**LOCAL SOLDIER NOW
STATIONED IN ENGLAND**

**Frank George Writes Americans
Appreciate Packages of Razor
Blades, Tobacco, Soap.**

American soldiers in England find it difficult to get tobacco, razor blades, soap and matches, a Bethlehem soldier writes to his parents here. The knowledge may help local folks who are preparing gifts or boxes to be sent abroad. Matches, cake and candy, however, are not being accepted by the post office department.

The Bethlehem boy is Frank George, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ldwelyn George, 546 North New Street, and disclosure of his location is made in a V-letter of October 15, just received by his father. His letter follows:

"Guess where I am? No less than Merry England. It seems to be a great country and so far we have been treated very well. However, never fear, they'll never force me to drink their tea. I'm also happy to say our trip across was uneventful.

"Tobacco, razor blades, soap and matches are hard to get. Let's hope that you'll send some from time to time. Let's hope you'll write often. You can probably obtain victory letter blanks at the postoffice."

A box with a supply of tobacco, razor blades and soap was sent to

Private George this afternoon. Private George's parents were notified October 15 by the War Department of their son's safe arrival overseas and they received a cable from their son last week.

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
