As the months passed and American Forces began a more active participation, the casualties from the foreign theaters of operations began to mount. Each new drive was followed by the telegrams which every home had learned to dread, TERSE TELEGRAMS

TERSE TELEGRAMS

The War Department regrets to inform you: "Your son died in a Jap prison camp," "Your son died in North Africa," "Your son died from wounds sustained in Italy," "Your husband failed to return from a mission over Germany," "Your brother died at sea." So many different things they said and yet they all said the same.

July and the latter part of June hit an all time high for these telegrams. It was through this period that the first reports of D-Day and the days which immediately followed June 6, came pouring in.

June 6, came pouring in.

It was then as always; approximately two weeks after a major operation in any of the theaters of war the lists of dead, wounded and missing were sent back to be reported.

Sometimes these first telegrams were proven wrong. Men, who for some reason or other had been sep-

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some reason or other had been separated from their outfits for a time, had been reported missing; later they were found to be safe.

Maj. Ralph Chelli, who was first reported missing and then on August 18, 1943, was reported killed was later found to be a prisoner of the Japs. His wife, the former Geraldine Reilly, never lost hope when those first telegrams came, she was so sure he was alive.

Capt. Michael F. Hochella spent several days in enemy territory after his plane was shot down in the Pacific area. His family spent some anxious days and then the latter part of July he was able to come

Pacific area. His family spent some anxious days and then the latter part of July he was able to come back to Bethlehem for a furlough. Another local soldier, Lieut. Col. Robert P. Montgomery, was first reported missing and later in July of this year was able to spend a month's leave with his parents. There were other instances—good telegrams following bad—bad following good—the telegrams which spell WAR.

One half of the war is over; the honored dead are recorded by gold stars in home windows, opposite names on honor rolls, in churches, schools, factories, wherever any group has claimed honor for those who have come from their midst who have come from their midst into the Armed Forces of their coun-

into the Armed Forces of their country. They are recorded forever in the hearts of the families and friends of these men.

Today is a day of gladness; it is also a day of sadness to those whose loved ones will never return. We think of these in our observance of the day; we also think of those who are still dying that we might live. It is becoming that we observe this day with dignity and honor that it deserves.
