NORTHAMPTON SAILOR SUCCUMBS TO WOUNDS

**Yeoman Stanley Flisak Buried
at Sea—Served at Pearl Har-
bor, Midway, Solomons.**

Word was received from the Navy Department Thursday by Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Flisak, of Northampton that their son, Yeoman Second Class Stanley Flisak, died at sea as a result of wounds received in action. He was aged 21 years and six months, having been born June 2, 1921.

A graduate of the Northampton High School class of 1939, Flisak entered the Navy in October of the same year. He received basic training in the naval base at Newport, R. I., and was graduated with honors from Naval clerical school, at San Diego, Cal. He then reported for duty in Pearl Harbor, where he was at the time of the Jap attack last December.

He survived and went on active sea duty, as clerical assistant to the commander of his ship. He was engaged in the naval battles of Midway and the Solomons. It is believed that his wounds were incurred during the latter engagement.

He was buried at sea with full military honors. Simple prayers will be said for him by Rev. Fr. Joseph Klosinski, rector of St. Michael's Roman Catholic Church, Northampton, during services at 10:30 a. m. Sunday. He is survived by his father and step-mother, Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Flisak, 1805 Canal Street, Northampton, Edward, a brother, and Wanda, a sister.

While at high school, he was well-known throughout the Lehigh Valley as an accomplished accordionist.

December 5, 1942
