## War Casualty Flown From Front, Surprises Kin With 'Phone Call

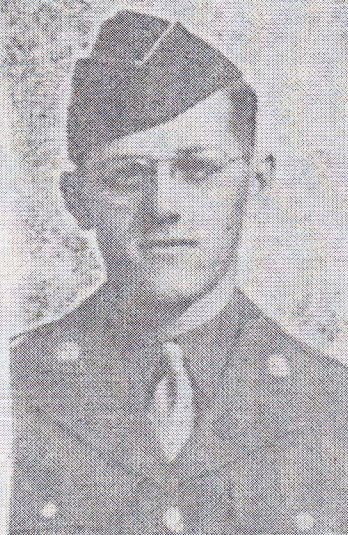
Last evening at 6 p. m., Mr. and Mrs. Charles E. Seifert, 230 Kichline Avenue, Hellertown, received a long distance call from their son, Corporal Charles C. Seifert, who was flown from the combat area in Germany to a hospital at Mitchell Field, N. Y.

This was the first news received by Mr. and Mrs. Seifert since a telegram from the War Department stated that he was wounded in action Feb. 27. In his conversation with his parents he told them of having had his right arm amputated. This was the second time Cpl. Seifert has been wounded in combat, the first time being Dec. 27, 1944, when he received injuries to his left arm.

Cpl. Seifert will remain at Mitchell Field for 48 hours and then will be sent to another hospital for further treatment. His parents left this morning for the hospital at Mitchell Field to see him before he is moved.

Cpl. Seifert is 21 years old, was graduated from Hellertown High School in 1941, enlisted in November, 1942, leaving for overseas duty September, 1944. He was serving with the 102nd Infantry Division (Ozarks) with the Ninth Army.
