Two sides of Bethlehem; many sides of entertainment



The 47th annual Musikfest spans the Lehigh River and many genres of entertainment.

From Aug. 5 - 14, more than 300 performances are on 14 stages, with 11 stages free, including Americaplatz, which moves to Levitt Pavilion, and the new Air Products Town Square, both at SteelStacks, First Street and Founders' Way, on Bethlehem's south side.

Free concerts continuing on Bethlehem's north side are at: Banana Island, Plaza Tropical, Festplatz, all at Main and Spring streets; Volksplatz, Johnston Park; Handwerk-

platz, 18th Century Colonial Industrial Quarter; Liederplatz, Sun Inn Courtyard; Lyrikplatz, Main Street; Vesper Concert Series, Central Moravian Church; Chamber Series, Central Moravian Church Old Chapel; and Main Street, from Church to Broad streets.

The main stage moves to Sands Steel Stage, PNC Plaza, and the PNC Performing Arts Series moves to Musikfest Cafe, both at SteelStacks. Tickets are required for concerts at these two stages.

Homecoming for two members of a cappella group

It's a homecoming for two members of Straight No Chaser when the all-male a cappella group performs at 8:30 p.m. Aug. 11 on Musikfest's Sands Steel Stage.

Jerome Collins, a 1994 graduate of William Allen High School, is an original member of the group formed at Indiana University where he studied

music and theater

Another original member of the ensemble is Walter Chase, a 1995 graduate of Easton Area High School who attended Indiana as a music education major.

The group was in Toronto in January when their manager told them the news that they were going to play Musikfest.

"We were so excited. Jerome and I were like 'no

way' and we high-fived and called our families and friends," says Chase.

### Stone Temple Pilots

7:30 p.m. Aug. 5, Sands Steel Stage, Musikfest. Opening: Rose Hill Drive. Alternative rock band, STP, first album, "Core" (1992), had the mega-hits "Creep" and "Plush." During the 1990s, the band, led by vocalist Scott Weiland, had 16 singles on the Billboard rock charts, including six tracks that hit No. 1; received a 1994 Best Hard Rock Performance Grammy Award for "Plush," and sold more than 40 million albums worldwide. Following a nearly eight-year hiatus from touring, STP reunited and embarked on a 70-plus date tour, including a sold-out concert at Musikfest, Aug. 8, 2008. Last year, STP released its sixth studio album, "Stone Temple Pilots," which hit No. 2 on the Billboard 200.

Miller rose to stardom in the 1970s with a series of major hits including "Fly Like an Eagle," "Take the Money and Run," "Jet Airliner," "Jungle Love," "Swingtown" and the No. 1 smash, "The Joker." During his 40-plus year career, the blues-rock guitarist-vocalist has sold more than 30 million albums and performed to sold-out arenas and stadiums throughout the world. His "Greatest Hits 1974 - 78" is one of the most popular albums of all time, having sold more than 13 million copies since its release in 1978. In 1982, Miller again topped Billboard charts with the hit album and song, "Abracadabra." On his latest CD, "Let Your Hair Down," Miller performs blues classics.

A debut album, "Songs About Jane" (2002), included four hit singles, "Harder to Breathe," "This Love," "She Will Be Loved" and "Sunday Morning." The band received the 2005 Best New Artist Grammy. "It Won't Be Soon Before Long" (2007) included the singles "Makes Me Wonder," "Won't Go Home Without You" and "Wake Up Call." The group's third studio album, "Hands All Over," released last year, includes the singles, "Misery" and "Moves Like Jagger," the latter premiered live on TV's "The Voice" in June. The band has sold nearly 15 million albums worldwide.

The duo reunited in the early '90s, releasing "Two Against Nature" (2000), and "Everything Must Go" (2003). # Little Feat dips into younger generation

There is nothing like Little Feat live. Experience it for yourself at the band's upcoming show at 8 p.m. Aug. 5 at Penn's Peak, Jim Thorpe.

Little Feat is an American rock band originally formed in 1969 by the late Lowell George and keyboardist Bill Payne. Although the band has undergone many changes in its lineup over the last 30 years, the band continues to deliver a rock 'n' roll sound that resourcefully mingles blues, R&B, boogie, country, folk, gospel, soul, funk and jazz. Albums include "Little Feat" (1971), "Sailin' Shoes" (1972), "Dixie Chicken" (1973) and "Feats Don't Fail Me Now" (1974).

Little Feat's album, "Waiting for Columbus," considered one of the greatest live rock albums, was recently covered by the band Phish and as a

result the band has captured interest from a younger audience.

"It's been really great for us lately, because we got a big boost at the end of last year when Phish did 'Waiting for Columbus' at their Halloween show. We've been seeing a lot of Phish fans at Little Feat shows," says the band's guitarist-vocalist

Paul Barrere in a recent phone interview.

The band is touring behind last year's CD, a live recording, "Ram's Head Revisited." Little Feat has recently been in the studio recording new music, with eight tracks completed "... of which we will probably perform two or three songs at Penn's Peak just because

we like to test the waters to see if people are digging the sound," Barrere says. The band expects to return to the studio this fall to record a dozen or so additional songs for consideration for a new CD next year.

When asked how their new music compares with the music history of the band, Barrere says, "We have always had a sound that is distinctive and basically timeless. We never seem to hook into whatever. We write all our own material and it's all very eclectic with regard to genre."

"The band has quite a history, to say the least, and we just remain true to it all. The only rule is that there are no rules musically."

Little Feat supports many charitable causes, most recently Habitat for Humanity to benefit the tornado survivors of Joplin, Mo.

# Expecting 'someone to pay for it'

For seven years, I've had an excellent licensed handyman who has kept the roof on my house in good shape.

I've hired him each year to pressure wash it and to give it another coat of the rubberized paint that strengthens the roof.

This year, however, he has so much work that he hired an assistant. Unfortunately, that assistant is grossly overweight (it mattered when he was on the roof) and is still in the learning stage. I didn't know all that until it was too late.

Instead of taking off his heavy shoes and being careful when he walked on the barrel tile of my roof, the assistant stomped around like he was tramping soil in a garden.

The first heavy rain we got, my roof leaked in five places. I called my always-faithful handyman and asked him to check it out.

"I'll try to fix it for you," he said, "But when you have that many leaks, you might want to call a roofing specialist." He admitted his assistant "probably" broke some tiles when he walked on the roof. But he reminded me the roofing tile is 30 years old and is probably at the end of its shelf life.

Right now, I'm in the process of talking with several roofing contractors and getting prices for a new roof versus repairing the old one. David thinks we should just repair the roof. But I'm thinking it will only be putting a band-aid on the problem. I'm in favor of biting the bullet and getting the new roof.

As we sit here in the middle of hurricane season, I don't want to take chances. Dave and I are still debating our options. Meanwhile, I'm surprised at the number of people who insist I should sue the handyman and/or his assistant.

When I say I wouldn't dream of doing that, people tell me "You're nuts."

"They ruined your roof. Someone should pay for that," insisted one vociferous friend.

It dawns on me that "someone should pay for it" has become a prevalent thought in this country.

Today, while listening to the radio as I was driving home, I heard a commercial for a local attorney who was urging anyone who gave birth to a child with disabilities to call him.

"If your child suffered because doctors didn't give you a Caesarian in time, see me. I can help," he promised.

Next came the line that rankled me. "If you are suffering, someone should pay," the lawyer advised.

That's the attitude when something goes wrong: Someone should pay.

Instead of accepting that things wear out and will have to be replaced, someone else, rather than the owners, should pay for the replacement.

Instead of accepting that children are sometimes born with birth defects, "someone should pay" for

that tragedy.

That line of thinking is too prevalent. Today, an acquaintance called me to add her voice to the chorus telling me I "should do something" about my roof problem.

I am going to do something. I'm going to have it fixed. I told her:

She said, at the very least, I should call the Better Business Bureau to register a complaint about the handyman. She also insisted I should write to the newspaper's consumer advocate.

She told me the advocate just helped her in a dispute with a time-share development.

She signed papers to buy a time-share but didn't read the contract which clearly spelled out there would be no refund after ten days.

Because the economy has now tanked and her extra income has disappeared, three years after signing the contract she wants her money back.

Someone should pay for her lack of diligence, she believes, and it shouldn't be her.

It bothers me that few of us take personal responsibility for our mistakes. It's always someone else's fault.

Two years ago, we bought our dream boat, filled with exciting plans for how we would cruise to Key West and go out with friends for sunset cruises.

Instead, I don't think we put 50 miles on the boat since we bought it. That's because the boat we call *Damn Boat* can't go more than a mile without breaking down.

Friends keep telling us to sue.

Sue the previous owners who didn't reveal all the problems the boat had.

Sue the boat inspector we hired to do a marine survey before we bought the second-hand boat. He said it was in better shape than any boat he ever inspected during his 11 years of business.

Perhaps they are a bit at fault. But the real fault lies with the woman with stars in her eyes instead of enough knowledge in her head - me.

They say we buy in haste and repent in leisure. I'm guilty on both counts. So I just have to accept personal responsibility and call it an expensive lesson.

Now, here's the odd twist. Remember that sweet handyman I told you about? When HIS boat broke down, the marine mechanic said it was the impeller. After that was fixed, something else broke on the next trip. He tried unsuccessfully to sue the boat seller as well as the boat mechanic.

Why can't we just accept that things break ... that luck runs bad as well as good?

Mostly, it's no one's fault. It's just a fact of life - a fact we push aside in our sue-happy society.

# Preview lights Bridge to Musikfest 2011

There's a free, sneak peek of Musikfest 2011 at SteelStacks in south Bethlehem 6 - 11 p.m. Aug. 4.

The evening includes live music, open houses at the festival's Sands Steel Stage main stage and the Musikfest Café, and the inaugural lighting of "The Bridge," the 68-foot-long steel and fire sculpture by artist Elena Colombo at Air Products Town Square.

"This special preview night is designed for the residents of the Lehigh Valley, who have been so supportive of Musikfest over the years," said ArtsQuest President Jeff Parks.

"The event will provide them with a taste of this year's Musikfest, as well as give them an opportunity to learn about the excit-

ing, new venues at the festival this year. We invite people to come out and explore the SteelStacks campus, enjoy the live music and start their 'festing a day early.'"

The Bridge, which features a 34-foot-long natural gas flame, will be lighted by Bethlehem Mayor John Callahan and Parks at 9 p.m. Aug. 4.

One minute before the flame is ignited, a steam ship whistle sound will announce the lighting, symbolizing the plant whistle that was blown at the Bethlehem Steel plant for many years.

The plant's whistle, which sounded to announce shift changes, was taken from the French luxury liner SS Normandie after it caught on

fire and sank in New York Harbor in 1942 while being recommissioned as a troop ship.

During Musikfest, The Bridge will be lighted at 9, 10 and 11 p.m. Sunday - Thursday, and 9, 10, 11 p.m. and midnight Friday - Saturday. Once it is ignited, The Bridge will remain lighted for five minutes.

In addition to The Bridge sculpture lighting, preview night guests may visit the Musikfest Café at the ArtsQuest Center, 101 Founders Way, and the Sands Steel Stage at PNC Plaza from 6 - 8 p.m. Both venues are new for 2011. The free open houses will offer patrons the opportunity to check out the new venues, stages and seating arrangements. Free music will fill the

air, with a 7:30 p.m. Levitt Pavilion SteelStacks concert by Smokin' Joe Kubek and B'Nois King, as well as a 6 p.m. Air Products Town Square show by Jerry Costello and a 9 p.m. Air Products Town Square concert by Little Buddy.

Food and beverages, Musikfest concert tickets, festival souvenirs and more will be available for purchase at the ArtsQuest Center.

In addition, guests can visit the Levitt Pavilion to enter to win one of 25 great prizes, including Musikfest 2012 and Musikfest Café concert tickets; SteelJam, Blast Furnace Blues and Oktoberfest presented by Yuengling festival passes, and more.

While Straight No Chaser has been touring full time since 2009, Chase says of Musikfest, "By far, it is the show I am most looking forward to playing for the entire year."

The members of the group met at Indiana University and formed in 1996. They had been part of a larger show choir made up of both men and women.

"Ten of us came out of that larger show choir and created Straight No Chaser," Chase says. "The intention was to start a group at Indiana and create a legacy group so we could come back and see a concert."

They never dreamed of the success Straight No Chaser has achieved.

The group has had 20 million views on YouTube, numerous national TV appearances and three hit albums.

The CD, "With a Twist," released last year, debuted at No. 29 on the Billboard 200. The group released two successful holiday CDs. Its 2008 debut, "Holi-

day Spirits," hit No. 4 on Billboard's Top Holiday Albums charts and spent two weeks in the No. 1 slot on Amazon, while 2009's "Christmas Cheers" reached No. 6 on the Top Holiday Albums charts and No. 38 on the Billboard 200.

On the road, Straight No Chaser has built a reputation as an unforgettable live act. Last year, the group performed more than 160 shows, including a hugely successful eight-week, 40-show run at Harrah's Resort Atlantic City.

"I really didn't think we had the wings to take off. You know, a cappella hitting the mainstream was a far-fetched idea. So, we took a leap of faith, put our jobs aside and gave this Straight No Chaser thing a [chance]," Collins says.

The 10-man group has been successful, garnering fans that span generations.

"When we come up with songs that we want to perform, we consciously consider ourselves a family act. Parents bring their young kids to our show so we have songs like 'The

Lion Sleeps Tonight' and we do a cartoon medley that, obviously, when the kids see it, they love it," Chase says.

Chase continues, "Our songs are ones that everyone can recognize - whether they're eight or 80. We do rock. We do Motown. We do Rat Pack. We do songs that are timeless. We cover it all."

The group covers songs by the Red Hot Chili Peppers, Coldplay and Oasis. They even perform a Lady Gaga medley.

The CD, "With a Twist," features the group's dynamic takes on modern hits such as the Red Hot Chili Peppers' "Under The Bridge," Coldplay's "Fix You," Crowded House's "Don't Dream It's Over" and Oasis' "Wonderwall." The album also features renditions of "Somewhere Over the Rainbow" and Barry Manilow's "One Voice," the latter featuring Manilow himself.

Many of the group's fans refer to themselves as "chasers," says Collins.

"I think the oldest 'chaser' is a woman who lives in Atlantic City," Collins adds. "Her name is Antoinette

and she's 93-years-old. She comes with her daughter and her daughter brings her daughter. It's fantastic to see three generations all enjoy the show together."

Members of the group are frequently asked how they came up with the name.

"'Straight No Chaser' is the name of a Thelonious Monk jazz tune. We were looking for something that had a musical meaning to it. The song title worked perfectly for our sound, which is just us straight up - no music just voices," explains Chase.

Although the group has had great success throughout the United States, Collins is pleased to see how popular the group is in Pennsylvania.

"I am very happy that my hometown has stepped up huge," Collins says.

"Pennsylvania is one of the best sellers for Straight No Chaser. It means more than just a local boy does good. I think sometimes a hometown does good, too. That's really been a spark for me," says Collins

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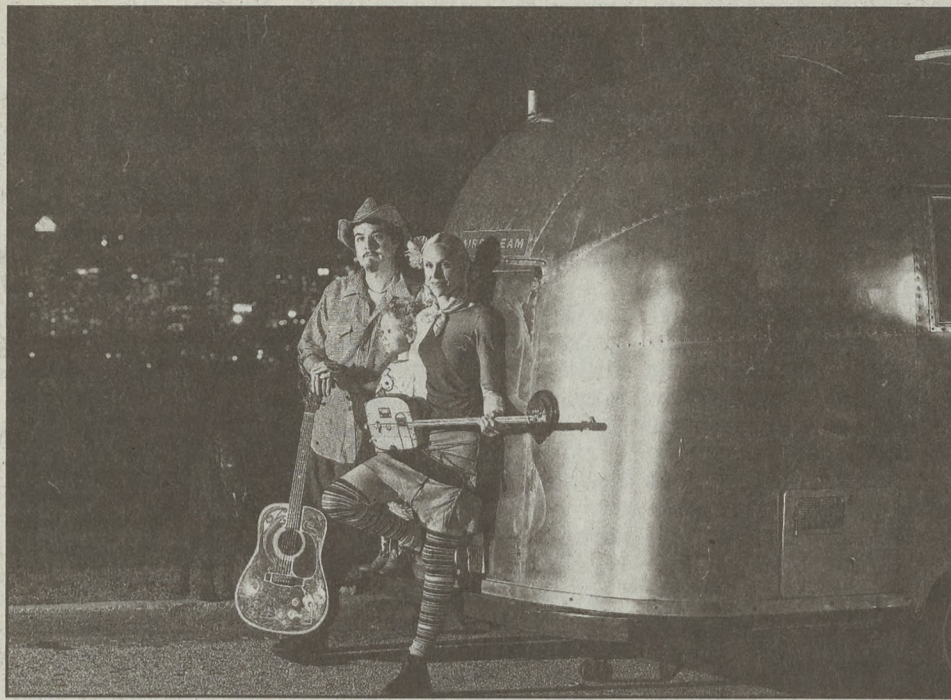

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# The 'Buck' starts here

You may be familiar with the popular movie, "The Horse Whisperer" (1998).

The documentary film, "Buck," takes a look at the man behind the mythical whisperer.

Buck Brannaman is no myth. But he is legendary. No less than Robert Redford marvels at his technique.

Brannaman apparently was the inspiration for Nicholas Sparks' novel and was a consultant for "Whisperer."

Brannaman doesn't so much talk to horses as calm them with his quiet and unassuming manner. He's not so much a horse whisperer as a gentle handler. He develops an

uncanny rapport with the horses he's hired to train.

He has no bag of tricks from which to choose from. In fact, the treats approach to training is discouraged. He builds upon the technique of two previous legendary horse trainers, Tom Dorrance and Ray Hunt.

In her rather plain approach, director Cindy Meehl approximates an actuality that is inspiring.

One of the more fascinating aspects of Bran-

naman's story is that because of his abusive father, he was placed in a foster home.

The contrast between Brannaman's own childhood and the way in which he and his wife are raising one of their daughters, who has become an excellent horse handler, further makes the point that one makes more progress with sugar and than vinegar.

Brannaman's own theory is that, more often than not, the difficulty of training a horse is not with the horse but rather with the attitude of its owner. In one of its many too preachy bromides, we are urged to control our emotions.

And, we don't have to live in the past, obsessing about when we often received some perceived or actual slight.

It's a way to handle horses, and fellow living beings, from which we all could learn.

Don't pass this "Buck," a quite remarkable film.

There are several moments of genuine humor, often involving Brannaman's cowboy comic approach, or that of his stepmother's.

## 'Wedding Singer': bouquets

The 1980s come to life in "The Wedding Singer," through Aug. 14 at Pennsylvania Playhouse, Bethlehem.

The book by Chad Beucler and Tim Herlihy was adapted to the stage by Herlihy with the lyrics by Beucler.

Director Ann Marie Squerrini has assembled a large, talented cast that brings the high-energy production to the Playhouse's intimate stage.

Dallas Young, in the title role as Robbie Hart, lays bare the problems that confront a lonely guy who still lives with his grandmother, Rosie, played by Terry DeBiase, a veteran area performer who knows how to get a laugh. Young's dynamic, believable performance leads the play through an amazing 20 scenes.

Set designer Mickey Brown and lighting designer Alyssandra Docherty bring a tremendous amount of talent to the production. One of the best is the "letter from Linda" scene.

Choreographer Mariel Letourneau does a masterful job in this fast-moving musical that features

numerous dances. She finds time to play a role as smokin' hot Linda, Robbie's runaway bride.

Keith Moser, as shallow heel Glen Guglia, is a big, intimidating stage presence as Julia Sullivan's rich and hard to get boyfriend.

Glen's girl, Julia (Gwen Swanson Vigorito), is a sweet, lovely waitress but she's tired of waiting for her rich boy friend to pop the question. It's hard to blame her if she captures another boy's heart.

Charles Weigold III brilliantly plays Sammy, a musician in Robbie's trio, as a stalwart good friend to Robbie. Sammy is understandably single but he valiantly stumbles through hard lessons while learning how to be a good boyfriend to beautiful and loyal Holly (Annie Locke), Julia's best friend.

The other member of the "Wedding Singer" trio, George, played by Gary Warren, gets plenty of laughs with his exaggerated, campy interpretation of a gay musician.

Judy Brunst shines in gold lame as Angie, Julia's mother who is always there with advice for her daughter.

The large ensemble per-

forms wonderfully. Some are standouts. Lauren Eitzenberger's performance as an aggravated girl friend in the "Pop" scene is perfect as she lands a good slap. She is an attention-getter throughout, but her "Fake Cindy Lauper" at the chapel is riveting.

Her sister, Mary Eitzenberger, as a bar mitzvah wallflower, is coquettish and cute then she is gorgeous as a real looking "Fake Imelda Marcos" in the last chapel scene.

Another attention-getting actor, Shawn Salevsky, is superlative as an embarrassingly drunk wedding guest, giving a toast in the first scene and then again as a single, pie-eyed drunk friend urging Robbie to embrace the lonely single life.

Melissa Keiser, a superb dancer, combines beauty and grace in her every scene. She is the perfect bride in the opening number, "It's Your Wedding Day," and cool hip-swinging cocktail waitress in the nightclub.

Lucille DeMasi Kincaid, the musical director, made a wonderful choice in bringing live musicians to play Matthew Sklar's score; they give the production a rich, vibrant sound.

## Good Will 'Kinsmen'

For the final production of its 20th anniversary season, the Pennsylvania Shakespeare Festival (PSF) decided to shake up Shakespeare.

The result is "The Two Noble Kinsmen," a somewhat obscure work Shakespeare co-wrote with John Fletcher, playwright successor for the King's Men. "Kinsmen" in its PSF debut, continues through Aug. 7 in Shubert Theatre, Labuda Center for the Arts, DeSales University.

It's essential to know the back story for PSF's "Kinsmen" to fully enjoy its many accomplishments. In keeping with Elizabethan theater practice, actors arrived with lines memorized, grabbed costumes from PSF's shop, developed their own staging and rehearsed for five days. There was no director.

According to PSF officials, rehearsals for a PSF production typically are 3 weeks, 6 days a week, 8 hours a day.

Script cutting and cast doubling were developed

by James J. Christy (director, "The Playboy of the Western World," "Twelfth Night") and Patrick Mulcahy. Scenic elements created by Bob Phillips for "Sleeping Beauty" and "The Comedy of Errors" were utilized as was Elizabeth Elliot's lighting design for "Sleeping Beauty."

The story was taken from "The Knight's Tale," one of "The Canterbury Tales." Dialogue and description are often poetic: "Those hopes are prisoners with us."

The approach seems to have freed the actors, given them a renewed measure of spontaneity and intensity.

Ian Bedford and Lauren Lovett, as Duke The-

seus of Athens and his bride-to-be Hippolyta, Queen of the Amazons, are delightful. Bedford's sonorous voice and dramatic demeanor anchors the often-fluffy play.

Thomas Matthew Kelley and Spencer Plachy play the cousin princes, Palamon and Arcite from Thebes, who vie for the affection of Emilia as played by Eleanor Handley.

The cast includes a jailer and his daughter, portrayed by Gordon Gray and newcomer Lauren Orkus, the latter deliciously over the top.

The play has many laugh-lines, a few of which are out-loud-hilarious.

## 'Hamlet' over easy for children

From the moment Julia Stroup, who plays Gertrude and several other parts in "Shakespeare for Kids," through Aug. 6, at the Pennsylvania Shakespeare Festival, DeSales University, explains to the children in the audience that the movie "Lion King" is very similar to the play they are about to see, the kids are completely OK with William Shakespeare.

"Violence is not the answer," said Stroup to the children. "We should all just love each other."

Then, with fast-paced action and lots of audience interaction, the play whirls the children into the intrigue-filled world of "Hamlet," as adapted by Erin Hurley.

Director Andrew Kane, who plays the roles of Hamlet's uncle, King Claudius, and other parts, presents a fast-moving, sing-along version of the classic tragedy.

The story that Shakespeare told in five acts Hurley has told in one approx-

imately 60-minute act. Peter Danelski as Hamlet, Stroup as Gertrude, and Kane as Claudius are adept at physical comedy — just the thing to keep the attention of the young audience.

The concept of murder and death so central to the original play is still in this children's version, but the play presents the re-enactment of Claudius' murder of Hamlet's father, the king, using puppets and dialogue that puts a child-appropriate gloss on the details.

Danelski's Hamlet is intense but doesn't forget the intended audience.

The simple songs led by Kane on acoustic guitar, Stroup on electric guitar, and Danelski on mandolin involve the audience in lyrics that spell out the plot: "Prince Hamlet was so sad. The ghost he saw looked just like his Dad." The sing-alongs also deliver morality messages such as, "Bullying is wrong."

The cast pauses the action to direct-message the audience with memory keys to help them focus as

they watch the play; for example, the ghost of the murdered king's commands to his son, Hamlet: "Revenge my murder!"

The players made good, very entertaining use of hand puppets for minor roles. There are lots of laughs as the actors double dialogue with their puppets.

Showbot, a mostly tin robot played by Adam DeLancey, provides plenty of comedy relief. Showbot's portrayal of Hamlet's friend, Horatio, is believable bonding between man and machine.

The cast in the decidedly unhappy final scene depicting the fate of the main characters, while believable enough for the audience, underplays it so that there are no tears from the children.

Preventing SIDS

**Q. I'm going to become a grandmother for the first time and I was wondering how things have changed since I took care of a newborn many years ago.**

Probably the most important change is in the approach to Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS), the abrupt, unexplained death of an infant younger than a year. SIDS is often called crib death because many victims are found in their cribs.

SIDS is the leading cause of death in children between a month and one-year-old. Most SIDS deaths occur in children between two months and four months of age. There are 2,200 SIDS deaths in the United States each year. More than 80 percent of the deaths may be caused by unsafe sleeping practices.

Here's what you're supposed to do to prevent SIDS:

Place babies on their backs to sleep. You can rest them on their stomachs when they are awake and being watched. You should not let babies sleep on their sides, because they can roll onto their stomachs.

Babies should sleep on a firm surface such as a crib mattress covered with a fitted sheet. Don't use crib bumpers; they are unnecessary. No pillows, blankets, stuffed toys should be in the sleep area. Put babies in blanket-sleepers. Make sure the baby's head is uncovered.

Sharing your bed with a baby increases a baby's risk by as much as 40 times. Research does, however, suggest that room sharing is protective against SIDS.

Research demonstrates that pacifiers reduce a baby's risk for SIDS. It is believed that pacifiers may discourage babies from turning over onto their stomachs during sleep. Another theory is that the pacifier helps keep the tongue positioned forward, keeping the airways open.

Make sure babies don't overheat. The baby's room should feel comfortable to a lightly-clothed adult. Don't overdress the baby. Don't expose babies to

tobacco smoke. Babies whose mothers smoke during pregnancy are three times more likely to die from SIDS. Studies have found that the risk of SIDS increases with each additional smoker in the home.

There is evidence that many SIDS babies are born with brain deficiencies. Studies of SIDS victims reveal abnormalities in a portion of the brain that controls heart rate, breathing, temperature and the ability to wake from sleep.

SIDS can strike any infant. However, some babies are at higher risks. These include babies who are: male; premature or born with a low birth weight; anemic; Black, Native American or Native Alaskan; born in the fall or winter; recovering from an upper respiratory infection; siblings of a SIDS victim; inadequately nurtured; first-borns of teen mothers, and born to mothers with a history of sexually transmitted diseases or urinary tract infections.

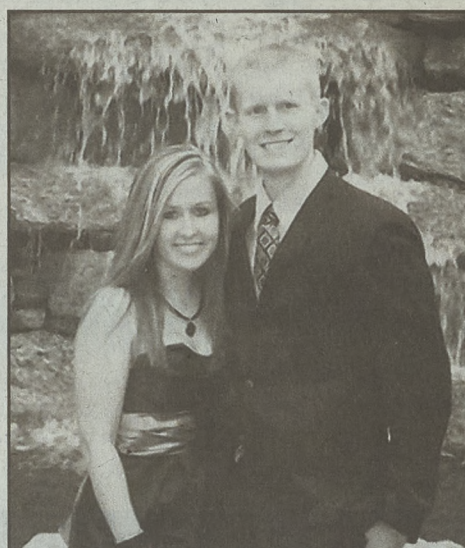

Conservation school theme

The week of July 16 - 24 was one of the hottest and most humid July weeks ever recorded in the Lehigh Valley with two days hitting 100 degrees.

While many 14- to 17-year-olds were hanging out at pools, texting friends, playing video games and/or fixating on their summer fun, 22 young teenagers were focused on the environment, attending the 31st annual Northampton County Junior Conservation School (NCJCS) at the 4-H Center property north of Nazareth.

The NCJCS dates back to 1980 when sportsmen and community leaders set up an education program to teach the youth of Northampton County and surrounding areas about the environment. Bill Halbflorestor and George Kreitz cofounded and co-directed the development of the school decades ago and it is still going strong 31 years later.

Director Andy Curtis attended his 20th session of the school this summer. He attended as a 14-year-old student camper back in 1992, then returned as a programmer (assistant to a counselor), a counselor and eventually took over as director. He takes one of his vacation weeks to volunteer as director. He also plans monthly meetings throughout the year.

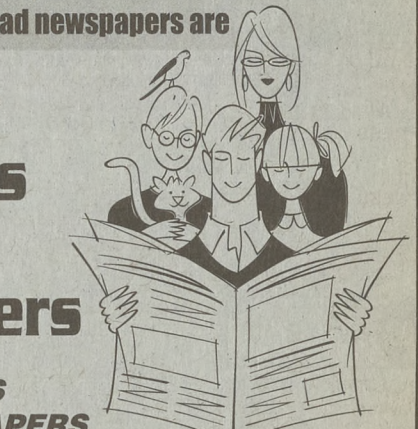

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 03-04 was duly ordained and enacted at a regular public meeting on June 21, 2004, the Bethlehem Township Board of Commissioners; and

WHEREAS, the Bethlehem Township Board of Commissioners now desire to amend Ordinance 03-04.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT AND IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED AND ENACTED by the Board of Commissioners of the Township of Bethlehem, County of Northampton and Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, as follows:

SECTION 1: Ordinance No. 03-04 (known as Chapter 110 of the Codification of Ordinances) is hereby amended with the addition of the following:

"(to be known as Codification of Ordinances §110-10). Sprinkler System Offer Form. The Township shall enforce Section 901(g) of the Pennsylvania Uniform Construction Code by requiring a form entitled "Offer to Install Automatic Sprinkler System in One- or Two- Family Home" which form shall be executed by a buyer, and submitted by a builder, of a one- or two- family dwelling at the time of application for a building permit."

SECTION 2: Severability. The provisions of this Ordinance are severable, and if a court of competent jurisdiction declares any provision of this Ordinance to be invalid or ineffective in whole or in part, the effect of such decision shall be limited to those provisions which are expressly stated in the decision to be invalid or ineffective, and all other provisions of this Ordinance shall continue to be separately and fully effective

SECTION 3: Repealer Clause. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances or Resolutions conflicting with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

SECTION 4: Effective Date. This Ordinance shall be effective five (5) days after adoption.

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# It's Back to Football

## Birds are 'all in'

After the most aggressive free agency in team history, there's a lot of hype surrounding the Philadelphia Eagles these days.

Terms like 'dream team' and 'Super Bowl favorites' have already been thrown out, just days after a lockout shut down the sport since March. Regardless of whether or not you believe the hype, Eagles President Joe Banner perhaps summed it up best.

"...somebody wrote the words 'the Eagles are all in,' - that's how we look at it," Banner said on Saturday at Lehigh University. "We're doing anything and everything we can. We're being aggressive about it and the expectations are high. I'm glad the players are excited as well about what they see being put together and their own optimism and excitement about seeing themselves surrounded by other high talent, and as importantly, people that really, really want to be here and really, really want to win. They're not afraid of a goal as high as we must win the Super Bowl to feel satisfied with the season."

Whether it's true or not, this attitude seems to be break the mold of how many perceived the Eagles since 2004 (when Terrell Owens and Jevon Kearse were signed) - a team that just wants to

compete year-in and year-out without making that move to put them over the top.

"There's a big focus relieving the stress and pain of having been so close so many times and not winning it all," Banner said. "We're very focused on getting that knot out of our stomachs."

The emergence of Michael Vick last year to go along with DeSean Jackson, Jeremy Maclin and LeSean McCoy helped to give the Eagles all the offense they needed. There's no reason not to expect that to continue this year. And if Vick gets hurt again, former Titan Vince Young, a signing that may have gone overlooked, is ready to step in.

Cruz took second in the tournament a year ago, but didn't allow a point to be scored on him during the tournament en route to going 10-0.

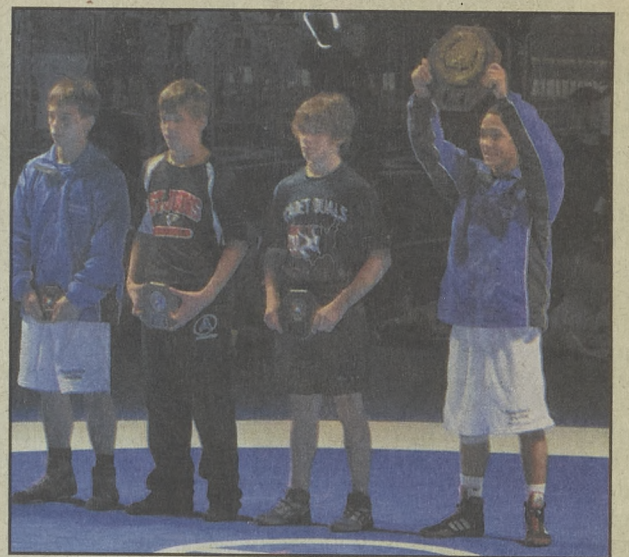
He also achieved All-American status in freestyle by taking seventh. He finished 5-2 in that category and wanted to win the freestyle crown as well, but he's happy with one national title.

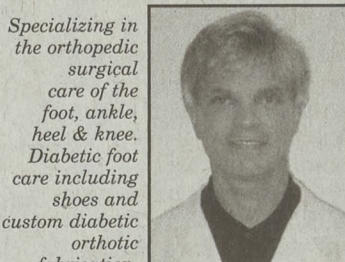

Local musician says that when the focus is money...

'You lose a sense of urgency'

When it comes to music, there is a thin line between art and business, and Jordan White knows which side to stand on.

White performs before Crystal Bowersox, the American Idol season nine runner-up, the rock band Hawthorne Heights and Carmen Magro Sept. 10 at Stabler Arena.

Some of the proceeds benefit juvenile diabetes studies.

His solid pop-rock songs have an unabashed classic rock influence. And people are starting to notice him.

Although the Stabler show is his biggest upcoming gig, his schedule is busy until then. He'll be at Musikfest's Town Square Stage Aug. 6 at 2 p.m., and other shows are posted on his website, www.jordanwhitemusic.com or his Reverbnation page, www.reverbnation.com/jordanwhitemusic.

His connection to American Idol is strong; in 2005, he placed among the top 400 contestants on the show.

The former American Idol contestant knows that they don't call it the music business for nothing. He can handle the games agents play. He can say how money gets distributed after a gig. He pays attention to which websites young people actually use.

But he also knows why he plays his particular brand of solid classic-rock-influenced pop, and it's not money.

It's a value he had reinforced while opening for

rock band Third Eye Blind. Lead singer Stephan Jenkins warned him about bands who experienced a little bit of success with their first album, and spent the next year wasting money on the rock star lifestyle. One group even bought expensive decorative carpets, Jenkins said. When it came time to release their second album, it bombed.

If the focus is money, Jenkins told him, "You lose a sense of urgency." If he loses that, the music he makes will lose something, as well, and the fans will know it, he said.

Before he was opening for acts of the caliber of Third Eye Blind, White began playing open mikes in 2004. But he really began learning about

music when he was just a child when his parents put him in boys' choruses. "I had no choice," he said.

Maybe it was because music was a part of his family's heritage already. His father played in a doo-wop band in New Jersey. "It was all a capella - they couldn't afford instruments," he said.

His mother, a writer of children's books, helped inspire the song-writing side of his music.

He even picked his major in college, psychology, partially because of music.

"There's an abstract link between psychology and writing songs," he said. There are certain "shades of gray" and character traits that learning



about people's personalities has helped him realize.

By the time he tried out for Idol, he had already begun generating some hype in the Lehigh Valley and surrounding areas. Though he did not have a chance to meet the show's famous judges, such as Simon Cowell, American Idol taught him the business side of his art, from the gory details to legitimate strategies for success in a saturated music market.

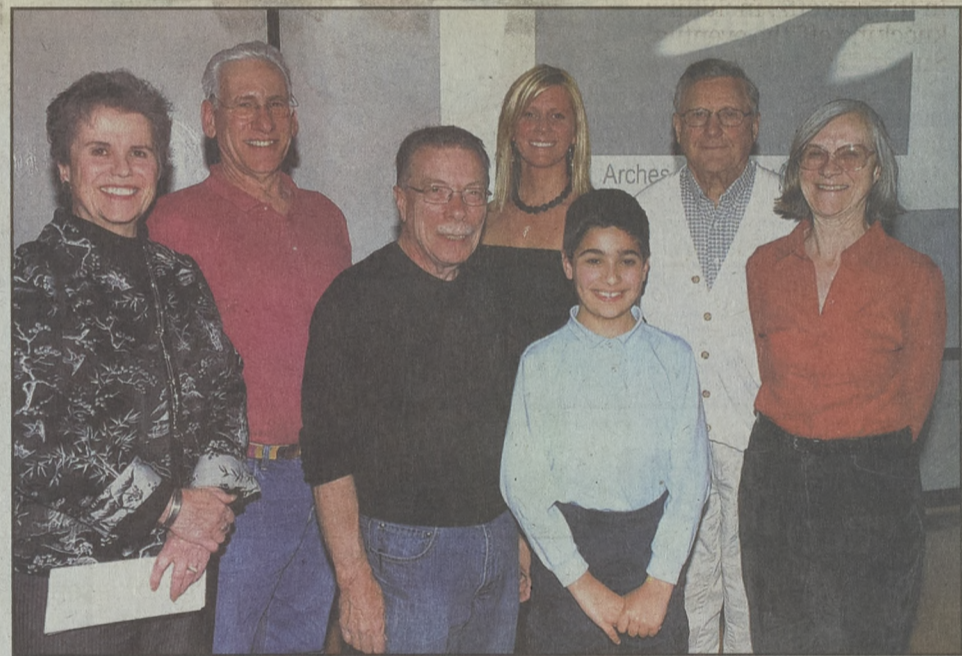
"I heard there's a clip of me for like a second" on the show, he said. "I've never seen it."

Coming in the top 400 may not get you a lot of screen time on the show, but many of the top-ranking participants on the show return to their hometowns to start bands. "It depends on what you make of it," White said.

Currently, White plays in a three-member group, but he was a founding member of KineticBlu and other local bands.

White is particularly excited about Stabler's "Rev It Up for Juvenile Diabetes" outdoor festival, but it's not the first time he's used his music in a charitable way. In 2006, his song "Baby's Breath," was included on "Care Package," a Bamboo Bird records release. The sales of the album benefited victims of the 2004 south east Asia tsunami.

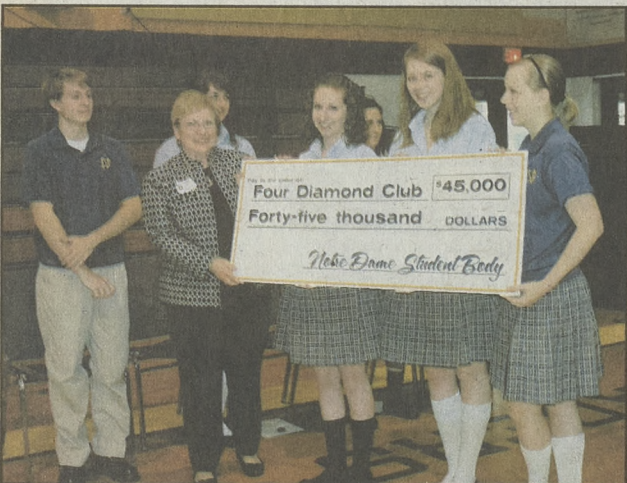

## BAVTS: THINGS YOU LEARN ON A BUS

### Speaker addresses bigotry, bias, prejudice and racism in schools across America

In 1993 then 23-year-old Quay Hanna embarked on a trip that changed his life, riding buses through 37 states for 12,000 miles over a nine week period. As a result of that experience Hanna learned that "if people are willing to give and receive respect for each other, you can have a civilized conversation."

That credo was central to his message when the now 41-year-old Hanna, a motivational speaker and author of 'Bus America: Revelation of a Redneck' visited Bethlehem Area Vocational Technical School April 18.

Hanna urged BAVTS students, "don't give up on the truth; pick five people that you don't want to talk to, and go talk to them; and become a bus rider because every seat on the bus sucks, and that's equali-

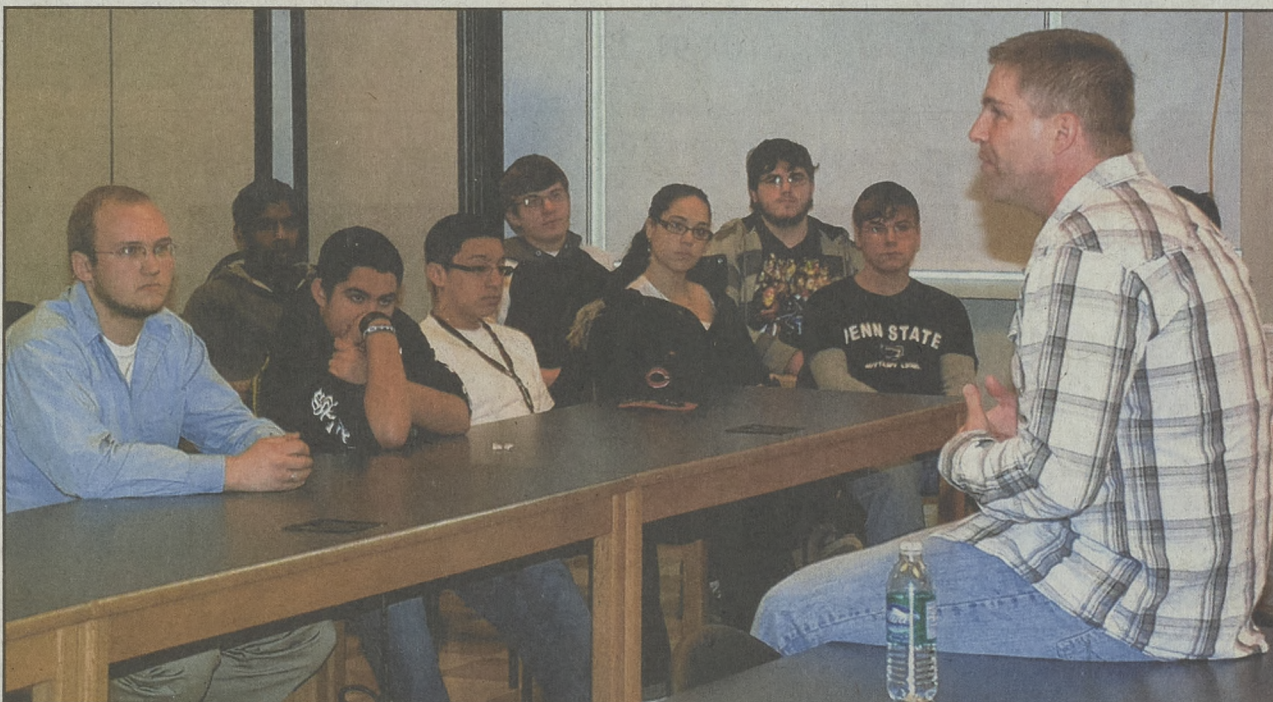

ty!"

A graduate of Bloomsburg University with a BA in English, Hanna has parlayed his cross-country bus ride experiences into an opportunity to assess and address bigotry, bias, prejudice and racism in schools across America.

A self-described racist with prejudicial beliefs, he draws from his experiences dressed in a T-shirt and jeans and evokes dialogue and thought from the students he addresses.

At BAVTS, he spoke at a full school assembly and then visited individual classes. Students were given an opportunity to question the affable and philosophical Hanna, recalling their individual experiences, how they confronted them, and sought advice on how they might deal with future similar circumstances.



Hanna spent time in a number of classrooms encouraging questions and discussion with students. "Seek the truth and pursue it with all you've got, and believe in it," was his message to this group of students.

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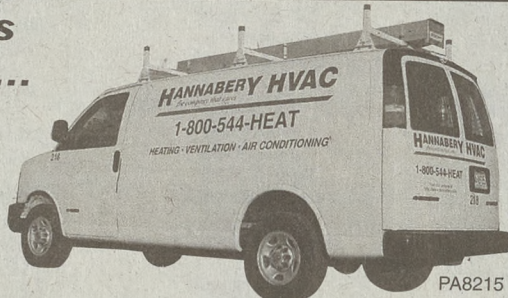
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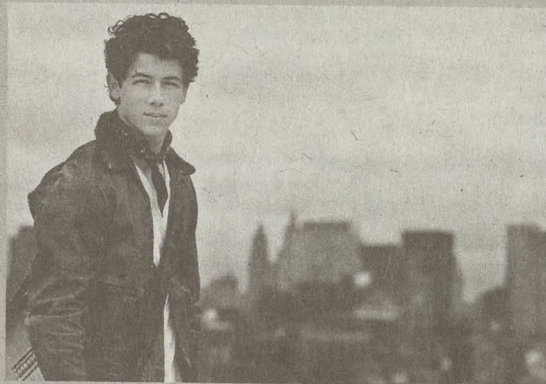

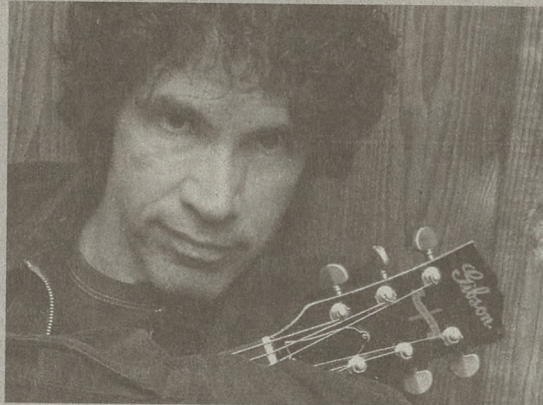
