


LAST TAPS

"It is not death to die— To leave this weary road, And, 'midst the brotherhood on high, To be at home with God."

★ Word of the death of *Pfc. Elmer Dorn*, son of William H. Dorn, 410 Third Ave., during action on Anzio beach, Italy, was received in Bethlehem June 9th. The War Department message contained no details of the manner of his death but said he was buried with full military honors.

Death of Private Dorn brings the first Gold star to the service flag of West Side Moravian church. Memorial services were conducted June 25 by Rev. John Groenfeldt, pastor, at 7:45 o'clock. The young soldier entered the armed forces in March of 1942. He went overseas in August of 1943 and landed in North Africa, transferring later to Italy. He was a high honor graduate of Moravian College and had taught in the public schools and worked for the Bethlehem Steel.

* Through the International Red Cross word was received from the War Department that Lt. Anthony R. Carcione, U. S. Army Airforces, son of Mr. and Mrs. Basil Carcione, 1917 Huntington Ave., was killed in action over Germany March 8th. He was shot down near Dummer Lake protecting a bombing mission to Berlin. None of his flight returned, so too definite information has not been available. Letters from his commanding officer, regretting the lack of information, gave Tony tremendous praise for the wonderful work that he had been accomplishing. Although he had not been technically credited with his fifth plane, he was accredited an "Ace."

Lt. Carcione was a graduate of Liberty High School and Lehigh University and had trained in Texas. He was the first member of Trinity Episcopal Church to lose his life. A Memorial service was conducted in that church on Sunday afternoon, May 14th, the Rev. Merrill M. Moore, rector, in charge.

★ College Hill Moravian church mourns the death of *Lieut. William Shimer Thompson*, killed in action on the Cassino front. News of his death was received May 20 in a War Department telegram to his father, William J. Thompson, 1116 Main Street. The lieutenant was a graduate of Liberty Hi and Moravian College, where he received his B. S. in 1937.


For Parents and Friends of Those in Service

LETTERS FROM OUR SERVICEMEN AND WOMEN

 \star Pvt. John Ulrich, in a letter from Communication school at Ft. Benning, Ga., where he took basic and a 12-week course in radio, writes: "My first day in code-room I spotted a familiar face among the cadre. It was "Watts" Clark, former basketball player at Bethlehem High and guitar player for Bud Rader's band. He is now assistant instructor at the school.

"I have encountered two college classmates also teaching at the school. Bob Fissel is quartered in the next barracks to mine and is attending Enlisted Motor Maintenance school. We are quartered in Main Post right in the middle of the old Army's stamping ground. The barracks are red brick.... Nothing like the wooden barracks, tents or log cabins on the training grounds. The parachute school is nearby as well as Lawson Field, an Airforce training center.

"I suppose there are Bethlehem boys in or near the Fort; I believe another came in with a new group last week but I can't recall his name off-hand." \bigstar As nice a letter as we have received in a coon's age comes under date of June 8th from *Pvt. Jeanne Kelly, WAC*, stationed at the Adjutant General's School, Ft. Washington, Md. Pvt. Kelly has a husband in the service, Air Cadet Harry Kelly, San Antonio, Texas. She is, also, sister of Dorothy Kunkle, also in the service.

After a complimentary introduction concerning Stars, Jeanne writes: "I work in the signal center here on the post and find Army life quite agreeable in spite of the irregular hours we work here in the telegraph office. In my spare time I work at the post theatre as cashier and sometimes as assistant manager. The extra cash is well used on small items such as cigarettes, laundry, toilet articles. Perhaps I should be a bit stronger in my opinion of Army life. They tell us every letter we write is potential recruiter. In that case, I recommend the service strongly. I feel I should have missed out on a big thing if I hadn't enlisted. And I certainly

wish I could impress that enough on the feminine sex. It's a good life good food, good discipline, training, etc."

* Postmarked June 11 came a letter from S/Sgt. Fred Reichard, New York APO, who wrote June 9th: "Yesterday I received the Spring issue of Stars. . . . One article in particular interested me. It was about Sgt. John Paul of 4th and New Sts. I know of a Sgt. Paul who is engaged in the same kind of work mentioned in the article. Though I have never seen him, I have talked to him over the 'phone. Whether or not he is the same Sgt. Paul I don't know, but I'm going to ask him. As they say in the army, I'm still 'sweating out' meeting someone from Bethlehem. . . . Not much else to write about but I would appreciate very much if you would write HELLO for me to all my buddies wherever they may be. Wish them lots of luck, health and good hunting for me." We take pleasure in passing on Fred's message to all Star's readers, at home and abroad.

HERO OF THE MAILS



★ This is Lieut. Donald F. Fry, about whose determined efforts to see that the men of his division, bogged down and dismal amid New Guinea's tropic rains, got their mail the "Cockatoo" tells.

★ From New Guinea our faithful correspondent, Tommy Wehr, has forwarded an interesting copy of the 6th Infantry Battalion's daily mimeographed newpaper, the "Cockatoo." In itself an interesting revelation of how Uncle Sam's nephew's carry on the daily familiar things of home life in such outlandish places as New Guinea, the paper is doubly welcome because it devotes a feature column to an exploit performed by a Bethlehem man, Lieut. Donald F. Fry. Before we go into that, however, a little description of the Cockatoo:—

Our portion of the paper is of the Wednesday, May 3 number, the "four score edition." It boasts "World Wide Coverage of the 6th Signal Radio News Service." Also "Never Dull, Never a Lull," and "Our Subscribers Are the Best in the World." Lieut. Fry, postal officer of the division, described by Cockatoo as "a bouncy, beefy, hardened lieutenant, former teacher of Bethlehem, Pa.", came to the rescue of his comrades in a singular way.

To quote: "The morale of the men of the 6th was low. No mail for days, no communication with the outside world . . . and there seemed no reprieve from the continuuous deluge. Roads were impassable, bridges out and terrific gales whipped the sea. It was, indeed, a dark moment in the lives of all of us

"But there is always a man who rises to the occasion, who will volunteer to carry the message to Garcia, come hell or high water (and high water it was!).

"Muttering the postman's creed to himself, our postal officer Fry, strictly a landlubber, volunteered to make the treacherous voyage to the base postoffice in the army launch through the churning sea. His face was grim, his purpose resolute as he heaved his solid frame into the launch, which floundered about in the high waves.

"Thus started a voyage which shades any of Conrad's tall stories of storms at sea . . . When he virtually crawled off the launch at his destination, his face was drawn and haggard. To add to his despair, only sacks of fourth class mail were in the division pouch. The discouraged lieutenant wearily boarded the launch and suffered the tortures of the damned on the return voyage.

"After a night of nightmares the lieutenant made a remarkable recovery and refreshed, and more determined than ever, set forth for base with a cargo of out-going mail. He weathered an equally hazardous trip like an old salt . . . Again he met with disappointment—

"Dejected but true to his trust, he trudged his way to the Red Cross building to telephone the sad news to division headquarters. As he plodped along, as only he can plod along, he attempted to walk a plank over a gully, which before the rain had been breached by a small foot bridge. And walk the plank he did! The plank creaked under his weight and the lieutenant, sensing danger, attempted to scurry to the good earth.

"Instead, he toppled into six feet of water and submerged. For a few seconds his poncho and bubbles were the only things visible. He fought his way to the surface but the poncho stifled him. Four soldiers dragged him to safety.

"Today our postal officer is his same beaming, bouncing self, and although he lost all the personal accessories that a lieutenant usually carries about, Lieutenant Fry has gained even more respect among the officers and men of the 6th Division of Infantry."

Orchids, we say, to the lieutenant, and to Cuckatoo—and to the chap who wrote so vividly and well of his misadventures.


