Belford Miller War Casualty In Belgium

A telegram received yesterday by Mrs. Belford Miller revealed that her husband, Pvt. Belford Miller, was killed in action in Belgium Jan. 4.

The War Department telegram was the first indication the family had that Pvt. Miller had left England where he recently had been stationed. A letter from him Dec. 31 and a picture received the day before his death revealed no word that he had been transferred to the fighting front.

A member of a glider infantry unit he had been overseas since July of this year. Prior to his induction, Jan. 19, 1944, he was employed at Roller-Smith where he was known to his fellow workers as "Wimpy." He received his basic training at Camp Blanding, Fla., after which he was sent to Fort George G. Meade, Md.

Pvt. Miller is survived by his wife, the former Dorothy Gulya, daughter of Alderman and Mrs. Andrew F. Gulya, 1713 East Fourth Street; a fourteen-months-old daughter, Sandra Jean; his mother, Mrs. William Miller, and a sister, Mrs. Richard Hoffman, both of 529 Spring Street, and a brother, T.-5 J. V. Gruver, a member of an infantry unit somewhere in Germany.

Pvt. Miller was born in Bethlehem and attended Bethlehem schools. He was a member of Calvary Baptist Church.
