The newspaper clipping tells the story of "Oscar, the Mascot Goldfish." It was carried to England in a whisky bottle filled with water in a gas mask. It is probably the widest traveled goldfish in the world, for its journeys have totaled more than 11,000 miles. Its daily treat is a swim in its owner's waterfilled steel helmet.
