

He holds five battle stars for participation in the Normandy, Northern France, Belgium, Luxembourg and Germany campaigns; the Presidential Unit Citation, and the Purple Heart with an Oak the Purple Heart with an Oak Leaf Cluster. His division was the first to enter Germany. Pfc. Herbst was wounded twice and was re-ported missing once. Harry attend-ed Bethlehem High School and was employed at the Kahn Gas Service Station. He reported to Comp. Put Station. He reported to Camp But-ner, N. C., for reassignment at the completion of his 30-day furlough.

Also home was the youngest brother, Pvt. Charles R. Herbst, who was inducted February 23, 1945. He just completed his basic training at Camp Blanding, Fla., and after completing a 15-day furbush be reported to Camp Mayer. lough, he reported to Camp Maxey, Texas, for further advanced training. Charles graduated from Bethlehem High School in 1944 and before his induction was attending Muhlenberg College and working part time at Greene's Gas Service Station.

The oldest brother, Pfc. Ralph L. Herbst, Jr., arrived in this coun-try with members of the 28th Division. He was inducted July 11, 1944, and received his basic trianing at Camp Wolters, Texas. He was sta-tioned at Fort Meade, Md., before going overseas to France. Ralph is a graduate of Bethlehem High School and of Muhlenburg College. He was attending Cornell University, mastering in chemistry, when inducted into the service.
