BETHLEHEMITE RECEIVES COMMISSION IN WAVES

Miss Betty Stolp, Easton Avenue, Becomes Ensign— Course Cut Short.

Philadelphia, Nov. 11 (INS)—Four WAVES from Pennsylvania have won promotion from apprentice seamen to commissioned officers in a single month's time, the Navy announced today.

The four enlisted as apprentices on October 6 for a four-month course at the Naval Reserve Midshipman's Training School for WAVES at Smith College, according to Captain E. R. McClung, USN (ret.), director of Naval Officer Procurement with offices in Philadelphia.

After one month of preliminary indoctrination, they were slated for three months of intensive training to become communications officers. But the Navy cut short the program and commissioned them as ensigns on November 6.

Among the four are:

Ensign Betty N. Stolp, 23, of 2112 Easton Avenue, Bethlehem, a 1941 graduate of Moravian College for Women at Bethlehem. She was a senior laboratory technician at Woman's Hospital, Philadelphia, when she enlisted.

Ensign Jeanne B. Corkhill, 27, of 1151 North Nineteenth Street, Allentown, a 1935 graduate of Seton Hill College who took post-graduate work at Women's Medical College, Philadelphia, and at the University of Pittsburgh. A registered medical technician, she was employed by Bethlehem Steel Corporation.
