## Light at end of museum's tunnel?

ethlehem's National Museum of Industrial History, known to most as the Steel Museum, announced late Friday that it has "reluctantly" accepted the resignation of its beleaguered executive director, Steve Donches. But he will remain on staff and still be paid about half the \$200,000 in salary and benefits that was going to the former Bethlehem Steel public relations VP.

ethlehem city council voted unanimously March 4 on a resolution to consider terminating Bethlehem police officer Hoffman's Richard employment.

Hoffman, a 10-year Bethlehem police veteran, was charged with driving under the influence of alcohol after being involved in an automobile accident Aug 8, 2013.

Officer Hoffman's blood alcohol level at the time of the accident was found to be 0.16, twice the legal limit in Pennsylvania. The accident occurred after as many as 15 off-duty Bethlehem police officers were celebrating another officer's birthday at the Fraternal Order of Police.

At a lengthy hearing the previous week, council also heard testimony relating to other instances of misconduct, from a 1995 altercation with a

## Bethlehem home selected as SOTA's 2014 'show house'

he 1870s federal style Church Street residence of doctors Bill and Peggy Hoffman will become the Allentown Arts Museum of the Lehigh Valley's Society of the Arts 'Show House' for 2014. The SOTA show house has been dubbed "Downtown Abbey" due to both the estate feel of the property grounds and its history, which has it evolving from the land holdings of William Penn, to the Moravians, and eventually to a series of private homeowners.



#### The Sin of Complaining

God had done so very much for His people in delivering them from God had done so very much for His people in delivering them from Egyptian bondage, but then they began complaining. "And when the people complained, it displeased the LORD: and the LORD heard it; and his anger was kindled; and the fire of the LORD burnt among them, and consumed them" (Numbers 11:1). The severe punishment that God brought upon those involved in this infectious sin indicates how much God hates it! The underlying evils of complaining against God reveal ingratitude of all God does for us, and unbelief of His promises. It dis-honors God and despises Him. It reflects an attitude of rebellion against God and culminates in disobedience to Him! Today we tend to underrate the sinfluess of complaining, but God

Today, we tend to underrate the sinfulness of complaining, but God has not changed His hatred of this sin as Jude 14-16 shows, "Enoch... prophesied of these, saying, Behold, the Lord cometh with ten thousands of his saints, **To execute judgment upon all...complainers.**"

The antidote to complaining is to focus on God's goodness and praise Him as David did when he said, "I had fainted, unless I had believed to see the goodness of the LORD in the land of the living. (Psalm 27:13). One of God's faithful missionaries, Allen Gardiner, expe-rienced many physical difficulties and hardships throughout his service to the Savior. Despite his troubles, he said, "While God gives me strength, failure will not daunt me." In 1851, at the age of 57, he died of disease and starvation while serving on Picton Island at the southern tip of South America. When his body was found, his diary lay nearby. It bore the record of hunger, thirst, wounds, and loneliness. The last entry in his little book showed the struggle of his shaking hand as he tried to write legibly. It read, "I am overwhelmed with a sense of the goodness of God." Think of that! No word of complaint—just praise for God's mondmess! goodness!





# Hawks do it again!

## 3 golds, another team trophy

When the 2014 PIAA Championships came to an end late Saturday afternoon, there was little doubt that the best team was Bethlehem Catholic.


The Golden Hawks' Jake Riegel, Luke Karam and Zeke Moisey all earned gold for the first time, while six others placed to help the program earn the team title with a state record 138.5 points.

For Moisey, the honor was a long time coming after the senior finished second the last two years.

"Every year is a new year, but it was definitely on my mind," said the 126pounder. "I just wanted to go out and get gold this year and I wasn't settling for anything less than that."


The senior took much of the drama out of the match early, getting an early lead on Schuylkill Valley's Josh Giorgio before eventually claiming a 9-3 decision. After getting caught in a move last year, Moisey was perfectly content to wrestle somewhat conservatively and win with his defense this time around.

"I wasn't going to try anything big like last year," he said. "My plan was just to wrestle smart, do the same thing I did at the Christmas City Tournament, which was hit my doubles and singles, and it worked it for me. The strategy was similar for Riegel and Karam. Riegel, a fifth-place finisher a week earlier at the Southeast Regional tournament, earned a 3-1 decision at 106 pounds over Bishop McDevitt's John Pipa while Karam atoned for last year's runner-up finish with a 5-0 win at 113 over Bedford's Jonathan Gabriel. "All three guys really wrestled conservatively, especially if you've seen what they've done in the past," said Bethlehem Catholic coach Jeff Karam. "They all have 'baby blanket' moves that they can go to at anytime, and that's what you saw today. "But it's the state finals and there's a lot of pressure. I think ... I know all three can wrestle better. But I also know that if you're going to try and score on them, it's going to be really hard. Defense is a major point of emphasis in our room, and I think you saw that today. After earning the final qualifying spot at last week's regional tournament, Riegel certainly made the most of his first ever trip to Hershey. "I just look to the future. Last week didn't mean anything," the freshman said. "I was able to advance and this tournament was like a whole new season for me." For Karam, the championship is the culmination of a dominant postseason that also included district and regional

## Jeff Karam: father, coach of a state champ

Jeff Karam admits that he has trouble separating being a coach and father when it comes to coaching his son, Luke, on the wrestling mat.

The nerves are different and there's essentially more at stake, as a piece of him is on the mat as well. It's a scenario that many youth coaches may have been in, but it becomes a different moment when the spectacle is your son wrestling in the state championship. Fortunately for the father and son tandem, they didn't have to worry that much during the PIAA 2A wrestling championships Saturday afternoon, as Luke captured his first state gold medal following a 5-0 victory over Jonathan Gabriel of Bedford in the 113pound finals. It was a special moment for the Karam's, as he subtly enjoyed one of his finer coach-

ing moments of his life, watching his son win a PIAA state championship.

Saturday, however, Luke didn't have Cruz in the corner, as he was watching his son, Darian, wrestle for Lehigh at the EIWA tournament. 

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

Bricks4Kidz® was founded in 2008 by an architect looking to combine the fun of building with LEGO® bricks with strong educational lessons in engi-


neering, science, architecture and technology.





If you barter, you should know that the value of products or services from bartering is taxable income.

Here are four facts about bartering: 1.Barter exchanges. A barter exchange is an organized marketplace where members barter products or services. Some exchanges operate out of an office and others over the Internet. All barter exchanges are required to issue Form 1099-B, Proceeds from Broker and Barter Exchange Transactions. The exchange must give a copy of the form to its members who barter and file a copy with the IRS.

2.Bartering income. Barter and trade dollars are the same as real dollars for tax purposes and must be reported on a tax return. Both parties must report as income the fair market value of the product or service they get.

3.Tax implications. Bartering is taxable in the year it occurs. The tax rules may vary based on the type of bartering that takes place. Barterers may owe income taxes, self-employment taxes, employment taxes or excise taxes on their bartering income.

4.Reporting rules. How you report bartering on a tax return varies. If you are in a trade or business, you normally report it on Form 1040, Schedule C, Profit or Loss from Business.



## Tips to reduce clotting

#### Q. Are all blood thinners the same?

More than two million Americans have atrial fibrillation (AF), a rhythmic disorder of the heart where the atria (the heart's pumping chambers) quiver instead of beat. As a result. not all of the blood is pumped out of the heart, allowing pools to collect in the heart chamber, where clots may form.

Blood thinners reduce the risk of heart attack and stroke by reducing the formation of blood clots in your arteries and veins.

There are two main categories of blood thinners: antiplatelets and anticoagulants

Antiplatelets prevent blood cells called platelets from forming a clot. Anticoagulants affect your body chemistry and lengthen the time it takes to form a blood clot. Anticoagulants target clotting factors, proteins made in the liver. These are crucial to the blood-clotting process.

When a person is wounded, platelets release thromboxane, a chemical that signals other platelets to work together to heal the damage. Without thromboxane, the platelets won't collect and no clot will form.

Antiplatelet agents, including aspirin and clopidogrel (Plavix), work by inhibiting the production of thromboxane.

Aspirin is highly recommended for preventing a first stroke, but it and other antiplatelets also have an important role in preventing recurrent strokes.

According to the American Heart Association, taking aspirin within two days of an ischemic stroke reduces the severity of the stroke. In some cases, it prevents death.

A stroke, which is also called a "brain attack," is caused by a blood problem



## A little birdie told me

What is it about a little bird that can bring so much joy to us?

The Audubon Society **REGARDS** tells us there are approx- By Pattie Mihalik imately six million people who are serious bird watchers. Many plan their vacations just to be able to spot another species of birds.

birds goes back to the beginning of time.

In ancient Rome, an augur was a priest with an important role. He studied birds to determine the will of the gods.

According to folk wisdom through the ages, birds have been said to have a certain power.

Well, I'll tell you this. They certainly have power over me.

Often, I find the sight of one little bird so uplifting that it's almost magical

There have been times when I've been depressed or excessively worried until I look up and spot a bird. Then magic happens. My breathing slows and I can feel myself smile.

Watching one little warbler can wash away my cares and uplift my mood.

I have no idea why that happens. I just know that it does.

On the night I recall as being the bleakest I have ever experienced because of my husband's illness, I dragged myself up my front steps with a heart so heavy it was hard to put one foot in front of the other.

When I got to my front door, I heard a bird that seemed to be demanding my attention. Bear in mind this was 9:30 at night, not a time when a bird would normally serenade. But this one was determined to get my attention.

As I looked up and watched the bird, my dark mood lifted and hope entered my heart.

Again, I have no idea how one little bird can exert such power on me.

I especially love the bright red cardinals that come to my bird feeder.

I even love the crows. Our fascination with While most people vilify crows, I think they sound rather funny.

Some birds are so stunningly beautiful that they can literally stop me in my tracks. That was the case when I saw my first roseate spoonbill in Florida.

At the time, my friend Frank Johannasen had taken me kayaking in Sarasota Bay. When I spotted the pink birds, I stopped paddling in amazement. I had never seen a pink bird before.

Frank told me they were roseate spoonbills then expected me to follow him. But I didn't move from the spot. I was too taken with the pink birds and wanted to watch them longer.

In truth, every bird is beautiful, some more than others. The closer you look, the more amazing they are.

From the time I get up in the morning until I turn in for the night, I listen for my little feathered friends.

In the morning before even open my eyes I hear the woodpecker that likes to tap away at the flue on my chimney, creating its own racket. Then the morning doves start to welcome the day with their soft cries.

Yes, I know. Their proper name is mourning doves. I don't think they sound mournful and don't like that name. Some call them turtledoves and I think that's far better.

I like to sit on my lanai and see how many birds grace my bird feeder. The other day while I was sitting there I saw an ibis hopping along the grass.
