The Bethlehem youth, twenty-two years of age, was employed by the Bethlehem Steel Company, but the attack on Pearl Harbor changed things. On December 8, 1941, he enlisted in the Marine Corps, which, it was later discovered, was the same date during which the Allentown youth, 23 years of age, enlisted. It was on the train, enroute to the training camp, that they sat in the same seat and fell to talking. They have been pals ever since. This intimate friendship has brought the families of the two Boys together, also.

Robert Gallagher is a graduate of Lansford High School, class of 1937. He entered Pennsylvania Military College and put in a year there, playing center on the varsity football team. He entered West Point in the Spring of 1939 and was there a year.
