Men of All Walks of Life Between 45 and 65 Registered Under Selective Service Act

Approximately 7,100 men be-tween the ages of 45 and 65 regis-tered with the three Selective Ser-vice Boards in Bethlehem during the fourth registration period Mon-day. taking registrations, many of them school teachers or retired school teachers. Each board worked in shifts in order to lighten the burden on the registrations.

At noon today only one of the three boards — Board No. 2 — had not completed tabulation of actual registrations, but it was indicated the total registered there would be about 2,200. Board No. 1 enrolled 3,634 men and Board No. 3, 1244. The registration period ended at 9 o'clock Monday night, after 14 hours, during which a continual stream of men poured into the reg-istration centers. Those who registered in the upper age bracket represented men in all walks of life — businessmen, indus-trialists, laborers, professional men and many who in years past have retired from their chosen fields of activity.

According to the figures, the greatest number were registered at Washington Junior High School, the day's total being 615. These cards must be separated and eventually sent to the board in the city or town where the registrant resides. This task was started this morning. Draft Board No. 2 One hundred and fifty registrars worked in three shifts at the three registration places set up by Draft Board No. 2. Ninety were engaged at Franklin School, 30 at Penn School and 30 at Lafayette School. None of the more than 2.000 who registered were required to wait more than three minutes before be-ing called to register, Draft Board officials declared.
