PVT. STANLEY BEDNARCHEK Butztown Boy Reported **Dead in Action**

Two weeks after he was restored to duty after having been wounded, Pvt. Stanley Bednarchek, aged 19, Pvt. Stanley Bednarchek, aged 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Bednar-chek, residing near Butztown, was killed in action on February 7 in Germany. Word of his death came to the parents today in a telegram from the adjutant general. Young Bednarchek was first wounded on January 19 in Luxem-bourg His injuries apnarently ware

wounded on January 19 in Luxem-bourg. His injuries apparently were not serious and he returned to duty as the Third Army, of which his in-fantry regiment was a part, con-tinued its drive into Germany. The young soldier, after attending schools at Butztown, helped his father with farm work until he en-listed on June 26, of last year. He was sent to Camp Blanding, Fla., for-training and five months later, De-cember 1. was sent overseas. cember 1, was sent overseas.

He is survived by his parents. He has two brothers, one Peter Bednarhas two brothers, one Peter Bednar-chek, who has been given a medical discharge from the Marine Corps following wounds in Guadalcanal. The other, Joseph, is with the Air Corps in California. Four sisters also survive. They are Mrs. Joseph Tadayeski, Easton R. D. 3; Mrs. John Yartymyk, Bethlehem; Miss Helen, at home, and Miss Anna, in New York. New York.
