Lieut. Naegely led his section through terrific anti-aircraft fire from a large number of major enemy warships and shore batteries and with quick decision and with disregard for personal safety, pressed home a successful attack against a heavy Japanese cruiser.

Harassed by enemy fighters and anti-aircraft fire, he chose a direction of dive which would produce the most hits even though it forced him and his wingmen to retire at low altitude close to and between enemy warships and directly through their concentrated cross-fire for a distance of three to five miles.

At the end of his race between the enemy ships and their cross-fire, Lieut. Naegely fought off Japanese fighter planes and he and his fliers returned safely to their base.

In the citation, Admiral Halsey concluded:
