## Lt. Olive Mills Commands V-Contingent

ALLIED FORCE HEADQUAR-TERS, Caserta, Italy — Within the shadow of the Royal Palace where the German delegates had signed the unconditional surrender treaty, which meant the end of the war in Italy, thousands of Allied troops, men and women, stood in a thanksgiving ceremony in recognition of the end of the war in Europe.

Flanked on one side by the soldiers of the U.S. Army and on the other by a platoon of sallors of the United States Navy, a contingent of WACS represented the women soldiers of APHQ. This theatre was
