Local Medical Officer Is Guest At Queen's University In Ireland

Dr. Sidney H. Mirbach, Captain, U. S. Medical Corps, a former Bethlehem practitioner, now on duty "somewhere in England," has the distinction of being one of the U. S. medicos who met members of the second vacation course for United States and Canadian medical services in the Great Hall of the Queen's University of Belfast. The invitation, according to information sent to his wife, was extended by the chancellor and senate of the university.

At the invitation of the British Council, he attended the informal dinner at the Grand Central Hotel, held in connection with the course.

A native of Phillipsburg, Center County, Pa., he completed his scholastic training in his home town, and subsequently graduated from the University of Pittsburgh. In 1937, he graduated from Jefferson Medical School, and served his internship at the Sacred Heart Hospital, Allentown.

With offices at 111 East Broad Street, he practiced medicine in this city for a period of four years.

Commissioned a first lieutenant in January, 1943, he was sent to Carlisle, and later to a paratroop unit at Camp McKall, N. C. From the latter station he was sent to Camp Dix, where he was advanced to the rank of captain. In October of last
