



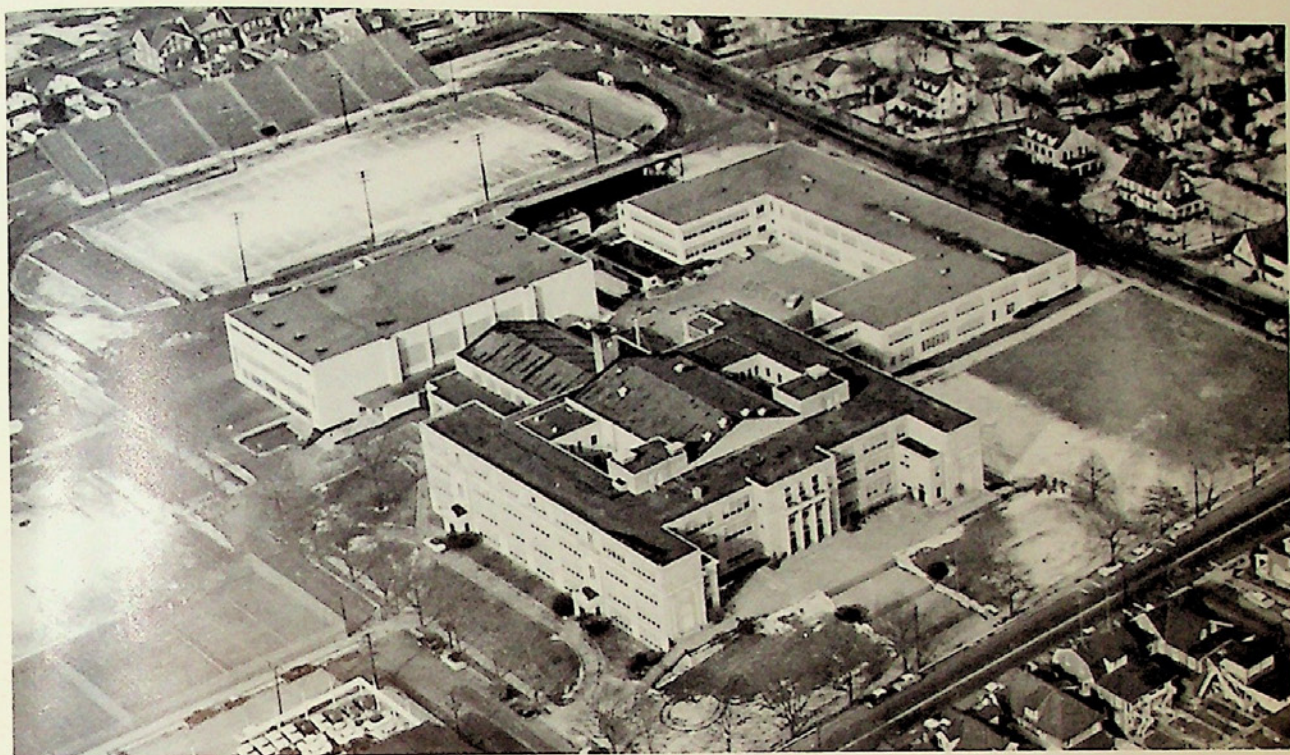

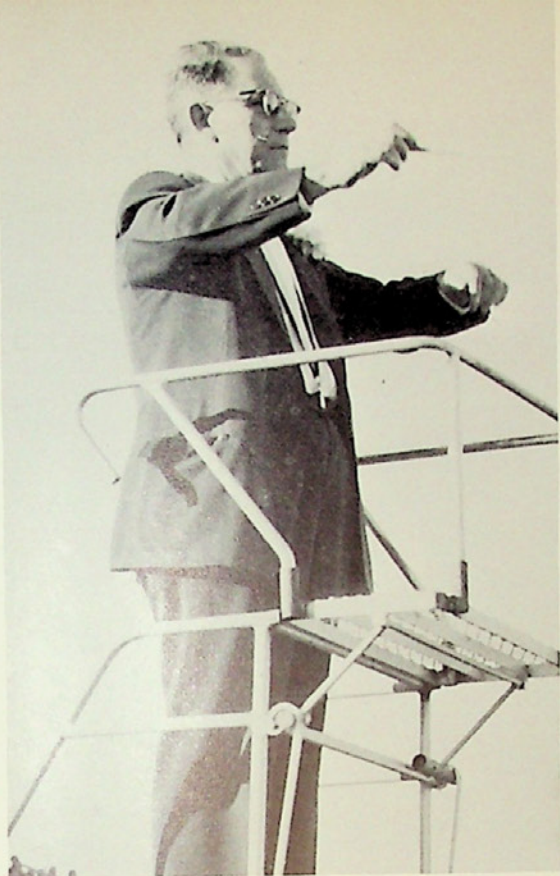


FOREWORD

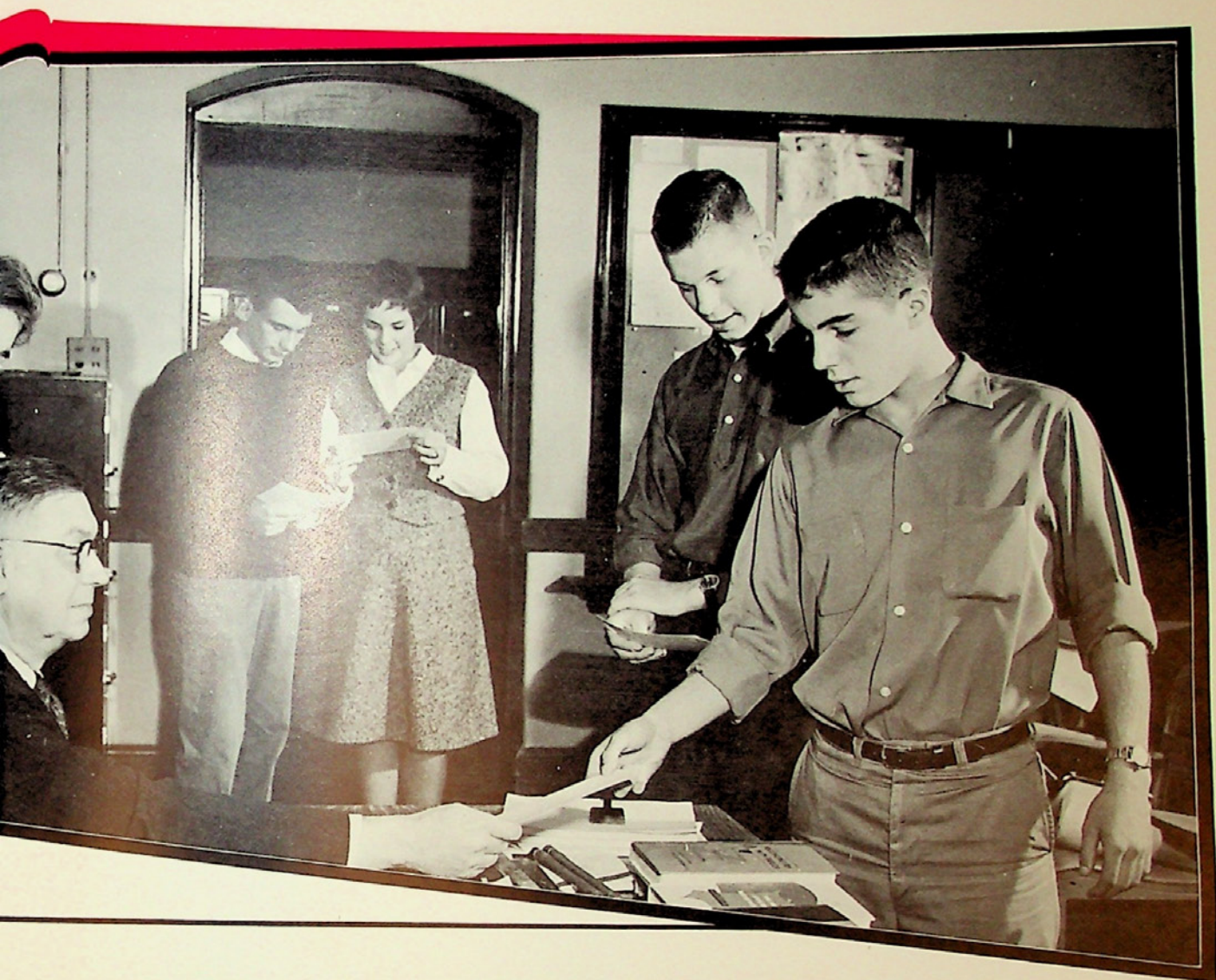

Those students who are not going to college are notified of available employment opportunities.

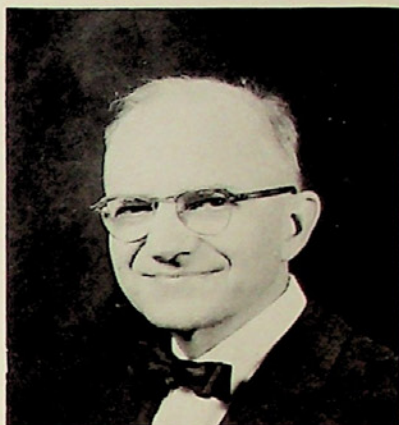

Emphasis in English classes is placed on developing the students' maximum power in the five communicative skills: listening, observing, reading, speaking, and writing. The study program for all classes consists of building vocabulary, writing compositions, studying grammar, reading great literary works, and using the library. Courses in creative writing, dramatics, journalism, and public speaking are offered as electives.

Required reading for the three years includes sophomore, "Julius Caesar" and **Silas Marner**; junior, "Our Town"; senior, "Macbeth".

Students in honor English classes are required to do extensive research in all phases of their study programs, thereby experiencing early the kind of work they will be expected to do in college.

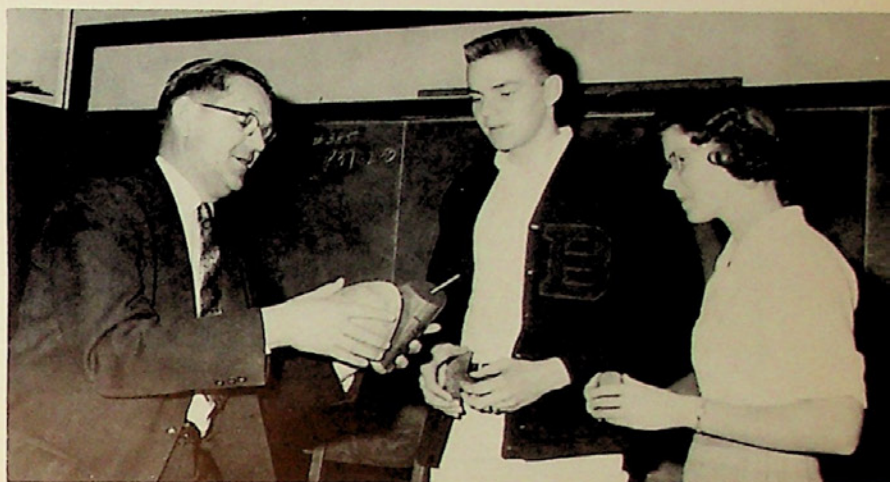

Mathematics courses at all levels are planned according to the ability and future plans of the students. A general course is offered for those people whose future plans do not necessitate a knowledge of the abstract mathematics. Students entering fields which do require a knowledge of higher mathematics are able to take advanced work at Liberty High School in preparation for college entrance.

Combining plane and solid geometry was the first step in a subject revision of the department. To supplement established subjects and introduce new ones, all the instructors took courses in modern concepts of mathematics at Muhlenberg College.

What is a molecule? Just ask one of the chemistry or physics students to get an answer. This term is one of many that the students learn in their study of these courses. In addition to theory classes, laboratory periods are provided in which students conduct experiments.

General biology, the study of living things, and biology 2, an advanced biology course involving bacteriological work, are also offered. Physical science and senior science deal with the principles of chemistry and physics but with a non-mathematical approach.

With this variety of courses and the advantages of laboratory facilities, students gain an appreciation of science in everyday life. College preparatory students are taught the fundamentals necessary for advanced study.

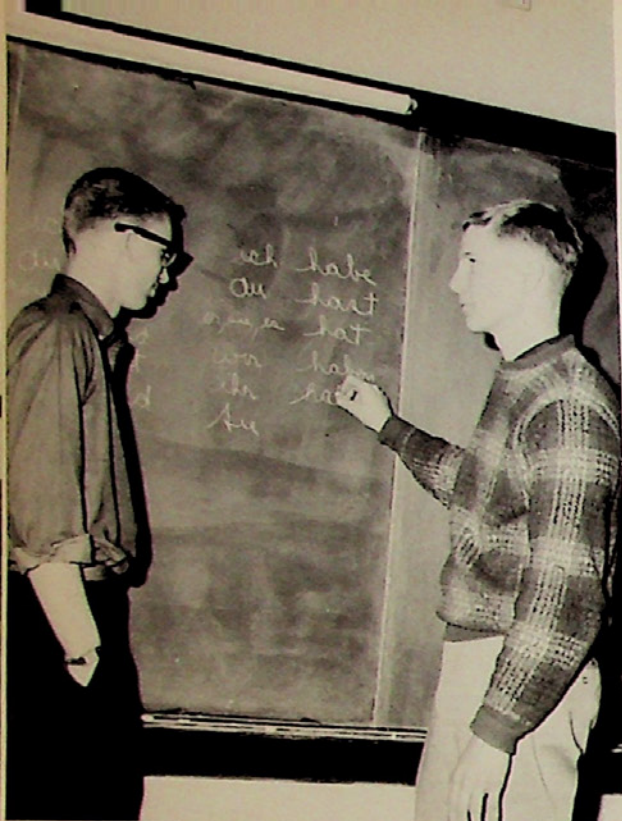

RUSSIAN IS ADDED TO

French, German, Latin, Russian, and Spanish are the five languages offered to students at Liberty High School. First-year students learn the grammatical fundamentals of the language and translate simple stories. Grammatical instruction is continued, along with increased reading, in the second and third years. The third and fourth-year students study the cultural background of the country, do many sight translations, and utilize the language in conversation.

All students are privileged to use the language laboratory. Here, in order to learn proper pronunciation, students can listen to recordings in the languages they are studying. Students also make speech recordings to help them improve their use of the language.

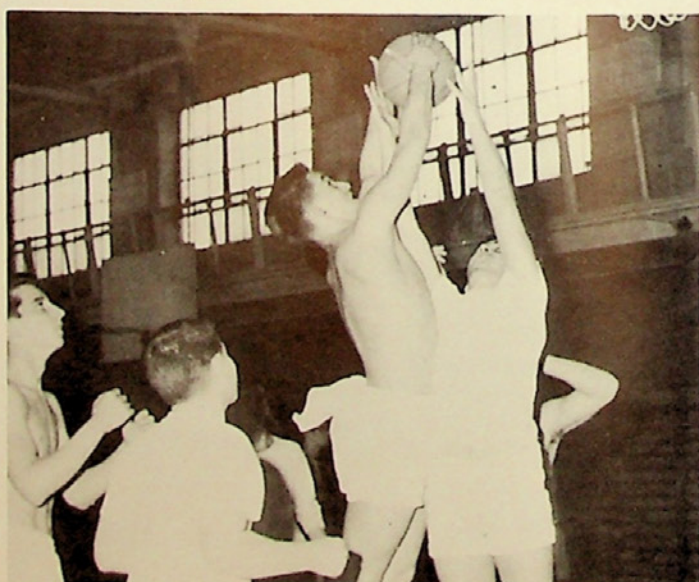

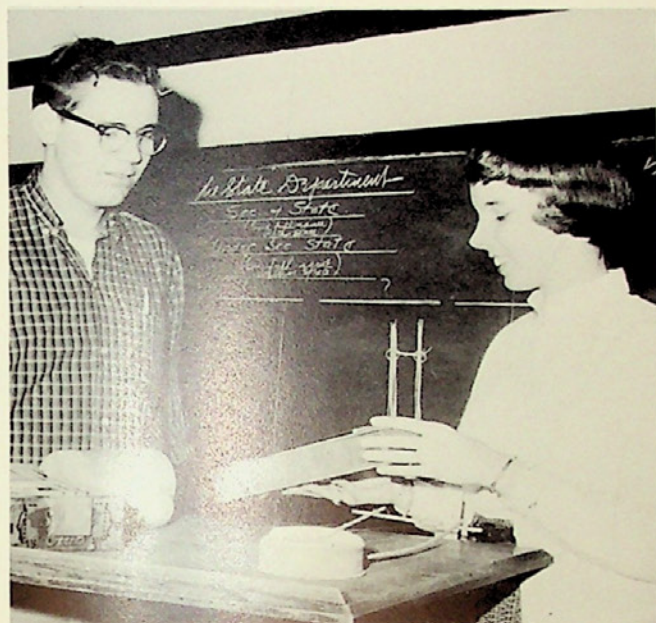

AUTOMOTIVE COURSES TRAIN

Upon completion of the auto body course taught by Mr. Vallone, students are prepared to enter the field of automobile body repair.

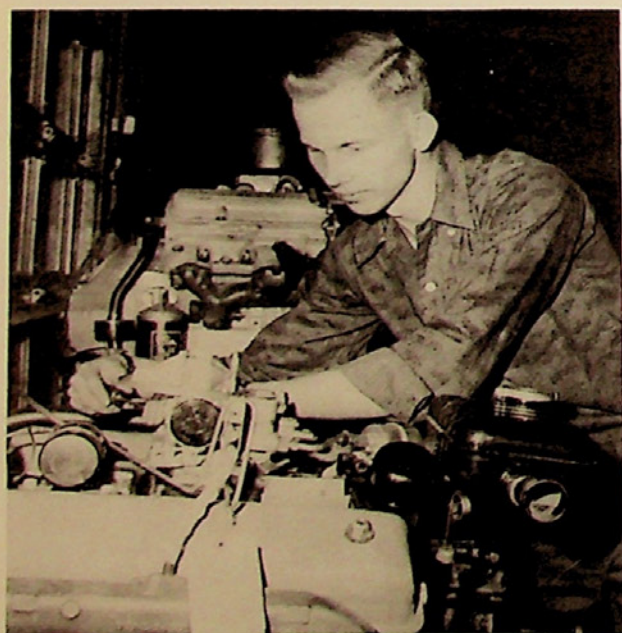
Fundamental body work and the use of its tools are taught to the sophomores. When assigned to a working area, sophomores are instructed in the techniques of sanding, aligning panels, and fixing dents.

Methods of welding, soldering, brazing, and shrinking are learned in the junior year. On the senior level the student is able to repair any part of a car body, and he is also fully trained in the spraying of automobiles.

As its title suggests, the auto mechanics course directed by Mr. Leidig provides the student with the basic knowledge necessary for servicing the intricate machinery of the automotive world.

Principles involved in the operation of an automobile are taught in the first two years. These include a study of each part, its individual function, and the causes and remedies for specific car troubles. In his senior year the student may gain the practical experience so vital in his field by actually working on automobiles.

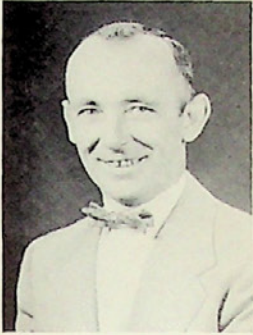

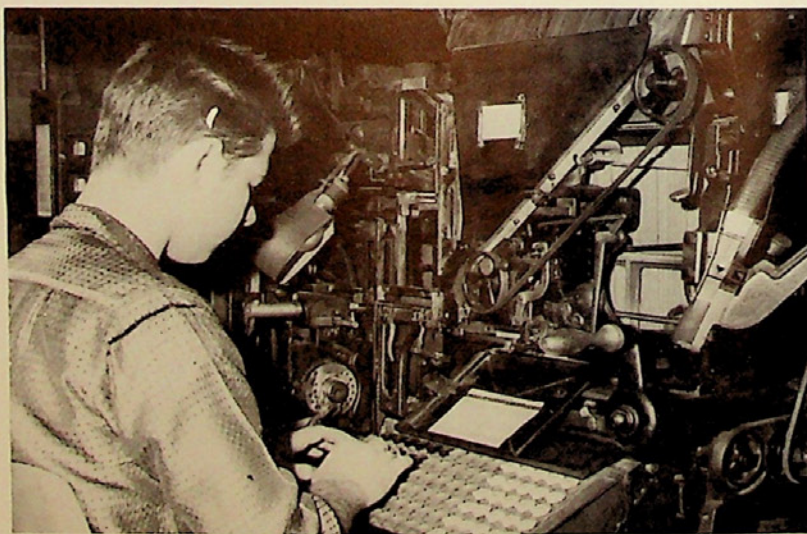


Divided into four areas, the print shop is under the direction of Mr. Bucchin and Mr. Hunsinger. After completing this course, a student is prepared for an apprenticeship.

In the darkroom the students are taught the fundamentals of photography and the preparation of plates for offset printing. The setting and proofreading of the type are done in the composing room. In the pressroom the actual printing takes place. Completion of the job occurs in the bindery where the products are stitched, wrapped, and drilled.

Use of hand tools is one of the first skills taught by Mr. Detwiler in woodworking. The beginner learns the types and grades of wood. He also is taught gluing, clamping, sanding, and joint-making procedures and operations.

Juniors and seniors learn how to safely operate the many power machines in the shop such as the power drill, lathe, sander, and jig saw.

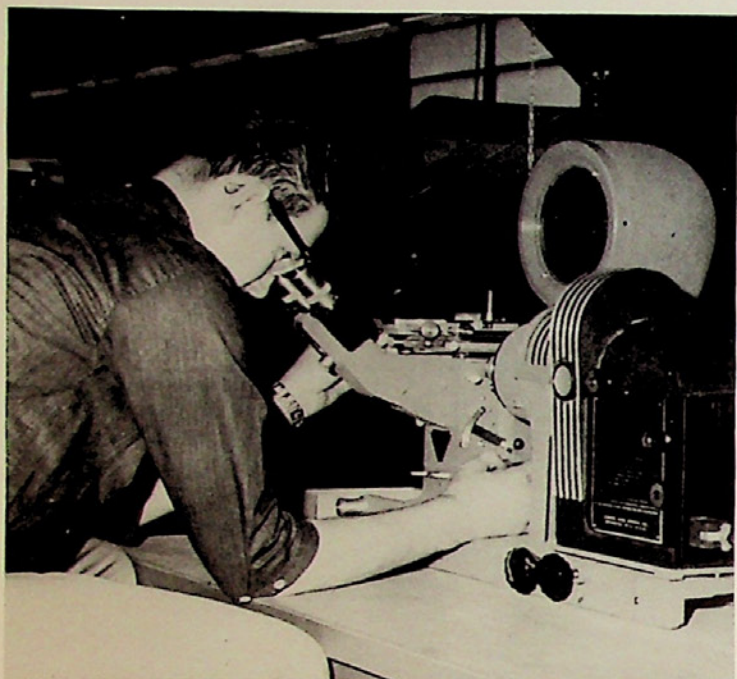

This year, after three years of planning by representatives of local industries, a course in metallurgy was initiated at Liberty High School. This program provides students with basic knowledge and experience. After graduation, students may pursue advanced studies and become metallurgical laboratory technicians or metallurgists.

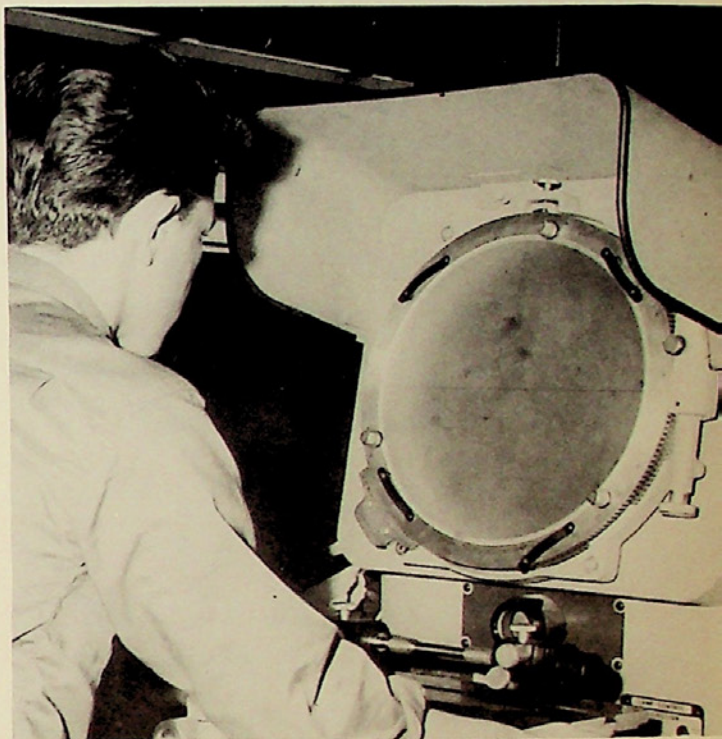
Instructed by Mr. Ross, the selected boys are taught the fundamentals from the removal of ore to the testing of the finished product. During the junior and senior years, students apply theories and techniques in actual laboratory practice.

ADDITION OF METALLURGY

During their three years in the machine shop, under the instruction of Mr. Cacciatore and Mr. Rhoads, the boys learn about design and use many mechanical devices. Included among these are the drill press, surface grinder, boring mill, and lathe.

Sophomores are able to work on small projects. The juniors work on more complex undertakings. In the third year, students operate all machines in the shop.

Mastering operations such as acetylene welding, arc welding, and acetylene burning further provides the students with a well-rounded background for becoming machinists.

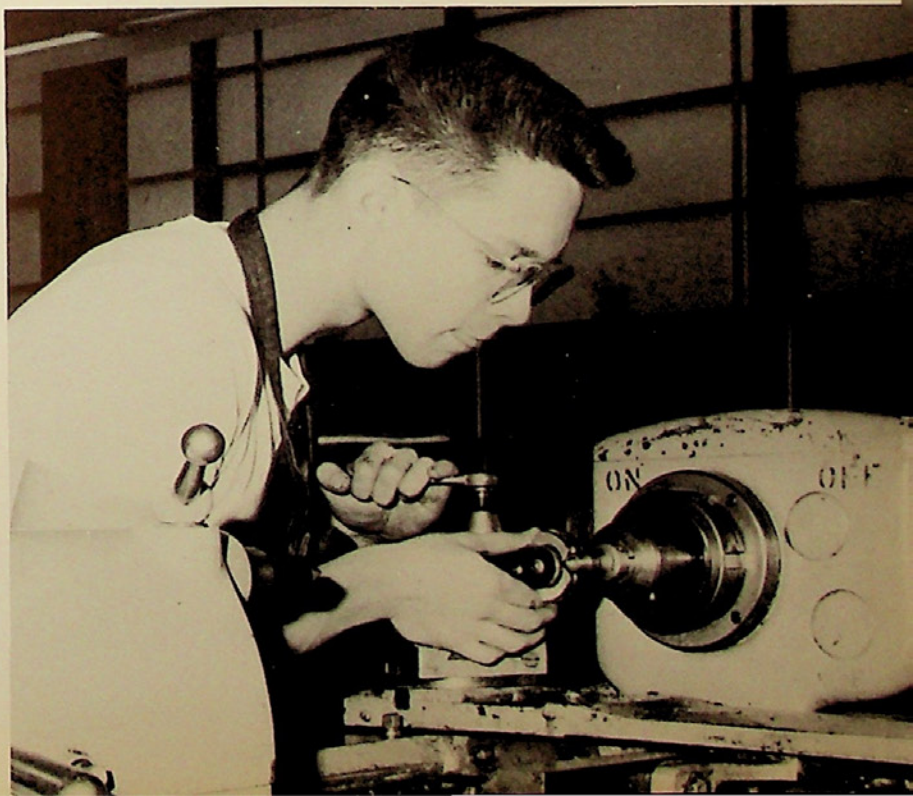

Because the uses of electronics in the modern world are both vital and varied, the study of the subject is interesting and important.

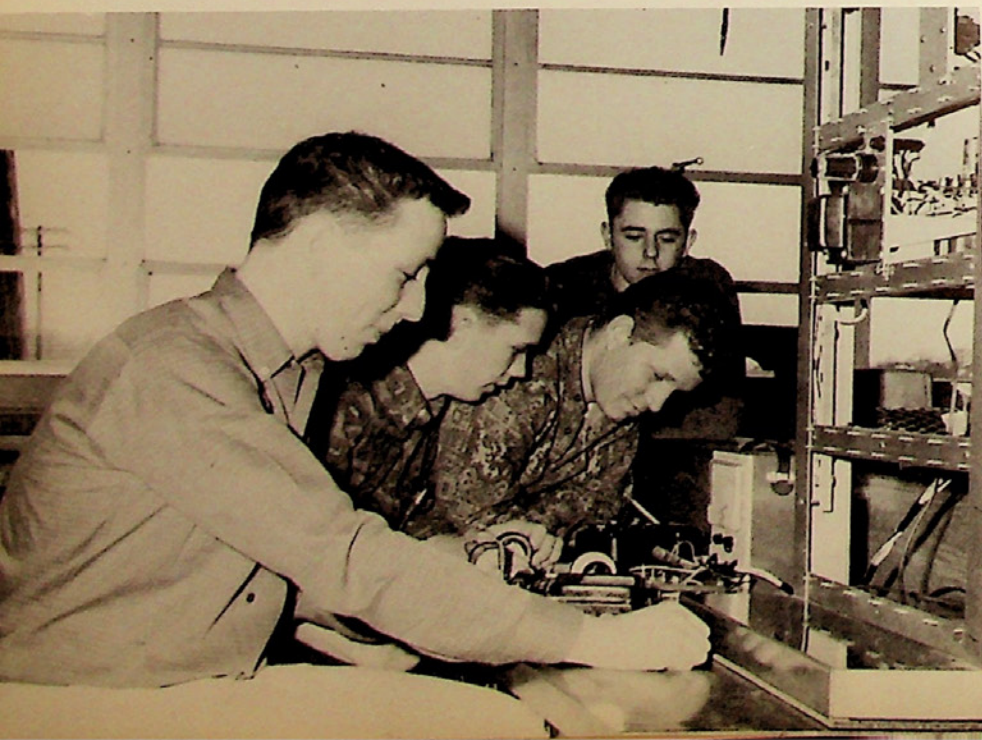

Mr. Risbon, the instructor in the junior year, presents the theory and practical applications of motors, generators, and transformers.

In the senior year Mr. Michaels familiarizes the students with the components used in basic electronic circuits and testing equipment used in checking them.

General metal working and construction are both included under the heading of building trades.

Sheet metal work, acetylene welding and burning, beam detail, and blueprint reading are taught in the general metal working shop. Students are instructed in the operation of crimping, bar fold, and rolling machines, along with soldering, in the sophomore year. Acetylene welding and burning are taught in the junior and senior years. Beam detail and blueprint reading are also taught by Mr. Dietrich.

Areas of construction work taught by Mr. Snyder include carpentry, heating, welding, plastering, template making, and roofing. Besides learning fundamental concepts of construction, students are given jobs both in and out of school which provide them with practical experience.

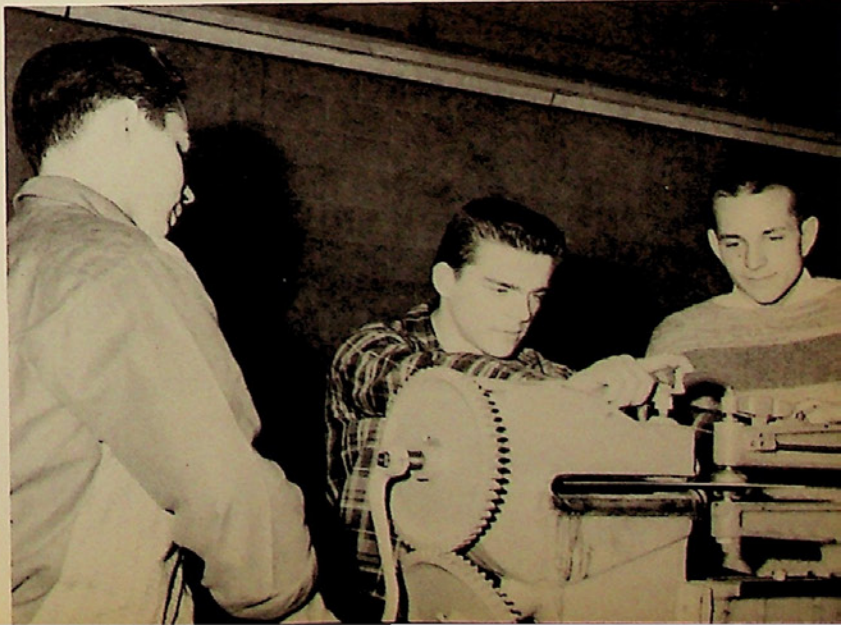

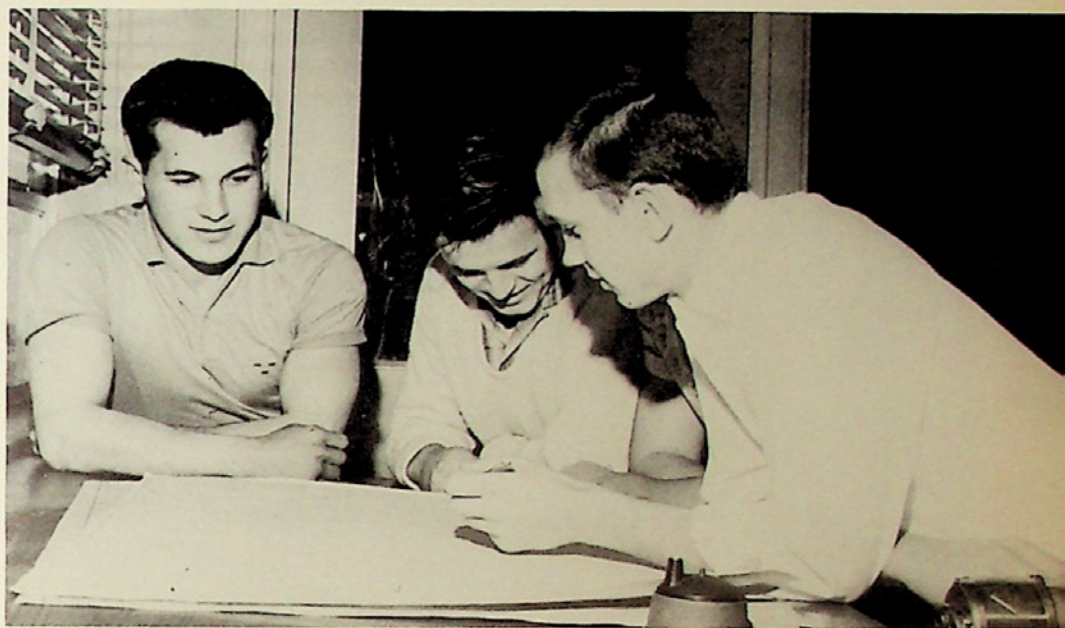
Drafting, the language of engineers and architects, is taught by Mr. Dubbeling and Mr. Kach. Mechanical drafting includes the drawing of machine, tool, and gear parts. Another course, structural drafting, covers the study of drawing beams and columns.

In related drawing, which is offered to sophomores and seniors, students under the direction of Mr. Messinger work mainly with blueprints.

Civil technology, a relatively new course at Liberty, is planned to breach the gap between the engineer and the draftsman. This course, which is taught by Mr. Andrucci, is the only one of its type in Pennsylvania. Its basic objective is to teach the fundamentals of surveying.

Innumerable opportunities are made available by the Future Nurses' League to girls desiring to enter the nursing profession.

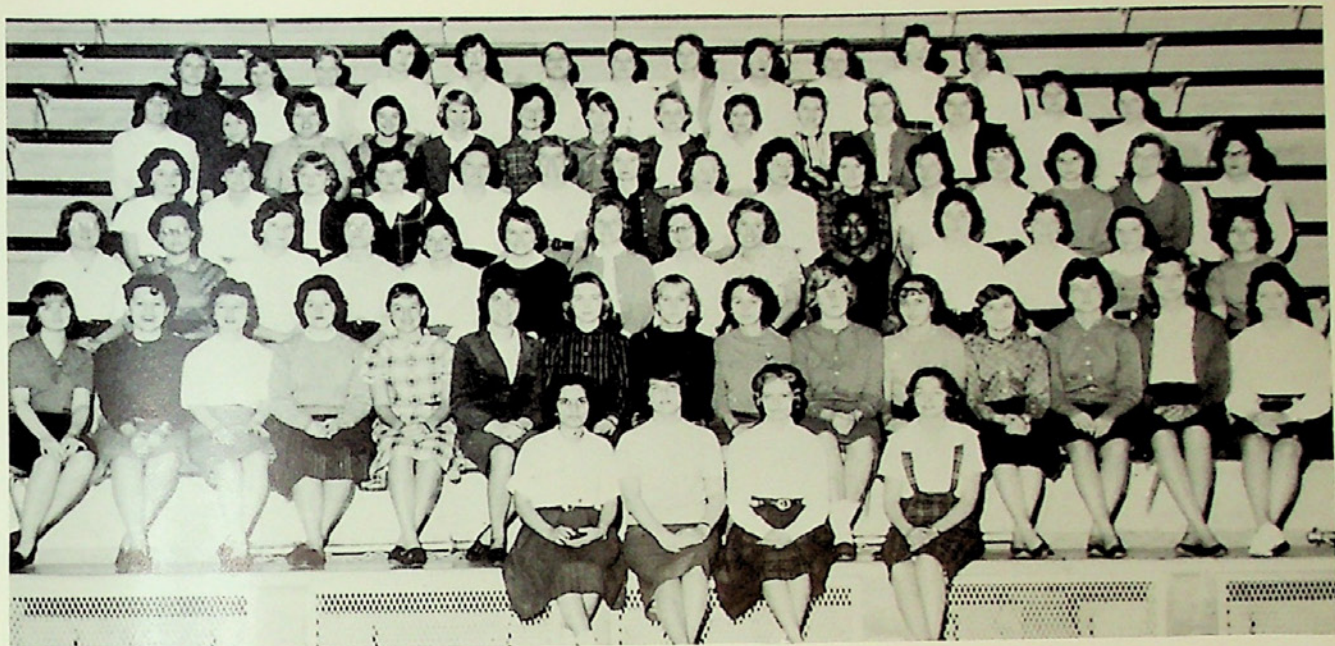

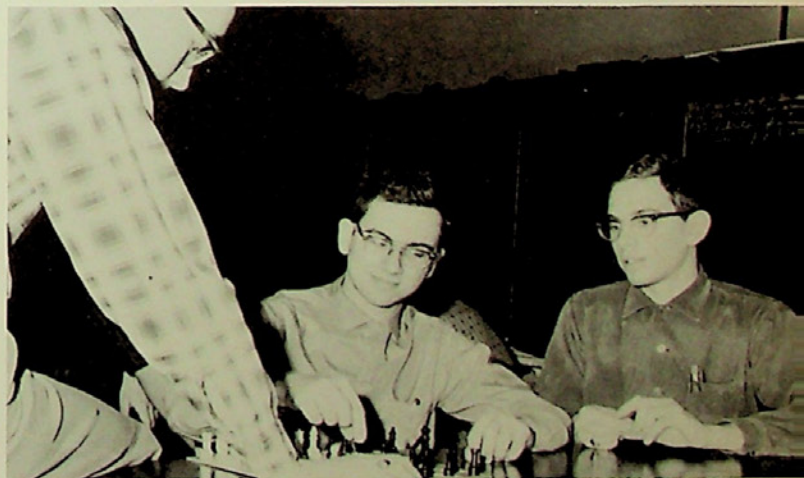
CHESS CLUB

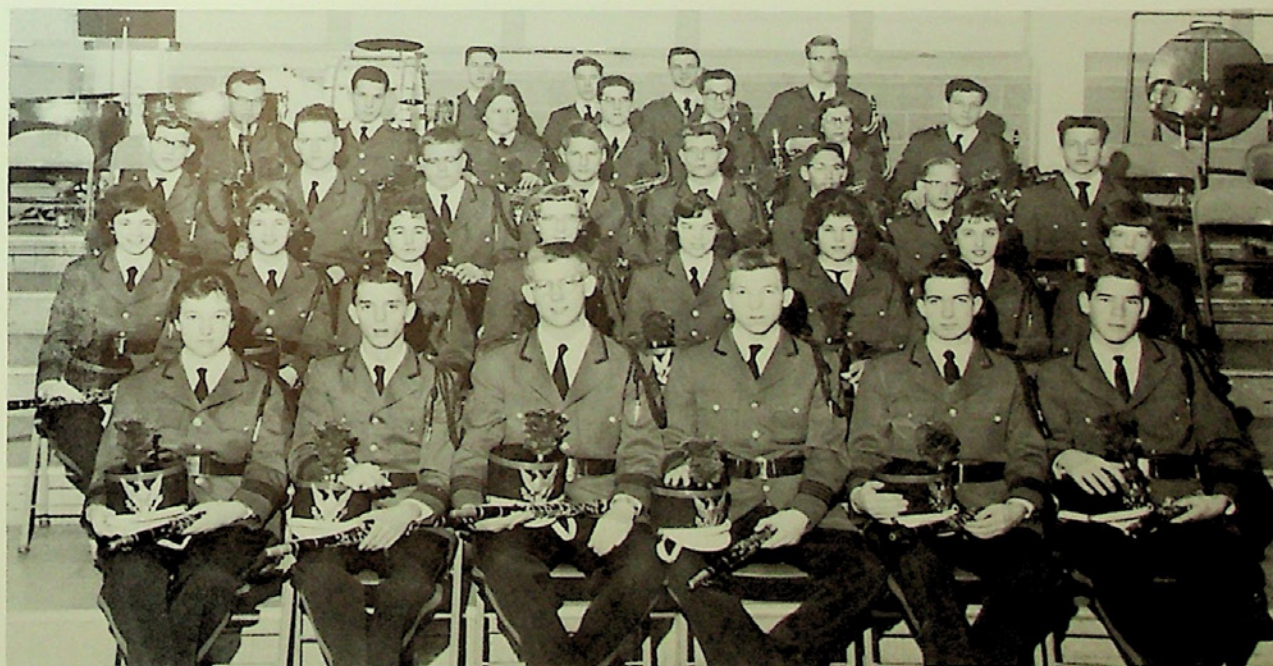

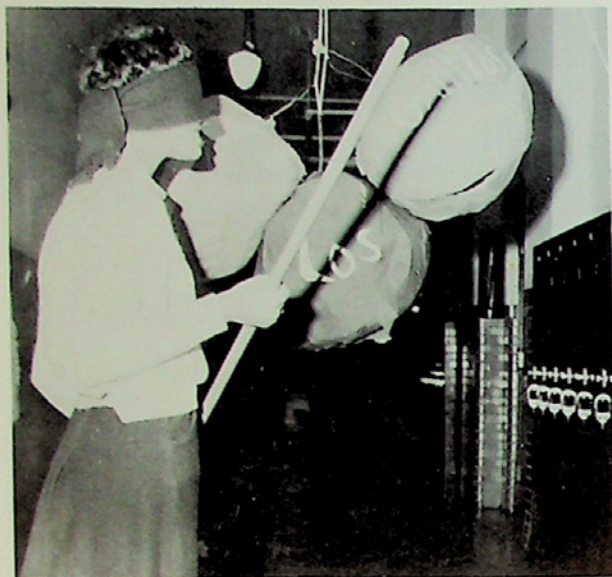

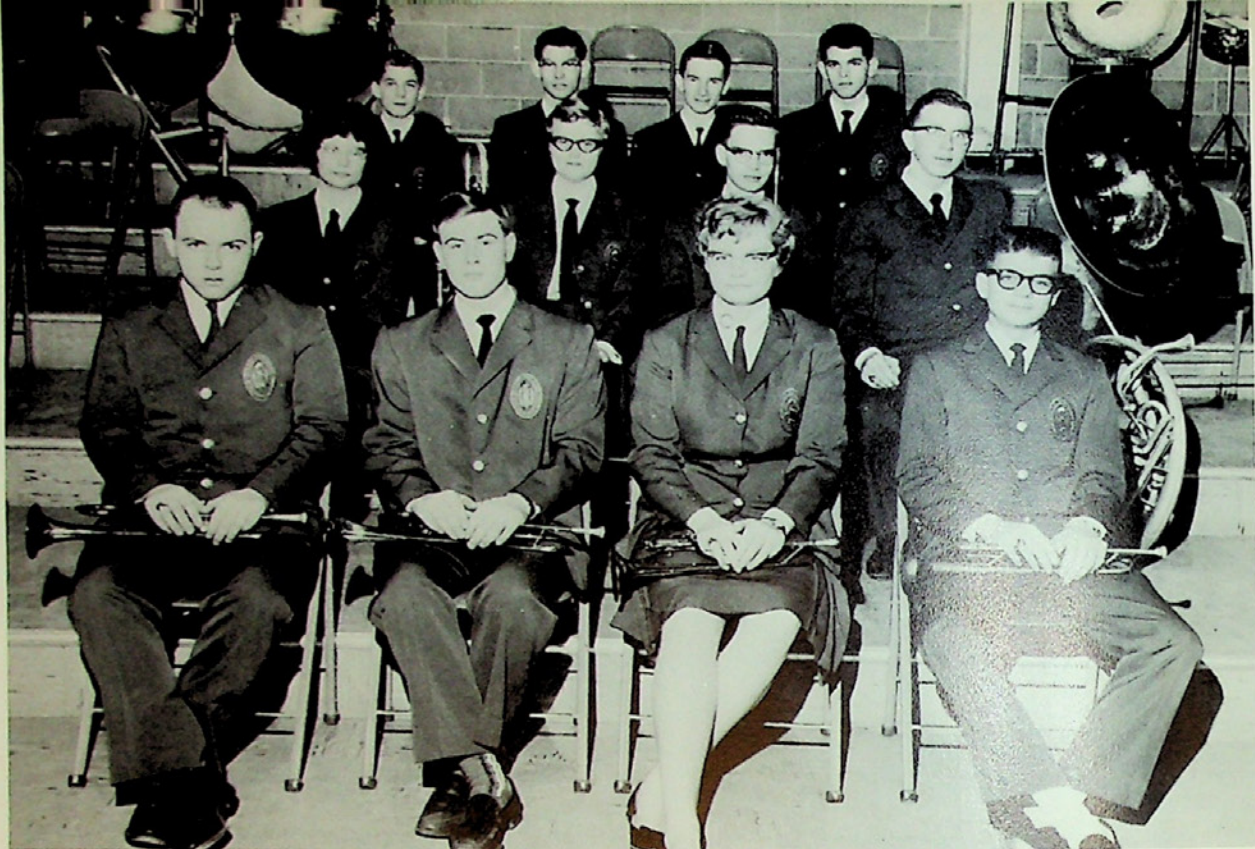

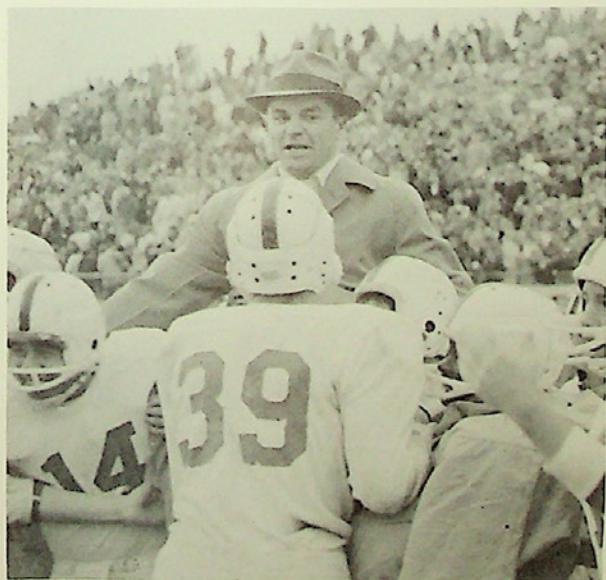

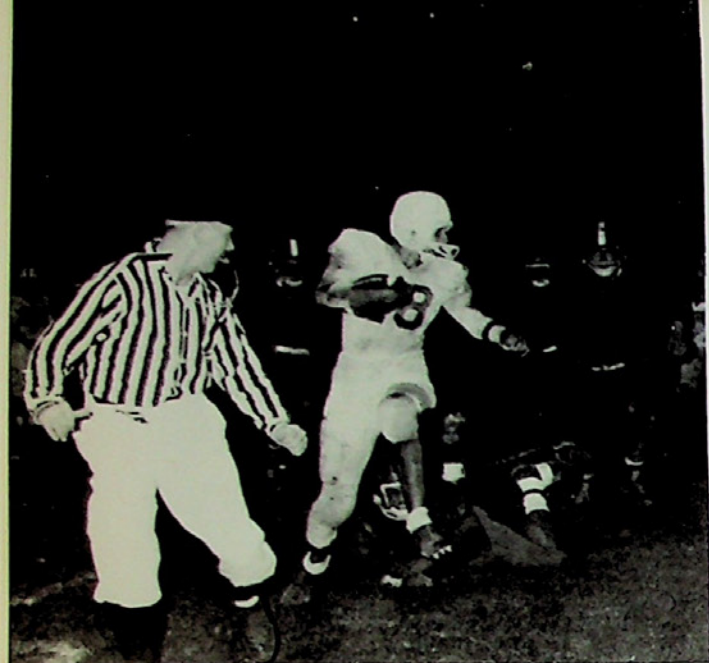

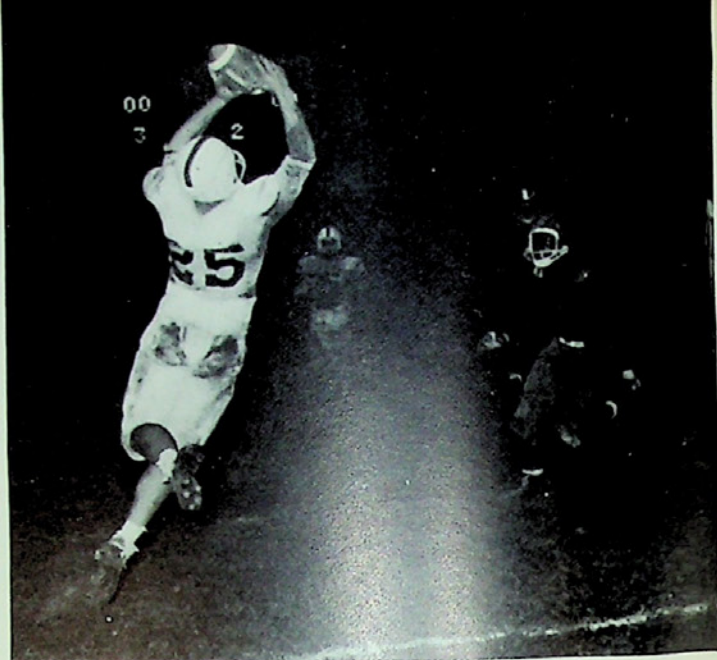

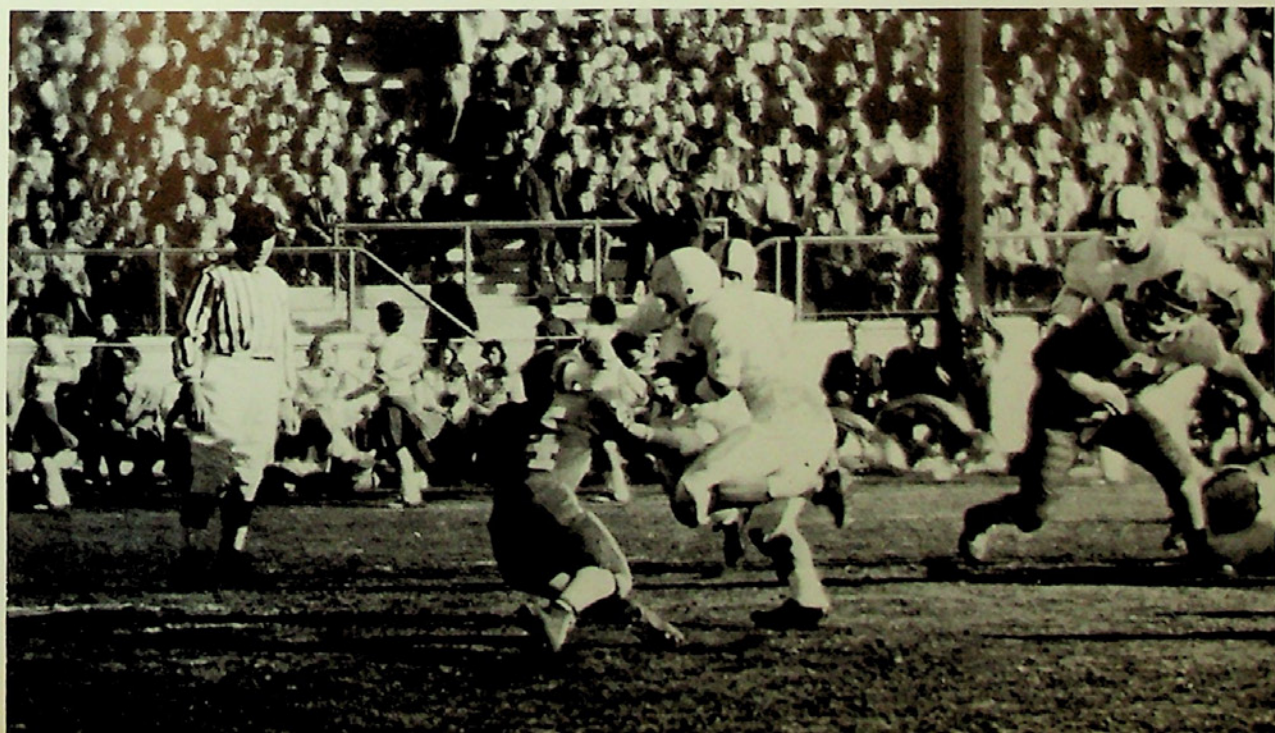

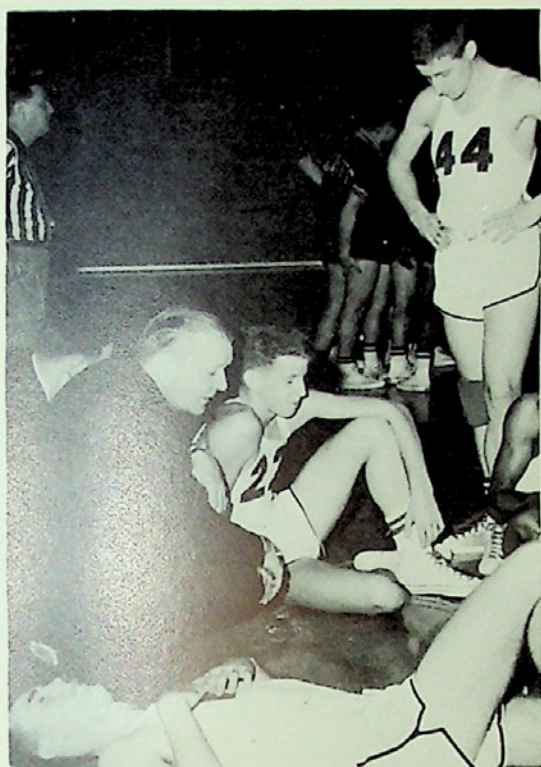
BASKETBALL TEAM WINS

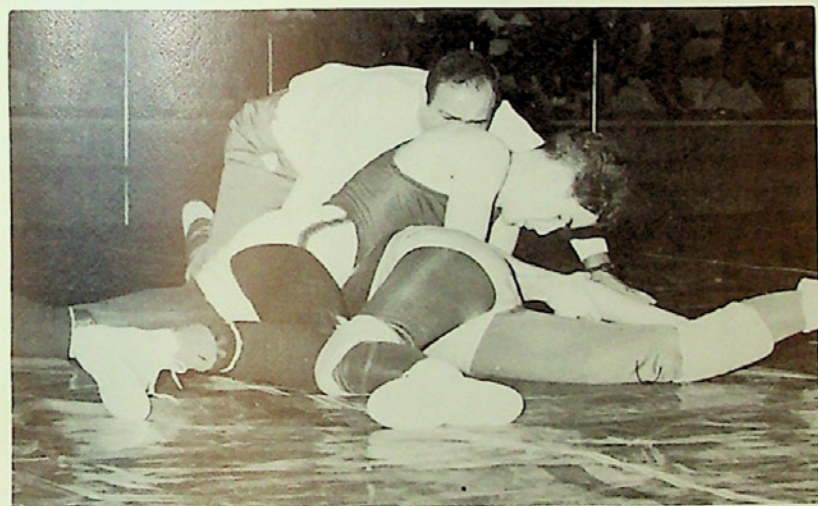

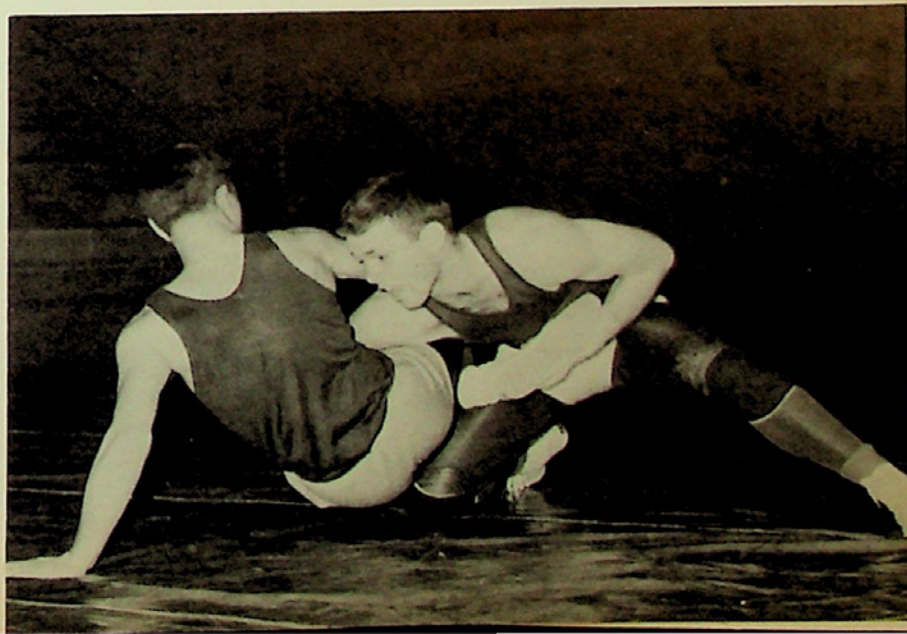

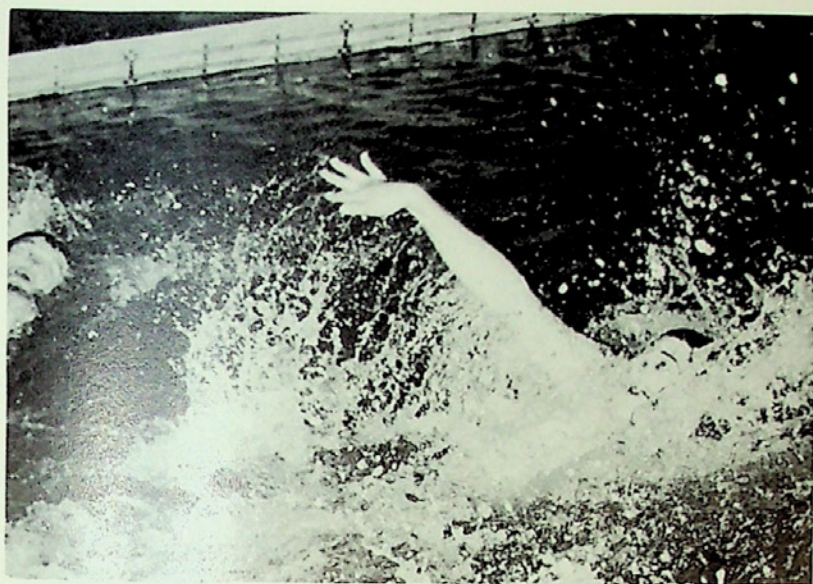

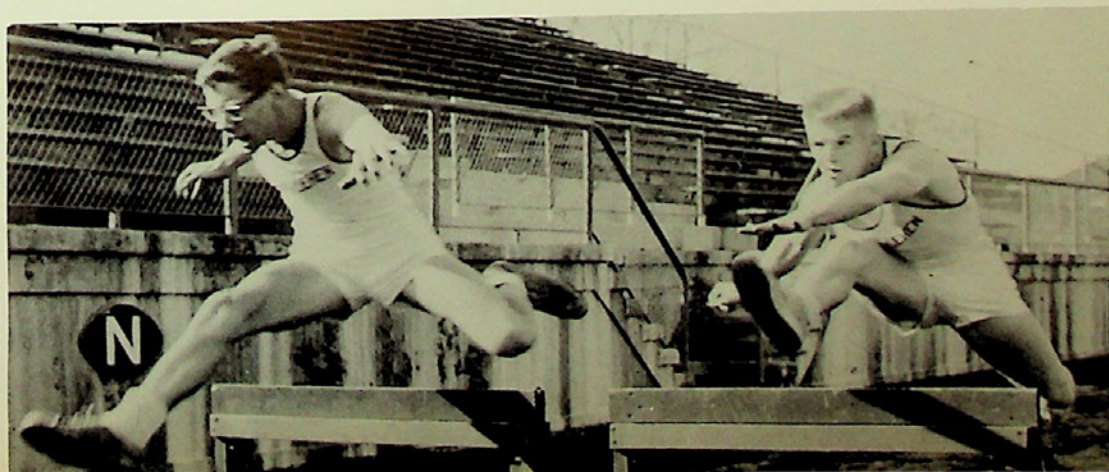

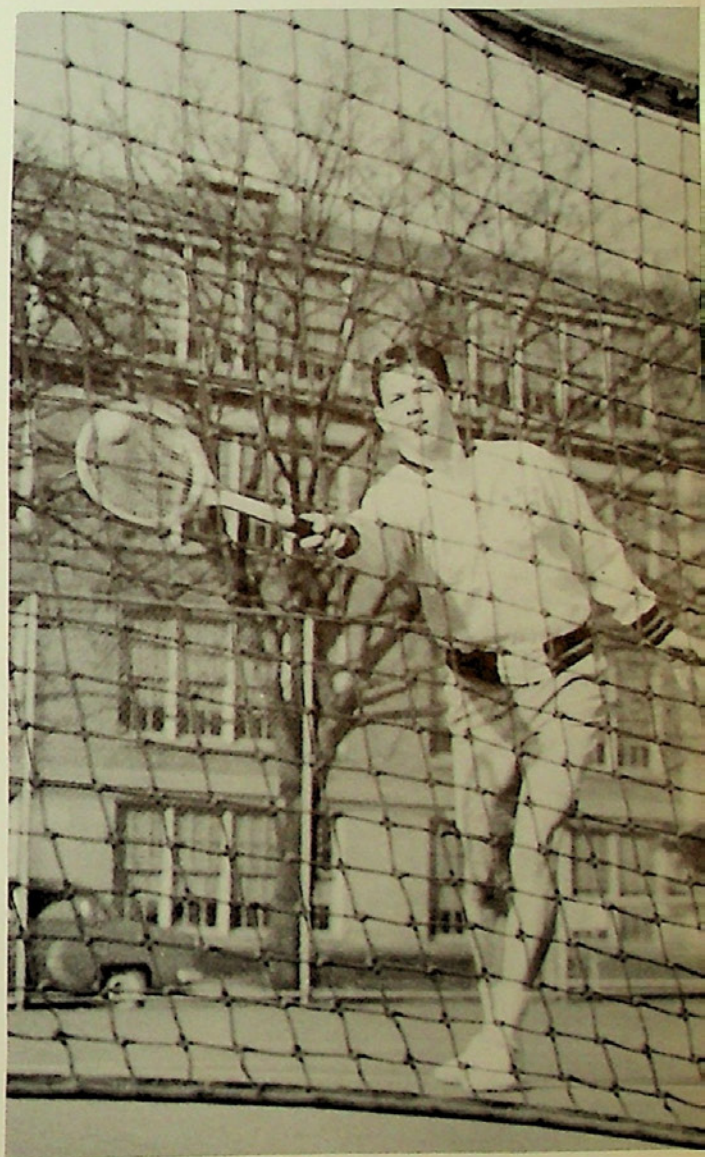

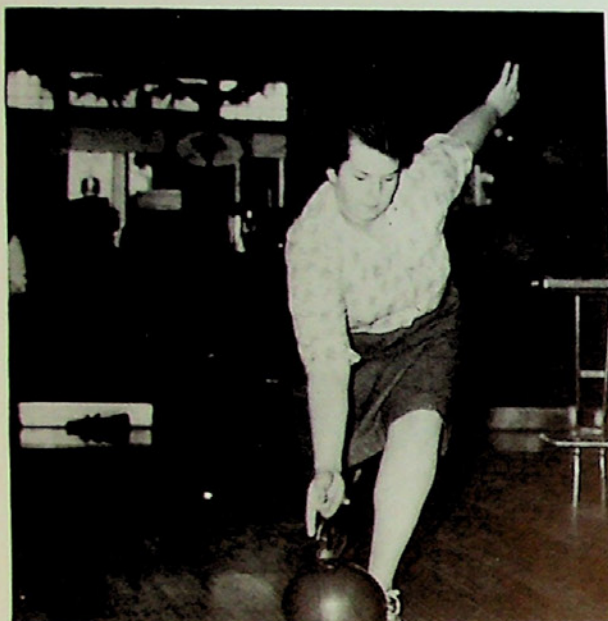

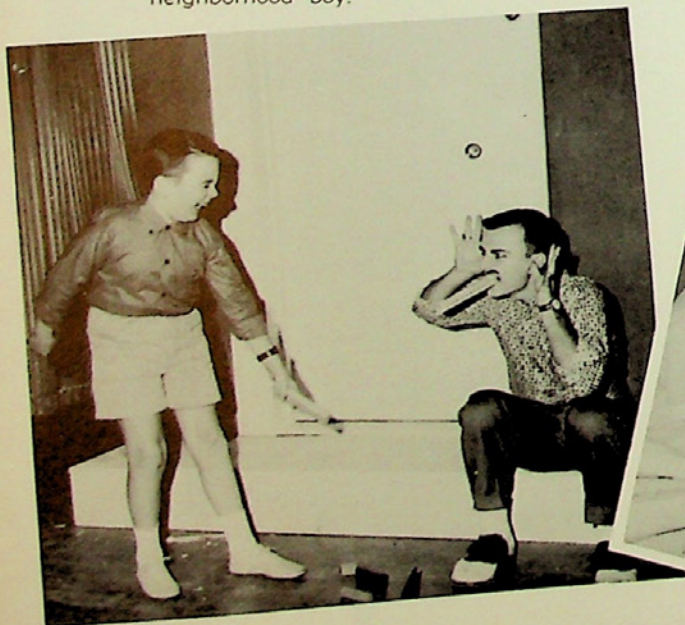

THE LITTLE DOG LAUGHED

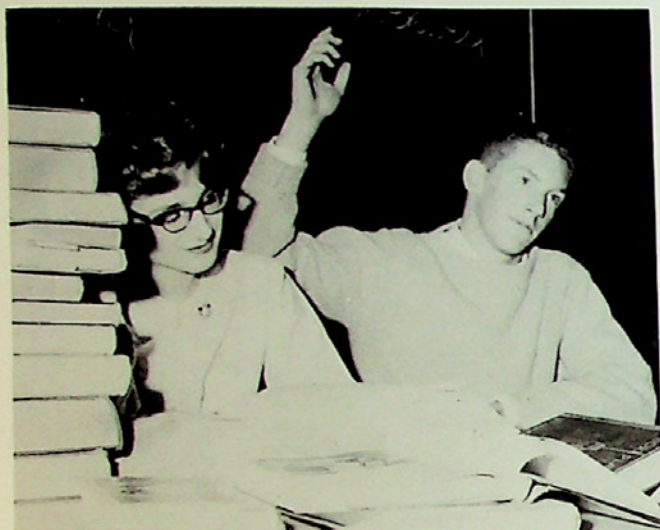
