twenty-four hours after he applied for 1-A rating to his draft board. Now Private Chock, who used to reside on the South Side, doesn't want to wait till August 13 to be sent to a reception center with the other Board No. 3 men. He wants to go August 11 with his South Side buddies who were accepted at Allen-town Tuesday.

Board No. 3, consisting of Frank-lin Cole, chairman, Stanley Weav-er, secretary, and R. Fred Stahl ex-pressed its gratification with Chock's attitude, his willingness to expedite his Army induction and held it up today as a splendid example for oth-er selectees to emulate.
