

BASD Board approves contracts

Resident questions safety of students' COVID shots

The BASD school board met June 21 to approve a multitude of contracts and a few salary adjustments. Many contracts were renewals of ongoing relationships, but several were new items funded by grants from the state's allotment of the federal Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief II and III programs.

All measures but one passed 5-0. Item 13.02, a recommendation to appeal the assessed value of 36 parcels of commercial property, met with opposition from board president Mike Faccinetto, who stated his view that the current economic situation makes it inappropriate to seek more money from these landowners

at this time. Of the roughly \$2.2 billion Pa. received from the federal Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act's ESSER programs, BASD will receive \$15,889,038 (ESSER II) and \$32,116,071 (ESSER III), for a total of \$48,005,109. As described in the district's budget book, \$11.5 million is being spent on summer enrichment and academic ramp-up programs to help students returning to school in the fall get back on track. The district is also using federal money to provide professional development to staff in the areas of math, literacy, and Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) for students' social and emotional needs. Tutoring programs funded by federal relief money will be offered all year.

The board approved several professional development and consulting vendor contracts. including Grading Rx to advise the district on a multi-year program to change the grading system in middle and high schools, Southern Regional Education Board (SREB) to train middle school math teachers (\$132,000), Houghton Mifflin Harcourt to train high school math teachers (approx. \$51,000), and Step By Step Learning (SBSL) for a variety of literacy training services (approximately \$2.2 million).

Julie Bailey, president of the Foundation for the BASD, presented the board with a check for nearly \$175,000. This year, in addition to funding field trips and supporting Project Lead the Way, awards were made from the Foundation to support new initiatives including dual

NATANILA AGENTIS 'God brought me back to school'

't was an act of her birth mother's love that ultimately led Natanila (Nati) Agentis to Lehigh Christian Academy (LCA), where Christ's love is the heartbeat of

the school. Natanila was one of four graduates composing the school's Class of 2021, and the school's commencement exercises June 4 at Cedar Crest Bible Fellowship

Church in Allentown is a world away from her native Ethiopia, where, she says, "God saved my toiling to provide for

Natanila was being raised in Ethiopia by her mother, Meseret Teshome, and her grandpa. After he passed away when Natanila was in second grade, her mother faced severe financial hardships, struggling to pay for food and her daughter's school. She also faced a cancer

diagnosis.

Though young, Natanila saw her mother her daughter.

"It was the worst year for me," Natanila

So the young girl did something she thought would help - for six months she only drank water and ate very little to help save her mother money.

"If I was hungry, I'd take a nap, so it didn't matter if I was hungry

or not," Natanila says. "I locked myself in a dark room. I had a broken heart.'

It was at this point Natanila credited God with saving her life. Her mother got her to a hospital, where she almost died. The doctor and his wife were very kind to her, and the Ethiopian Orthodox Church was very supportive and became like a home to

'It's not hopeless. It's not easy'

Special to the Bethlehem Press abriel (Gabe) Shellock was an average kid, who fell apart in high school.

He attended Liberty HS in Bethlehem. He describes the classes as large, and himself as "lost" in the back of the classroom, but he doesn't blame class sizes or companions for his addictions. He sees his own mental health as the culprit.

Things came to a head when the house alarm sounded late one evening. Gabe's stepmother went to shut it off and found her son. Gabe says she brought him up to his father. "I think he's high,"

she said.

He was. Fortunately, Gabe's parents were supportive. They found Kolbe Academy, a small high school run by the Diocese of Allentown just off Bridle Path Road in Bethlehem. Its mission is to treat high school-

ers with addictions, and guide them to graduation.

Gabe entered the Kolbe Academy in his 11th grade year. Initially, it was a good fit for Gabe. Then COVID-19 struck. Gabe attended a few online classes, but slipped into addiction again.

He attempted suicide three times. He overdosed and spent some time in the hospital, but he didn't lose his connection to his school.

Kolbe staffers kept in regular contact with him, and as he recovered, he was able to keep up with his schoolwork. He credits the Kolbe Academy staff for sticking with him and describes the staff as supportive and listen-

Gabe has now been sober for over 387 days. He received acceptances to five colleges, and scholarship offers from four. His plan is to start at Northampton County Community College, so See GABE on Page A2



Homicide plea

Lehigh County District Attorney Jim Martin has announced Jahmel Anthony Crews, 27, pleaded guilty in a 2019 homicide on

According to Martin, on Oct. 23, at approximately 1:03 a.m., members of the Allentown Police Department found Yaret Rivera, 22, of Worcester, MA, in a parking area with a gunshot wound to the chest. Rivera died from his injuries and his death was ruled a homicide by the Lehigh County Coroner's Office.

An investigation revealed that Crews and his alleged accomplice, Walter Martinez, 27, caused the death of Rivera while in the commission of a robbery. Martinez is charged with criminal homicide, robbery and conspiracy to commit robbery, all felonies of the first degree.

Crews' sentencing is scheduled for Aug. 11.

Continued from page A1 tanila, her mother had started the process to give her daughter a better life. She was placed in an orphanage for two and a half years. Across the Atlantic, Nate and Melanie Agentis of Bethlehem started the paperwork to adopt her in 2014, but since it is a long process, she didn't arrive here until July 4,

2017. Natanila was welcomed into the Agentis family, which includes the couple's other children Lola, Logan, Riley, Mayzee and August.

Bethlehem is nice. I like walking and seeing people," Natannila says.
"We have a nice big yard where I play with my siblings, and I also take them to the park."

Natanila began her education here in the English as a Second Language (ESL) program at Northampton HS, where she was enrolled for her first

two years in the United States. In the fall of 2020, she joined all her siblings at LCA, which has held in-person classes throughout the COVID-19 pandemic.

Natanila said she never thought she'd be able to go to a Christian school because of the ESL program, but LCA also offers the program.

"When I first came to LCA, I was so nervous. I didn't know how I'd connect with people," Natanila admits. "In the public school, I sat in the back of the library, but here I'm more connected with people."

Natanila was in the chorus at LCA, as she had been in public school. She wanted to play basketball at LCA, but chose not to so she could concentrate on her studies. Natanila previously participated in gymnastics locally and says, "I dream to go back.'

Natanila has been very happy at LCA. As her education in Ethi-

opia was limited, she says, "God brought me back to school.' Melanie Agentis

said Natanila faced challenges because her education in Ethiopia was curbed, but she not only met those challenges but triumphed over them with hard work and, as Melanie says, "the awesome team of people that have helped her to achieve those milestones" in her educational journey.

"The thing I like best here is Chapel Wednesdays," Natanila says, "when students and teachers share and ask people to pray for them. The teachers really connect with the kids. We share what's going on,"

"We call it fellowship - to be here and care for one another," says John Moser, director of development, of Chapel Wednesdays.

"We accentuate character at this school," Moser continues. "It's not a list of do's and don'ts, but Biblically

looking at what a godly man or woman is like.'

"Natanila's smile lights up the room, and joy oozes out of her, Moser says, adding that it's been beautiful to see her "transformation and reclamation.

"She's going to be tough to lose," he says. "She may think others have had a big impact on her, and that may be true, but she has had a massive impact on us here.'

Natanila's birth mother, Meseret. remains in Ethiopia. Though it still hurts Natanila to lose her, they keep in touch by phone.

The graduate's future plans? "I want to go to col-

lege and study nursing to help people," Natanila says.

"Natanila certainly is a very fortunate young lady having been through a difficult childhood," Moser says, "but we are sure many good things are in store for her."

During the public comment portion of the evening, Fountain Hill resident Iris Kale read a statement highlighting risks of COVID-19

"Unprecedented pressure is being exerted on children to take experimental biological products," Kale said, noting, "only 1,100 children were followed for two months [before the emergency use authorization in children 12

to 15]," and asking the board whether parents are being given information on reporting vaccine injury via the Vaccine Adverse Event rting System (VAERS).

Board president Mike Faccinetto noted the passing of Walter Pocalyko, who was on the last Bethlehem Township school board and the first BASD school

board, and who championed the name "Freedom" for the township's new high school.

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

·\$1 million for broadband needs for Northampton County K-12

·\$1 million for Emergency Medical Services Grants ·Approximately \$6 million for personal protective equipment, vaccination efforts, testing and hazard pay

Details on how and when to apply for the grants will be provided in future press releases.

DRIVE-THRU TESTING: Lehigh Valley Hospital-Coordinated Health Allentown Hospital (LVH-CHA) announce new hours of operation at the drive-through COVID-19 testing and vaccination center. Beginning on Monday, June 28, hours of operation at the site will be Monday/Wednesday/Friday from 10 a.m.-2 p.m. and Tuesday/Thursday from 2-6 p.m. Vaccinations are by appointment only and only available for Northampton County residents, age 18 and over. Patients can choose from all three vaccines: Pfizer, Moderna and Johnson & Johnson. Pfizer and Moderna require two shots administered three weeks apart, Johnson and Johnson requires only one dose.

As of June 18, 68 people have received at least one shot at the testing site.

To make an appointment for a vaccine at the COVID-19 testing site, use one of the following options:

Schedule at the LVHN website at LVHN.org/appointments. ·Schedule on the MyLVHN patient portal, at MyLVHN.org.

·Call 833-584-6283 (833-LVHN-CVD). The COVID-19 Vaccine Hotline is open Monday-Friday, 8:30 a.m.-5:30 p.m. and Saturday-Sunday, 9 a.m.-5 p.m.

A physician's order is not required for a COVID-19 test. The drive-through site is open to everyone, but only residents of Northampton County will have the cost of testing covered by the county if they do not have health coverage. All testing will be through HNL Lab Medicine unless insurance requires an alternate laboratory. Participants should bring a photo ID and their insurance card, if they have one, with them to the testing site.

We must teach our history'

"We still struggle with racism today," said Rayah Levy, the master of ceremonies on Juneteenth eve. She was speaking to over 100 celebrants who gathered that evening at Bethle-hem's sculpture Garden next to city hall.

In a joyous get together, a crowd comprised of different races and cultures, academics, politicians and local citizens listened to music, were entertained by dancers, and listened to speeches. They were all commemorating the first, national holiday of Juneteenth.

'Never forget the millions of people who were enslaved," Rayah Levy said. "Let's take a step back in history and remember all who were enslaved.

"We must not forget our history," said Levy. "We must teach our history. We must teach it and we must say it loud. We must say it out loud and continue to share our history because it is extremely, extremely important to not forget our history."

She said Africans were living in Bethlehem in 1741. "Esther Lee's family came here in the 1800s. There is history here. And we must learn the history. We must learn about

where we live.' Bethlehem NAACP Chapter President Esther Lee said, "We have begun to work together to accomplish our ends. There is much to be done in the Lehigh Valley. We do it within our own city.

ever name the white man attached to us we answered to. We didn't stand up for what we believed it should be, but we answered to what we are called. It's almost like being in slavery.

"I was asked what I thought about Juneteenth being set apart as a holiday. It's another day, and I hope it's not used by businessmen to set up for shopping. I would hope each year we can come together and have a celebration, a joyful time remembering our forefathers, and sisters and mothers and what they went through. I'm a great-granddaughter of a slave. I've looked at her history and given much thought about how she, as a black woman, had to give herself to my great-grandfather, who was a white Englishman; and to have no choice, but she raised nine children.

"We are making strides in the world today, but in order to demolish what they call systemic racism, there is much that has to be done. We need to get busy doing it. There's See TEACH on Page A4



The latest round of government assistance for small business has arrived. It is part of the American Rescue Plan. Called the Restaurant Revitalization Fund, or RRF, it allocates \$9.5 billion of assistance. Unlike past assistance, this assistance is intended to make up for business losses during the pandemic. U.S. Representative Susan Wild led a virtual education session on the Rescue Plan.

It is only available to businesses that are still in operation. Permanently closed businesses are not eligible. There are also limits on how many locations a business may have to be eligible. However, businesses that have not yet opened, but have incurred expenses in 2021 are eligible to apply.

The first assistance will be distributed to business owners in specific Priority groups: Veterans, Women and socially or economically disadvantaged small

The funds must be used on expenses incurred between Feb. 15, 2020 and March 11, 2023. Once the funds are received, recipients must use them by March 11, 2023.





Locals win Burger King scholarships



Program protects 'industrial athletes'

Two years ago, you would have found Athletic Trainer Nilvia Vazquez working with student-athletes at Parkland High School, evaluating an injury, treating a sprained ankle or performing therapeutic exercises with them.

But these days she spends much of her time on the brewery floor at Samuel Adams in Breinigsville, teaching employees how to properly lift a case of Hard Seltzer, performing ergonomic assessments or reviewing injury and lost days reports with managers.

Vasquez, 27, who has a master's degree in athletic training from Moravian College, is the first resident in St. Luke's pioneering Athletic Trainness Residency program. A first-of-its kind nationwide, the program is currently under review for formal recognition by the Commission on the Accreditation of Athletic Training Education.

According to Kyra Dodson, MS, LAT-ATC, CEAS II, Manager of Occupational Medicine, Prevention and Wellness, who currently serves as the residency's program director, workplace musculoskeletal disorders cost companies more than \$60 billion each year in medical and insurance expenses and lost production time.

Blending formal education with practical onsite work experience, the new Athletic Training: Prevention and Wellness Residency program is the culmination of a collaborative effort combining the disciplines of athletic training and occupational medicine. The overarching objective is injury








