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"There seldom was any excitement. Our advance lines in the Southwest Pacific have moved so far away from the Russells we didn't even have any serious air raids. Once in a while a few Jap planes would stray over our way but never did any damage during the time I was there."

Pfc. Boksan attended Vocational Trade High School, Bethlehem.

Prior to enlisting in the Marine Corps July 23, 1942, he was employed as a machinist by the Bethlehem Steel Corporation.
