jump is a result of both Easter time demand and an outbreak of H5N1 avian influenza A, or bird flu.

'We've seen some pretty substantial price increases over the last two weeks or so," said Chris Anthony, manager of Country Harvest Family Market in Palmerton.

While the USDA Animal and Plant Health Inspective Service confirmed that the virus has been detected in commercial and backyard poultry in 24 states, no cases have been found in Pennsylvania as of last week.

To quell the spread of the virus, the standard practice in the poultry industry is to destroy all infected and exposed birds. That means fewer egg-laying hens at a time when demand is at one of its highest points.

"Eggs are a market-based commodity, so and layered with colors they fluctuate with supply and demand weekly. When supply is short and demand is high - I mean we're going into Easter - so demand for Easter eggs, baking, cooking and that kind of stuff increases the demand on that particular commodity," Anthony

And thus, prices rise. The USDA reports that the national average for a dozen of large eggs is currently \$2.60, up from \$1.60 in January.

While no cases of the virus have been reported in the commonwealth, states including Delaware, Maryland and Iowa have been hard hit. Across the nation, an estimated 23 million birds have been euthanized. Of that amount, 80 percent were chickens raised for meat, and 20 percent for their eggs, explained Chris Herr, executive vice president of the PennAg Industries Association, which represents Pennsylvania's agribusinesses.

Even though millions were eliminated from the flock, Anthony said Country Harvest hasn't had any trouble pro-

Easter tradition from the Ukraine

hristina Deutsch teaches the ancient art where wax and dyes are used to create pysanky, beautiful, decorated eggs. Teaching at the Art Establishment located at 945 Broadway in Bethlehem, Christina has over 40 years of experience making pysanky eggs. When asked why, "It's relaxing because you have to focus and forget about the world around you," she says.

Pysanky (plural form of pysanka) is from the Ukrainian word "pysaty", meaning "to write." Pysanky eggs are handdrawn creations - first in pencil using guidelines to section off an egg into a grid pattern, and then with detail within the grid. Afterward, pencil lines are covered with beeswax of dye that results in beautiful eggs.

A tool called a kistka is used to apply the melted beeswax from a funnel onto the eggs. The wax turns black from the carbon in the flame, melts and flows up into the kistka.

Once beeswax is applied to an area, it will seal in the color underneath. Therefore, the beginning lines drawn on a white egg will stay white through the entire process. Each

time an egg is dyed and more beeswax is added to that color, the new color is sealed. With this manner of dyeing and waxing, a pattern is created.

There are many different dyes on the market from stores stocking pysanky supplies. Please be aware they are not edible dyes and should not be used to color regular hard-boiled eggs. Dyes are often diluted with hot water and vinegar or granular citric acid, which is added for potency. Be sure to check the directions on the dye packets, as a few colors, like pink and orange, may not need a vinegar boost.


The best routine for a beginner is to start with the lightest color and work toward the darkest. Yellow, orange, red, and black are tried and true colors that have been used since pysanky were first made.

When a design is complete, the egg will be covered with wax and the design will be hard to see, making this step tricky. One way to remove the wax from the egg is to heat the egg with a heat gun or hair dryer on high setting. Wipe off the excess wax with paper towels as it melts away.





curing eggs. All of its eggs, with the exception of Eggland's Best, are locally sourced. The purchases come from the Lewistown Valley Egg Ranch near Tamaqua and Open View Acres in Orwigsburg, he

Herr said PennAg keeps abreast of the situation, and noted that the commonwealth continues to monitor the bird flu situation.

But if someone unexpectedly consumes meat or eggs from a chicken infected with the current strain, the chance of them becoming ill is essentially impossible, he said.

Herr said the illness is not transmissible through food.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention also noted that the risk to humans is extremely

"So far, current H5N1 bird flu viruses lack changes seen in the past that have been associated with viruses spreading easily among poultry, infecting people more easily, and causing severe illness in people," according to information from the CDC. No human infections have been identified in the U.S.

And even though the price of eggs has risen, Herr said they still remain an affordable protein.



NORTHAMPTON COUNTY

COUNTY PRISON UPDATE: As of April 5, there were no cases of COVID-19 among the inmates at Northampton County Prison (NCP). Two employees have tested positive and are currently in quarantine, although neither is showing signs or symptoms. The Work Release and Linking to Employment Activities Pre-release (LEAP) programs have restarted.

Since the start of the pandemic, 434 inmates have tested positive; all have finished their quarantine periods or are no longer at NCP.

Since March 2020, NCP has conducted 8,008 tests for COVID-19 on inmates. NCP has held 36 vaccination clinics and vaccinated 629 inmates. The clinic also offers booster shots. Currently, 276 inmates in the facility are fully vaccinated and 78 inmates have received shots.

There are currently 581 inmates in residence at NCP. One inmate is out on extended furlough.

DRIVE THRU VACCINATION/TESTING: A COVID-19 drivethrough vaccination clinic and testing site is open at 3100 Emrick Blvd. Bethlehem Township. Hours of operation are Monday/Wednesday/Friday from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. and Tuesday/Thursday from 2 to 6 p.m. The drive-through testing center is located in the parking area to the rear of the Coordinated Health Building and is separate from patient parking and routine patient care.

A physician's order is not required to be tested but only residents of Northampton County will receive a free test if they do not have health coverage. To make an appointment for a vaccine at the COVID-19 drive-thru testing site use one of the following options:







Baxter and Board President Dr. Shamim Pakzad kicked off the first presentation by thanking Erickson for his support and partnership over the past decade. Erickson will be stepping down as NCC president after a 10-year stint at the end of the summer.



He noted that many of the school's programs have begun to ramp back up. The Vo-Tech's student body, of which Saucon pupils comprise approximately six percent of total enrollment, often competes in skills and employment-related competitions and other events.

Saucon Valley's obligation to the school's overall budget will increase by a little under three percent for the upcoming year, Lazarchak said. The funding formula is largely - but not totally - determined based on each sending district's number of students who attend the Vo-

He further explained Malakai would also that, especially since the 2015-16 school year, total enrollment in the school has remained relatively steady. However, smaller districts like Saucon have seen significant jumps, while larger ones such as Bethlehem Area now account for several hundred fewer pupils.





Outdoors: Building a nesting area for robins

With the flocks of robins we've been seeing in the Lehigh Valley, these, as well as doves and phoebes, will begin searching for a place to make nests for their egg

laying. But unlike many birds that commonly use nest or bird boxes, these three species in particular don't use nest poxes like, for example, bluebirds use to lay and hatch their eggs. Robins, in particular, use a nesting shelf that could consist of a flat spot under a patio deck, under a porch roof, door wreaths even hanging baskets.



appointment, I was tested for COVID and flu. I stayed home on Thursday, and late Thursday evening, I received an app notification that my tests were back. I checked, and I was

I did not get a flu shot. I got my COVID booster in late October, then the holidays came, and over the winter break, I had COVID. And then I forgot about the flu shot. I seldom get the flu anyway, maybe once every 10-12 years. Well, apparently this was the year

I was feeling terrible, so I got Advil Cold and Sinus from behind the pharmacy counter. Which led to a lively discussion with Erick about why it has to be purchased at the counter. Sorry to those of you who need it to make methamphetamine, but those of us with the flu and/or a sinus issue don't appreciate having to present our driver's license just to get a little relief.

I felt well enough on Saturday to go through with the day's plans. And then, on Sunday, the flu roared back with a vengeance. Even with the pseudoephedrine in the Advil Cold and Sinus, I was having coughing fits so long they would leave me gasping for breath. Over the next two days, I didn't improve. I was frustrated, because according to the CDC, the flu last 7-10 days. I forgot about the law of averages. And my flu chose to be above average.

I returned to the doctor on Tuesday. This time, I was sent for a chest x-ray. This was better than I remembered. Gone are the heavy lead aprons. I stood against a thick screen, and one quarter turn later, it was done. Thankfully, the x-ray was clear. Pneumonia is scary, it kills a lot of people.

The doctor prescribed a prescription cough medicine. It helped. She also prescribed an inhaler. I had a bad experience with an inhaler in my teens, and remain skeptical of them, so I left it in the ican Association of bag. BASD Pre-K Counts registration

The Bethlehem Area School District Pre-K classrooms in Calypso, Donegan, Fountain Hill and Marvine ES are fully funded through the Pennsylvania Pre-K Counts grant. State certified teachers instruct students from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. on school days following the BASD calendar for 2022-2023. Students must be four years old as of October 1, 2022. Free breakfast and lunch are provided each school day. Efforts are made to place students in the Pre-K classroom that is closest to their home, but this does not always occur. The district does not provide transportation.

Families must meet specific income guidelines based on family size and income. The total annual family income must be less than 300 percent of the Federal Poverty Guidelines. There are other specific criteria. Space is limited; not all applicants will be accepted for enrollment into this program.

Since July 1, 1998, the Carbon County Domestic Relations Office has been a part of the Pennsylvania Child Support Enforcement System, known as PACSES. All counties in Pennsylvania are a part of this statewide-computerized system. As of October 1, 1999, a centralized office in Harrisburg, known as the State Collection and Disbursement Unit (SCDU), handles all support payments and check processing. This has changed the way support money is collected and disbursed in Carbon County. All other services are still provided through the Carbon County Domestic Relations Office.

The Domestic Relations Office does not address problems with custody and visitation. The appropriate legal authority to handle these matters is either an attorney or the Court. You can contact the Prothonotary's office for more information at (570) 325-2481, or click on the CUSTODY link here for forms and instructions on filing a custody complaint.

The DRS consists of judges, managers, hearing officers, conference officers, and various technical and clerical support staff. The DRS staff is assisted by the PACSES (Pennsylvania Child Support Enforcement System) statewide computer system and is trained to make recommendations to the Court for support amounts when the parties involved in the support case are unable to come to an agreement.



When our ancestors came to the United States, they brought with them the concept of trial by jury. This great privi-

It is not surprising, then, that the Founding Fathers incorporated the concept of trial by jury into the Constitution of the United States. Article III, Section 2, and the Sixth and Seventh Amendments provide each of us with this fundamental and basic right. Accompanying this right and privilege, however, is the obligation to participate actively in the judicial process as a juror. The successful operation of the judicial system which is designed to protect the rights of each of us depends upon the willingness of men and women of sound judgment and absolute honesty and fairness to serve.

Each month approximately 2,000 pro-

direction of the Court Administrator and
the Board of Judges. The selection is at
random by computer from the drivers' license list.

Serving as a juror is one of the fundamental rights and privileges of being a United States citizen. You should welcome the experience. Most people who actually serve as a juror on a trial will tell you that it is a very educational and interesting experience. The Court recognizes the inconvenience jury service may cause. However, the success of the jury system depends upon the willingness of men and women of integrity and intelligence to accept jury service, and upon the fidelity with which they discharge that responsibility.

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Carbon County Magisterial District Courts

Jurisdiction of District Justices

District Justices are authorized to hear the following types of cases:

Civil Cases:

1. Claims for money up to \$12,000 (not including interest and court costs).

Note that a district justice does not have jurisdiction to hear any claim in which legal ownership of real estate is at issue.

2. Claims under the Landlord and Tenant Act.

Criminal Cases:

- 1. Summary offenses, including motor vehicle violations.
- 2. DUI cases if: (a) it is a first offense, (b) there are no personal injuries, and (c) the defendant pleads guilty.
- 3. Third degree misdemeanors if the defendant pleads guilty. District judge also preside over arraignments, fix bail, and issue arrest and search warrants.

They also issue Emergency Protection from Abuse Orders on nights, weekends and holidays when the Court of Common Pleas is closed.
