A yen for adventure on the high seas drew the four sons of Mr. and Mrs. James Love to the local induction center in February, 1942. All four, under the age of 21 years at the time of enlistment, were accepted for service in the U. S. Navy.

Now, a fifth son, aged 17, is conducting a one man campaign calculated to persuade his parents that he, too, is Navy material. So far, the Loves have not succumbed to his pleadings and he, is still employed by Brown-Borhek Company. His name

is John Norman Love.

Mrs. James Love, at present a medical patient at St. Luke's Hospital, is the mother of eight boys, all alive and well. She and her family formerly lived at 231 Fairview Street, but are now residents of Danielsville, Pa.

Elders of the four Navy men is James Robert Love, electrician's mate second class, age 23, has seen service in Africa, Sicily and Italy. He is now in England.

Second son, Richard Henry Love,

seaman first class, went overseas on the South Dakota "mystery ship." He was home on leave for his 22nd birthday in March, but he is now in the South Pacific theater.

Robert Allen Love, seaman second class, aged 20 years, has had the least adventuresome time of the quartet, since his service is at a U. S. base in Portsmouth, New Hampshire.

Henry Albert Love, 19, electrician's mate third class, is somewhere in England. Recently he and James

enjoyed a brief but happy meeting in Italy.

In addition to John Norman, there are at home: Frederick Peter, age 15; Anthony Fred, 7 years, and Bruce Lee, aged 5 years. Mrs. Love is anticipating that the war will end before the last three get the smell of the sea in their nostrils. Enthusiastic letters piled up on the hospital bed do very little to discourage the hopes of the four sons still at home. They, too, want to be Navy men.
