Edward J. Gross, Northampton, Earns Medal By Saving Shipmate

Northampton, was awarded the Navy-Marine Corps medal while serving aboard the veteran aircraft carrier, U. S. S. Ranger.

Acting entirely on his own initiative, Seaman Gross dived headlong into a narrow strip of water between the carrier and a lighter barge to save the life of Coxswain John Campbell, USNR. Campbell had fallen onto the roof of the barge.

Gross is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Gross, 1336 Stewart Street, Northampton, and was a former resident of North Coplay.

He reported aboard the Ranger in June, 1943, for duty in the gunnery department. He is an accredited "Blue Nose" for having crossed the Arctic Circle.

Two brothers are also serving, "Acting without hesitation as Andrew, 30, Gunner's Mate 2/c, and soon as the injured man fell into Robert, 22, a parachute rigger, in the water, Gross dived overboard, Puerto Rico.
