Election code change: You can now vote by mail

or the first time in 80 Pennsylvania vears. has made significant changes to the Elections Code. If you hate standing in long lines on election day or insist on voting by paper ballot, this is for you.

For the first time, voters will be able to cast their ballots by mail. On Jan. 10, the Pennsylvania Department of State issued its guidance to all counties. Here's what you need to know:

1) Voter registration. - Previously, in order to vote, you had to be registered at least 30 days before the election. That





3) Permanent Mail-in voter list. - You can ask to be placed on a permanent mail-in voter list. Voters on this list will receive an application for a ballot in early February.

4) Can You Vote by mail and in person? No. If you've returned a mailin or absentee ballot, you are ineligible to vote at your polling precinct.

In another tweak to the Elections Code, the state legislature has banned the Department of State from decertifying voting systems used by the majority of the counties unless it advises the legislature six months in advance with a justification as well as a plan for paying for a new system. 

Houch takes DA oath of office **NORTHAMPTON COUNTY**

For the first time since 1991, Northampton County has a new district attorney. John Morganelli, who held office for an unprecedented 28 years, has been succeeded by his First Deputy, Terrence Houck. Houck was sworn into office Jan. 6.

When Morganelli was first elected, nine of his 11 assistants were parttime prosecutors with private practices. The office of district attorney was itself a part-time job. Morganelli argued that he and his assistants should devote 100 percent of their professional time to prosecuting criminal cases.

The voters agreed, Charter to make his office full-time. Since then, Morganelli has replaced retiring part-time prosecutors with fulltime professionals. All of Houck's 22 assistants now have just one client - the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Houck himself is a career prosecutor who has spent 32 years in the Bucks, Lehigh and Northampton County DA's office. His last 13 years has been as Northampton County's first deputy DA. Before he became a lawyer, Houck worked as a cop in Philadelphia. He attended Temple Law School at night.

"Being elected as district attorney has been a life goal since the time I became a career prosecutor over 32 years ago," said Houck on election night. "This is who I am. I will seek no other office.

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

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

Reorganization comes with contests

At Bethlehem City Council's reorganization meeting Jan. 7, incumbent President Adam Waldron was recon-firmed 4-3 for a second term as president of the seven-member council. He defeated the other nominee for the office, Councilwoman Olga Negrón.

Negron's candidacy for the position was encouraged by over 20 speakers who unsuccessfully urged council members to vote for Negron. Each speaker in support of Negrón got a smattering of applause at the conclusion of their remarks.

One of Negrón's sup-porters also took the opportunity to criticize Waldron's leadership. Barbara Diamond was concerned about what she described as a "breakdown in order and decorum as far as meetings have been handled.'

Al Worth, who said he is a political scientist, pointedly did not indorse a candidate, but encouraged Democrats to work toward inclusivenes they want to succeed in the 2020 elections. Waldron said he had received positive support from council members when he had called them. He said he has a "soft gavel" which allows people to speak their mind without being gaveled down. Negrón recounted her experiences, pointing out that "leadership is part of

At that point Spirk called for nominations for vice president. Colón and Van Wirt both were nominated, and Colón won 4-3.

"It has been almost 40 years since there has been a female president [of the city council]," said Van Wirt. "We have lost an opportunity tonight that would have meant a lot to people of this community.'

Van Wirt also ad-vanced her support for a female mayor of Bethlehem, a sentiment that got applause from some of the audience.

Colón won the vice president job 4–3 with votes from Callahan, Colón, Crampsie Smith and Waldron.

In regular business, council approved 7-0 a contractor to develop a "climate action plan" for the city. The resolution was sponsored by Councilwomen Negrón and Van Wirt.

"It's been a long road to get to this place on a climate action plan," said Reynolds. He recounted the three-year history of the resolution and expressed hope that a final plan can be approved in 2020. Waldron later recounted the annual report reflecting council's achievements during 2019: Council held 24 regular meetings and 14 committee meetings, adopted 272 Resolutions, and passed 51 Ordinances.

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

From Quidditch to Queen, the Allentown Symphony Orchestra explores the relationship between sports and music at the next "Pops Concert," 7:30 p.m. Jan. 18, led by guest conductor Carl Topilow of the Cleveland Pops Orchestra.

"Music and Sports" looks at how music captures the emotional impact of sports, from the unforgetta-ble theme ("Gonna Fly Now" by Bill Conti) to "Rocky" (1976) with Rocky Balboa running up the 72 steps of the Philadelphia Art Museum, to the inspirational theme from Vangelis that is the backdrop for the Olympic runners in "Chariots of Fire" (1981).

Topilow, a colleague of ASO music director Diane Wittry, was asked to bring his popular "Music and Sports" program to Miller Sym-phony Hall for the ASO Pops Series. "It caught her eye," Topilow says

of Wittry.

The logarithms of fireplace logs



Choosing firewood to burn in your fireplace or wood-burning stove is much like selecting any favorite item.

The fuel-wood connoisseur will want to choose his or her wood carefully and weigh his or her needs and tastes before building a fire.

Softwoods, like pine, spruce and fir, are easy to ignite because they are resinous. They burn rapidly with a hot flame.

However, since a fire built entirely of softwoods burns out quickly, it requires frequent attention and replenishment.

This characteristic of softwoods can be a boon if you want a quick, warming fire or a short fire that will burn out before you go to bed or before you step out for the evening.

For a long-lasting fire, it is best to use the heavier hardwoods such as ash, beech, birch, maple and oak. These hardwood species burn less vigorously than softwoods and with a shorter flame.

Oak gives the most uniform and shortest flames and produces steady, glowing coals. When you have several oak logs burning in your grate, you can settle back for a steady show of flame.

Aroma is best derived from the

and cherry, and nut trees such as beech, hickory and pecan. Their smoke generally resembles the fragrance of the tree's fruit.

Wood from fruit and nut trees may sell for more per cord than wood with greater heating values, but they generally are steady pro-ducers of flame.

By mixing softwoods with hardwoods, you can achieve an easily-ignited and long-lasting fire. Later, by adding some fruit or nut woods, you will capture the nostalgic wood smoke aroma, as well.

The heat that a log produces depends on the concentration of woody material, resin, water and ash. Since woods are of different

woods of fruit trees such as apple compositions, they ignite at different temperatures and give off different heat values. Therefore, it is beneficial to mix light and heavy woods to achieve the ideal fire.

The most common measure of firewood volume is the cord. A standard cord can be described as a wellstacked pile of logs, 4 by 4 by 8 feet. A ton of air-dried dense hardwoods, such as oak, hickory or maple, is equal to approximately one-half of a cord.

If you buy your wood by weight instead of volume, look for the driest wood. Don't pay for extra water.

Logs are sold in different lengths and thicknesses. The sizes you buy should depend on the size of your See GREEN on Page B2

'Women' on the March

It's called "Little Wom-

en," not "Little Girls." The latest theatrical **MOVIE** movie version of "Little Women" is directed by Greta Gerwig, who wrote the screenplay based on the novel by American author Louisa May Alcott (1832-1888))

Published in two volumes in 1868 and 1869, the novel is about the journey from childhood to womanhood of the March sisters: Jo, Meg, Amy and Beth. The novel, which Alcott based on herself and her three sisters, was a commercial success and was critically-acclaimed.

In addition to stage plays and television shows and TV series, the novel has been adapted into seven theatrical motion pictures, including two silent films in 1917 and 1918.

Perhaps the bestknown version is the 1933 movie directed by George Cukor that starred Kath-Hepburn (Jo), arine Frances Dee (Meg), Joan Bennett (Amy) and Jean Parker (Beth).

A 1949 movie version directed by Mervyn Le-Roy starred June Allyson (Jo), Janet Leigh (Meg), Elizabeth Taylor (Amy) and Margaret O'Brien (Beth).

A 1994 movie version directed by Gillian Armstrong starred Winona Ryder (Jo), Trini Alvarado (Meg). Kirsten Dunst and Samantha Mathis (as the young and older Amy, respectively) and Claire Danes (Beth).

Gerwig's version of "Little Women" is stunning. It's romantic, humorous, heart-felt and highly-recommended for fans of Gerwig, the actors and Louisa May Alcott's novel

kind of Hollywood cottage industry, is a leitmotif for each era in which it's produced. Gerwig's interpretation could be titled "Belittled Women," The screenplay underscores the dilemma of mid-1800s females, as for example in the following monologue:

Gerwig captures the cusp of youths on the verge of adulthood with the inherent joy, trepi-dation and sensitivity in scenes between the main characters and swirling, exuberant dance scenes. "Little Women" is darn fun.

The film has gorgeous cinematography by Director of Photography Yorick Le Saux, a French cinematographer ("Per-sonal Shopper," 2016; "Clouds of Sils Maria," 2014; "Only Lovers Left Alive," 2013).

The film, set during the Civil War, in Concord, Mass., has authentic-looking exterior and interior settings and beautiful costumes by Jacqueline Durran (Oscar recipient, "Anna Karenina," 2012; fivetime Oscar nominee, including "Pride & Prejudice," 2005).
