

Colorful 'Hello Dolly' A Superb Production

The Class of 1980 can be justifiably proud of its colorful production of "Hello Dolly." The entire cast, nothing less than gorgeous in their rainbow-colored costumes, lit up the stage for all four performances on the evenings of March 14, 15, and 17 and on the afternoon of the 16th.

As the matchmaking Dolly Levi, Sarah Aronson was a joy to watch as she wheeled and dealed and managed and manipulated, in the process bringing love into everyone's lives, including her own. Joe Gross was quite convincing as the cranky, money-hungry Horace Vandergelder whose self-proclaimed cleverness proved to be no match for Dolly's wiles.

Also highlighting the play were hilarious performances by Harry Van Keuren as Cornelius Hackle and Doug Field as Barnaby Tucker, Vandergelder's two naive but most likeable clerks who vow to put on their Sunday clothes, see the world, and not come home till they've kissed a girl. On the receiving end of those kisses were Connie Jordan and Julie Hartranft as Irene Molloy and her assistant Minnie Fay, both of whom brought such beauty and talent to their roles as to make them instant sentimental favorites with the audiences at each enthusiastically received performance.

An energetic and most attractive chorus added much to the musical. Particularly pleasing was the "Waiters' Gallop" in which male members of the chorus put on a brilliant display of dancing and acrobatic maneuvers.

At the helm of the production was Mr. Dale Kehler, who succeeded in directing a polished and professional-looking endeavor. Mrs. Diane Signarovitz was responsible for the choreography, and Mr. Gregory MacGill was in charge of the fine pit orchestra. Special mention must also be made of the efforts of Mrs. Jean Hafner, who designed the costumes, and Mrs. Suzanne Kroboth and Mrs. Shirley Daluisio, who helped Mrs. Hafner to make the beautiful outfits.

Liberty Band Superb In Concert Performance

Eight herald trumpets sounding the notes of a spectacular fanfare marked the beginning of one of the finest concerts performed by the Grenadier Band. The two performances, held on the evenings of March 28 and 29, attracted well over 2,000 enthusiastic listeners. Highlighting the program were a pair of demanding overtures, Strauss' "Die Fledermaus" and Rossini's "William Tell." Especially outstanding in the Rossini work was the playing of oboist Linda Henkelmann and flutist Mike Sewell. Other selections included "Parade of the Tall Ships," "Holiday for Winds," "The Irish Washerwoman," Bach's "Air" from the "Suite in D Major," "Bricusse and Newley on Broadway," conducted by Assistant Director Greg MacGill, and, of course, marches by Sousa.

The soloist for this year's concert was Kimberly Wessner, whose flawless bassoon playing in Godfrey's "Lucy Long" won her warm applause. The talented senior displayed an expertise which is very seldom seen at this level of musician-ship on any instrument, much less one as difficult as the bassoon. The spotlight also fell upon Senior Cheryle Veanus, who was presented with the Raymond Hoffert Award for

outstanding service to the Grenadier Band.

As always the hard-working supporting units added that flashy "something extra" guaranteed to please any audience. The majorettes, who put on a particularly excellent routine, the highland dancers, pipe corps, and color guard were all well received, and deservedly so.




Modernized 'Macbeth' An Imaginative Treat

Shakespeare once again came alive this year as the Liberty High School Drama Club presented *Macbeth* as its all-school play on the evenings of April 17, 18, and 19 in the auditorium. In keeping with its past two such efforts, the club's production was far from being a traditional one for, under the direction of advisers Judith Smullen and Leonard Perret, all preconceived notions of how a Shakespearean play should be performed were cast aside and replaced by a modernized and sometimes almost disturbingly surrealistic interpretation. The production was well mounted and well done, offering further proof, if any is really needed, of the greatness and universality of Shakespeare's works.

A special set, done in red and black with mirrors strategically placed around the stage, was designed by Doug Field. LeeAnn Schray and Donna Muschlitz created the special effects and lighting which did much to enhance the ominous mood of the story, as did music ranging from Tchaikovsky to Pink Floyd and Kansas. And some excellent acting, particularly on the part of Chris Allman as the title character and Juliann Gregus as his scheming wife, also deserves recognition as having contributed to the performances' success.

A large and responsive audience was on hand in Memorial Gymnasium on the evening of April 25 as the Liberty High School orchestra presented its 15th annual Pops concert. Joining the Liberty ensemble this year were the 77 members of the Massapequa High School orchestra from New York under the direction of Mr. Martin Feldman.

The massed contingent of 170 players got things off to a rousing start with Hector Berlioz's "Marche Hongroise." Under the baton of Mr. Ronald Sherry, the orchestra continued to please the audience with such favorites as Gliere's "Russian Sailors' Dance" and von Weber's "Invitation to the Dance," which featured some fine solo work by Patti Berger on cello and pianist Mako Haruta.

Mr. Feldman then took the podium and conducted "Danse Infernale" from "The Firebird" by Stravinsky and selections from the Broadway hit "The Wiz." A special feature encouraged by Mr. Sherry, orchestra members, and the audience was a novelty violin solo by the Massapequa director called "Hot Canary." Mr. Feldman's clever playing got plenty of laughs from the audience and an enthusiastic round of applause from all, particularly the string section of the orchestra, who appreciated the difficulty of the piece.

During the program orchestra president Maria DiTroia was presented with the Hoffert Award for her outstanding contributions to the organization.

Over 250 couples gathered in the Grand Ballroom of the Hotel Bethlehem on the evening of May 9 as Liberty High held its annual Junior-Senior prom. A light show by Edwin Erickson also enhanced the evening. Music for the occasion was provided by The Topics, with sponsorship of the affair underwritten by the Junior Class.

Suspense, Surprises Mark 1980 Graduation


For those who like suspense, surprises, and "cliff-hanger" endings, 1980 was the year to graduate. Because of the 180-day minimum state requirement, some questionable planning of the school calendar by the central administration, and a pair of snow days that left the district short of the legal limit, the date of commencement exercises see-sawed between the traditional weekend ceremony, scheduled for June 7, and a mid-week graduation on June II. Finally, after much discussion and debate coupled with the unwillingness of the state legislature to pass a special bill exempting the BASD from the 180-day regulation, the mid-week date became Graduation Day for the Class of 1980.

One of the better commencement exercises in the past few years began with an invocation by Joseph Gross, class treasurer, and continued with two speeches on the theme "In Celebration of Liberty." Class Speaker Kevin Morano stated that the knowledge gained at Liberty "is something we will use and build on the rest of our lives," while Faculty Speaker Connie Jordan stressed that the lives of the graudates "will be so much more complete and fulfilling when we do courageously enter this world, reaching for every possible liberty within our grasp." Soloist Matthew Walker then delivered an outstanding rendition of "Climb Every Mountain," accompanied by the orchestra.















Soloist Matt Walker performs "Climb Every Mountain."








































Language Clubs Study International Cultures





Talented Stage Crew Keeps Things Moving



'Excellent' The Word For School Newspaper






Young Writer Captures Highest State Honors











All-Stater Valianatos Paces Winning Campaign

The Cosmos? The Fury? Well, not quite. But Liberty's soccer team continued to be just as much of a force to reckon with on its own level of play as the Hurricane captured I4 of twenty contests, in the process once again contending for the EPL crown and capturing a berth in the district playoffs held in Allentown.

In his second season as head coach, Joe Tavares was faced with something of a rebuilding job. Only four seniors returned to the field, so most of the lineup consisted of relatively inexperienced underclassmen. Particularly missed was Senior Tim Nonnemacher, unable to play this year, whose talent can be attested to by the fact that he was drafted by the Pennsylvania Stoners, the Lehigh Valley's entry in the American Soccer League.

After tuning up and making adjustments in the pre-season Elco Tournament, Liberty opened its East Penn League campaign with a 12-game win streak that included a thrilling come-from-behind 3-2 victory over intracity rival Freedom under the lights in BASD Stadium. An upset loss to a scrappy Emmaus contingent and a three-overtime scoreless duel with Freedom left Liberty and the Patriots tied for the championship, necessitating a playoff two days later at Moravian College. Freedom, playing a superb defensive game, blunted the Hurricane attack sufficiently to walk off the field with a 3-l triumph and the EPL title. A week later Liberty, emotionally drained by its encounters with the Pates, dropped a 3-2 decision to Emmaus in the opening round of the District XI tournament at Patriots' Park.

Senior Mike Valianatos was the Hurricane's chief offensive threat, and his outstanding play earned him a spot on the all-state team. Chris Allman, Jeff Raniere, and Derek Fleck were the other veterans who formed the nucleus of the club. Underclassmen Joe Petraglia, Brian Rodenbach, Ken Pellatiro, Ed Hrichak, Pete Csongradi, Mike Molnar, Jim Collins, and Brian Spadaccia were all instrumental to the team's success and will certainly make the Hurricane a championship contender again next year.



Wide Receiver Bill Loftus makes the first-down reception.




Bob Detweiler struggles for yardage as the Freedom defense converges.








Goalie Ann Wrable sets up to stop a shot.




Before a race, Tom Collier takes in some advice from the coach.




Ron Weitknecht drives hard for the finish.






It was a tremendous team effort.







Talented Trio Leads LHS Basketball Team

























Added to the above-mentioned efforts were the considerable talents of Bill Danish, Mike Engiles, Bob Franssen, George Mowrer, and Jim Willner.








DeFazio, Tihansky Pace LHS Gymnastics Team












Returning Lettermen Spark Volleyball Team




Attitude Alteration Produces Winning Year

















Lisa Hudock Shines, New Talent Develops For Girls' Track Team

Rebuilding a team can be a painful process, but when you start with cornerstones like Lisa Hudock, Sue Schneck, and MaryBeth Marcincin, some of the sting disappears. New coach Tom Zelko found this to be true when he inherited a team which last year won the EPL title but also lost some very key performers to graduation. Some of the new people — notably Diane Wruble, Pam Sobchak, Fran Yuhas, Lisa Henry, Pam Schneck, and Carol Danish — should return Liberty to prominence in the future, but this year was, for the most part, a time to learn and experiment.

Despite the sub-.500 final record, there were a number of brighter moments for individuals. Diane Wruble set a new school record in the shot put and finished third in Districts, missing a trip to the state meet by only a few centimeters. Pam Sobchak progressed steadily in the triple jump and also came within a few centimeters of a trip to States with her third place finish at Districts. The 4x100 relay team, composed of Marcincin, Yuhas, Sue Schneck, and Hudock, and the 1600 meter relay team, composed of the first three girls plus Pam Schneck, both made it to States after finishing second in District XI competition. LeeAnn Schray did a capable job in the hurdles despite injury, and top distance runner Cathy Snyder performed well before having to end the season on the sidelines with a severe case of Achilles tendinitis. Lisa Henry and Carol Danish displayed blossoming talent in the high and long jumps, respectively.

But the best has been saved for last. Lisa Hudock, justifiably ranked as one of the top ten sprinters in Pennsylvania, was a consistent quadruple winner, taking first in the 100 and 200 meter dashes and the triple jump, and anchoring the 4x100 relay in dual meets throughout the season. Probably the most memorable moment of the season for her and for those who cheered her on came in the District XI meet at Metzgar Field on the afternoon of May 17 when she walked away with both the triple jump and 100 meter dash titles, winning the latter event in 12.4 seconds while decisively defeating Allen's Kathy Isaac, who some had mistakenly thought to be the best sprinter in the area. The ESSC-bound Hurricane senior also established a school record 3714" in the triple jump at the state meet and just missed qualifying for the finals of the 100 meter dash by .004 second, both accomplishments coming despite being hampered by a severe throat infection and a painful ankle injury with which she had had to run all season long.







English Courses Pose Challenge

"Teaching English" is a phrase that embraces much work. Those who did so at Liberty High School were faced with the challenge of guiding high school students towards an understanding and appreciation of literature in its many forms. Students became acquainted with the many kinds of prose narrative, such as the short story, the romantic novel, the realistic novel, and the adventure story, several kinds of drama, various forms of poetry, and the critical essay. Moreover there is a host of difficulties relating to the use of the English language itself, and teachers worked to insure the basic literacy of students by emphasizing on each level the rules of correct usage. Courses in journalism and creative writing provided students with the opportunity to explore a possible career area or to experiment with new and different modes of self-expression.

Mrs. Sally Campbell headed the department and skillfully brought to a conclusion a three-year program of curricular revision that saw the courses on each grade level extensively revamped and updated to student needs.


Math Department Provides Answers

During the 1979-80 school year, Liberty provided an extensive and outstanding science program. Twenty-one courses were available, and next year yet another additional class in biology will be offered.

The overall objectives of the Science Department, headed by Mr. Robert Buffman, were to provide students with a well rounded science education and to create a general appreciation of the discipline in the physical, chemical, and life science areas. The department worked towards meeting those goals by implementing a program in which students first become familiar with basic terminology and the tools of scientific investigation. On the senior level the department not only provided rigorous training for college preparatory students, but also stressed in its courses information which would help those not intending to further their education by introducing them to science-related occupations not requiring a college degree.

Languages Needed By All Students

In line with the current national tendency, fewer students were enrolled in foreign language courses at Liberty than had been the case several years ago. This decrease in numbers is usually attributed to the elimination of a language requirement by many colleges, which in turn allows students to rationalize their nonparticipation on the grounds that the study of a foreign language has no "practical value." Department Chairman Jerry Damandl disagrees with that rationale, however, and believes that students are making a mistake in an attempt to find an easy way out of academic responsibilities. He stated that language study provides a student with a discipline that no other course can provide, increasing the individual's ability not only in the new language, but in English as well, since only a strong fundamental understanding of English will allow a student to succeed in learning a new tongue.

Although the enrollment may not have been at an alltime high, it was noted that those students taking a language were of a high caliber and generally stayed with it for four full years, beginning in junior high school. German, Spanish, French, Latin, and Russian were the courses from which students could choose.

Special Programs Aid LHS Students


The Cooperative Diversified Occupations Program is an enterprise shared by the Bethlehem Area School District and various merchants and manufacturers. Under the direction and supervision of Mr. Albert Senavitis and Mr. Robert Kishbaugh, approximately 75 students spent half-days on the job and the remainder of the day in school. The aims of the program are threefold: (I) to provide students with vocational training, (2) to provide students who experience financial hardship with an opportunity to meet this need and still remain in school, and (3) to provide potential dropouts with a half-day school, half-day work program. Those involved worked twenty to forty hours each week.

The Occupational Education program was under the direction of the same two individuals, aided by Mrs. Nancy Wilcrout. The approximately fifty students in this division had to find their own employment and spent half of their day at Vo-Tech.

The bi-lingual program was formed at Liberty in an attempt to help students who come into the district at the high school level with little or no knowledge of English. Although Hispanics comprise the largest segment of those enrolled, world affairs have created a growing number of Asiatic students new to the area. The goal in every case is to teach these students enough English to allow their speedy enrollment in regular classes, thus minimizing the disruption of the learning process in regular areas of study.

Students were given the opportunity to sharpen their driving skills thanks to the efforts of the driver education instructors. Classroom presentations, time in the simulator, and on-the-road training made up the program required of all juniors.

The usual fine job of providing special services to the student body and faculty alike was done by the school nurses and librarians. Their efforts were, perhaps, not appreciated as much as should have been the case, for their work is seldom spotlighted. But without them the school would surely run less efficiently.
