THREE BROTHERS SERVE IN UNCLE SAM'S ARMY

One Now Is in England, One
in California, One in
Mississippi.

Uncle Sam's strong right arm, wherewith he is dealing vengeance to the aggressor nations, is strengthened these days by the might of three Bethlehem brothers (and a fourth may soon join the trio to make a quartet), sons of Joseph and Victoria Morris, 420 Lehigh Avenue.

Longest in the service is Henry, 21 years old, who is in California. Eldest of the three is Edward, 25, a corporal, who is soon to be made a flight sergeant in the Air Corps and who is stationed at Gulfport, Miss. The third brother, Joseph, 21, is the most recent to enter the service. He was inducted three months ago and is now in England with an infantry unit, having arrived there three weeks ago.

Henry Morris is a private first class and enlisted in the regular army four years ago. His first three year hitch was up just before Pearl Harbor, and he was enroute home when the Jap blow was struck. Government orders halted him in California and he is now an instructor in machine gun practice at San Luis Obispo with an infantry company. He is a graduate of Bethlehem High School.

Edward, who worked at the Bethlehem Steel Company plant before being inducted eight months ago, has just taken up new duties at Gulfport with a training squadron. He attended Bethlehem schools.

Joseph served at Fort George G. Meade, Md., from the time of his induction until his transfer to England. He, too, attended the Bethlehem schools.

Fourth brother is Michael, 34, who expects to take his physical examination this coming Saturday. He is employed by the Superior Metal Company.
