Lt. T. G. Heck Badly Hurt In Battle

1st Lieut. Theodore G. Heck was seriously wounded in France on March 20th, according to a telegram received from the War Department by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. William F. Heck, of 1024 Linden Street. The injury occurred while his unit was making a river crossing. A letter was received from Lt. Heck shortly after the arrival of the telegram explaining the nature of his wounds and according to his own statement he will be back in action within a few weeks.

Lieut. Heck was a senior at Lehigh University at the time of his enlistment. He received his basic training at Fort McClellan, Alabama, and was commissioned a 2nd lieutenant at Fort Benning, Georgia, June 27th, 1944. Assigned to the 70th Division at Camp Adair, Oregon, after his graduation, he remained there but a short time as the division was transferred to Ft. Leonard Wood, Mo. He sailed for Europe early in December and has been in active combat almost constantly since his arrival there. The 70th Division is attached to General Patch's Seventh Army and their action has taken place largely in Alsace-Lorraine.

Lieut. Heck has two brothers in the service. Sgt. William A. Heck, assigned to the Air Force at Stuttgart, Arkansas, and Corporal Guy O. Heck, also of the Air Force at Tyndall Field, Panama City, Fla.

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
