Local GI Sends Captured Nazi Flag To Daughter He's Never Seen



A Nazi flag, 35 feet long, was unfurled in the streets of Bethlehem yesterday. But there's nothing Nazi about the folks holding it, as shown above. They are the parents and wife of Corporal Frank Zemba, who took the flag from German prisoners in the advance of Patton's Army into Germany. In the picture below are the Corporal's wife and his daughter, Francis, two months old. The GI has not as yet seen his daughter.

Cpl. Zemba Sends Huge Nazi Flag From Luxemburg to Wife

What is believed to be the largest Nazi flag received in this city is the trophy sent to Mrs. Dorothy Zemba, 1304 East Fifth Street, by her husband, Corporal Frank Zemba, who is now with General Patton's Army in Germany.

The flag, measuring fifty-six inches by thirty-five feet, was taken in Luxemburg and is the type that is generally displayed before official buildings.

Corporal Zemba, who participated in the battle of Bastogna during

the Christmas season, has been overseas since July, 1944. He had served a year and a half prior to Pearl Harbor, but received an honorable discharge, later being called back to active duty in October of 1942.

He is the father of a daughter, Francine, aged two months, whom he has never seen. Prior to entering the service, he had been employed by the Bethlehem Steel Company and attended Technical High School.

His wife is the former Dorothy Jawbuck, of Hellertown.
