Some neighbors are not armless

During the regular City Council meeting March 15, local business owner Joe Pearl asked council members for help, since he is having difficulty with his neighbors. Except his neighbors are several nonvenomous snakes and mice housed in the basement of the house between the two buildings he owns with business partner William Eaton.

Pearl said he and Eaton have spent \$1.5 million to renovate the old Martin Furniture building and another building that used to house a yogurt shop.

The snakes are a project of resident Gary Heckenberger. According to Pearl, the stench coming from the basement where the animals

Homicide charged in toddler's death

According to Kanah Dew's obituary, her "infectious smile" lit up everyone. But at just 17 months of age, her life was snuffed out.

On Feb. 24, 2015, she was rushed from a trailer at the Mountainview Mobile Home Court in Lehigh Township to Palmerton Hospital. But by the time she arrived, she was unresponsive and had no pulse. She was pronounced dead at 8:29 p.m.

Carbon County's Coroner later determined that she was the victim of a homicide. Over a year later, homicide charges have been filed against Bangor resident Gary Foley, 32, who was watching the baby while her mother worked. The See **COUNTY** on Page A2

SOUTH BETHLEHEM
Car park has both support, critics

Members of the City Council Finance Committee heard from residents and from the Parking Authority regarding financial projections and bond issue for the city's parking garages, both current and planned.

Committee chair Bryan Callahan and council members Adam Waldron and Shawn Martell were joined by council member Michael Colon and Council President J. William Reynolds.

Callahan explained that the meeting was for information only and said a public meeting with the Parking Authority would be scheduled before the council votes on a proposed new parking deck at Third and New streets for first reading on April 19. Second

reading for the proposal will be held May 3.

Resident Peter Crownfield said the proposed parking deck would be a "completely inappropriate use of this much taxpayer money." He said a traffic impact study already showed a problem on the Southside and "adding to it will not help." Crownfield said the proposed building and parking deck are "ridiculously unplanned development."

Lehigh University Professor Al Wurth said building a parking garage with city funds was not financially efficient. "If you want to subsidize, just subsidize. You could just hand money out," he said.

Jane George, St. Luke's University Health Network vice president of government relations, said St. Luke's would potentially

occupy about 21,000 square feet of space for outpatient rehabilitation in the proposed building. The parking garage would be very important for patients undergoing physical rehabilitation, some of them seniors and many with limited mobility, she said.

Adrienne Washington, assistant vice president of community and regional affairs at Lehigh University, said the University is "committed to development of South Bethlehem."

She said the proposed building at Third and New would house about 130 Lehigh University employees. The university's Advancement office also plans to bring additional people into South Bethlehem, moving about 30 employees into the Flatiron Building. "It is our goal to sup-

mother, Heather Surget, 28, of Great Meadows, N.J., has been charged with child endangerment.

Both Foley and Surget have been preliminarily arraigned and are incarcerated at Northampton County jail. Surget's bail has been set at \$100,000, with no 10 percent option. Because Foley is facing homicide charges, he is incarcerated without bail.

Lehigh Township police first became aware of this matter when Foley called 911 on Feb. 24 to report "something wrong with my baby." He told a dispatcher that Kannah was not breathing and that a funny substance was coming out of her nose.

While Northern Valley Ambulance rushed Kannah to the hospital, police began to question

Foley, who told them he had known Surget for little more than a week and had moved in with her. While she was working, he was babysitting Kannah and her two other children, ages 4 and 2 months, as well as his own 4-year-old son. He told police he had been feeding hot dogs to the children. He had placed Kannah on the floor to change her diaper when she began to choke and a dark substance started coming from her mouth and nose.

In addition to taking Foley's statement, police noticed that the conditions of the home were "deplorable." Dirty dishes littered the table and countertop, with garbage piled up and bugs crawling on the table and countertop. There was no running water and the pipes had frozen. Despite an outside temperature of just 21 degrees, there was no heat other than some

space heaters.

Kannah's mother told police she had met Foley online about a week before this incident, and that when she left for work that day, the children seemed normal.

The autopsy revealed that Kannah had died as a result of blunt force trauma to the head, resulting in a fractured skull.

In addition to seeking toxicology reports, Lehigh Township police and Northampton County Detective Paul Romanic forwarded the autopsy results for review by an expert, who determined that the blunt force trauma was not an old injury, but recently inflicted.

Because Foley is accused of killing someone under 12 years of age, he could face the death penalty. District Attorney John Morganelli, however, has cautioned that his office is still investigating and will make

that determination later.

The child endangerment charge against Surget is a third degree felony carrying a maximum sentence of seven years and a \$15,000 fine.

Lehigh Township Police Chief Scott Fogel indicated that the other children were removed by Northampton County Children and Youth, adding that there are indications of abuse of them as well.

Morganelli called this "a very serious case and another example of individuals who have absolutely no responsibility with respect to taking care of numerous children, endangering their welfare, and in this case, the life of one of them." He acknowledged he is relying on circumstantial evidence, although various people have been questioned.

"What we do know is that Foley is lying to us," he concluded.

George's Light Lunch, a steak and sub shop, in one of the buildings.

After Pearl complained to the health bureau in August, inspectors were sent out, but nothing was done, he said.

In January, another inspector was sent out,

and Heckenberger was given 60 days to find a new home for the animals.

Karner said, "We certainly don't want to see snakes and other animals disrupt what could be a number of viable businesses in the downtown."

Pearl told council members, "If people move out of these apartments and don't come to my businesses, I'm going to lose all these rents. Then, every dime I put in over on the Southside is going to be useless."

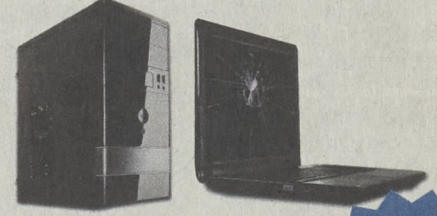

Norco confirms new elections commission

Northampton County's Home Rule Charter has established an Elections Commission, a five-member volunteer board that oversees elections, including the ballot. Members are first selected by the two parties receiving the most votes in the most recent election. Names are forwarded to the executive, who then passes them on to council for confirmation. They serve for two years. No more than three members may belong to the same party. Historically, whichever

party is in power gets the three-person majority.

Election commissioners are barred from holding any other public office. But that charter provision was determined to be unconstitutional by Judge Leonard Zito when he served as council's solicitor.

Based on the request of both major parties, Executive John Brown submitted five names for appointment (or re-appointment) by county council at the March 17 meeting.

Three Republicans: Judith Ladonis (Hanover), Mary K. Diggs

(Bethlehem) and Joshua Weinstein (Forks), and two Democrats: Marques Grundy (Easton) and George Treisner (Bethlehem) were unanimously confirmed as elections commissioners.

Joan Rosenthal, a feisty Hanover Township Republican known for her dry humor, had chaired the elections commission and has been a member since at least 2006. But she decided she's it's time to step down. Democrat Ken Kraft, who served with her before joining county council, thanked her for her years of service.

BETHLEHEM AREA SD District saves on energy expenses

Mark Stein and Sean McKenna, who are a part of the facilities management and operations for the Bethlehem Area School District, gave an energy update to the school board March 7 at the facilities committee meeting.

Facilities management presented the mid-year operation review to the board, which consisted of budget updates regarding the electricity and natural gas

for the BASD. As far as the electricity goes, an agreement was extended from June 2017 to June 2019. At this rate, there will be a savings of \$0.01385/kWH, which is a total of \$277,000 in savings. BASD will not see that return until June of 2017.

"Because rates are so low, there is a lot more upward risk than downward risk," said chief facilities and operations officer Stein. Because of the low rate, the BASD is looking to lock it in for a third year.

As far as the natural gas goes, BASD has extended the current agreement due to end this December through December of 2017. The

school district will save roughly \$60,000 starting in June of this year.

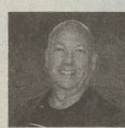

the electrical and natural gas consumption from 2006-16. Stein and McKenna graphed their data on a chart that is measured over a six-year average. Due to the mild winter, energy consumption is well below the six-year average for both electrical and natural gas.

There have been budget impacts as a result of the energy consumption thus far. Specifically, the electricity budget is \$2 million for BASD. The anticipated total cost is roughly \$1,968,929, which would result in a savings of \$31,071 for the district. In natural gas, the budget is \$850,000.

The anticipated cost for natural gas is significantly less than the budget itself. It is estimated to cost \$595,992, which would save the district \$254,008.

Within the operations efforts, McKenna has been tracking the use of electricity on a weekly basis and showed he cut down the use of electricity in the school buildings when they were not operating during school hours. He compared November of 2014 to November of 2015. McKenna found they were able to reduce the use of about 400 kilowatts per day during that month compared to the previous year.

"This was due to schedule changing," he said. By lowering the temperatures in the buildings when the school day is over,

the district could save significant money. There are exceptions, though, such as after-school events in the buildings which would obviously require heating to remain on.

The goal is to continue driving down prices and reinvest the savings. School board vice president Shannon Patrick spoke briefly at the end of the presentation to congratulate McKenna on the work he had done. She had expressed her skepticism in the beginning, when the idea to create a specific position for monitoring this data was proposed, but she now agreed with bringing him on board. Patrick finished up by saying, "Thank you."

District, NCC expand partnership

The Bethlehem Area School Board's Finance Committee heard presentations from Northampton Community College and the Bethlehem Area Vocational-Technical School (BAVTS) at the meeting March 14.

In addition, the Finance Committee discussed tax payments for the 2016-17 school year, a lease of farmland owned by the school district, and appointing Gorman & Associates as local auditor. The committee also discussed the 2016 bond issue parameters.

Dr. Mark Erickson, president of Northampton Community College, spoke about the college's strategic priorities, student outreach, completion agenda, diversity and global engagement, community engagement, and technology leadership.

Erickson also said the college has a dual enrollment program with Bethlehem schools, allowing

students to take college courses for credit while still in high school. He also said the college is waiving fees for dual enrollment classes. Instead of the usual \$139 in tuition and fees per credit, dual enrollment tuition will be only be \$97 per credit, a \$42 savings.

The college will also be offering an associate degree in global studies and a study abroad program in China and India, Erickson said. To prepare students for the global business environment, the college is offering classes in Intermediate Mandarin and Introduction to Arabic. Other courses offered to prepare students for in-demand careers include applied psychology, public health, and computer forensics.

Currently there are 313 students originally from the Bethlehem Area School District in Northampton's honors program, Erickson said. "We appreciate your partnership," he said.

Board member Tom Tomasik asked Erickson

what is the biggest gap he sees in students entering the college. Erickson said the gap is greatest in math readiness, but professors are working with school district faculty to prepare students for college-level math. "I think we're making progress," Erickson said.

Adam Lazarchak, executive director of Bethlehem Area Vocational Technical School, presented the school's 2016-17 budget proposal to the finance committee. To prepare students for in-demand careers, BAVTS will offer two new programs in athletic training and physical therapy fundamentals. This will require additional facilities, staff and equipment, he said.

Students are assessed using NOCTI and Skills USA, which are industry certifications similar to academic assessments like Keystone exams, Lazarchak said. He told committee members the BAVTS expenditure

budget increase for 2016-17 will be \$233,129 or 2.10 percent. The school's total budget will be \$11,413,426 and the increased cost to member districts will be \$144,389 or 1.56 percent.

The finance committee also discussed the lease of land on the corner of Freemansburg Avenue and Farmersville Road in Bethlehem Township to Dale and Gloria Koehler from March 22 through Dec. 31, at a rental payment of \$2,400, which pays for the taxes on the property.

The Finance Committee also discussed 2016 bond issue param-

eters with Scott Shearer of Public Financial Management. Shearer said the financing plan for the Nitschmann MS project should be done as two separate borrowings. The first borrowing is planned for the summer of 2016 to finance the Nitschmann project and various other capital projects. The payments will be structured to wrap around debt to lessen the budget impact of the Nitschmann project bond until 2020, until BethWorks TIF expires. After that, overall debt will increase and be funded by additional tax revenues. The parameters were scheduled to be on the board's agenda at the March 21 meeting.

Hit-run trial set for May 2

Hanover Township resident Royce Atkins, 22, was arraigned March 17 on criminal charges filed as a result of a Nov. 6, 2015, hit-and-run accident that left a 9-year-old boy dead.

Darius Condash, along with a 14-year-old cousin and 15-year-old friend, had just left a WaWa store on Schoenersville Road, Hanover Township, at about 6:30 p.m. The store is located about a quarter mile from Condash's home, which was in Hanover Township, Lehigh County.

As he was crossing the street, Condash stepped back to pick up a piece of candy dropped on the road, and was struck and killed by Atkins' blue Mazda. Atkins left the scene without stopping, but admitted his involvement to police Detective Gary Hammer three days later.

Following a preliminary hearing Jan. 15, Magisterial District Judge James Narlesky found sufficient evidence to send the case to county court.

Atkins faces charges of careless driving, a summary offense, and the more serious charge of failing to stop at an accident involving death or serious bodily injury. That is a second degree felony with a mandatory minimum sentence of three years in prison and a mandatory minimum fine of \$2,500.

At his preliminary hearing, Atkins faced the wrath of Darius Condash's family, but they were absent at the arraignment. His lawyer, Jack McMahon, who was unavoidably detained, was also absent.

Standing with his father at his side in a suit and tie, Atkins quietly answered Senior Judge Leonard Zito's questions.

He remains free on 10 percent of \$50,000 bail.

Zito has tentatively scheduled a trial for May 2.

Darius Condash was in the fourth grade at Sheckler ES in Catasauqua.

Time Running Out to Claim \$950 Million in Refunds for 2012 Tax Returns

IRS Special Edition Tax Tip

If you did not file a tax return for 2012, you may be one of nearly one million taxpayers who may be due a refund from that year. If you are, you must claim your share of almost \$950 million by April 18. To claim your refund, you must file a 2012 federal income tax return. Here are the facts you need to know about unclaimed refunds:

- The unclaimed refunds apply to people who did not file a federal income tax return for 2012. The IRS estimates that half the potential refunds are more than \$718.
- Some people, such as students and part-time workers, may not have filed because they had too little income to require filing a tax return. They may have a refund waiting if they had taxes withheld from their wages or made quarterly estimated payments. A refund could also apply if they qualify for certain tax credits, such as the Earned Income Tax Credit.
- If you didn't file a 2012 return, the law generally provides a three-year window to claim a refund from that year. For 2012 returns, the window closes on April 18, 2016 (or April 19 for taxpayers in Maine and Massachusetts).
- The law requires that you properly address, mail and postmark your tax return by that date to claim your refund.
- If you don't file a claim for a refund within three years, the money becomes the property of the U.S. Treasury. There is no penalty for filing a late return if you are due a refund.
- The IRS may hold your 2012 refund if you have not filed tax returns for 2013 and 2014. The U.S. Treasury will apply the refund to any federal or state tax you owe. It also may use your refund to offset unpaid child support or past due federal debts, such as student loans.
- If you're missing Forms W-2, 1098, 1099 or 5498 for prior years, you should ask for copies from your employer, bank or other payer. If you can't get copies, get a free transcript by mail that provides the information you need by going to IRS.gov. You can also file Form 4506-T to get a transcript. Order your transcript early. Transcripts arrive in five to 10 calendar days at the address we have on file for you.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF PENNSYLVANIA

The following are true and correct copies of joint resolutions of the General Assembly of Pennsylvania proposing two amendments to the Constitution of Pennsylvania. Consistent with the procedures prescribed by Article XI, Section 1 of the Constitution, the General Assembly first proposed the amendments during the 2013 session and approved them for a second time during the 2015 session of the legislature. As required by Article XI, Section 1 of the Constitution and statutory law, the Secretary of the Commonwealth has caused the proposed amendments to be published here.

Pursuant to law, the Secretary of the Commonwealth will submit the proposed amendments to the electors of Pennsylvania in the form of two ballot questions at the General Primary to be held on April 26, 2016. If a ballot question is approved by a majority of electors voting on it, the corresponding amendment becomes part of the Constitution.

Those parts of the joint resolutions that appear in **bold print** are the words of the Constitution that are proposed by the General Assembly for addition or deletion. If an amendment were approved, the words **underlined** would be added to the Constitution and the words in brackets (e.g., [Constitution]) would be deleted. The unbolded words would remain unchanged in the Constitution.

Following the proposed amendments is the text of the questions that will be placed on the ballot. Below each question is a "Plain English Statement" prepared by the Office of Attorney General, and published as required by law, indicating the purpose, limitations and effects of the ballot question upon the people of this Commonwealth.

JOINT RESOLUTION 2015-1

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, further providing for compensation and retirement of justices, judges and justices of the peace.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby resolves as follows:

Section 1. The following amendment to the Constitution of Pennsylvania is proposed in accordance with Article XI:

That section 16(b) of Article V be amended to read:

§ 16. Compensation and retirement of justices, judges and justices of the peace.

(b) Justices, judges and justices of the peace shall be retired on the last day of the calendar year in which they attain the age of [70] **75** years. Former and retired justices, judges and justices of the peace shall receive such compensation as shall be provided by law. Except as provided by law, no salary, retirement benefit or other compensation, present or deferred, shall be paid to any justice, judge or justice of the peace who, under section 18 or under Article VI, is suspended, removed or barred from holding judicial office for conviction of a felony or misconduct in office or conduct which prejudices the proper administration of justice or brings the judicial office into disrepute.

Section 2. (a) Upon the first passage by the General Assembly of this proposed constitutional amendment, the Secretary of the Commonwealth shall proceed immediately to comply with the advertising requirements of section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and shall transmit the required advertisements to two newspapers in every county in which such newspapers are published in sufficient time after passage of this proposed constitutional amendment.

(b) Upon the second passage by the General Assembly of this proposed constitutional amendment, the Secretary of the Commonwealth shall proceed immediately to comply with the advertising requirements of section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and shall transmit the required advertisements to two newspapers in every county in which such newspapers are published in sufficient time after passage of this proposed constitutional amendment. The Secretary of the Commonwealth shall submit this proposed constitutional amendment to the qualified electors of this Commonwealth at the first primary, general or municipal election which meets the requirements of and is in conformance with section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and which occurs at least three months after the proposed constitutional amendment is passed by the General Assembly.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT 1 AMENDING THE MANDATORY JUDICIAL RETIREMENT AGE

Ballot Question

Shall the Pennsylvania Constitution be amended to require that justices of the Supreme Court, judges and justices of the peace (known as magisterial district judges) be retired on the last day of the calendar year in which they attain the age of 75 years, instead of the current requirement that they be retired on the last day of the calendar year in which they attain the age of 70?

Plain English Statement of the Office of Attorney General

The purpose of the ballot question is to amend the Pennsylvania Constitution to require that justices, judges and justices of the peace (known as magisterial district judges) be retired on the last day of the calendar year in which they attain the age of 75 years.

Presently, the Pennsylvania Constitution provides that justices, judges and justices of the peace be retired on the last day of the calendar year in which they attain the age of 70 years. Justices of the peace are currently referred to as magisterial district judges.

If the ballot question were to be approved, justices, judges and magisterial district judges would be retired on the last day of the calendar year in which they attain the age of 75 years rather than the last day of the calendar year in which they attain the age of 70 years.

This amendment to the mandatory retirement age would be applicable to all judges and justices in the Commonwealth, including the justices of the Pennsylvania Supreme Court, judges of the Commonwealth Court, Superior Court, county courts of common pleas, community courts, municipal courts in the City of Philadelphia, and magisterial district judges.

The ballot question is limited in that it would not amend any other provisions of the Pennsylvania Constitution related to the qualification, election, tenure, or compensation of the justices, judges or magisterial district judges.

The effect of the ballot question would be to allow all justices, judges, and magisterial district judges to remain in office until the last day of the calendar year in which they attain the age of 75 years. This would permit all justices, judges, and magisterial district judges to serve an additional five years beyond the current required retirement age.

JOINT RESOLUTION 2015-2

Proposing integrated amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, eliminating the Traffic Court of Philadelphia.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby resolves as follows:

Section 1. The following integrated amendments to the Constitution of Pennsylvania are proposed in accordance with Article XI:

(1) That section 1 of Article V be amended to read:

§ 1. Unified judicial system.

The judicial power of the Commonwealth shall be vested in a unified judicial system consisting of the Supreme Court, the Superior Court, the Commonwealth Court, courts of common pleas, community courts, municipal [**and traffic**] courts in the City of Philadelphia, such other courts as may be provided by law and justices of the peace. All courts and justices of the peace and their jurisdiction shall be in this unified judicial system.

(2) That the heading and subsection (c) of section 6 of Article V be amended to read:

§ 6. Community courts; Philadelphia Municipal Court [**and Traffic Court**].

(c) In the City of Philadelphia there shall be a municipal court [**and a traffic court**]. The number of judges and the jurisdiction [**of each**] shall be as provided by law. [**These courts**] **This court** shall exist so long as a community court has not been established or in the event one has been discontinued under this section.

(3) That subsection (d) of section 10 of Article V be amended to read:

§ 10. Judicial administration.

(d) The Chief Justice and president judges of all courts with seven or less judges shall be the justice or judge longest in continuous service on their respective courts; and in the event of his resignation from this position the justice or judge next longest in continuous service shall be the Chief Justice or president judge. The president judges of all other courts shall be selected for five-year terms by the members of their respective courts[, **except that the president judge of the traffic court in the City of Philadelphia shall be appointed by the Governor**]. A Chief Justice or president judge may resign such position and remain a member of the court. In the event of a tie vote for office of president judge in a court which elects its president judge, the Supreme Court shall appoint as president judge one of the judges receiving the highest number of votes.

(4) That subsection (b) of section 12 of Article V be amended to read:

§ 12. Qualifications of justices, judges and justices of the peace.

(b) [**Judges of the traffic court in the City of Philadelphia and justices**] **Justices** of the peace shall be members of the bar of the Supreme Court or shall complete a course of training and instruction in the duties of their respective offices and pass an examination prior to assuming office. Such courses and examinations shall be as provided by law.

(5) That subsection (a) of section 15 of Article V be amended to read:

§ 15. Tenure of justices, judges and justices of the peace.

(a) The regular term of office of justices and judges shall be ten years and the regular term of office for judges of the municipal court [**and traffic court**] in the City of Philadelphia and of justices of the peace shall be six years. The tenure of any justice or judge shall not be affected by changes in judicial districts or by reduction in the number of judges.

Section 2. (a) Upon the first passage by the General Assembly of these proposed constitutional amendments, the Secretary of the Commonwealth shall proceed immediately to comply with the advertising requirements of section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and shall transmit the required advertisements to two newspapers in every county in which such newspapers are published in sufficient time after passage of these proposed constitutional amendments.

(b) Upon the second passage by the General Assembly of these proposed constitutional amendments, the Secretary of the Commonwealth shall proceed immediately to comply with the advertising requirements of section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and shall transmit the required advertisements to two newspapers in every county in which such newspapers are published in sufficient time after passage of these proposed constitutional amendments. The Secretary of the Commonwealth shall submit the proposed constitutional amendments under section 1 of this resolution to the qualified electors of this Commonwealth as a single ballot question at the first primary, general or municipal election which meets the requirements of and is in conformance with section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and which occurs at least three months after the proposed constitutional amendments are passed by the General Assembly.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT 2 ABOLITION OF THE PHILADELPHIA TRAFFIC COURT

Ballot Question

Shall the Pennsylvania Constitution be amended to abolish the Philadelphia Traffic Court?

Plain English Statement of the Office of Attorney General

The purpose of the ballot question is to amend the Pennsylvania Constitution to abolish the Traffic Court in the City of Philadelphia.

Presently, the Pennsylvania Constitution provides for the Traffic Court in the City of Philadelphia as part of the unified judicial system. If the ballot question were to be approved, the Traffic Court in the City of Philadelphia would be abolished by removing all references to the Traffic Court and the judges of the Traffic Court in the City of Philadelphia from the Pennsylvania Constitution.

Legislation enacted in 2013 transferred the functions performed by the Traffic Court to the Philadelphia Municipal Court. As a result, violations of the Vehicle Code previously adjudicated by the Traffic Court are presently being adjudicated by the Philadelphia Municipal Court. The proposed amendment would officially abolish the Traffic Court by removing all references to the Traffic Court and its judges from the Pennsylvania Constitution.

This ballot question is limited to whether the Traffic Court in the City of Philadelphia should be abolished. The ballot question would not amend any other provisions of the Pennsylvania Constitution beyond the removal of all references to the Traffic Court and its judges.

The effect of the ballot question would be to abolish the Traffic Court in the City of Philadelphia. As discussed above, legislation enacted in 2013 transferred the functions of the Traffic Court to the Philadelphia Municipal Court. This amendment would officially abolish the Traffic Court by removing all references to the Traffic Court and its judges from the Pennsylvania Constitution.



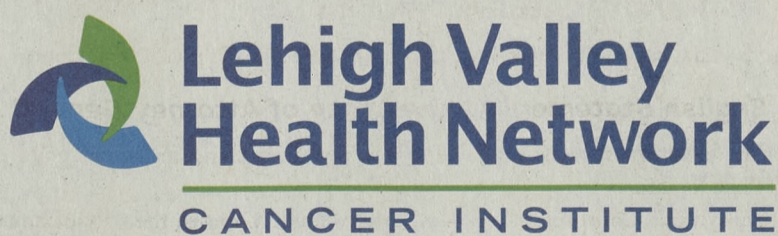

Becahi will travel to Northampton on Thursday, a game which is expected to be just as competitive.

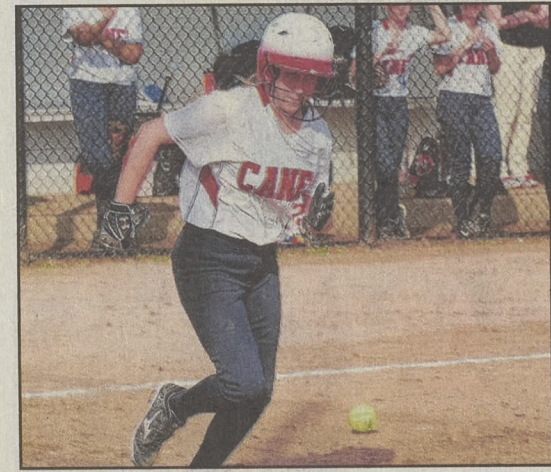
"They have two good pitchers, and they throw hard," Mazza said. "It should be a good game."

Esas partes de las resoluciones conjuntas que aparecerán en **negrita** son las palabras de la Constitución que se proponen por la Asamblea General para su adición o eliminación. Si se aprobara una enmienda, las palabras **subrayadas** se añaden a la Con-

stitución y las palabras entre corchetes (por ejemplo, [Constitución]) se suprimen. Las palabras que no estén en negrita se mantienen sin cambios en la Constitución.

Siguiendo a las enmiendas propuestas se encuentra el texto de las preguntas que se pondrán en la papeleta electoral. RESOLUCIÓN CONJUNTA 2015-1

Se propone una enmienda a la Constitución de Pennsylvania, que se conceda una indemnización y jubilación de los magistrados, jueces y jueces de paz de la Asamblea General.

La Asamblea General del Estado de Pennsylvania resuelve lo siguiente:

Sección 1. Se propone la siguiente enmienda a la Constitución de Pennsylvania, de conformidad con el artículo XI:

Que sección 16 (b) del Artículo V se modificará como sigue:

§ 16. Compensación y retiro de jueces, magistrados y jueces de paz

(b) Jueces, magistrados y jueces de paz serán retirados en el último día del año natural en que alcanzan la edad de [70] 75 años. Jueces jubilados y exjueces, magistrados y jueces de paz recibirán la compensación que dispone la ley. Salvo lo dispuesto por la ley, ningún salario, beneficios de jubilación u otra compensación, presente o diferida, se pagarán a cualquier juez o juez de paz que, en virtud de la sección 18 o bajo el Artículo VI, está suspendido, retirado o excluido de la celebración de un cargo judicial para la condena por un delito grave o mala conducta en la oficina o conducta que vaya en detrimento de la administración de la justicia o lleve la oficina judicial al desprestigio.

Sección 2. PROPUESTA DE ENMIENDA CONSTITUCIONAL 1

ENMIENDA A LA EDAD DE JUBILACIÓN JUDICIAL OBLIGATORIA

Pregunta en la papeleta

¿Deberá enmendarse la Constitución de Pennsylvania para requerir que los magistrados de la Corte Suprema, jueces y los jueces de paz (conocidos como jueces de distrito magistrales) se retiren en el último día del año que cumplen la edad de 75 años, en lugar del requisito actual de retirarse en el último día del año que cumplen la edad de 70 años?

Declaración en Inglés Simple de la Oficina del Procurador General.

El propósito de la pregunta de la papeleta es modificar la Constitución de Pennsylvania para exigir que los jueces, magistrados y jueces de paz (conocidos como jueces de distrito magistrales) se retiren en el último día del año natural en que alcanzan la edad de 75 años.

Actualmente, la Constitución de Pennsylvania dispone que los jueces, magistrados y jueces de paz se retiren en el último día del año natural en que alcanzan la edad de 70 años. Los jueces de paz se conocen actualmente en el distrito como jueces magistrales.

Si la pregunta de la papeleta se aprobara, los jueces, magistrados y jueces de distrito magisteriales se retirarán en el último día del año natural en que alcanzan la edad de 75 años en lugar que del último día del año natural en que alcanzan la edad de la enmienda 70 años.

Esta enmienda de la edad obligatoria de jubilación se aplicará a todos los jueces y magistrados en el Estado, incluyendo los jueces de la Corte Suprema de Pennsylvania, los jueces de la Corte del Estado de Pennsylvania, Tribunal Superior, las cortes de primera instancia de los condados, tribunales comunitarios, tribunales municipales en la ciudad de Philadelphia, y jueces magisteriales.

La pregunta, en la papeleta, está limitada para que no modifique otras disposiciones de la Constitución de Pennsylvania relacionadas con las aptitudes, elección, la titularidad, o la compensación de los magistrados, jueces o jueces magistrados de distrito.

RESOLUCIÓN CONJUNTA 2015-2

Se proponen enmiendas combinadas a la constitución del Estado de Pennsylvania, eliminando la corte de tránsito vehicular de Philadelphia.

La Asamblea General, del Estado de Pennsylvania, por la presente se resuelve de la siguiente manera:

Sección 1. Las siguientes enmiendas combinadas a la Constitución de Pennsylvania se proponen de conformidad con el artículo XI:

(1) Que la sección 1 del artículo V se modificará para que diga:

§ 1. Sistema judicial unificado.

El poder judicial del Estado corresponderá a un sistema judicial unificado que consiste en el Tribunal Supremo, el Tribunal del Estado, los tribunales de primera instancia, tribunales comunitarios, municipales y tribunales [de tránsito vehicular] para la ciudad de Philadelphia, los demás tribunales que se establezcan por la ley y los jueces de paz. (3) Que el inciso (d), de la sección 10, del artículo V, se modifica como sigue:

§ . 10. Administración Judicial

(d) El Presidente del Tribunal Supremo y presidente jueces de todos los tribunales con siete o menos jueces serán la justicia o juzgar más larga de servicio continuo en sus respectivos tribunales; y en el caso de su renuncia a este cargo la justicia o el juez el próximo más largo de servicio continuo será el Presidente del Tribunal Supremo o el juez presidente. Los jueces presidentes de todos los demás tribunales serán elegidos por un período de cinco años por los miembros de sus respectivos tribunales [salvo el juez presidente de la corte de tránsito vehicular en la ciudad de Philadelphia será nombrado por el Gobernador]. Un Presidente del Tribunal Supremo o el juez presidente podrá renunciar tal posición y seguir siendo un miembro de la corte. (4) Que el inciso (b), de la sección 12, del artículo V, se modifique como sigue:

§ 12. Requisitos de los jueces, magistrados y jueces de paz.

(b) [Los jueces de la corte de tránsito vehicular en la ciudad de Philadelphia y los jueces] Los jueces de paz serán miembros de la barra de la Corte Suprema o deberá completar un curso de formación y la instrucción en los deberes de sus respectivos cargos y aprobar un examen antes de asumir el cargo. Tales cursos y exámenes serán las fijadas por la ley

(5) Que el inciso (a) de la sección 15, del artículo V, se modifique como sigue:

§ 15. Titularidad de jueces, magistrados y jueces de paz.

(a) El término regular del mandato de los magistrados y jueces será de diez años y el término regular de la oficina para los jueces de la corte municipal [y la corte de tránsito vehicular] en la ciudad de Philadelphia y de los jueces de paz será de seis años. La titularidad de cualquier justicia o juez no se verá afectada por los cambios en los distritos judiciales o por la reducción en el número de jueces.

Sección 2. El propósito de la pregunta de la boleta es modificar la Constitución de Pennsylvania para abolir la Corte de tráfico en la Ciudad de Philadelphia.

Al presente, la Constitución de Pennsylvania establece que la Corte de tráfico de la ciudad de Philadelphia sea parte del sistema judicial unificado. Si se aprobara la pregunta de la boleta, la Corte de tráfico en la ciudad de Philadelphia sería abolida mediante la eliminación de todas las referencias a la Corte de tráfico y los jueces de la Corte de tráfico en la ciudad de Philadelphia de la Constitución de Pennsylvania.

Legislación promulgada en 2013 emitió las funciones realizadas por la Corte de tráfico en la Corte Municipal de Philadelphia. De la pregunta electoral sería abolir la Corte de tráfico en la ciudad de Philadelphia. Esta enmienda aboliría oficialmente a la Corte de tráfico mediante la eliminación de todas las referencias a la Corte de tráfico y sus jueces de la Constitución de Pennsylvania.

Remembering the holiday traditions

At the beginning of the last century, immigrants who first came to South Bethlehem celebrated the Christmas holiday in the traditional manner of their native lands. As with so many ethnic groups, the holiday revolved around the dining room table with all members of the family. To achieve success in this holiday feast at home, each parent performed chores that balanced their workloads. During the 1920s and 30s, a husband who worked at Bethlehem Steel relied on his wife to care for their children, keep house and prepare the meals.

For this generation living in South Bethlehem before the Great Depression and beyond the post-WWII years, Christmas Eve and Christmas Day dinners were prepared in the manner practiced by their ancestors. All the food needed for dinner was planned and purchased in advance.

On Christmas Eve, women frequented the Municipal Market at East Third and Adams streets for the bulk of dinner items. They purchased fruits and vegetables, dairy items, eggs, sugar, flour, poultry, seafood and meats.

Since electric refrigerators with freezers were not yet popular or affordable, housewives depended on the icebox – and that meant food had to be purchased daily. Chickens were never frozen; they were chosen live and were butchered at any number of Southside chicken markets: Kaplan's on East Third and Taylor streets, Hoffman's at West Fourth and Buchanan streets or at the Municipal Market on East Third and Adams streets.

Christmas dinner was prepared early in the day. Many young Southside residents remember how their mothers rolled cookie dough on the kitchen table and made them with tin cookie-cutters. They decorated the cookies on cookie sheets and placed them into the hot coal-fired oven. Nothing compared to the smell of fresh baked cookies. Depending on which Southside ethnic group, these hand-made traditional pastries included apple strudel, Dobos torte, kiffles, nut tossies, poppy seed rolls, pizzelles, biscotti, strufoli, butter kuchen and even yeast-raised

Moravian sugar cake.

While adult family members occupied their usual seats at the table, extra chairs were supplied to seat additional relatives. The father was always seated at the head of the table. Prayers of thanks at dinner were said prior to any food touching the lips of those seated.

Although the dining room was devoid of distractions like television and electronic devices, Christmas dinner was hardly eaten in silence. Conversation kept the table alive with chatter by family members who hadn't seen each other for long periods of time and had taken the opportunity to share the latest events in their lives.

Eaten leisurely, Christmas dinner was a feast of flavors not experienced during other times of the year.

After dinner, women wearing aprons collected the plates and flatware and retreated to the kitchen. Here they held court with conversation and gossip while dishwashing by hand, while others in the room dried every glass, plate, flatware and pot, and put everything back in its respective cupboard, cabinet and drawer without evidence that a meal had even been prepared, except for the lingering aroma.

The dishwashing ritual ended with a scoured sink, followed by a pot of coffee placed on the stove range to perk, while cake, homemade pastries and desserts were arranged on platters covered with doilies for serving.

Back in the dining room, men recounted hunting and fishing triumphs and garden failures the previous summer while drinking beer or wine. They spoke of their jobs with conviction and bravado or recalled winning moments of their favorite football team at Taylor Stadium.

Breezing through blue-colored cigarette smoke from the men's ashtrays, women returned to the dining room armed with cups, plates, coffee and dessert platters to still more personal stories and family secrets. While adults reminisced at the table, children busied themselves on the floor with games and remained quiet, so as not to miss one word of family folk tales.

Finally, small glasses were brought to the table accompanied by HOLIDAYS on Page A16

cost or for free. The county farm bureaus were also recognized with a 2016 "Adopt A Room" award for their continued support to the Ronald McDonald House.

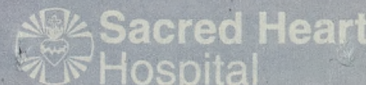

Masonry students compete at SkillsUSA

Lehigh Valley masonry students completed several competencies recently by building an advanced stone and brick veneer mason wall that could be used for decorative purposes in a pizzeria, doorway arch or outside patio. Saucon Valley senior Benjamin Martincavage, and Liberty junior Alexis Fenstermacher completed the assignment. Martincavage took third place in the local SkillsUSA masonry competition. The wall is comprised of brick, block and stone components. The brick arch required additional cutting and spacing to form the semi-circle. Approximately 20 full and half-blocks were required, in addition to 200 full and cut bricks. The top of the project were capped off with solid brick. The students incorporated 70 pieces of stone that was inlaid after the stucco coat. To preserve the project, a special mortar composed of sand, lime and water was used. The project was under the guidance of Joe Pinto.

panied by an assortment of bottled cordials, which included fruit brandy, port and sweet liqueurs.

Christmas festivities didn't end there. It was relatively common for local Southside musicians to serenade their friends at home at Christmas and on New Years Eve, as Francis Figlear recalls:

"Music was the lifeblood of the Southside community

because it was recreational and gave relief from the pain of the economic difficulties caused by the Depression and the gruesome war in the 1940s. My Dad, violinist Victor Figlear had two orchestras organized at the same time. His cousins, George and Frank Doddy also had their own orchestras; there were others, including Vincent Czipoth, Peter Heinrich, Ernie Pecsek and Joe Resetar.

"Late Christmas Eve was very special around our house, when the gypsies

from New Jersey came with their musical instruments. My dad would take his violin and lead them serenading to family and friends all over Southside neighborhoods – and around the valley. They usually would arrive back at our house sometime later that night and dump all the tip money inside their bass fiddle onto the table!"

Back then, as now, Christmas festivities soon faded to memory. The anticipation of the long winter of sledding on snow-covered streets led to the hope

of spring, and of course, another family holiday.

After six weeks of Lenten dishes, devoid of meat and sweets, Easter was welcomed with baskets filled with colored pysanky eggs, chocolates in the form of rabbits and crosses and edible marshmallow Peeps. And like Christmas, Easter offered another holiday dinner of food and table talk – all of which evolved around the family in those bygone days.

ASO's season of anniversaries concludes with 'Carmina Burana'

What an amazing year this has been celebrating my 20th anniversary as the Music Director and Conductor of the Allentown Symphony Orchestra.

It was thrilling to open the season with pianist Emanuel Ax. In November, we also celebrated the 20th anniversary of our renowned national Schadt String Competition with violin winner Zeyu Victor Lee.

And on Valentine's Day weekend, we performed a splendid night of favorite Puccini opera arias with a stellar cast of soloists from the Academy of Vocal Arts in Philadelphia.

This was followed by our recent, fun-filled story concert featuring Rossini's "William Tell," Richard Strauss' "Till Eulenspiegel" and Stravinsky's "Petrouchka," with dancers from the Lehigh Valley Ballet Guild.

One could not wish for a more exciting orchestral season.

To top it off, at 7:30 April 9 and 3 p.m. April 10, we will perform Carl Orff's famous "Carmina Burana" for Chorus and Orchestra at Miller Symphony Hall, Allentown.

We open the concert with Ellen Taaffe Zwilich's rousing piece,

"Celebration." I conducted this work in my very first season with the Allentown Symphony.

This exciting concert-opener has three fanfare trumpets echoing across the orchestra and features a battery of percussion instruments, including three vibraphones, marimba, assorted gongs, hand-bells and chimes.

Rounding out the concert is Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart's popular Symphony No. 35, often referred to as the "Haffner" Symphony. This piece was written to honor Sigmund Haffner (1756-87), Mozart's friend, who was to be elevated to the nobility. The Emperor attended the concert and was so impressed that he sent Mozart a large sum of money.

The Haffner Symphony is considered one of Mozart's finest compositions.

Joining the Allentown Symphony Orchestra for

"Carmina Burana" will be the Allentown Symphony Chorus and the Bel Canto Children's Chorus of The Bach Choir of Bethlehem.

We will also feature baritone Mark Womack, soprano Elizabeth Sutphen and tenor Christopher Pfund.

Many people are familiar with the title, "Carmina Burana." But what exactly does it mean? The words are from early Latin. "Carmina" means song or incantation. "Burana" refers to the Burana district, or the area called Beuern, which refers to the monastery name.

The piece is based upon poems in Latin and old German from the 12th and 13th century written by wandering scholars and defrocked priests. The manuscript was found in 1803 in a monastery in Benediktbeuern in Upper Bavaria.

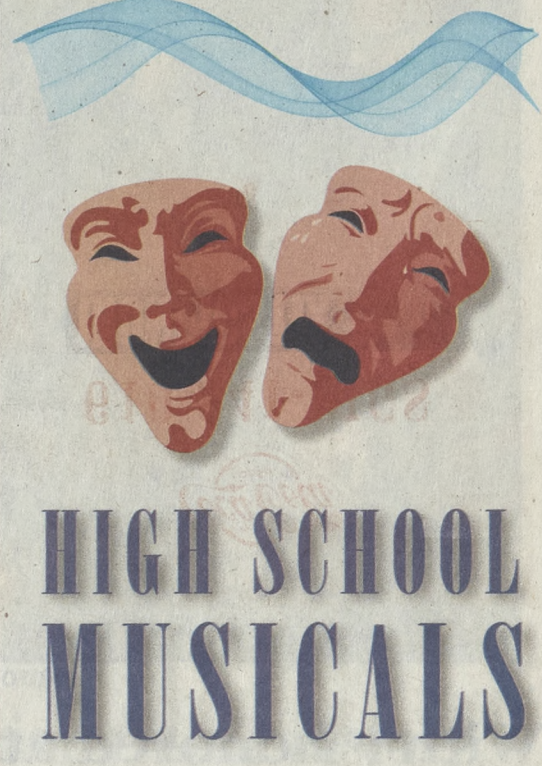
Included in it are drinking songs, love songs and

songs about spring. Some of the poems are close to being X-rated, at least for that time period. At the concert, we will provide the translations on the orchestra shell so that you will be able to follow all the intricacies of these early poems.

The opening section of the piece, "Fortuna Imperatrix Mundi" (Luck, Empress of the World), has become one of the most performed pieces of music of all time. You hear it often in commercials, TV shows, movies and sporting events. It is grand, chant-like, visceral and powerful.

During the "In Taberna" (In the Tavern) part of "Carmina Burana," the solo baritone plays the role of the Abbot, who launches the men of the choir into a rollicking ode as they all drink.

Read the fine print on seed packets

Read the seed packet for important information on what you are planting.

Few consumers would buy a car or an appliance without reading information about the product.

Purchasing a package of seeds doesn't require a bank loan, but buyers still should read the packet carefully.

The picture you see on the cover of a seed packet is designed to show the plant at its very best. Reading the package before you buy helps you to make sure the seeds are best suited for your garden.

Gardeners of all skill levels should take time to check some important information on the seed package.

Date: The date typically has a phrase such as "packed for 2016." Don't buy last year's seed unless it's free or so reduced in price that it won't matter if they do not germinate. Some seeds are viable longer than other, but how the seeds have been stored has a major effect on germination.

Purity: Most packag-

es of flower and vegetable seeds for home gardening contain 100 percent of the variety. If you buy a "garden mix" for a flower variety, read the percentage of seeds thoroughly. The highest percentage is listed first.

Weight: The weight listing is invaluable in helping gardeners calculate costs and potential yield. Many seed packets are weighed in milligrams or listed by number per packet. Seeds also are packaged by the ounce, so it's important to remember that there are 2,800

milligrams in an ounce and 28 grams to an ounce.

Origin: Certain agricultural and vegetable crops grown in one geographic area may not do well in another. If you buy seeds in Georgia, they may not do well if you plant them in Pennsylvania, unless they are specified for our region.

Germination: If listed on the package, germination information tells you what percentage of the seeds that will produce plants under ideal conditions, which usually means in a laboratory.

Home gardeners can expect a germination rate of 75 to 85 percent when planting directly into the soil.

Variety: Most packets of flower and vegetable seeds for home use list the variety and whether the seed is an annual, perennial or biennial. The package will note if the plant is a hybrid as well.

Culture: Almost all seed packages have information on how and when to plant. The information should include the number of days until seed germination. Vegetable packets list number of days to maturity. Most packets list spacing recommendations and height and spread of the plant at maturity. Special care instructions and growth habits usually are included as well.

Be sure to save the seed packet for use as a reference during the season or as a guide.

d'amours" (Court of Love), we experience beautiful, lyrical melodies featuring the soprano soloist who portrays a woman very much in love.

One of the most memorable solos is the "Roasting Swan" song where the tenor sings in falsetto and we see him as the swan is roasting slowly on the spit. This piece is Pfund's signature song and he has performed it more than 150 times with orchestras in the United States.

Carl Orff used a cover portrait for "Carmina Burana" that was particularly striking: an image of luck, shown as a revolving wheel, blindly governing people's destinies. The wheel of fate is continually turning. This image is used today when the piece is performed.

In referring to "Carmina Burana," Orff said, "It is not sophisticated, not intellectual ... but there is a spiritual pow-

er behind my work, and that is why it is accepted throughout the world."

"Carmina Burana" has not been performed by the Allentown Symphony for more than 20 years. It is a spectacular way to conclude our classical season of concerts and my 20th anniversary season.

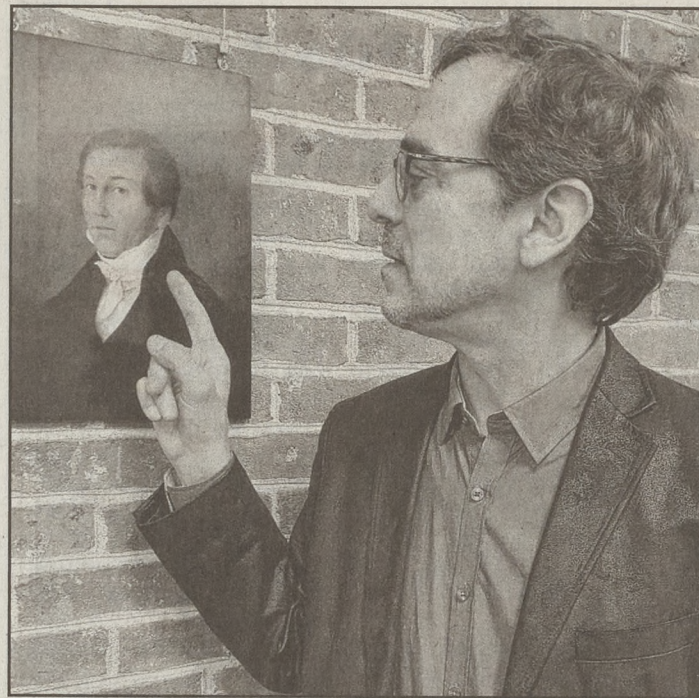

A special homecoming

Restored 19th Century portraits offer links to Moravian music history

When John Christian Malthaner was a teacher at the Young Ladies' Seminary in the mid-19th Century Moravian community of Bethlehem, he commissioned fellow teacher Gustav Grunewald to paint portraits of himself and his wife Catherine.

The portraits, after hanging for more than a century and a half in the homes of Malthaner's descendants throughout the United States, have come home to Bethlehem, where they are now part of the permanent art collection of the Moravian Archives.

The portraits, newly cleaned and restored, were presented to the public at a reception at the archives in February by Dr. Paul Peucker, archives director, and Steven Erisoty, the conservator who refurbished the paintings.

Peucker explained the importance of the portraits and their connections to Bethlehem, especially the connection with Moravian music.

Malthaner (1810-1873) was a piano maker who emigrated from Germany to the United States in 1828. He lived first in New York City, where he opened a piano factory and in 1832 married Catherine Schoenheinz (1812-1879). In 1837, the couple moved to Bethlehem. At first, he supported himself and

his family as a self-employed craftsman in cabinetry, as well as a music teacher at the seminary and an organist for the Moravian Church.

Within a few years, however, Malthaner was again building pianos, and records show that he sold his first piano to the seminary in 1846. In her research paper "Music, Women, and Pianos in Antebellum Bethlehem," Jewel Smith wrote that the piano was very popular in the late 1800s, replacing the harpsichord, clavichord and spinet. There was an increasing demand for piano instruction.

By 1855, Smith said the seminary owned nearly 40 pianos, many that had been tuned and repaired by Malthaner. By 1865, it had purchased 20 of his instruments. The principal of the seminary at the time wrote, "We find his pianos equal to the best of others in point of finish and excellency of tone. For service and durability, we find none equal to those of Mr. Malthaner's."

When Malthaner moved to Bethlehem, Gustav Grunewald (1805-1878) was a resident of the Moravian community and a professor of drawing and painting at the seminary.

Grunewald, born in Germany, studied at the Dresden Art Academy. He arrived in Pennsylvania in 1831 and was

admitted to Bethlehem's Moravian community in 1833. He went on to gain notoriety as a landscape painter among what became the artists of the Hudson River School.

Sometime between 1837 and 1866, Grunewald painted the portraits of the Malthaners.

When Erisoty was commissioned to restore the paintings, he said he had to deal with several challenges. Demonstrating with "before photos,"

he showed that the color of the paintings had become very dark, faces appeared orange, white cloth had yellowed, and there were disturbing cracks on Catherine's forehead. Worse, there was a sticky substance on the surfaces of both paintings that had attracted pollutants, especially cigarette smoke.

"Someone had rubbed oil on the portraits," Erisoty said, remarking that it was "an old wives' tale" that oil would pre-

serve paintings.

"Oil is the binder that mixes with paint, and it binds with itself and binds the paint to it, making it very difficult to remove," he said.

Erisoty told the audience that he used solvents to remove the oil and pollution that did not harm the paintings and could be easy for a conservator in the future to work with. Exactly what solvent, he would not specify. It is a trade secret, no doubt.

"In restoration work, every painting is different," Erisoty had explained earlier. "Very old paintings can be impervious to solvents. Knowing what to use depends on long years of experience."

The disfiguring cracks on Catherine's forehead, he said, were caused because Grunewald used paint with too much oil for his first layer and then covered it over with paint with less oil before the bottom layer had completely dried. This caused the first coat of paint to shrivel and crack. The cracks can still be seen, but they are far less prominent.

In a way, it was those cracks that led to the portraits being brought home. In an interview after the public presentation, Catherine Abrams, a Malthaner descendant who donated the portraits to the archives, said that when she noticed the cracks

she began to worry about the integrity of the paintings. The artwork had been passed on through generations and had never left the family. Abrams said she grew up with the portraits, which hung in her parents' home for 50 years.

An art historian who did her master's thesis on 17th Century American marriage portraits, Abrams had lived with the paintings of the Malthaners in her own home for the past seven years. For three years, the paintings were on the walls of her bedroom.

Abrams and her sister, Anne Malmquist, who lives in California, decided to donate the paintings to the Moravian Archives, where they thought they would be well-preserved.

Referring to the portrait of Catherine Malthaner, Abrams said, "I will miss her."

Eat, prey, love: It's all happening in 'Zootopia'

"Zootopia" is a fun animated feature film from the Walt Disney Animation Studios that should be enjoyable for adults and children.

parents, Stu Hopps (Don Lake) and Bonnie Hopps (Bonnie Hunt).

Judy is thwarted in her efforts by Mayor Lionheart (J.K. Simmons), while getting some help from Assistant Mayor Bellwether (Jenny Slate).

There are more celebrity voices, including that for Gazelle (voiced by Shakira, who sings a dance tune, "Try Everything," in the final scene).

While the quality of the animation is incredible, the storyline is not. It is derivative, including many tropes that go back to the dawn of the cinema era: a runaway train and a chase on it (in this case, a subway train), a chase across a wooden rope bridge over a chasm, giant characters versus small characters, a mad scientist's experimental lab and a sendup of "The Godfather."

Could this be because the screenplay by Jared Bush and Phil Johnston

includes credits for seven story writers (Byron Howard, Jared Bush, Rich Moore, Josie Trinidad, Jim Reardon, Phil Johnston and Jennifer Lee), with additional story material by yet another writer, Dan Fogelman?

The movie also has two directors: Byron Howard ("Tangled," 2010; "Bolt," 2008) and Rich Moore ("Wreck-It Ralph," 2012), and a co-director, Jared Bush.

There are almost as many writers as there are main characters in "Zootopia." Well, animation characters can't exactly speak for themselves. Somebody has to put words in their mouths.

The names of the characters are cheeky. Judy Hopps is a bunny, That's obvious.

Assistant Mayor Bellwether is a sheep. A herd of sheep follow the sheep with a bell, hence bellwether, a political term for predictive quality of a particular township, borough or city district or precinct.

The name of Chief Bogo is a retail term for Buy One, Get One.

Mayor Lionheart is a lion. Nick Wilde is a red fox. And Mr. Otterton is, in fact, an otter.

The screenplay is often pleasantly amusing. Judy Hopps has 275 bunny brothers and sisters.

The voices are well-cast, particularly those of Ginnifer Goodwin, Jason Bateman and Idris Elba.

For this review, "Zootopia" was seen in the 2D format. There are a few scenes that would be fun in 3D, but not enough to make a difference in your enjoyment of the film.

And, not to get too politically-correct, but I would again like to lodge a complaint about the use of the word "moron" in "Zootopia" as a derogatory term said by one character to another. This archaic term was once one of several used to classify persons in diagnoses that often led to tragic outcomes. I am surprised and disappointed with Disney for not being more sensitive and aware.

"Zootopia" is pretty much of a grab bag. It's a fun grab bag. But a grab bag nonetheless.

February LV house sales up 23.8 percent

Closed sales of houses in the Lehigh Valley entered March like a lion, zooming in February, increasing at an even faster pace than in January.

Closed sales of houses in the Lehigh Valley increased again by double digits, up 23.8 percent in February to 437 from 353 in February 2015, according to statistics provided by the Greater Lehigh Valley Realtors (GLVR).

The February data shows the local housing market is doing well despite a dwindling inventory of homes, stated the latest GLVR report.

Year to date, closed sales are up 21.6 percent to 902 as of February from 742 as of February 2015.

"Looking at the overall big picture, all the other key indicators for judging the health of our real estate market show we are strong across the board and progressing quite well," said GLVR CEO Justin Poremba.

Pending sales also increased dramatically, up 23.1 percent in February to 651 from 529 in February 2015.

Days on the market decreased 4.8 percent in February to 80 from 84 in February 2015.

The months supply decreased 35.6 percent in February to 4.7 months from 7.3 months in February 2015. In-

ventory of four to seven months is regarded as constituting a balanced real estate market.

Inventory decreased 28.1 percent in February to 3,027 from 4,209 in February 2015.

"Shrinking inventory numbers is an issue that's affecting real estate markets across the country, not just here in the Lehigh Valley," said Chris Raad, GLVR President.

"The cure, of course, is more inventory. But new construction has been lagging during this opportune moment, and sellers of existing homes are not yet hitting the market in large numbers," Raad said.

"With the heart of the spring selling season still a few months away, there's a good chance those numbers will adjust and improve," added Poremba.

New listings increased 9.2 percent in February to 845 from 774 in February 2015.

The average sales price increased 3.8 percent in February to \$190,497 from \$183,603 in February 2015.

The median sales price increased 2.2 percent in February to \$165,495 from \$162,000 in February 2015.

The percentage of list price received increased 0.5 percent in February to 96.6 percent from 95.1 percent in

February 2015.

The affordability index decreased 1.4 percent.

According to the GLVR report, the Carbon County data shows days on the market decreased 3 percent to 128 days, and new listings increasing 26.5 percent. Median sales price dropped 11.8 percent to \$79,250, with percentage of list price received at 90.1 percent.

The monthly housing data is collected by the GLVR from its Multiple Listing Service, a comprehensive database that includes housing market information from its more than 2,000 Realtor members.

The GLVR is a not-for-profit trade association providing professional development and training resources, competitive market information, legislative advocacy, a peer review and mediation process for members, and a dispute resolution service for consumers.

In praise of beautiful people

Marilyn is a beautiful woman I've just gotten to know.

She isn't beautiful on the outside. In fact, when you look at her you get the immediate impression she's a little

strange, at least when it comes to appearance. I don't know how old she is. Somewhere upward of 62, I would guess. Most times she puts her blond hair into pigtails, then tops it with an odd hat of some sort.

She dresses in layers of unmatched clothes I won't even begin to describe. But let's just say she looks like she went to her closet (or someone's closet) and put on everything she saw there.

I see Marilyn each week at a dance that is attended mostly by couples. Undeterred by that fact, Marilyn goes out on the dance floor and dances by herself.

I see people rolling their eyes when they watch her uninhibited dancing. I guess they see "strange" when they look at her. I see courage.

During a short conversation I had with her, Marilyn told me she lives by herself and gets rather lonely.

"I have two choices," she told me. "I can sit home alone and be lonely, or I can go out and dance by myself."

She lives close to our wonderful Cultural Center, where she attends all the free events by herself rather than staying home alone, she said.

I admired her courage to do that. Sooner or later, many of us end up alone. If we don't have a circle of friends to do things with, we can't help but be overwhelmed with loneliness if we are alone day and night.

How many of us would have Marilyn's courage?

I've thought about it and I've concluded I would like the courage to go dancing by myself — if that's all I had available to me. But I wouldn't have Marilyn's courage.

Two weeks ago my husband and I went to a dance at an outdoor pavilion where every seat was taken and it was standing room only — if you could find room to stand, that is.

Marilyn was sitting at a table and immediately made room for me to sit by her. That's when I discovered she is one beautiful lady, maybe not on the outside but certainly on the inside.

When she saw an old man who could barely walk struggling to get to the men's room, she went over and took his arm to help him.

"The ground is so uneven and I didn't want him to fall," she told me.

What I discovered about her is that Marilyn has a caring heart and always watches out for others.

The old fellow she helped was so touched by her kindness that he brought her a heart-shaped box of candy the following week. It turns out this guy, who looks about 90, lives in a nearby nursing home. Once a week they drop him off at the outdoor pavilion to listen to music.

"But the old guy can barely walk and no one stays with him. I think we have to care about others," Marilyn says.

When the old guy asked Marilyn if she would dance with him, she knew he couldn't maneuver around the dance floor. So she "danced" with him by his chair, just swaying to the music without moving much.

The look of sheer joy and contentment on the old man's face brought tears to my eyes.

What struck me that night was the contrast between Marilyn and me. While she sat there concerned about others, my only thought was whether the band would play a rumba or waltz so we could dance.

I didn't even look around to see who was there because David and I focused only on the music, thinking only of ourselves.

I told another friend of mine that if I ever hear anyone making fun of Marilyn again, I was going to let them know she has more of the right stuff on the inside than the rest of us do.

"Well, I should hope you would not let anyone make fun of another person — no matter who it is," said my friend who would never tolerate hearing an unkind word about others.

We all sometimes are guilty of judging by appearances, aren't we?

If we see a stunning woman dressed to the nines, we might think she's beautiful.

If we see someone shabbily dressed without much thought to appearance, we probably wouldn't call that person beautiful.

Yet the real beauty that truly counts is what's on the inside of someone.

The homeless guy who put a few crumpled-up dollar bills into a collection basket for our county soup kitchen is beautiful. I'm sure he needed the money for himself, but he said he wanted to help those who are worse off than he is.

Now, that's beautiful.

My friend Jeanne encountered a beautiful young man when she went on a trip to Thailand then forgot her wallet in a jitney. With no credit card, cash or passport, she would have been in trouble.

But when she got back to her hotel that night, the young jitney driver had gone through a lot of trouble to track her down and had delivered her wallet to the hotel — with not a thing missing.

This is in praise of all the truly beautiful people in our world.

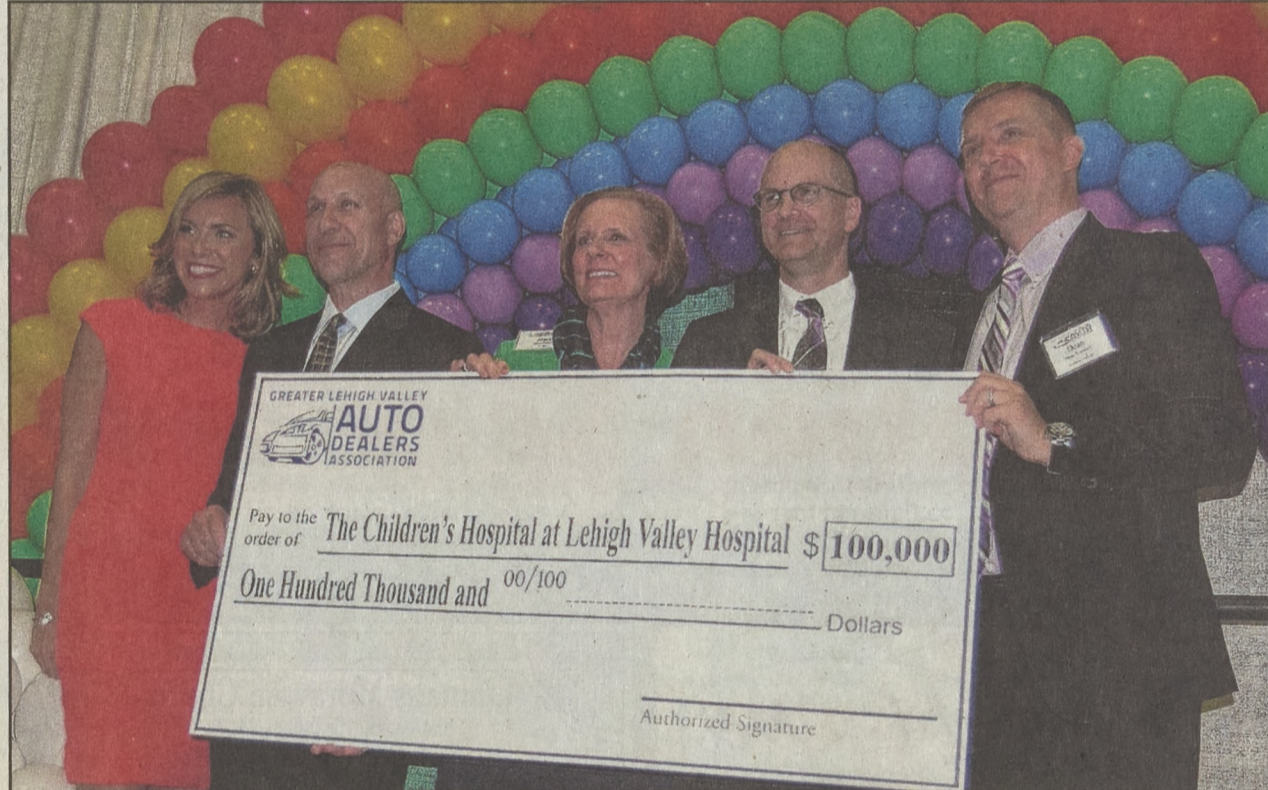

Treatments for heart-attack victims

Last of three parts
Because of better care, most heart-attack victims survive today. There are improved tests, drugs and surgery to defend against heart attack.

Tests

An electrocardiogram (ECG) records the heart's electrical activity. This test is done because injured heart muscle generates abnormal impulses. If the ECG picks up abnormalities, physicians will know that a patient has had a heart attack or that one may be in progress.

If you have a heart attack, there are heart enzymes that leak slowly into your blood. Physicians draw blood to test for the enzymes.

A chest X-ray is done to evaluate the size and shape of your heart and its blood vessels.

A nuclear scan enables doctors to locate places where blood is not flowing properly to the heart. A radioactive material is injected into

your bloodstream. Cameras detect the radioactive material as it flows through your heart and lungs.

An echocardiogram can tell if a part of the heart has been damaged by a heart attack. Sound waves are bounced off your heart and converted to images.

An angiogram employs dye injected into your arteries. The dye makes the arteries visible to X-rays, which illustrate blockages.

A stress test on a treadmill or stationary bike while hooked up to an ECG machine measures how your heart and arteries react when you exert yourself.

Drugs

Drugs that help dissolve clots blocking blood to your heart are lifesavers. These drugs

are known as thrombolytics or "clot-busters." The earlier you are given a clot-buster, the better.

A "superaspirin" is given with a clot-buster. The superaspirin prevents new clots from forming.

Nitroglycerin is used to open arteries, improving blood flow to and from your heart.

Regular aspirin keeps blood moving through constricted arteries. Therefore, paramedics may give aspirin when they respond to an emergency to treat a heart-attack victim. Aspirin reduces mortality from heart attacks.

Beta blockers, which lower your pulse rate and blood pressure, can reduce damage to the heart.

Drugs to lower cholesterol may be helpful if given soon after a heart attack begins.

If you are in great pain, you may be given morphine.

Surgery

Angioplasty opens blocked coronary arteries. In this procedure, a catheter is run through an artery to the blockage. The catheter, which is a long thin tube, has a balloon tip that is inflated to open the blockage. In most cases, a mesh tube (stent) is also placed inside the artery to hold it open.

Coronary artery bypass surgery is not usually done when a heart attack occurs but it may be recommended after recovery. During the operation, surgeons take a segment of a healthy blood vessel from another part of the body and make a detour around the blocked part of the coronary artery.
