

## Three Brothers Reunited After Overseas Duty

Wearing their theatre ribbons with numerous battle stars, the Remaley brothers are together again, swapping tales of their experiences overseas. The trio, who were all assigned to combat duty have now been discharged.

Reginald, member of the 555th Signal Warning Battalion attached to the 9th Air Force, entered the service in January 1943. He received his basic training at Atlantic City and radar training in Florida before shipping to England in October 1943. He attended several RAF radar schools there from December, 1943 through May, 1944, and was a radar operator with his unit, which guided planes to and from their target on the continent.

Landing in France on "D-1" he saw action in France, Holland, Belgium, Czechoslovakia and Austria. He wears the ETO ribbon with six battle stars and Good Conduct ribbon. After two years duty he returned to the States in September, 1945, and received his discharge at Indiantown Gap, October, 21. Prior to entering the service he was employed by Western Electric Company. Kenneth MOM2-C mamber of the

Kenneth, MM2-C, member of the fighting 78th Naval Construction Battalion, entered the service in September, 1943. After finishing "boot" at Camp Peary, Va.; he rereturned home and was stationed at the Philadelphia Navy Yard until he received his discharge several days ago. He wears the American Defense Medal, Asiatic—Pacific and Victory medals and two campaign stars. MM2-C Remaley is a former employee of the Bethlehem Steel Company.

Cpl. Lester, member of the 155th Infantry Regiment, of the famed 31st Division, which served as part of the 8th Army, entered the service November 11, 1942. He received his basic at Camp Shelby, Miss. and trained further at various camps throughout the States. Sent overseas early in 1944, he saw action in New Guinea, Netherland East Indies and the Philippines. He was discharged, December 22 at Indiantown Gap. Cpl. Remaley holds the following decorations: American Defense, Asiatic-Pacific, Philippine Liberation, Good Conduct and Victory ribbons with two campaign stars. Before entering the Army, he was employed at Pep Boys.
