

We are very proud to dedicate this 1958 Cauldron to a favorite teacher at Bethlehem High School. Mrs. Marion (Clark) Baker, has been teaching for forty and a half years, many of those years spent at Bethlehem High School.

Mrs. Baker was born in Russell, St. Lawrence County, New York. She was educated at St. Lawrence University and has taken courses at Middleburg College, Muhlenberg College, Lehigh University and the Escuela Para Extranjeros, University de Madrid, Spain.

Most of her childhood was spent in New York State and her adulthood in Pennsylvania.

Mrs. Baker has taught in Russell, New York; Corsicana, Texas; Jamestown, New York; Warren, Penna.; and Bethlehem, Penna.

A brief comment from Mrs. Baker concerning her retirement: "During her early years, a teacher is likely to be most concerned with knowing her subject matter. As her experience increases, her interest is divided between her personal ambitions and her professional interest in her pupils, while in later years a person minimizes his self-importance and feels very humble toward her profession. This is probably the point when one is just becoming a truly good teacher; the welfare of the student is upper-most in one's mind."


He was graduated from the University of Pennsylvania with a Bachelor of Science degree in chemistry.





The Junior Class Play, Let Me Grow Up, by Anne Martins, was one of the most delightful three act comedies ever presented at Liberty High School.

The play, given in the auditorium March 15th and 16th, 1957, begins with Lexie, (Roseanne LaVan) a sixteen year old Miss, confiding to her best friend Mary Jo (Judy Judge) that she has invited a young soldier, Bill, to be her week-end guest. Bill (Lee Steele and Bill Ender) has never seen Lexie; so her prime concern is obtaining his full approval. Her Aunt Lydia, a kind spinster, portrayed by Gail Bauder and Joleita Wagner, spends her entire morning telling Lexie that she is attractive and charming. While Aunt Lydia is comforting her niece, Mary Jo is busily hinting to Matt Flemming, Lexie's older brother, that she has no date for the Saturday night dance. However, Matt (Ronnie Flores) is completely unimpressed by this young woman's attention because he prefers Arden, the local siren. Muriel Flemming (Nan Easter) is also excited about the dance. She is to do some impersonations to show the whole town how talented she is as an actress.

These plans for a nice, calm week-end are up-set by the arrival of Nola Flemming (Lois Blake) their talented actress mother, and some news she brings with her. She has met a producer, Mr. Holden, (Tom McIlwain) who wants her to

make a movie. However, if he were aware of her real age the part would be lost. Therefore, Nola has confessed to having only one child, eight-year-old Lexie. Lexie, refuses at first to play eight-year-old Bunny, her trumped-up cousin, but, her love for her mother is strong and she finally consents. Muriel is to play the maid and Matt the handy man.

Bill arrives and meets Lexie. This is one of the few times he is to see her because she must be Bunny the rest of the time that Mr. Holden is there. Bill's numerous spare moments are filled by Arden. This infuriates both Lexie and Matt and causes Mary Jo to form one of her many plans. Arden (Pat Lennartz) is invited for an afternoon of fun. This includes dodging a tricycle, a jumping rope, narrowly missing flying balls, and playing London Bridge. Poor Arden flees.

At the end of an exceedingly humorous and hectic day, everything is peaceful at the Flemming home. Muriel is the star instead of Nola, who has decided to become a real mother at last. Matt and Mary Jo attend the dance as do Lexie and Bill, after more complications.

This play, under the direction of Miss Elizabeth Shimer was the first encounter with the dramatic art for many of the cast and crew. The fine staging, make-up, and costumes were a result of hard work and good direction. Let Me Grow Up will be remembered because it was produced by a cast and crew who put all their energies into making a good play.

Pat, Della, and Sylvia, the three regulars who keep popping in for a coke, or to tease Shirley, Dino's new found girl friend, were played by Charleen Frankenfield, Susan Pitcher, Pat Opp, and Marlene Spevak (Sylvia double cast). He joins the neighborhood gang, The Silk Hats, and tries to persuade Dino to organize a robbery. With the help of his parole officer and a touch of old fashioned love, Dino not only puts himself back on the right track, but also sets Tony aright.








PORTABLE WEATHER STATION



White Sands, N.M.: This is the "Sergeant" missile, the successor to the four year old "Corporal," a highly mobile U.S. Army surface-to-surface weapon capable of carrying a nuclear warhead, which is being built by the Sperry Gyroscope Co. It is a solid fuel rocket "that can be quickly emplaced and fired by a very small crew under all conditions of weather and terrain," according to the release from the Army Feb. 18th. It has the advantage, because of the solid rather than liquid fuel, of being easily stored for fairly long periods.

The social activities of this organization are usually limited to a rollicking evening of entertainment during the winter and a trip to New York City in the spring.







An attempt is made to acquaint the girls with the educational and physical requirements necessary for entrance into the various nursing schools.

In order to achieve the aim of the club, a varied program is planned by student committees. Included in the program are speakers from the nearby hospitals and community health agencies, films dealing with various fields of nursing, and field trips to schools of nursing outside the local area. The group also attends recruitment teas sponsored by hospitals in Bethlehem, Allentown, and Easton. At these teas the girls meet and observe student nurses in training, tour the hospitals, and meet future nurses from other high schools.



AUTO BODY SHOP

Auto Body Shop is a very interesting shop. The student who spends three years in this shop will do many interesting jobs.

Sophomores in this department do mostly paper work. They have to make notebooks and take tests. Their information is obtained from their instructor and from the books they read. The students spend the first semester of the school term in the Auto Body Shop and the rest in the Auto Mechanics Shop. While in their sophomore year, they also have to choose the shop that they will remain in for the next two years.

In the Junior year, they will spend most of their time in the shop. They will do more jobs than the sophomore and these tasks will also be more difficult. The juniors may also use the welding outfit and if the instructor thinks that a junior can handle a paint job, he will let him spray an autobile. Even though the juniors spend most of their time on jobs they still have many things to learn about the automobile.



In their senior year, they are faced with many responsibilities, and are expected to help the sophomores and juniors in their work. They will spend all of their time in the shop and may bring their own cars in and work on them. If the instructor thinks that a senior is dependable and can handle a job, he will recommend him for employment. The senior will then work in the day time and go to school at night.



AUTO MECHANICS

Auto Shop is one of the most important departments in the vocational building, because the rate of cars being built today is enormous.


As sophomores in Auto Mechanics, the boys are guided by Mr. Leidig who teaches them theory work for one half of the year. Then they are transferred to the Auto Body shop where they finish out their sophomore year. They do this because as the boys start their junior year, they will have picked the shop in which they could do their work.

When they are juniors and have picked auto repair, they are ready to go to work. They get more difficult tasks than the sophomores, and can also help instruct the sophomores in their work. The jobs done mostly by the juniors are: brakes, tune-up's, valves, and overhauling engines. They still get a little theory practice now and then to further advance them on the automobile.

In the senior year, Mr. Leidig thinks the boys have been trained sufficiently enough to get jobs and learn more about the automobile. They still work in shop to aid the sophomores, and juniors in their struggle for mastery of the mechanics of the trade.

There will always be a great demand for auto mechanics. The vocational department tries to do everything in its power to fulfill that demand.






BUILDING TRADES

Construction in some forms is almost as old as man himself. It started when the first man sought shelter or refuge from the weather in a cave. He then started to make things to add to the comfort of the cave. Construction has one of the brightest futures in industry today. As long as there are people, they will need homes to live in, bridges to cross rivers, and office buildings to work in. Therefore the purpose of this trade is to instruct boys in the basic fundamentals of these operations that they may fulfill the growing demands of construction.

When the sophomores enter the shop, they are told what their course of study will be for the next three years in high school. They begin their training by learning to read the foot-rule efficiently. They start the regular shop work with the basic construction of the stud wall. They learn the lay out for a stud wall with window and door.

A sophomore is taught to lay out a flight of stairs with the rise and treads, and is shown how to stake out a building with building line and batter boards. He becomes acquainted with the machines that are part of this trade. He is taught the use of the plans and the right handling of all tools of this shop.

A junior studies brick laying. He is shown the right handling of a masons trowel. He starts by laying a straight wall first. Gradually he goes to the more difficult parts of brick laying. He is taught to lay a leader or, by simple means, a corner of a brick wall. He also studies electrical wiring. In this time he will wire a complete house to meet the approval of state electrical investigators. He studies the different types of switch connections. Also included in the junior year is a course in plastering and interior finish work.



The senior does a great deal of work from a book. He makes a study of plumbing. In this he learns how to sweat a joint. He learns the different types of plumbing tools and joints. He studies the laws governing the plumbing code which are set up by the state. He studies heating and air conditioning and then reviews what has been taught him during his sophomore and junior years.


This year, as seniors, we have had the privilege of building two rooms in Liberty High School. In these rooms we have had a chance to put into use the knowledge we have gained in the past two years. The two rooms are on the second floor of Liberty High School. In this project, we have had contact with the rough structure and the finished interior of construction. The finished carpentry being done with a certain amount of skill and care.

Building Trades offers a trade of many opportunities and security to those who possess the ambition and ability associated with this type of work.

DRAFTING

The drafting language is a graphical language. It tells how to build houses, how to assemble machines, how to detail beams, in short how to make and assemble a material object. How far a boy will go in this field, depends not only on his ability to draw, but also upon his ability to read and interpret the ideas of engineers.

In the tenth grade or first year of drafting, the boy learns the fundamentals of the trade. He is taught the importance of drafting and shown all the tools he will work with.



In the eleventh grade the boy learns finishes and tolerances, jigs and fixtures, and piping. In the structural shop the student learns the detailing of beams and trusses.

In the twelfth and final year of drafting, the student will meet such problems as the detailing and assembling of the globe valve. During the structural senior year he faces such problems as the detailing of columns, beams, reactors, haunches, and girths.

The boys in mechanical drafting draw details and assemblies of such pieces of machinery as air cylinders, milling machines, arboss, gears, bench drills, etc. They detail parts of cars such as gaskets, bearings, and pistons.


While in the structural drawing shop, the main problems a student would solve are the detailing of columns, beams and trusses. The structural draftsman also does the detailing of the beams, angles, etcs., in the architectural drawing of a house. The structural members which he details are used in such places as commercial buildings, and warehouses.

The architectural draftsman specializes in the designing and detailing of homes, public places, and business establishments.

He also has a lot to do with foundations, footings, etc.

There are different fields into which a draftsman can enter after he has completed his course. He can become a detailer, checker, or blueprint reader. With his knowledge of drafting, he may even become a tool or jig and fixture designer.

Drafting gives great opportunities to a boy, and it also teaches him accuracy and neatness thereby giving him an excellent view of the mechanical and structural concepts of industry.






ELECTRICAL SHOP



In the sophomore year, the students are taught chassis building, soldering and the construction of simple series and parallel circuits. The handling and use of the different types of meters are very important and are to be learned by the sophomore students.





In their junior year the boys are taught the use of the Oscilloscope and its construction. They learn about the different types of amplifiers. This includes their construction and application. The electron tube and plotting charts and graphs are also part of the junior year course.

In the senior year the accent is mainly upon the radio receiver. The seniors are taught the parts of the radio, section by section. They are taught how to trouble shoot. By checking out different sections of the radio with up to date equipment, they are able to locate the source of the trouble. The senior year is the time when all the knowledge from tenth and eleventh grade is combined.

After graduation, a boy has a choice of continuing his trade in industry, private business, or the Armed Forces. All these fields offer opportunities for advancement and a good paying occupation.

There is a demand for electronic engineers. In this age of space travel and electronic brains, there are limitless opportunities in the fields of Electronics. More and more, young men are needed to fill the spaces of men returning. The demand is great and it will increase in years to come.







The handling and use of the different types of meters are very important and are to be learned by the sophomore students.



In their junior year the boys are taught the use of the Oscilloscope and its construction. They learn about the different types of amplifiers. This includes their construction and application. The electron tube and plotting charts and graphs are also part of the junior year course.

In the senior year the accent is mainly upon the radio receiver. The seniors are taught the parts of the radio, section by section. They are taught how to trouble shoot. By checking out different sections of the radio with up to date equipment, they are able to locate the source of the trouble. The senior year is the time when all the knowledge from tenth and eleventh grade is combined.

After graduation, a boy has a choice of continuing his trade in industry, private business, or the Armed Forces. All these fields offer opportunities for advancement and a good paying occupation.

There is a demand for electronic engineers. In this age of space travel and electronic brains, there are limitless opportunities in the fields of Electronics. More and more, young men are needed to fill the spaces of men returning. The demand is great and it will increase in years to come.






GENERAL METAL WORKING

The shop teacher is Mr. Donald Dietrich. In this shop some fabrication is taught, also sheet metal work, burning, welding, soldering, riveting, and blue print reading.

The fabrication of this shop consists of assembling beams, columns, trusses, etc. The beams are fastened with bolts or are welded together. The sheet metal work consists of making all kinds of small objects, out of sheet metal, holding them together with rivets or solder.

They burn beams, columns, and trusses in the shop. This is good practice for the students when they get out in the field on actual jobs. They have to learn how to read blue prints so they can put the right beams where they are supposed to go. This will help them to advance in their jobs out in the field because not all men can read blue prints.

In the three years that the students are in this shop they learn how to use all the tools and machines.



They can make all kinds of designs and shapes out of sheet metal, fasten beams together with bolts or welding, burn through beams, columns, etc. They can also read blue prints and know what they mean.

Mr. Dietrich also teaches related drawing to the draftsmen. The draftsmen work with beams, columns, trusses, etc., because in their shop, they draw these structural members in detail and make the blue prints. They also work with sheetmetal, burning, welding.

When the students graduate, there are all kinds of jobs in this field. The boys with the highest grades are the boys who get the best job.




MACHINE SHOP

The finished product of the machine shop has an effect on everyone's daily life. From the wooden made lathe to modern automation, the need of the machinist is great. The machine shop in the Vocational Annex is providing the manpower for this important and vital task.

During the three years that a boy is in the shop, he learns the operations that each machine can perform. The shop includes such machines as the lathe, milling machine, grinders, sharpeners, and drill presses. Included in the shop is a Do-All saw, Hacksaw, and a horizontal boring mill. He not only learns how to operate the machine, but he learns how to repair, and make the necessary adjustments. He learns formulas for finding out how fast a machine may go, and for finding the length and depth of a cut. There is a formula for every operation performed in the machine shop. The boys are taught safety habits, and learn the machinist language.





THE PRINT SHOP

Can you visualize a world without printing? From the time we arise in the morning until the time we go to bed at night we come in contact and depend on printing. Our punch cards at work are printed. The check or money by which we are paid is printed, and the newspapers we read everyday are printed.


The Print Shop at the Vocational Department of Liberty High School is built around four departments, the Dark Room, the Composing Room, The Press Room, and The Bindery.

The Dark Room consists of a camera, a line-up table, an arc light, and all the various chemicals necessary to produce aluminum plated for printing by the offset process.

The Composing Room consists of over three hundred cases of type, a proof press, and corrected before taken into the pressroom

before taken into the pressroom.

In the Press Room the type form is locked up according to the press best suited to its particular



The Bindery is the last steo. It is here that the job is finished. It will be either drilled, stitched, folded, perforated, or packaged. Our shop is fitted to meet each one of these requirements.

The kind of work that is printed here in the print shop is comparable to that which is done in industry. Some examples are tickets, letterheads, envelope corners, programs, etc.

Upon graduation the student in printing has the basic fundamentals to place him in industry allowing him to earn his livelihood in one of the most interesting and fascinating trades in modern living.



WOODWORKING

Cabinetmaking is the trade of building wooden furniture. The word is derived from a French word meaning "a collection of fine things," and a cabinetmaker is one who builds fine things. That is how he differs from a carpenter who usually does more crude types of building, such as building houses or repairing them.

In order to gain the knowledge which is required of them, the students have to go through a three year course of cabinetmaking.


In their sophomore year, they learn how to recognize different types of wood by the grain, weight, texture, and color. They also learn the names of different joints, and how to make them.

In their junior year, they begin to operate machines such as the sanders, powersaws, jointers, planer, drill presses, and the lathe. They are taught how to safely operate these machines and how to execute simple repairs on them.

When they enter into their senior year, they take the full responsibility of doing mostly all of the work by themselves and, at the same time, helping out their lower classmen. At the end of the three years, the students are expected to know how to read blueprints and must be able to use both hand and machine woodworking tools.

Mr. Don L. Detwiler, who is our instructor, has encouraged the students to take a great interest in the study of wood. We think he is doing a fine job of producing the future cabinetmakers of today's industries.

During the past year our club has had the pleasure of having one of the local newspapermen come in and give a description of the make up of a newspaper and the arrangement of the advertising. A few days after



the lecture, we had the privilege to make up our own full sized page of advertising. This page consisted of different things we learned from our Advertising Book, but also from what had been taught in the lecture. Each student's ad was based on the type of store which he works in.

One of the most outstanding things the club participates in is the final gathering of all the D. E. Clubs of the neighboring towns. Allentown, Harrisburg, Reading, etc. At this meeting the different schools pick a king and queen. The king and queen represent our city. They receive different awards and prizes.

THE DISTRIBUTIVE EDUCATION CLASS

The Distributive Education Class was first organized by Mr. J. A. Beidelman, in 1952. When the group was first started, the sessions were held in the General High School in Room 23. When the Vocational Annex was to be erected, it was decided that the Distributive Education Class should have a room and also a display window so that they would have the proper space. In 1955, when the Vocational Department was completed, Mr. Beidelman proudly took over what is now known as the Distributive Education Room and also the School Store.

The purpose of D. E. is to train the students to sell properly and also how to handle the different types of customers which they might meet while on the selling floor.

In order to become enrolled in this class certain requirements must be met. Some of them are: you must be a senior and not in the habit of being tardy. In addition to this, you must possess passing grades in all the subjects you had taken in both the sophomore and junior grade levels. You must also secure the signature of your parents or guardian as a final requisite for admission into the class.

Every student enrolled in D. E. is considered as being in the general curriculum. In this course, there are five subjects, each one being considered as one full credit towards the 13.4 credits needed for graduation. The boy or girl also receives one full credit for his or her work at an individual training station. Altogether, 6 units of credit are received for D. E.

The five subjects you receive are job problems, merchandise information, retailing, English, which includes Literature, and economics of distribution. Every subject studied dove-tails the others, which makes each and every subject very interesting and understandable.


Along with our five subjects, we are required to make a Merchandise Manual. This is not a requirement of the school, but rather one of the state. The book consists of the history, methods of manufacturing, methods of packing, and the transporting of the goods from jobber to retailer.

Out of all the D. E. classes in our area, Liberty High is fortunate enough to have the largest display window. Every student of D. E. takes a great deal of pride in being able to say that they arranged a display in the window at one time or another without help from the instructor or fellow students. The merchandise which is placed in the window is loaned to us by our employers for a period of two weeks.

Next to our display window, all of the students enjoy being able to sell various school supplies to their friends and fellow class-mates.

The store helps us in many ways. We can practice the different selling approaches, the correct method of giving change, and one of the most important things of all, the correct use of the cash register. This practice provides us with the necessary experience that we need in order to become successful in the trade.






THOMAS JORDAN

JUNIOR VARSITY FOOTBALL


The little Hurricanes under the capable coaching of Joe Preletz and Freddie Burkhardt finished a successful season this year with an excellent record of seven wins and two losses.

By the end of the season the J.V's had been rounded into a smooth running team. With some of these boys filling the gaps left by our seniors, Bethlehem should have a fine team next year.



VARSITY WRESTLING

DISTRICT XI CHAMPIONS

"In one of the most startling form reversals in many a moon in Lehigh Valley athletics, Bethlehem High's energetic wrestling machine dethroned Allentown as District XI Champions.

Such was the opening paragraph of the Globe Times spread and such was the conclusion of the 1957-1958 successful wrestling season during which Bethlehem, in league competition, placed third to Allen-

town and Northampton.

In dethroning Allentown and fighting off an aggressive Northampton team, which finished second, Bethlehem succeeded by placing nine of eleven starters in the semi-finals, and five of these nine in the finals. Four of the five came through as District XI Champions to give coach Jim Harkins one of his most cherished wins in eleven years of coaching. Harry Hollinger, Junior at 112, started by scoring a decisive win over competent Ken Nickischer of Northampton. Bill Rinker, stellar point scorer and undefeated during the season, then established himself as one of the finest 123 pounders ever to compete for Bethlehem by decisively outscoring the accomplished Joe Recker from Northampton. Bethlehem's captain Bart Mosser at 127, also undefeated for the year, followed by defeating previously undefeated Milan Billy of Northampton football fame in a bitterly fought overtime match. Bill Werst, heavy weight, capped the Tourney by defeating Northampton's able Charlie Kuntzelman and thereby established the necessary margin of victory.

During the season, Werst was also undefeated, as was Ed Nickles who finished as district runner-up

in the 145-pound division to Wilson's only finalist, Joe Ackerman.

In addition to those mentioned above, other senior lettermen were Van Filipos, Norton Smiley, Dave Grubbs, Jim Kresge, and Jon LeTowt. Roy Morgan, Charles Walker, Doug Kock, Roger Grubbs, John Bartek, Ron Bednar, and Dick Bedies were undergraduate lettermen who will serve as the nucleus for next year's team which, it is confidently predicted, will again have a most successful year under the fine coaching of Jim Harkins.

John (Hans) Schultheis also established what appears to be a new Hurricane record for a wrestling manager. John Served in that

capacity since seventh grade and thus reigned for six years.

During the regular season, the gapplers only lost three of ten meets and wrestled Hill School for the first time. The high mark of the season was the Hurricane's 22-19 defeat of Easton which, up to that time, was undefeated.

In further post season wrestling, the Hurricane District XI Champions, Hollinger, Rinker, Mosser and Werst, entered the Northeastern Pennsylvania Regional Tournament held at Wilkes College on March 15. Mosser and Werst emerged as tourney champions by beating Holodick, of Wilkes Barre; Meyers and Rutkowski, of Kingston, in the finals, and thereby qualified for the PIAA State Tournament.

In the state tourney, which was held March 29, Bill Werst pushed the eventual 185 pound champion, Ray Bozzoli, of Chartier's-Hustons Joint, to the limit in the semis before bowing 5-3. Bart Mosser than won the cherished state wrestling championship, at 127, before a crowd of 6,500 roaring fans at Recreation Hall, Penn State University, by defeating Bill McCreary, of Indiana, 3-1, in the semi-finals, and by stopping Don Hershey, of Manheim Central, 5-1, in the finals. Bart thereby became the first Hurricane State Wrestling Champion since 1947 and the first during Jim Harkin's reign as coach.

In recognition of outstanding achievement in the sport of wrestling, Jasper athletic awards were presented to Harry Hollinger, Bill

Rinker, Bart Mosser, and Bill Werst.




The fourteen majorettes under the advisorship of Miss Nancy McIntyre can be found practicing with the band two mornings a week during the football and basketball season.

DISTRICT XI CHAMPIONS

The 1957-58 edition of the Bethlehem High School basketball team under the able coaching of Mr. John Howard ended its season with a record of 15 wins and 3 losses in the season league competition. This gave the netsters a percentage of .833.

The first half of the season was very successful, with the Hurricanes suffering only one loss while winning eight. This loss was to Reading, but couldn't keep Bethlehem from being the first half champions of the East Penn League.

During the second half, Bethlehem lost only two, while they won seven. Easton and Allentown, playing on this home courts, avenged their earlier losses to Bethlehem by defeating our hoopsters with small margins of victory in two of the most thrilling games of the season.

At the end of the second half, B. H. S. wound up tied with Allentown for East Penn League first place honors.

The Red and Blue Hurricanes then ran, shot, and rebounded their way into the District XI Playoffs with a crushing victory over arch-rival Allentown, 60-52, in the league playoff at Hershey Arena.



In a preliminary District XI game leading to the District Finals, Bethlehem, advanced one step closer to the District XI Championship with a sterling victory over outclassed Wilson Boro 77-52.

The Hurricane then traveled to the Penn Palestra for the District XI PIAA Finals. In this game Bethlehem became District XI Champs by defeating the Blue Raiders of Tamaqua 81-48. The Hurricane victory came with less trouble than had been expected. At the end of the first half, the Hurricane had a lead of 26 points with a score of 46-20. Holding a large advantage during the second half they easily emerged victorious. In winning their first district title since 1948, the Hurricanes hit on 47.4 per cent of their shots.

Bethlehem High's hopes for their first state basketball championship were then stopped short when they were defeated by the Bearcats of York in a playoff game leading to the PIAA Eastern Finals.

During the first half the lead changed many times and at the half Bethlehem lead 31-24. In the third quarter B. H. S. built up an advantage of 13 points only to have the tables turned in the fourth. The final score was 55-48 in favor of York.





The mermen accounted for a total of 27½ points to place third after Allentown and Hazleton. Allentown was first and Hazleton placed second.



Relying on his returning lettermen, members of last years team who didn't graduate, and last years second string Coach Kernan predicts another highly successful season this year.



We were glad to get to bed that night after such an exciting ordeal.





as we left the airport and climbed into the sky.


