







Foreword


Well, we've come to the end of another year and we can look back and say it was a year filled with accomplishments. We are well pleased.




Coach Johnny Butler was faced with the task of building a football team around one backfield replacement and two linemen with limited experience, for he had lost thirty-three members of last year's squad. In answer to Butler's call for practice, one hundred thirty-five candidates reported on August 25, most of them without any previous experience. In all too short a time the first game drew near, and Butler found his team not only lacking in experience but also in weight, for the line averaged 167 and the backs 165, compared to last year's 200 pound line and a backfield averaging better than 175.

Bethlehem scored in every period as they rolled over Scranton Tech, last year's Eastern Conference Champions, 32-6. In less than a minute after the opening kickoff, Bethlehem scored a touchdown, the result of a poor punt made by the Scranton tailback. The remainder of the game was largely dominated by Bethlehem drives which resulted in four more touchdowns.

In our first conference game, Bethlehem traveled to Reading and defeated the "Red Knights," 25-6. Held on even terms throughout the first half, Bethlehem broke loose the second half and rolled over the "Red Knights", scoring three touchdowns, although they were stopped twice within Reading's 20 yard line.

"The Hurricane" scored its most impressive victory of the season when it upset the highly favored Easton eleven, 19-0. The highlight of the first half was Bethlehem's return of a punt 40 yards for a touchdown behind beautiful down-field blocking. In the final period, Bethlehem drove 83 yards for a touchdown, which was followed by another, the result of on intercepted pass.

Hazleton broke our four game winning streak when they defeated the Butler Boys, 6-0. Bethlehem had the edge in statistics, but on the scoreboard Hazleton was on the top, the result of a pass play which netted 25 yards and a touchdown. It was Hazleton's day, for they recovered all three Bethlehem fumbles and stopped a Bethlehem drive on their own 2 yard line.

Bethlehem outplayed unbeaten Phillipsburg, but the old rivals battled to a scoreless tie in a game played in our stadium. Although the Bethlehem team was heavily outweighed, it drove to the 11, 19, and 32 yard lines on three successive drives which lacked the necessary scoring punch. Bethlehem's line-play was exceptional, and the hard running backs made the most of the situation.

In a hectic game played at Shamokin, Bethlehem defeated the "Greyhounds", 38-20. With the score tied at half time, 20-20, Bethlehem spurted in the second half to tally the greatest number of touchdowns scored against Shamokin in fifteen years. Bethlehem scored two touchdowns in three plays, but the Shamokin pass offensive tied the score and threw a fearful scare into the Bethlehem stands.

In Bethlehem's final game of the season played in our stadium on Thanksgiving Day, Allentown defeated our boys 12-0. The first half ended in a scoreless deadlock with Bethlehem having a slight edge in the statistics. Early in the third period, Bethlehem employed a deceptive spread formation, the spark to a drive which was stopped by an intercepted pass on Allentown's 35. It was this same spread, which resulted in an Allentown touchdown, the climax to the return of an intercepted pass to our 15. Late in the fourth period, Allentown had the ball on our 38, the result of a poor punt made by the Bethlehem tailback. By their victory over Bethlehem, Allentown completed their season undefeated, and became the unofficial champions of Big Fifteen.

The annual Public Testimonial for Bethlehem High's football team and band was given by the Bethlehem Kiwanis Club, December 3, 1941, with Ray Morrison, coach of Temple University, guest speaker.


Life Saving






