

The tale is this:

Now and again a shaft of light struck across the pavement as some worshipper entered, opening the door to step into the candle-lit brightness.

"Here," he said, darting to her side, "I was going to eat this, but you may have it." And he thrust into her hand a round, red, shiny apple. Then he opened the door and disappeared into the church.

The child put the apple to her lips to bite it, but as she did so, the church door opened. From within floated the strains of childrens' voices singing, clear and sweet, a Christmas carol.

She looked again at the apple and then, with great courage, slipped through the door into the church. The bright lights dazzled her eyes, the swelling music of the organ seemed to surround and enclose her, the throngs of people, intent on their prayers, frightened her; but withal there was a great joy in her heart.

The Babe in his Mother's arms smiled down upon her.

When the gifts of the people were gathered, two thin hands placed reverently upon the plate a shiny, red apple.

Trembling, the little girl watched as the apple was borne toward the altar. Trembling, she saw it lifted high, shining in splendid beauty, above all the other gifts, toward the Christ Child.

LAST TAPS

★ Sgt. Roland Lynn, son of Mr. and Mrs. Roland T. Lynn, Sr., 284 West Fairview Street, laid down his life for his country in Italy on October 13. He was killed in action against the enemy a telegram from the War Department to his parents stated. Sgt. Lynn was a member of College Hill Moravian church.

★ Rev. Milton A. Yaeck conducted Memorial services in College Hill church for Pvt. John F. Burcaw, Jr., killed September 16 while participating in action in France. Members of Johnson Post, American Legion, attended. He was the son of Caroline and the late John F. Burcaw. His mother resides at 131 West Fairview Street.

★ Services were held in memoriam to Clare VanBilliard, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles VanBilliard, 213 Spring Street, in Nativity Episcopal church, Very Rev. Roscoe T. Foust, rector, and Rev. W. Robert Webb, associate rector, officiating. VanBilliard was killed in action in France.

★ A memorial service for the late Pvt. Fred Shuster, killed in France in August, was held in St. George's Episcopal Chapel, Hellertown.

★ A memorial service for Captain Jack Herstine was held in Grace Lutheran church October 8. Jack was killed in China where he had been training a Chinese regiment. In one of his last letters he told of fighting cn 11,000 foot high mountains in sleet and snow and of being reduced to eating mule and dog meat when supplies failed to arrive.

Captain Herstine is the first member of Grace Lutheran to be killed in action, although two others, S/Sgt. Raymond Sell and Pvt. Charles Seifert, have been reported missing. Paul Buchold, Bkr. 1/c, assisted the pastor, Dr. J. Howard Worth, in performing the service. Members of Harry F. W. Johnson Post, American Legion, attended in a body.

Greetings from Our Pastors.

* On Sunday, November 26, the memory of M/Sgt. Daniel L. Mengel was honored at special services in Pro-Cathedral Church of The Nativity in charge of the Very Rev. Roscoe T. Foust, dean and rector. Sgt. Mengel was killed in action September 23 in China. He was a member of a transport plane crew and had been awarded the Air Medal. the Purple Heart and the Citation of Honor. His death occurred when his plane crashed into a mountain while on combat mission. Surviving him are his wife, the former Muriel Boresch, and an infant son, Edward, whom he had never seen.

★ On November 27 a telegram from the War Department informed Mrs. George P. L. Rowe, this city, of the death in action on the Italian front of her husband, Pfc. G. P. L. Rowe on November 4. Private Rowe was a member of Grace Lutheran Church and affiliated with Harry F. W. Johnson Post, American Legion. He had been employed by Bethlehem Steel Company. Survivors include, besides his wife and daughter, Lucille, his mother, Mrs. George Younger, West Raspberry Street.




